## YARRA TRACK HOSTELRIES- Marysville to Woods Point

Travelling into the bush on an unknown track for many miles it was important to know where supplies, lodgings and horse feed could be found. Hostelries along the Yarra Track were often spaced at a day's walk or horse ride. Travellers walked more often than they rode with the steep track and wet conditions.

The first bridle track went from Fernshaw to Paradise Plains, where there were a few shanties. These shanty owners<sup>1</sup> moved to Marysville or further along when the main Yarra Track, built 1864-1870, left Fernshaw by the Black Spur via Marysville to join the original track about Mt Grant.


Many of these shanties did not last long. The crowds of individual "surface" gold miners was (or had) ended. And fewer were employed in "deep" mining. As one owner remarked "I hardly make enough to pay for my (shanty) licence" George Edwards' comments in notes on the Walker Family and the Yarra Track.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> Belle Isle original name referenced in "Virgin Gold & How to Win It", James holt former storekeeper, Wood's Point, 1896 and in 1938 F G Cobb article. Paraphrased Belel is a wide grassy expanse set in a narrow valley fringed with Native Beech trees. The popular theory for the name Bel-el is that in the early days on the Yarra Track Mr Bell had his hotel here. Bell's Hotel was known as Bell's Hell. Another explanation is that the original name was Belle Isle. The clear expanse of grassland being considered as a 'beautiful island' after the rough passage through such a sea of forest. No hotel was on the site, but a man named Bell lived there, who became renowned for his hospitality. He was a paling splitter by occupation, living in a humble shanty; but many had cause to thank Bell for his often-boiling billy and thawing warmth of a fire after a trek or bullock-wagon journey over a snow-clad road.
