TOUR OF INSPECTION

Yesterday Councillors from the Shire of Healesville were taken on an Official Tour of Inspection of the Forests Commission Activities within their Shire.

Forests Commission Officers from the Marysville Forest District, Toolangi Forest District and Healesville Divisional Headquarters accompanied the Councillors and provided background information on the aspects covered by the tour.

The Councillors are concerned that their Shire is disadvantaged by the large tracts of unrateable land controlled by the Forests Commission, Board of Works and National Parks

Authority.

The main theme of the tour was to emphasise to the Councillors that the area controlled by the Forests Commission was in fact the life blood of their community. The income of the majority of the rate payers within the Shire is in some way derived, directly or indirectly, from the large tracts of forested land within the Shire.

The two main population areas, Healesville and Marysville, depend on sawmilling and tourism for their prosperity and both of these industries are directly dependent on these for-

ested areas.

The Councillors were shown the various steps involved in regenerating the forests after all the merchantable timber has been removed, how better use is being made of the low quality forest areas by converting them to pine plantations and how the amenities for the public who use the forests for
