REFLECTIONS ON HISTORY

from MARYSVILLE & DISTRICT HISTORICAL SOCIETY

A good long while ago when gathering material on the eastern end of the old Yarra Track, I met up with some people who'd spent their young years in the area. They were unwilling to discuss the mean conditions of those long-ago times. Such as boys and girls working in small family goldmines. Now, a group of descendants of a large family established at Narbethong in early times are soon to embark on a sentimental journey along The Track, to Narbethong and Marysville. Some of the group will travel from as far as northern NSW. In the Narbethong area, pioneer members of the two families - Roche and Andrews - settled in to conduct a sawmill, building the Black Spur Hotel, and provide transport.

It is recorded one Charlie Andrews was the first person to drive a horse-drawn Cobb & Co passenger coach over Black Spur. Later, when motor cars came, by Roche's Motors was the way to go. As the thirty-or-so descended family members make their way by modern-day, comfortable travel, they can only read about the undertaking of managing a team of horses hauling a seemingly top-heavy coach. It had to make safe way, depending on skilled driving around those steep hairpin bends and sudden rises which made up parts of that old route of Black Spur, as it wound higher over Mt. Monda.

I'm studying two pictures of two Cobb & Co coaches outside Keppel's Marysville Hotel. The year would be about 1890. One outfit is loaded up all ready to leave for Melbourne. People stand around, saying farewell. Some seem to be sitting on the roof of the coach, apparently four metres from ground level. Their position looks a bit precarious. Three cab horses are in one team, four in the other. The second coach, not yet loaded, will probably swing around and carry mail and passengers to Woods Point and the goldfields. The pictures, of course, are part of the Society's vast collection.

Why I'm musing today about travel on Yarra Track is because of the forthcoming visit of the group paying homage to their forebears. It is hoped they will have a fitting reception as they arrive at Marysville's Gallipoli park on Saturday, 22nd February, at 10.30am. They will plant a memorial tree in the Park to honour the pioneers, mingle with interested locals, then move on to Narbethong Hotel where a second tree will be planted. The visitors will be shown an oak tree about a century old, and planted by a great grandparent in the grounds when the property was Roche's Hotel.

It will be a splendid time to pause awhile for reflection on the subject of the first road builders and transport, and accommodation houses of which the founders of the present-day generation visiting, played a major part. It's time to express some appreciation and pride for the pioneers. ■

The film crew consists of one cameraman, two producers, film director, the Client (from Rev Milk), wardrobe mistress, 'grips' (carry cameras etc.), art department (in charge of all props e.g. soccer net in this instance).

The wardrobe mistress designed and made the soccer uniforms (black and white).

I don't know if the cows were 'made up', but I saw one of the human players having make-up applied!

The Country (cows) sported leg bands and head bands in Rev colours.

Red and white on the black and white Friesians - the perfect colour combination!

Who picked the teams?

The humans were chosen by a casting agent. The country team, were local cows, from the Mansfield area. They were mainly house cows, and all pure bred Friesians.

Who trained the teams?

I'll only concentrate on the winners. Gerald Egan from Mansfield and a team of animal handlers.

MID-GOULBURN WATER

Mid-Goulburn Water and Goulburn Valley Water have agreed on terms of reference for investigations into water boundary structural issues. This follows on from discussions which the Chairman of the two Authorities have had with Minister Pat McNamara's office.

In the first stage of the study consultants will evaluate the current and future potential business performance of each Authority.

Mid-Goulburn Chief Executive, John Maglen, said, "They will be looking at our financial performance and the extent to which each Authority is meeting Government requirements for matters such as drinking water quality and wastewater management".

Other issues to be addressed will be how community and industry service expectations are being met. Both Authorities have made significant contributions to natural resource management, particularly through their active involvement with the Goulburn-Broken Catchment and Land Protection Board. The consultants have been requested to highlight the major achievements of the Authorities since they were formed.

Mid-Goulburn has been operating since 1991 when the former Authorities in Seymour, Broadford and Kilmore were merged. Later the Board was to include Marysville, Mansfield, Alexandra, Yea and Pyalong into its operations. These mergers were completed in 1995.

Mr Maglen said, "I was concerned that in looking at any potential amalgamation that the impact on customer service and the local business environment is taken into consideration. Stage 2 of the study will investigate the benefits and disbenefits of any merging of the Authorities and these impacts have now been included in the consultant's brief. The Minister's office has made it clear that any changes are to be customer driven, accordingly, this requirement has been included in the brief. Likewise, local offices are to be kept open."

"The Mid-Goulburn Board gave undertakings when the last round of restructuring took place that we would maintain a visible presence throughout the region. Customer service centres in Mansfield, Alexandra and Kilmore continue to be well patronised by the local community," he said.

At their most recent meeting Board Chairman, Ian Everist, stated that it was important that the community be kept informed on these issues, and that they be given an opportunity to have input into the deliberations.

"Whilst these further investigations into a potential merger have been unsettling for our staff, I am more than happy that they have continued to dedicate themselves to providing our services as efficiently and effectively as possible. I have given an undertaking that the impact on personnel is part of any deliberations," said Mr Everist.

Commissioner's Column

As mentioned previously in the media, my role as Chairman of Commissioner will, for all practical purposes, cease on Wednesday 12th February.

After discussions with the Office of Local Government regarding my intention to stand as a candidate in the neighbouring municipality of Strathbogie, it has been agreed that the most appropriate course of action is that I take leave of absence for the remainder of my term. There are some functions which I wish to attend and of course I am keen to be part of the official handover to the elected Council after March 15th, an event I am sure you will agree will be of some historical significance.

Nominations for Council opened on Thursday 6th February and closed on 12th February. Voting will be by post so candidates will need to commence their campaigns relatively quickly to ensure they get their message across before voters begin returning their ballot papers. All the information regarding the postal voting process can be obtained from the officers of the Victorian Electoral Commission who are operating out of the Yea Offices by telephoning (03) 5797 2209.

There has been substantial progress on the development of the new Murrindindi Planning Scheme following the release of the new statewide planning controls, called the Victorian Planning Provisions. These were released on the 24th December, 1996, by the Minister for Planning.

As residents would be aware, there was widespread community consultation last year as part of the development of the underlying strategic framework on which the new controls would be based. One of the fundamental changes that the new controls will introduce is the requirement for strategic planning to be an inherent component of the new controls. This is incorporated into the scheme as the Municipal Strategic Statement. Because the process is new, the Council is working very closely with the regional office of the Department of Infrastructure.

Once the preliminary draft of the planning scheme, in the new format, is finalised in about two weeks time, the Department of Infrastructure will closely check it for compliance with the new requirements. We have been advised that this would take about six weeks. It is expected that the Scheme will then be put on formal exhibition by early April, 1997, for a minimum of two months. If the new Council decides that some of the submissions should not be incorporated into the new controls, a panel hearing may be required to decide the issue. All Councils have been requested by the Minister to have their new planning schemes on exhibition by June, 1997.

In conclusion I wish to place on record the pleasure, excitement and sense of achievement I have experienced in carrying out my role as Chairman of Commissioners. Some of the decisions that the Commissioners were required to make were difficult for some sections of the community to accept, for when change occurs it impacts on the community unevenly. Nevertheless, the vast majority of the community have accepted that decisions needed to be made for the benefit of the whole Shire. I wish to thank all those residents and community groups with whom we have worked during my term and wish everyone in the Shire every success in the future.

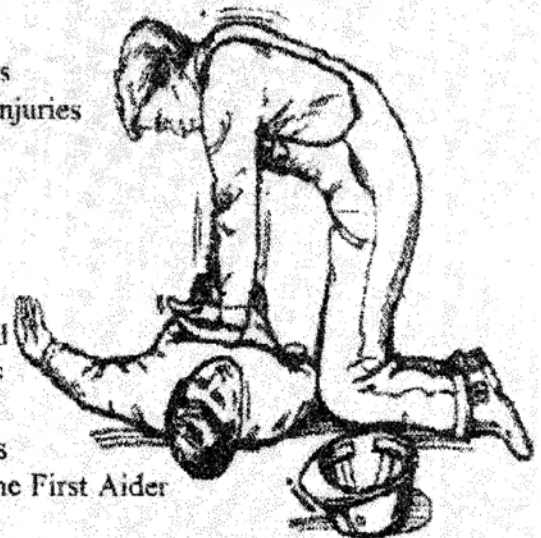

The Lions Club of Marysville & District is seeking local youth to represent our community and Australia in several different countries in December '97 & January '98 during the school holidays, through the Lions International Youth Exchange Programme.

The Lions Youth Exchange Programme is founded upon the first Object of Lionism: *To create and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world.*

Lions Youth Exchange is a not-for-profit programme, committed to broadening international awareness among the youth of the world.

Lions Youth Exchange emphasises the value of sharing in family and community life in another country. It is not tourism; nor is it conducted for the purposes of formal education or employment.

The chief organisers of Youth Exchange are Lions Clubs whose activities are co-ordinated at Multiple District and District level. All applicants, whether hosts or exchangees, must be screened and sponsored by a Lions, Lioness or Leo Club.

The programme is open to all young men and women, aged 16-21, who are eager to learn about another culture and willing to share their way of life, not only school students but also to youths who have already entered the workforce. All Lions exchangees are expected to serve as representatives of their respective communities and countries. Most of the programmes are of 5 to 6 weeks duration.

Australia currently exchanges with Austria, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Malaysia, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, South Africa, Sweden, Switzerland, Tahiti, United Kingdom, United States, and District to District (within Australia).

The costs of international travel and insurance are usually paid by the youth's family. Sometimes the sponsor club contributes towards the costs. During the period of exchange, room and board are provided by the host family. The host club may contribute to these costs and will assist for special excursions, entertainment and club dinners. The visitor should have been provided with funds for gifts, long distance telephone calls, souvenirs and incidentals. About \$AU200 per week is recommended and should be sufficient to cover all needs.

Most international flights have chaperones to accompany the groups of Youth Exchangees, they are also present in the country of exchange to assist with any problems that may occur. The chaperones are all experienced Lions Youth Exchange personnel who have been involved in the programme for some years.

Costs of the various programmes can be obtained by contacting Lion John Bartley on (03) 5774 7258. But remember that costs quoted will not be air fares only, but will include all air travel ex Melbourne, insurance, internal travel in destination country, visas where required, departure taxes and stopovers where applicable in Honolulu, Los Angeles, Singapore, Tokyo, Melbourne and Sydney etc.
