SUSPICIOUS FIRES -APPEAL FOR INFORMATION IN

Phoenix Task Force detectives are treating the fires that occurred in the Marysville Buxton, Narbethong and Murrindindi region as suspicious.

MURRINDINDI MILL AREA

Detectives are appealing for information in relation to a fire which started in the vicinity of the Murrindindi Mill on Saturday February 7

Investigators would like to speak to anyone who was in the area of the Murrindindi Mill near Wilhelmina Falls Road on that day.

Murrindindi is located between the townships of Glenburn and Yea and the mill area can be accessed from the Melba Highway or a number of other local roads

Detective Superintendent Paul Hollowood said that there must be some one out there who saw something on the day, that can assist us with this investigation

"We need to hear from anyone who was in this area on the day. It may not be immediately obvious that they saw something unusual or of possible value, but it is important that we speak with them"

These fires were absolutely devastating and are causing immense pain and loss to many people," Mr Hollowood said

There is a popular camping area and swimming hole not too far from the mill, however it is likely that the extreme weather conditions on Saturday 7 February may have kept most people away.

The visit by these distinguished Lions was greatly appreciated by the our Lions, many of whom had not been able to meet with other members since the fire

The members are extremely grateful to all who helped make this nappen, including Member for Seymour Ben Hardman, Premier's Department, Department of Justice, Victoria Police Superintendent Ross McNeill, and Victoria Police Operations Co-ordinator, Homicide Jeff Maher and Senior Sgt Ralph Willingham Police Forward Commander, Marysville.




SURVIVORS

Here's a story that in the midst of such tragedy will. I hope, give us a moment to rejoice in the miracle of life.

These 5 little ladies (see pic) lived on a farm approximately 4 kms from Marysville. They are part of the Perry family who are fourth generation loeals first arriving in the 1800s.

The fires swept down on their home with mercifless ferocity - as you can see by the posted picture the family homes were destroyed and everything in the fires path was completely engulfed - that is except for our five little ladies whose home miraculously was spared. How ? We'll never know.





So who were these ladies? Well I don't know their names but they are chooks, yes the Perry chooks. David Perry, their owner, smiled genuinely as he related coming home to the absolute devastation and discovering the girls - a little singed - but still on the job!

Dave tells me they cleaned out the girls home - their straw in their nesting boxes had burned and there were several hard roasted eggs, but the girls were already hard at work - the attached picture shows their morning's work 4 eggs! (one of the girls had de-layed shock).

I am told of the symbolism of this - eggs signifying new life and the promise of rebirth.

Picnic chairs and an esky were found nearby and police are now concerned about the whereabouts of the owners.

Anyone with information about who may own the dogs are asked to contact police so it can be determined whether they are missing or currently accounted for.

The puppies, one black and one tan, have suffered burns and are currently being aided by the Yea RSPCA.

WATER QUALITY ISSUES

Goulburn Valley Water is preparing for potential water quality issues that may arise as a result of rainfall after the fires.

Goulburn Valley Water's General Manager Technical Services, Mr Allen Gale said that the Corporation has identified the potential risk of water quality problems from runoff after the fires for each of its water systems. "A number of catchments in our region have extensive fire damage so if there is heavy rainfall event then ash and debris from the fires could be washed into the waterways that we draw our water from for drinking water supplies."

"A number of our systems have off stream storages and for these systems we will stop diverting water into them prior, during and after a rainfall event," said Mr Gale. "Stopping the diversion will ensure that runoff does not enter our water supply. This could be for a day or two or up to several weeks."

Mr Gale said that the systems that do not have off stream storages will need special attention. "We will need to use a number of different approaches depending on the size and treatment facilities for each system. In an extreme case tankering of drinking water may be required."

Mr Gale said that when the runoff occurs it will be most important for customers to use as little water as possible.

"We have been speaking to a number of our counterparts in other water corporations who have experienced bushfires and water quality issues from rainfall events," said Mr Gale. "We are doing everything we can so that we are prepared for any deterioration in water quality."
