POSTCARDS FROM MOROCCO

(The current travel diary from Megan & Marty of Buxton)

Wednesday April 8 – Bonjour from Casablanca: After 32 hours in transit we finally arrived at our hotel at 2 pm yesterday afternoon.

I was delighted to find the room had a bath and collapsed into it for a good soak. Around 4 pm we laid down for a quick nap, with the intention of going for a walk and doing some exploring afterwards, and didn't get up until about 6:30 am this morning!

Today we went for a walk into town and visited the amazing Hassan II mosque, the medina (the old part of town consisting of winding little streets and market stalls) and walked back via the beachfront which is all being redeveloped – I am sure it will look like Surfers before too long!

Thursday 9 April: 'We're all riding on the Marrakech Express... Today we left Casablanca behind and caught the Marrakech Express (any Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young fans out there?) to...well, Marrakech.

Three hours sitting in the train was a great way to see the variously changing country side with the capacity to get a few shots along the way – not something you can do easily on a bike...unless you want to stop all the time.

Marrakech is a lovely place – everything that Casablanca wasn't, really. We have two nights here at the end of the bike tour so will have time to explore the place properly then.

We went directly from the train to the bike hire place where we were acquainted with our transport for the next three weeks (always wanted a zippy little black BMW – now I have one ... for awhile at least).

Back to the hotel for the night and tomorrow morning we are back to the bike hire place to pick up the bikes and start the part of the trip we came half way around the world for – riding through the Atlas Mountains.

10 April: Heading for Hendrix country – Today saw our first day riding and all I can say is thank goodness we have previously ridden in India! Riding in traffic that seems to obey few road rules, on a bike you are unfamiliar with (at least this one has the controls in the same places as we are used to – not like the Enfields we rode in India) is tricky enough – add to that being on the wrong side of the road!!! The India experience at least meant the vehicular 'free-for-all' was not something else to try and get our heads around for the first time.

We had an easy morning's ride to our destination of Essaouria

(Jimmy Hendrix lived here for a while) along a nice straight road with a total of just three turns to get us to Marrakech. However turning left at a T-intersection in suburbia, when you are on the opposite side of the road where you are used to being, is a bit of a case of taking your life in your hands. We found it was best to take the 'Safety in numbers' approach – one takes off and we all go ... and a good idea to ride behind the Americans at this point in time! Lunched at Sam's Seafood Restaurant on the waterfront where Jimmy Hendrix ate in 1963 (according to the signed picture in the foyer – mind you... everywhere seems to be promoting their Jimmy 'Experience')

Wandered through the Medina for shopping (I think I may have single handedly propped up the Moroccan economy with the amount of jewellery I bought) for the rest of the afternoon before heading back to our Riad and, yes, another bath! You have got to love a country that considers a bath a mandatory inclusion in even the most basic of bathrooms.

It is truly a wonderful feeling to be here on the bikes finally, as I can honestly say after the dramas of the recent months, there have been times since 7 February that I wondered how the hell we were ever going to get here! But we have.

FAMILY FISHING FESTIVAL NETS A KEEN CROWD AT EILDON

At least one lucky family discovered the joys of catching their dinner, during the weekend Family Fishing Festival at Eildon Pondage last Saturday.

The family, from Eildon, caught two rainbow trout and promptly announced the fish were destined for the dinner table that night.

They were among more than 80 families with 160 children who attended the event.

All up 38 fish, mostly stocked rainbow trout, were landed and many of those provided a unique thrill to young, first time anglers.

Family Fishing Festivals are aimed at beginning anglers, particularly children between four and sixteen years of age. These events have already introduced many youngsters to the joys of angling.

The manager of the Go Fishing in Victoria initiative, Brian Mottram, said one mother indicated the event has given her the confidence to now take her son fishing.

"One little girl caught her first ever fish and proudly showed all the other participants in the fishing activity," Mr Mottram said.

"Brightly painted faces and colourful balloons didn't deter the fish from biting.

"Lots of happy families left the event with bags of goodies after a fun day and some were lucky enough to win a new fishing rod and reel combo.

"Eildon Pondage is regularly stocked and provides great opportunities for fishers of all abilities and the Eildon township would love to see people visiting their region over coming months and enjoying the fishing opportunities.

"Other Family Fishing Festivals will be held at Lake Hyland, Churchill on 2 May. Kennington Reservoir, Bendigo on 9 August, Lilydale Lake on 19 September and Jubilee Lake in Daylesford on 18 October."

MURRINDINDI SHIRE COUNCIL

Amnesty period on open air burning in residential areas within Murrindindi Shire



It has been brought to the attention of the Murrindindi Shire Council and the Municipal Fire Prevention Committee that there is a considerable amount of fire hazard material (vegetation material i.e. tree limbs and cuttings, dried leaves) within some residential properties in the Shire. As a result of this build-up of combustible material from the recent February 2009 bushfire, a decision has been made to give residents a five (5) week-end opportunity to clean up any possible fire hazard on their properties.

Therefore, on the weekend of **2 & 3 May 2009** and the following weekends of **8 & 9 May; 15 & 16 May; 22 & 23 May; and 29 & 30 May 2009**, an 'AMNESTY' will exist and residents within the Murrindindi Shire will be permitted to 'burn-off' any vegetation material without fear of breaching Council's Local Laws.

Although this Amnesty period exempts persons from breaching Council's Local Laws, it does not exempt persons who light fires that cause a nuisance, created by the smoke from these fires. Please ensure that when burning off, that your fire does not create a nuisance.

NO WINDROWS MUST BE LIT. ALL FIRES MUST BE NO LARGER THAN A METRE IN DIAMETER OR A METRE IN HEIGHT.

The local Fire Brigades in your immediate area have been made aware of this 'Amnesty' period.

****Please Note**** For persons not wishing to burn off, Council is offering residents **free disposal** of their household vegetation material at all Waste Transfer Station sites on the above weekends. Please ensure you present your Tip ID Tag or Rates Notice to the Transfer Station Attendant on arrival. This offer is not available to commercial operators.

Councillor Comment

Firstly may I take this opportunity to thank the staff of Murrindindi Shire for their excellent presentation of the community information session at the Marysville Golf Club on Saturday 18th April 2009. The feedback from the community has been positive saying it was very informative and well presented.

At the ordinary meeting held at Yea chambers on Wed 22nd April 2009 the council endorsed an agreement to the management model for bushfire recovery and reconstruction in the Murrindindi Shire as proposed at a meeting between councillors and representatives of the Victorian Bushfire Recovery & Reconstruction Authority (VBRRRA), the Department of Human Services (DHS) & the Department of Planning & Community Development (DPCD) concerning the longer term management of bushfire recovery & reconstruction within the Murrindindi Shire.

This agreement incorporated the following:-

- (a) The establishment of a delegated committee of council to oversee the longer term strategic management of Bushfire Recovery & Reconstruction
- (b) The formation of a single set of advisory groups across the fire affected communities
- (c) An instrument of delegation for the committee of council to appoint 3 Councillors to the committee

The Committee of Council (referred to as The Murrindindi Bushfire Recovery & Reconstruction Committee-MBRRC) will be in accordance with section 86 of the local government act 1989 with the main purpose being to ensure alignment of the activities of VBRRRA, DHS, DPCP and the council in relation to bushfire recovery in the Murrindindi Shire.

The Committee's role will focus on the longer term strategic management of the reconstruction process to ensure each communities economic, infrastructure, environmental & health needs are identified and met.

The Committee will comprise of 3 Councillors (Cr John Walsh, Cr Peter Beales & Cr Kevin Bellingham) and a member of each group- VBRRRA, DHS & DPCD with VBRRRA chairing the meetings.

The Committee will adopt a single model of community consultation and engagement for the bushfire recovery & Reconstruction in the Shire. The model proposes the initial formation of

advisory groups representing Marysville (Marysville, Narbethong, Buxton Taggerty), Kinglake Ranges (Toolangi, Castella, Kinglake, Pheasant Creek, Kinglake West), Flowerdale Valley (Flowerdale, Hazeldene, Strath Creek) and Melba Highway (Glenburn, Murrindindi).

The advisory groups will comprise of representatives of local community groups that existed prior to the fires and those which have arisen as a result of the disaster. People who nominated for consultation roles following councils call for expressions of interest will also be considered. The final composition of the groups will be confirmed jointly by council and VBRRRA in consultation with the representative local communities. The Committee of Council will consult directly with, and receive and consider recommendations from these advisory groups in relation to the recovery and reconstruction process. This agreement will provide a significant opportunity for greater alignment of the activities of the principle authorities involved in bushfire recovery & reconstruction within the Murrindindi Shire.

Marysville Community Golf & Bowls Club
'REBUILDING OUR COMMUNITY: FIRST STEPS'***

• WHAT IS THIS WORKSHOP?

As advised in the Triangle 3 weeks ago, this workshop is the first stage in a consultative 2-stage process to allow ALL community members to contribute to the re-building process of our community. This In this first 'scoping' stage, we will explore the following questions::

As a community,

- who are we?
- what do we care about?
- what do we feel is "special" about our area and our community?
- in terms of this 'specialness', what do we want to carry forward?

• WHY?

This first stage 'scoping' stage will form part of be a the foundation for a second stage a few weeks later, to be held a few weeks later at a date to be advised. (In the this second stage, the community will begin to establish the 'guidelines' for the rebuilding of our community, such as services and infrastructure; re-building planning & regulations; business and employment opportunities; arts and culture; community networks and activities.)

• WHO?

The meeting is open to all business owners and ALL residents - both "permanents" (current and relocated) and "part-timers" (weekenders, holiday-home owners, etc).

• WHEN and WHERE?

This workshop is on Sunday 3 May, 10AM-3PM, at the Marysville Community Golf & Bowls Club. A light lunch will be provided and "crêche" facilities will be available. As a protection for anyone who may become distressed, a separate shire-appointed counselling service will be available.

• What preparation might I need to make?

As part of the process, we are looking for individuals or groups to present in 60 seconds what they see as being special about this area and our community. This segment will be known as '60 Seconds on Marysville & District'. This will form part of the basis for the day's sessions, when everyone can discuss the key issues that matter.

• Who is responsible for all of this?

The activity is an initiative of the Marysville & Triangle Development Group (MATDG Inc.) and is supported by VBRRRA. We will have the help of a specialist moderator and eminent eco-architect, Nigel Bell, and a large team of skilled group facilitators.

In addition, MATDG Inc. intends to conduct a General Meeting on Saturday 13th June 2009 commencing at 10AM. All Committee positions will be declared vacant at that meeting and a General election of Office holders and committee will be held. All locals with an interest in helping to shape the future of Marysville and district are encouraged to join MATDG as members (\$2 membership fee) and, if they choose, nominate for a role on the Committee.

GREATERNOOSA-VIRGIN BLUE BIG SISTER PROGRAM TAKES OFF

The first contingent of residents from fire-affected Victorian communities has arrived on the Sunshine Coast for a rejuvenating holiday as part of the Greaternoosa-Virgin Blue Big Sister program.

Launched in response to the Victorian Bushfires in February by Greaternoosa Living Publisher Jonette Wilton, the program will see 70 visitors from fire-torn townships arrive here between now and October.

Virgin Blue has donated the visitors' flights and over 50 businesses have gifted accommodation and a range of goods and services, including tours, meals, theme park and entertainment passes.

Maria McIntyre and Dr Eileen Slack of Marysville and Buxton will be on the Sunshine Coast until Wednesday, April 29. The next family is due to arrive on May 9.

Ms Wilton said the program was a resource placed in the hands of the Marysville Lions Club, who is at the heart of the rebuilding efforts in the fire-devastated region.

"Australians everywhere have been touched in some way by these fires and want to help in whatever way they can. The Big Sister program has taken time and careful planning to bring to fruition and given our community a co-ordinated opportunity to support our brothers and sisters in Victoria."

Marysville Lions Club Big Sister coordinator, Jan Emblin, mother of Gayne Emblin of Ritek, Cooroy, said the program was invaluable in assisting with the healing process.

"The looks on the faces of the people when you tell them the people of Noosa have organized a holiday for them is just priceless. They can't believe anyone would do that for them. These people have really gone through hell and you can't imagine how much something like this means to us," Mrs Emblin said.

Virgin Blue Chief Executive, Brett Godfrey, said the airline was more than happy to assist.

"Our team of people at Virgin Blue had an immediate reaction to the Victorian bushfire tragedy, from our cabin crew initiating coin collections on flights to staff organising fundraising events and photo searches for those who had lost their family albums in the fires. We are very humbled to be able to work with our tourism partners in Australia, including the Greaternoosa-Virgin Blue Big Sister program, to offer those who have endured unimaginable hardship some happy time away in the Noosa region, one of the country's favourite holiday havens," Mr Godfrey said.

Further offers of accommodation for the 21 couples or family groups arriving for one and two week stays between now and October are gratefully accepted, as are offers of goods and services.

Sunshine Coast businesses including Australia Zoo, The Noosa Farmers Markets, The Noosa Ferry, theatres, restaurants and other tour operators are among those who have donated free goods and services for the visitors.

Opportunities begin to open up in bushfire rebuilding

Recovery from the February bushfires will, in many cases, be dependent on people getting back to work as soon as possible. Two initiatives are being implemented to assist local businesses and individuals to be first in line when opportunities present themselves. "Council has been working with The Industry Capability Network (ICN) and the Rural Skills Connect (RSC) program to open the door to employment opportunities for local people" said Bob Elkington, Manager of Economic Development recently. "It is vital that people can put their skills and experience to good use and help to drive our recovery and rebuilding process" he added.

The Regional Industry Link (RIL) is an industry development program managed by the ICN that assists regional businesses to grow and take advantage of local work opportunities. Once a business is registered, links can be made between them and those looking for their particular skills, goods and services. Getting involved is easy. All that a business needs to do is register its capability/capacity via the website (www.regionalindustrylink.com.au) - follow the links to **Register Your Company, View Opportunities or Find a Supplier**.

Currently the focus is on those Murrindindi businesses capable of assisting with the clean-up efforts. As has been well publicized, Grocon is project managing the clean-up and the ICN is working with them to help facilitate the involvement of local businesses in this major project. Be sure to provide details of all your plant and equipment, as well as your tickets, qualifications and work experience. The more detailed the information you're able to provide to the ICN, the better. Individuals looking for work are best to contact their local employment provider or call 1800 805 206.

The *Rural Skills Connect* (RSC) program was originally set up as a drought recovery initiative but it has now been extended to include bushfire recovery. The RSC sets out to match suitably credentialed and job-ready candidates with job opportunities. The program can also help with targeted training and accreditation and has access to funding to achieve these ends.

Deb Shaddock is the project manager for the Rural Skills Connect program and she is available on 0407 848 789. Greg Laidlaw is also available to assist on 0418 225 271 and both Greg and Deb are ready and waiting to help you to become job-ready and to be linked to potential employers needing your skill set.

A number of positions are available right now at Lake Mountain. The Resort will be open this winter and recruiting is underway for people to prepare the mountain in time for the opening weekend.

Both of these programs are funded by Regional Development Victoria and are partnered by Murrindindi Shire Council as well as neighbouring Councils including Mansfield, Strathbogie and Benalla.

In closing Bob Elkington said, "As we move from bushfire cleanup to recovery and rebuilding, it is very important that local people and businesses are able to take full advantage of opportunities as they become available and both the Industry Capability Network and the Rural Skills Connect programs are ready to assist".



The Dangers of Isolation

Generally, human beings are social characters. We live in groups (families), form partnerships, and live in communities. Some people always find social contact difficult, but there are times when most of us avoid social contact for some reason. Social contact is important for our emotional and mental health. It gives us a sense of worth and purpose. A sense of belonging is a basic human need.

What happens when we are isolated? When we have little or no contact with other people, we tend to lose our focus. We tend to dwell on our own situation and have little to measure our progress against, so it is easy for our view of our situation to get distorted. Isolated people are at greater risk of getting depressed, paranoid, or developing other mental health conditions.

Many rural people are geographically isolated, living and working apart from others, so it is important for these people to develop connections with others – join a group in town or on the internet, keep in touch with old friends and family.

Others may live in town but be socially isolated - have few people they know and have contact with. It is important for others to help these people to get out, meet people, join groups, make friends.

In times of stress – drought, bushfires, unemployment, relationship breakdown, death of a loved one, chronic illness – people often cut themselves off from others. Try to fight this urge. There are lots of activities going on in our community, so check out something that might interest you. Mixing with others will help you to deal with the problems you face, just by making you feel better about life.


