Mountain Motorsports to stay with AASA

Not one, but four tarmac rallies will be held under the AASA governing body over the next 18 months by Mountain Motorsports, giving rally competitors the chance to compete in a fun and relaxed atmosphere with more lenient and sensible regulations.

The shock switch back to CAMS by Targa organiser's Octagon has left many competitors without the means to compete. Vehicle modifications made under AASA regulations that will now not be legal under CAMS; higher entry fees; difficult scrutiny procedures and new license requirements are only a few considerations that have sparked heated discussions in the tarmac rally community.

Mountain Motorsports has the solution, with **four events** to be held in the Victorian alpine region over the next year and a half: the Great Alpine Sprint, Mt Baw Baw Sprint, and the return of the Lake Mountain Sprint.

This year the Great Alpine Sprint (GAS) is scheduled for the 25th - 27th November and boasts over 300 competition kms. It will now be based in Lakes Entrance (major roadworks have forced the move from original location in Mt Beauty).

The entry fee for GAS has been reduced by \$500 to \$2450 due to the generous event sponsorship of American Republic. It offers great value and includes two 40km

stages that are sure to test both mettle and metal.

As with all of Mountain Motorsports events, there will be a touring section for those who want to experience the roads and rally atmosphere without the need for a roll-cage or rally compliance.

Walkers appreciate Cathedral's changing landscape

A misty, peaceful, and yet challenging walk to the South Jawbone peak was held on Friday 27 May as part of a Parks Victoria Fire Recovery program. Local rangers, accompanied by a suite of ventriloquist lyrebird songs, provided a small group with special insights into the recovery of Cathedral Range State Park.

The climb to the majestic peak through the sheltered Farmyard Saddle was made easier with the 400 plus beautifully made stone steps that were constructed after the 2009 fires. The steps have made the access to the range less arduous and were identified as a landscape feature in themselves by the group who came from as far as Flowerdale and metropolitan Melbourne.

Parks Victoria staff shared their knowledge and reflections on how the park has been recovering, including management issues they had overcome and the challenges that lay ahead, as well as species identification and natural indigenous and European history.

"It was a great opportunity to be able to listen to visitors' responses and see them enjoy the experience so much" said Parks Victoria Ranger Rhyl Shaw. "The irony of the 09 fires will be managing the greatest challenge of keeping the revegetation at bay on the access tracks stimulated by the fires," said Ms Shaw. Most reconstruction projects in the Park are completed and are providing visitors opportunities to once again enjoy the camping, walking and rock climbing in a constantly changing landscape.

Resting atop the peak, enveloped in the misty stillness, it was not difficult to appreciate how much the rocky ridge has changed.

"The group noticed how the exposed, craggy red rocks are now covered with many species of flora and supporting an increasing number of fauna," said Ms Shaw.
