## Marysville drainage works ready to be rolled out

Major drainage works in Marysville's town centre will soon ease pressures on potential flood risks with the construction of a main drainage outfall along Lyell St.

Cathedral Ward Councillor Kevin Bellingham said there would be two components to the project which is expected to start in October.

"This has certainly been a priority of the community," Cr Bellingham said.

The project focuses on the overland flow issues that Marysville's town centre experiences in times of high rainfall and seeks to protect the business district that is bounded by Sedgwick and Darwin Streets to the south and north and Lyell Street to the west.

"PatAsh & Civil, has been awarded the street drainage contract while Council will oversee the construction of easement drainage," Cr Bellingham said.

The street drainage will include large diameter underground drainage pipes being installed on the western side of Lyell Street from the King Street intersection with pipe sizes up to 900mm through to the outfall.

PatAsh & Civil are expected to establish on-site in October with ground works expected to commence shortly thereafter.

Works will be coordinated with localised traffic management to ensure that Lyell Street will continue

to operate with two way traffic. The project is scheduled to be completed by December, weather pending.

"The project will also include the construction of a number of easement drains which will allow property owners a direct connection to an underground service. This project will go a long way towards solving flooding issues within the township at times of heavy rainfall," he said.

The funding for these works has come from Department of Planning and Community Development and the Victorian Bushfire Appeals Fund (VBAF).

## Amnesty supports fire prevention efforts

Murrindindi Shire Council is supporting residents and landholders in their efforts to be fire ready, by putting in place a burning off amnesty period and providing free green waste disposal at all Resource Recovery Centres (Transfer Stations).

From Friday 30 September until Saturday 15 October residents and landholders will be able to burn vegetation materials without a permit.

Mayor Peter Beales said there were conditions to the amnesty including keeping fires to a metre in diameter and height.

"It is important people do not create a nuisance when burning off. This is not an open invitation to

create bonfires and the like, it is about a sensible approach to cleaning up land and have it a condition that could limit the impacts should a bushfire occur," Cr Beales said.

"People need to control the size of their fires and ensure there is minimal smoke. It is about working together to ensure that we clean up, but have minimal impacts on neighbours."

Cr Beales said an alternative to burning was using the free green waste disposal of vegetation at any of the shire's Resource Recovery Centres (Transfer Stations)

People wanting to use the green waste service will need to present their tip ID tag or provide a current rates notice to prove eligibility to the site attendants.

"The free offer does not apply to commercial clearing and maintenance operators," Cr Beales said.

"By working together and taking responsibility we can go a long way in reducing fire hazards before the start of summer," Cr Beales said.

## Bushfire memorial prioritisation commences

The important task of prioritising concepts for lasting memorials to the 2009 bushfires is under way.

Following community feedback on a range of suggestions and options, stage two of the consultation is seeking community input to prioritise the range of ideas presented by the community so more detailed memorial designs can be developed.

Mayor Peter Beales said it was important that the community continued to support and take an active interest in the latest stage.

"In keeping with the feedback received, we are presenting options for memorial development in each of the communities that suffered loss of life as a result of the fires. The locations suggested during phase one are to be ranked in order of preference by the community," Cr Beales said.

"Numerous options were presented for memorial location in each of the communities, as well as a number of features or ideas for inclusion specific to each area.

"Kinglake had seven options for locating the memorial presented, while Marysville had three, Flowerdale five, Narbethong three, and Toolangi/Castella and Strath Creek just one each.

"Our challenge now, is to identify the option in each community that meets the desires and needs of most of its residents, or if there are other options that have not yet been considered. To assist we are asking residents to provide their preferences. This can be done through surveys circulated through the Kinglake Ranges and Marysville and Triangle communities, or on-line at Council's website.

The first round of consultation identified a number of options to add to existing memorials or projects already established by the communities.

Cr Beales said that if this option was preferred it could enhance what the community had created by providing additional features the communities' own funding did not allow for.

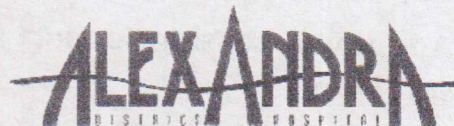
"The Memorials Working Group is interested to know if each community wants to focus on the projects they have already created and where the Council funding could add real value to these projects.

"We are certainly keen to hear what would work best for each community and also if we should link the memorials created in each community through some common features or themes, or if they need to remain completely separate and unique.

"Also, we need the community to tell us if we should recognise the loss of property and loss of pets and wildlife through the memorials, and if so how we should do this, as this was another frequently raised desire from our first round of consultation."

Consultation to prioritise the memorial concepts for further development will take place throughout the latter part of September and all of October.

Information on consultation opportunities will be distributed through Council offices, community facilities, local media and other publications. ## A Step in the Right Direction for Women's Health in the Marysville, Buxton, Narbethong Triangle

Alexandra District Hospital has successfully secured funding from PapScreen Victoria to extend its current Pap test services to women in the Marysville, Buxton and Narbethong communities between September and December 2011.

These Clinics will be held fortnightly in the Marysville Medical Centre in Buxton on Thursday evenings between 5pm and 7.30pm, commencing Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> September 2011.

The Clinic Extension Grants program enables current Pap test providers to extend their clinic hours so more tests can be taken, or provide outreach services to access women who are unscreened or under-screened due to social or geographical isolation. All additional services are provided free of charge for all women.

Over the past nine years, PapScreen Victoria, the Victorian component of the National Cervical Vaccination Program, has awarded over 260 clinic extension grants to organisations throughout the state.

Anne Atkinson from Alexandra District Hospital is confident the grant will enable them to reach women within the community who have found it difficult to commit to a Pap test appointment in the past.

"It's vitally important to be vigilant when it comes to cervical screening, however many women within the community are busy with work or family commitments, or they simply live too far away from their closest service provider to have a regular Pap test," Anne said.

"Unfortunately at the moment only 62.9 percent of women in Murrindindi Area have regular Pap tests.
