It was evident early that the game would be hard fought by both sides with Croydon wanting to cement their position on top of the ladder and the villains wanting to show that they were up for the challenge against what is regarded as the best side over several years.

Councillor comment

In recent weeks I have attended quite a number of community group or Council sponsored events which have reminded me that no member of the Murrindindi Shire community should feel that there is no interest in their hobby, special interest or craft pursuits.

Our region offers all types of sporting opportunities either of a competitive or a passive supporter nature or of male or female interest.

But for anyone with no sporting interests within our shire we have an enormous number of craft activities where skills can be developed or a new interest encouraged.

Our thriving Men's Sheds at Eildon, Yea, Kinglake Ranges, Flowerdale and Marysville all cater for anyone with an interest in woodworking or the mechanical trades.

I recently attended a community dinner provided by the Yea Community House and was impressed by all the interests that they promote and provide, in addition to being a popular 'drop-in centre' that is well supported by young and older members of our community.

Music is one interest at the Community House where it is not uncommon for their 'jam sessions' involving both accomplished and new 'musicians' to attract so much enthusiastic participation that they often run into the early hours of the morning!

And it was evident that supporters were travelling quite widely from elsewhere in the shire just to be involved in the diversity of Yea Community House programs.

Some residents may be reticent in becoming involved and achieving that first experience by attending an initial meeting or function to show they have an interest, or would like to be involved, to contribute, or seek to enhance their skills.

I believe there are a few interest groups or community bodies that don't make it well enough known through our local media in particular as to what they offer, when and where they meet and who their key practitioners are as well as providing their contact details.

A good publicity officer and regular contact with our local editors and correspondents is always a good place to start in promoting your interest group.

For instance I was contacted recently by a new resident to our shire who asked me "is there a local Bridge Club?" The gentleman had been a keen player in his previous Melbourne community where quite a large social Bridge playing group met on a regular basis.

I had to admit that I wasn't sure if the Murrindindi Shire had a Bridge Club or similar interest group. Perhaps there is one already or there may be enough interest in establishing a group locally.

Another question I regularly receive is from older members of the community who would like to develop basic computing skills especially an understanding of the internet to create their own email connectivity.

I know that a lot of advertising and promotional activities these days assumes that everyone owns or has access to a personal computer or similar device and the reference typically says 'see our website for further information' without even giving a phone number.

Some people have told me they are frustrated by this assumption so there seems plenty of scope to launch some courses for connectivity or just basic computer skills for the older members of our community. Perhaps one of our local community bodies may be interested in this as a new project as there seems to me to be some demand for it.

As I said in the outset there is no reason to feel that your special interests are neglected in Murrindindi Shire. We are a resourceful community; we already have lots of active special interest groups whose members will always welcome new participation.

Just asking around always seems a good place to start and don't be reticent in being involved.

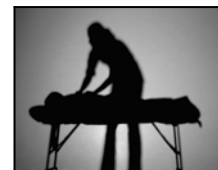

Congratulations to all those involved in this year's Murrindindi Shine for showcasing the tremendous talent of the young people in the shire.

It was a night that was thoroughly enjoyed by all those who attended. Berry Street and the FReeZA team did a great job staging the event and thanks too to Rustic Simplicity, Alexandra Newsagency and the Ronda Café for their generous sponsorship.

The comments from Judges Bev Dick, Phil Weeks and Liam Drummy gave encouragement and insight to all performers and noted the progressive improvement of those who were returning after the two year break since the last Fame or Flop Show.

The professional music, lyrics and presentation of Shantelle Matcham and Tim Shaw in the 14 -17 years section would have inspired the younger performers to continue pursuing their music, singing or dancing as did the guest performances of Liam Drummy and Werner.

We are indeed lucky to have such talent in our Shire and I look forward to seeing and hearing more of them all.

Council has approved a contribution of \$6874 to promote the Yes case for the Referendum on the financial recognition of Local Government in the Constitution.

At about 72 cents per property this investment is cheap insurance that we will pay once to ensure certainty in the continuation of funding from the Commonwealth not only for next year but forever.

The return next year alone in Murrindindi Shire, just from Roads to Recovery, is equivalent to over \$87 per property. We insure our houses against the chance of fire and floods so it makes sense to take out this one time insurance against the risk that the funding from the Commonwealth could be stopped.

There will be other future benefits as our communities gain further grants to support their plans for their localities and community groups. Of course to realise the benefits, we all need to vote Yes when filling out the Referendum ballot and the promotion campaign will provide all the reasons for the Yes Case.

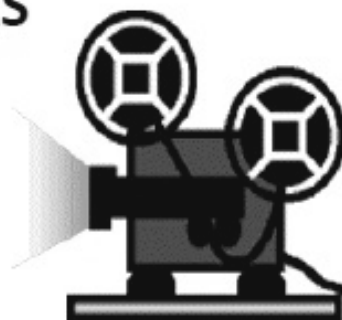

Council supports rail trail name change

One of the region's major tourism draw cards could soon be known as the Great Victorian Rail Trail.

Murrindindi Shire Council has supported the name change to what is currently known as the Goulburn River High Country Rail Trail so that the popular attraction can be more successfully marketed nationally and internationally.

Mayor John Walsh said Council was supportive of a marketing strategy to position the trail as a trail of national significance.

"The naming and branding of the rail trail are key components to further develop the rail trail experiences for visitors and locals," Cr Walsh said.

The marketing strategy includes the creation of content for all signage plus a fully operational website and mobile site, interactive mapping, social media pages and third party endorsement mechanisms such as Trip Advisor, Blogs and similar.

"Promotion of the rail trail is critical to its long term success. As a Council we want to see the rail trail, and the experiences it offers, promoted both on a national and international scale. The rebranding and marketing strategy is important in achieving that success," Cr Walsh said.

While the marketing is aimed at state, national and international cyclists, walkers and horse riders, the success of the trail will also be determined by communities and businesses along the trail.

"We look forward to the next stage of development in what is proving to be a very popular tourist drawcard to our region and shire.

"Part of that development is the creation of a marketing prospectus to encourage buy in from local businesses. The prospectus will be available online and will be explained at information sessions to be held in Mansfield and Yea in the coming weeks."

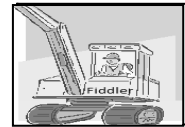

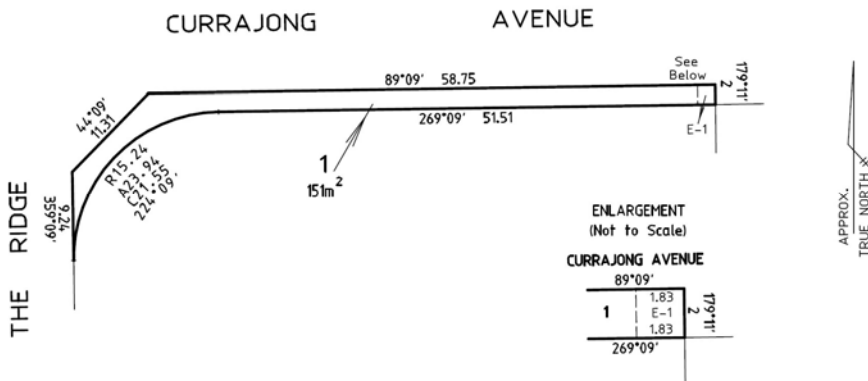

Former Councillor recognised for Red Gate contribution

One of the key people in supporting the recording of Alexandra's history has been recognised with a plaque at the town's Red Gate.

The late Cr Andrew "Drew" Collier was a strong advocate of preserving and enhancing Alexandra's history and was a driver of establishing the Red Gates next to the Alexandra library.

Several years ago, the precise location of the original Gate was found to have been in Perkins Street in the fence between the Eglington and Mt Pleasant pastoral runs-just up from the ford over the U.T.Creek. History shows that the first name used for the Alexandra township was "Red Gate".

Through the work of the Rotary Club of Alexandra, a replica Red Gate was officially opened in 2011.

The concept is of a transition through the gate from the modern world of Perkins Street to the early days of Alexandra represented by the indigenous people, the miners and the settlers.

Fox control – Lake Eildon National Park, Rubicon State forest, Cathedral Range State Park, Marysville State forest, Yarra Ranges National Park and Toolangi State forest

The Department of Environment and Primary Industries and Parks Victoria are committed to protecting and enhancing the natural values of parks, reserves and state forests across the state. Examples of this conservation management are the control of introduced plant and animal species which can impact on these values.

As part of an ongoing strategy, the Department of Environment and Primary Industries is continuing to lay buried baits containing sodium fluoroacetate (1080 poison) on public land for the control of foxes. Baiting commenced Monday 14th January and will continue until Friday 13th December 2013.

Baits will be laid at strategic sites and other known areas of fox habitat within the above mentioned forests and parks, within the vicinity of townships Eildon, Rubicon, Taggerty, Buxton, Marysville, Narbethong, Healesville, Warburton and Toolangi.

1080 poison signs will be posted throughout the baited areas and members of the public who are living, visiting or working in the above named areas are advised to take particular care not to disturb or interfere with bait stations. Domestic dogs and cats are particularly susceptible to 1080 poison and should be under effective control, muzzled or kept away from the poisoned areas.

Have your say on the health and wellbeing of our shire

Creating an active and healthy community is the key goal of Murrindindi Shire Council's draft Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan that has hit the streets for public comment.

Mayor John Walsh said the plan encouraged community members to lead healthier lives and was a guide on how that could be achieved through individual and community participation.

"The health profile of Murrindindi Shire is something we'd like to see improved. Statistics show that nearly half of the shire's population does not eat enough fruit and vegetables.

"Also, less than one fifth participate in enough physical activity. What's more alarming is that many of our people are overweight or obese, putting themselves at serious risk of diabetes, heart problems and other preventable conditions," Cr Walsh said.

Council's Manager Community Services Naomi McNamara explained that the themes in the health plan were derived from the Murrindindi Community Visioning Day held in 2012.

"We used the 10 social determinants of health to guide our discussions with groups and agencies about how we might address the root causes of our health and wellbeing challenges. To round off our discussions we ran a workshop where all major partners and Council staff got together and agreed to work together over the next four years to make the plan happen," Ms McNamara said.

The Public Health and Wellbeing Plan has already attracted positive comments from stakeholders for its dedicated Murrindindi Shire focus and its non cut and paste approach.

Council adopts Budget and Council Plan

Murrindindi Shire Council has adopted the 2013-14 Budget and 2013-17 Council Plan incorporating the Strategic Resource Plan.

Mayor John Walsh said the guiding documents put the new Council on a strong footing in delivering for the Murrindindi Shire community.

"We have delivered a modest Budget that has kept rate rises to 6 per cent while our plan for the next 12 months sets achievable challenges and goals," Cr Walsh said.

"Importantly the development of the 2013-17 Council Plan has been guided by the community, particularly from the input of the visioning day held in August last year.

"We have also provided the community the opportunity to comment on the documents and we have welcomed the feedback at both community meetings and through the submission process. It is important we receive buy-in and I thank those who made the effort to come to one of the five information sessions or made a written submission.

"The Budget has been a challenging process, but as a Council we have been mindful of the community's ability to pay and Council subsidization of services that now have been brought into line with neighbouring councils or those of a similar size."

As the 2013-14 rates notices are prepared, Cr Walsh said the notices would also include the fire services levy.

"The fire services levy is not a Council charge, however we are the collection agency and as such the levy will appear as a separate charge on notices."

Another forward step in fire recovery journey

The Bushfire Rebuilding Advisory Service (RAS) will conclude after four years assisting people to rebuild their homes following the 2009 bushfires, Minister for Bushfire Response Kim Wells said today.

Rebuilding advisers have assisted more than 1,180 bushfire-affected households and recorded almost 10,000 contacts with their clients.

"Rebuilding Advisers have played an important role in providing invaluable advice on all aspects of planning and construction, helping hundreds of households through the difficult rebuilding process and into permanent accommodation," Mr Wells said.

The service will conclude on 30 June 2013, after which building and planning enquiries will be returned to local council.

In line with the ongoing transition of the State Government's bushfire-specific recovery services, the Fire Recovery Unit (FRU), will also undergo a number of changes from 1 July 2013.

A centrally-located Community Engagement Coordinator will replace regionally-based staff and be available to support fire-affected communities as they finalise recovery-related issues.

The final edition of the FRU newsletter will be published in August 2013 and feature additional information to ensure that community members can continue to stay in touch with the latest recovery news from local council, service providers and community organisations.

"These changes reflect the ongoing transition for these services as communities move along the recovery journey," Mr Wells said.

Helicopters sowing alpine ash forest following Harrietteville fire


Minister for Environment and Climate Change Ryan Smith said a helicopter was being used to spread Alpine Ash seeds across 198 hectares of State Forest and 1,876 hectares of National Park that was burnt in the fires.

"Areas within the Harrietteville fire boundary have been burnt several times over the past decade and Department of Environment and Primary Industries and Parks Victoria ecology experts predict about 2,000 hectares will not be able to naturally regenerate due to the nature of Alpine Ash and its response to fire," Mr Smith said.

"It is also important to re-seed the area to assist with stabilising the fragile soils in the steep terrain to protect water catchments, which supply communities downstream.

Parks Victoria Regional Director East Andrew Marshall said it was important to sow the Ash seeds before other plants regenerate so the Ash seeds can germinate in the spring.

The cost of the re-seeding work is approximately \$620,000 and is funded as part of the Victorian Coalition Government's Harrietteville fire recovery program.

Council says yes to supporting “YES” campaign

Murrindindi Shire Council will make a contribution to support the Yes campaign in support of the proposed referendum on the the constitutional recognition of Local Government to be held at the next Federal election. Council has committed to provide \$6874 towards the campaign – a figure based on the proportion of ratepayers in the Shire compared to the state total.

Mayor John Walsh said the funding would be from interest obtained on Council initiated grants and not directly from ratepayer funds.

“Recent High Court cases have placed the legality of direct Commonwealth funding to Local Government under a cloud. Council believes we must protect these funding sources for the benefit of our community,” Cr Walsh said.

“Not only do we get direct funding through the Roads to Recovery program, we can also point to the Great Victorian Rail Trail (Goulburn River High Country Rail Trail) as a major project that possibly would not have proceeded if there was a challenge to direct federal funding of local councils.”

Cr Walsh said the funding would not compromise or diminish Council projects.

“We believe this is a small price for insurance against any action through the High Court that could jeopardise funding for the community and Council.”

While Council has committed its support, it will wait to consider the implications of the leadership change in Canberra.

“We will wait further advice before we send in our contribution. The events in Federal Parliament could have a big bearing on the future of the referendum in the short-term,” Cr Walsh said.
