International delegates look to Murrindindi leadership

Senior Chinese officials have taken in the sights, learnings and progress of Murrindindi Shire during a visit to our region.

The group of 17 Tianjin City delegates are undertaking a three month leadership program hosted by RMIT College of Business. The program is a joint partnership between the University, City of Melbourne and the Tianjin Municipal People's Government.



Mayor John Walsh welcomed the opportunity to share with the group the experiences and learnings from the 2009 bushfires, as well as promote the shire and encourage business investment.

"Many of the delegates are deputy district leaders or town mayors, and they were eager to hear how we responded and dealt with the bushfire disaster," Cr Walsh said.

"We have a strong story to tell about our recovery and the resilience of people and businesses across our shire.

"It was a great opportunity to promote our region, not only for its tourism qualities, but our

strong agricultural industry. Importantly our visitors were impressed with our open space, natural attractions and our beef industry."

The group visited Marysville and Kinglake to see firsthand the extent of the rebuilding and recovery efforts that have taken place over the past four years.

"We provided our findings about disaster planning and recovery and the importance of supporting communication and networking channels across communities, regions and agencies," Cr Walsh said.

"It was a wonderful opportunity to promote the region and we have received very positive feedback

and inquiries from the delegation in terms of on-going communication."

Captive bred Regent Honeyeaters put on a show at Chiltern

Four months after the latest release of Regent Honeyeaters in Victoria's north-east the captive-bred birds are showing up their wild counterparts.

Department of Environment and Primary Industries (DEPI), BirdLife Australia and Taronga Zoo released 37 captive-bred Regent Honeyeaters in Chiltern-Mt Pilot National Park in April. Since then daily monitoring by staff and volunteers has been assessing the outcomes of the release.

DEPI Senior Biodiversity Officer, Glen Johnson said: "Last week our dedicated survey team confirmed 28 (or over 75%) of the 2013 released birds are 'known to be alive' 13 weeks later. That's an extraordinarily high survival rate for captive releases generally, and matches results achieved for Regent Honeyeater releases in the same area in 2008 and 2010."

"Last week's survey also identified three surviving birds from the 2010 release, bringing to nine the number of birds known to have survived for more than 12 months after 2010. That's really significant given that we've only found one wild bird in the area this year," Mr Johnson said.

"This is a great boost to the wild population and we're hopeful that like last year we'll again be able to demonstrate successful breeding between captive release and wild birds later in the year."

"That our survey teams are still able to locate and confirm the presence of so many birds is remarkable as we are now several weeks past the radio transmitter battery-life."

BirdLife Australia's national Regent Honeyeater recovery coordinator Dean Ingwersen said: "We had fitted leg bands with unique colour combinations to each captive-bred bird. This assists identification during our surveys and once the radio transmitters run out."

"Regent Honeyeaters are a difficult species to study because they are nomadic, moving long distances to areas where nectar is available," Mr Ingwersen said.

"It is testimony to the skills of our survey team that we have been able to keep finding and identifying these birds over a long period and over a large area."

"We are also catching any of the birds that were fitted with exhausted radio transmitters and removing them."

This project has been co-funded by the DEPI Natural Resource Investment Program, DEPI Hume Region, BirdLife Australia, and Taronga Zoo.

Council has included a number of goals that are a part of our Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Strategy that directly relate to access and inclusion for people with a disability.

One of the aims is to conduct an audit on all our buildings to review their access and also to include the principles of universal access in the design of our parks and facilities.

I am now well on my way to a full recovery but will not forget what I have learnt. That is, to be grateful for my good health and to consider others in everything we do.

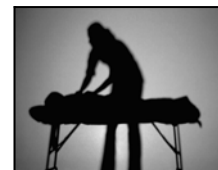

Pioneer Reserve gets a minor make-over

Minor repair works have been taking place at the historic Yea Pioneer Reserve.

Wear, tear and some wet weather has resulted in a back door and its surrounds being replaced at the popular meeting spot.

Council has a number of capital works being undertaken presently that include resealing and re-sheeting programs, the on-going refurbishment of Yea Shire Hall, roof repairs at the Yea Railway Station, installation of the 1000 Hands project at Marysville, the construction of Marysville carpark and associated works, footpath upgrades in Alexandra and Eildon and continuing design works on the Kinglake path extension.

Works have also been progressing on Breakaway Bridge, Break O Day Road and design works for the Allendale Road Bridge at Strath Creek.

Piece of history to take root in shire

Murrindindi Shire Council will plant a piece of history at the Hume and Hovell Memorial at Yarck thanks to an initiative from Albury City Council to preserve a piece of Australia's early exploration history.

The Albury City Council project has resulted in cloned specimens of the famous Hovell Tree being gifted to the 21 modern Local Government areas that Captain William Hovell and bushman Hamilton Hume trekked through to find an overland route from Gunning, New South Wales to Westernport, Victoria.

The expedition started in Gunning on 17 October 1824, reaching Point Wilson (slightly off course) on 16 December 1824 and returned to Gunning on 16 January 1825. Retired Captain William Hovell and Australian born bushman Hamilton Hume were commissioned by the NSW Government to explore the route. The expedition is commemorated by the naming of the Hume Freeway.

On 17 November 1824, on the bank of the Murray River, Captain William Hovell carved his name into the solid wood of a River Red Gum to signify the first sighting of the river by Europeans. This tree has become known as the Hovell Tree.

The Hovell Tree has been through some trying times in terms of its health on the brink of death, however has been nursed back to good health. Albury City Council has successfully commissioned the grafting of cuttings of the Hovell Tree onto River Red Gum root stock to be presented to councils including Murrindindi Shire Council.

Mayor John Walsh said it was fitting that the specimen be planted at a significant site within the shire.

"To celebrate the acquisition, a special planting will be held on Monday 12 August at the Hume and Hovell Memorial at Yarck. This will take place at 10.30 am and all members of the public are welcome to attend," Cr Walsh said.

The memorial is located on the Maroondah Highway opposite the Yarck CFA building.

A second tree has also been made available in the shire, with the Hume and Hovell Cricket Ground receiving the specimen in honour of the ground's naming.

School Crossing Safety, it is everyone's responsibility

The safety of school children is paramount across the shire and Murrindindi Shire Council Local Laws officers and police will be out in force patrolling school crossings over the coming weeks to enhance that safety.

Council's Acting CEO Michael Chesworth said recent patrols in Alexandra and Yea had witnessed some drivers breaking the law when dropping off or picking up children.

"One of the many things we see is people double parking to let children out and also parking in no standing or disabled zones. Dropping children off in this manner can put them at risk of being hurt or injured by another vehicle," Mr Chesworth said.

"Safety is paramount for all children and parents using our school crossings. Therefore Council will join with local police conducting static patrols of the local school crossings over the coming weeks and issuing fines to motorists who commit offences."

These offences include parking in "no standing" or disabled zones, stopping in a Children's Crossing zone whilst the flags are being displayed and stopping in a bus zone during the stipulated times.

Offences carry a penalty of more than \$144 and will be issued to any person found failing to obey the parking control signs. Police will also be enforcing time designated school speed limits.

"It is up to all drivers to do the right thing. We don't want to see any of our children put in danger at anytime, let alone while being picked up or dropped off at school," Mr Chesworth said.

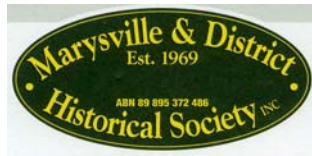

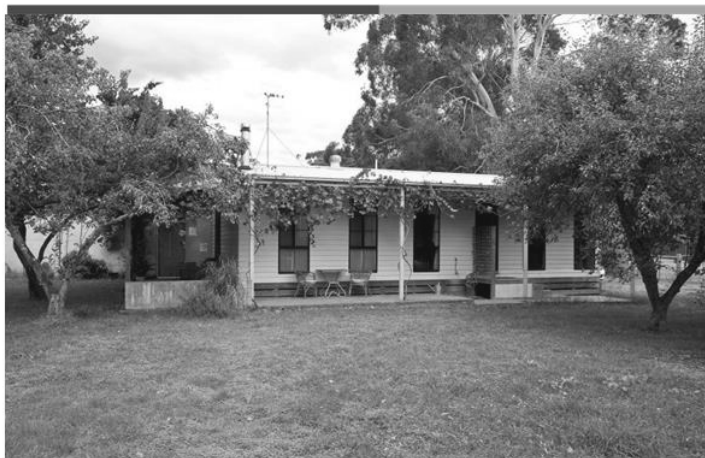

Snags survey to guide work on Victorian Rivers

A survey of Victoria's rivers has found most of them could do with a significant increase in the amount of Instream Woody Habitat (snags) to improve their health and increase native fish numbers.

Department of Environment and Primary Industries (DEPI) has completed an assessment of the amount of woody habitat in 27,700 kilometres of Victorian Rivers using a combination of aerial photography and on-ground mapping.

Fish Ecologist from DEPI's Arthur Rylah Institute (ARI), Zeb Tonkin said: "Our modelling shows that the amount of woody habitat in our rivers was an average of 41 per cent below natural levels and we know that is having a significant impact on freshwater fish species."

"The areas which had the greatest reductions in instream woody habitat included Southwestern Floodplains, Glenelg and North Central Floodplain river regions. In comparison, the Alpine, North East Uplands and East Gippsland Upland regions were in relatively good condition"

"The Victorian Government will use this information to prioritise areas for restoration activities such as reintroducing snags and revegetating riparian zones through current river health programs including:

- Victorian Waterway Management Strategy
- Catchment Management Authority Waterway Management Strategy
- Biodiversity Strategy and
- Fisheries Management Planning

"We know that numbers of threatened native species such as Murray Cod and Trout Cod do increase in response to habitat restoration and the same applies to many other native species."

"In the past snags were removed from our rivers because it was incorrectly thought that they reduced flows and contributed to flooding."

"Over the past 20 years we have been gradually returning snags to our waterways particularly through the efforts of Catchment Management Authorities (CMAs) with a resulting improvement in stream health and eventually fish stocks."

The Victorian Government has a responsibility under the Wildlife Act 1975 and the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988 to protect threatened species. These animals and plants contribute significantly to the biodiversity of their ecosystems. The knowledge we acquire about these species helps us to then take the on-ground steps needed to ensure their survival.

Our democracy doesn't ask much of us. We have to vote and with that commitment there is an underlying obligation to think about our vote.

With the referendum on recognising Local Government some slogans are starting to appear. Slogans are not a replacement for arguments that relate to the matter but are sometimes useful as reminders of the pros and cons.

The "No" case for the referendum has come out with the slogan "If you don't know, Vote No". It's a lazy slogan, not directly relevant to this particular referendum but been trotted out times before. It's insulting.

It assumes we are too dumb to understand this simple change to the Constitution and we care so little about our country that we won't read the cases for and against that will be sent out to everyone in the lead up to the referendum.

I have faith that in Murrindindi Shire there will be very few who "don't know" and once they do know, they will support the "YES" case.

Voting Yes provides financial recognition of Local Government in the

Constitution thus ensuring funding for roads and community infrastructure continues as it has for the past 40 years.

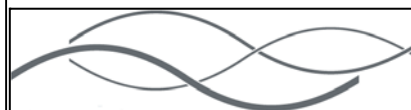
If the No case gets up and there is a High Court challenge to the way the Commonwealth funds Local Government (it will only take one disgruntled ratepayer to get the ball rolling) then funding will stall until the matter is sorted out.

Recent history indicates a challenge would be successful and for the funding to be reinstated it would need a mass of new legislation, compliance rules and paperwork all of which would take time to set up while funds were suspended. There would be no guarantee that full funding would be resumed.

For Councils it would be a mess and replacement cash would have to be found by increasing rates.

Slogans can be a good reminder of the options, so here's a few. Vote YES to avoid the mess. Vote YES to pay less. Vote NO and do your dough.

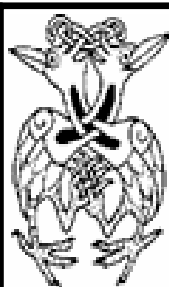

Have your say on new national parks regulations

Victorians are being invited to comment on new regulations governing the use of the state's much-loved national parks. Comments are invited before the closing date of 19 August.

The regulations are reviewed at least every decade to ensure they are contemporary and effective.

Department of Environment and Primary Industries (DEPI) Executive Director (Land Management Policy) Peter Beaumont said "In Victoria, we are very fortunate to have access to 3.45 million hectares of national, state and other parks, visited by 33 million visitors each year."

"The National Parks Regulations are primarily a tool for enabling people to access parks in accordance with the National Parks Act 1975," Mr Beaumont said.

"The current regulations prescribe appropriate behaviours for the protection of flora and fauna, cultural heritage, park facilities, water supply and to ensure the safety and education of park visitors. Victoria's parks are managed to provide a broad range of experiences for people to value and enjoy a healthy environment."

"Victoria's population is growing and more people are visiting our parks. We need to ensure that national parks are well managed so that people will be able to enjoy them now and into the future."

Parks Victoria is responsible for management of Victoria's national parks.

The main changes include removing unnecessary and unused provisions of the previous regulations, reducing overlap and improving consistency with other regulations regarding vehicles, fires and permit and making the regulations easier to interpret.

The new regulations allow the declaration of days when wheel chains are not required to be carried in Mt Baw Baw and Mt Buffalo National Parks, as is possible in other areas during the snow season.

The new regulations also incorporate provisions of the current National Parks (Cape Howe Marine National Park) Regulations 2006 into one set of national park regulations.

Targeted consultation with key stakeholders was conducted earlier this year. A regulatory impact statement has been prepared and is now available for review.

Mr Beaumont said "The Victorian Government is working to gain maximum benefit from our state's public land, including national parks, to ensure Victorians continue to have opportunities to enjoy these unique places into the future and while maintaining the environmental values of the parks."

"We invite people to review the proposed regulations and provide comment. Responses from members of the community will be considered in finalising the regulations."
