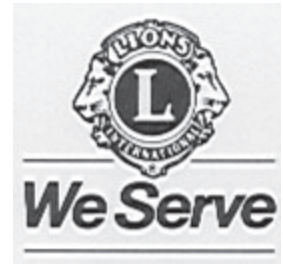

A GREAT CAMP!

Eighty visitors from across Victoria thoroughly enjoyed a Field Naturalist Club camp in Marysville over the weekend 2nd – 5th May. The venue was the OEG's Camp Marysville which provided excellent and comfortable accommodation, good meals and a great place to hold evening presentations and organize our daily activities.

The weather was overcast, but no one actually got wet and those who walked at Lake Mountain were thrilled as it snowed and they were able to photograph red robins in the snow! The leaders and helpers were praised by the attendees for their knowledge and friendly guidance. Some sixteen outings (or excursions) were offered over three days and all were well attended. The natural beauty and interesting ecology was a hit with our visitors.

Three speakers gave evening presentations, all excellent; the first was Mary Kenealy introducing the burning of Marysville, using the local 'on location' film; the second was Steve Smith from DEPI Alexandra, a local expert naturalist with vast knowledge who spoke of the overall post fire story concerning the forest and the animal life within it; the third was Dr Dan Harley from Healesville Sanctuary who delivered a fascinating talk on Leadbeater's

possum. Overall a great camp, all went home pleased with the experience.

As the local arm of the organising committee, I must highlight the willing and enthusiastic response I received from residents of the Triangle – none of which actually have any association with the Field Naturalists movement, and whom I asked as a friend, to help out with excursions as a leader or guide. All those I approached had no hesitation in saying yes and then went on to fulfil their commitment with serious intent – most undertook a reconnaissance of their walk in preparation. A brilliant response. Two residents opened their gardens and welcomed visitors to their homes.

A great big thank you to all our local helpers.

It was satisfying to be able to bring a large contingent to our area to help with the ongoing recovery. Several said they would come back to holiday with their family. With the visiting participants and the club members and helpers, the camp involved about 100 persons. It took nearly two years to put it together, but in the end was well worth the effort.

The Upper Goulburn Field Naturalists Club hosted the camp for the South East Australia Naturalist's

Association – a Victoria wide network of clubs.

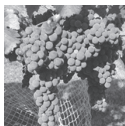

PORTABLE SKATE RAMP AT BUXTON RESERVE

The Buxton Recreation Reserve Committee is currently seeking community input into future of the portable skate ramp that we share with other towns within Murrindindi Shire and comes to Buxton Reserve regularly on a cyclical basis. The skate ramp is next due to be returned to Buxton on May 30th to be located near the toilets, where it has been in the past. Whilst this location within the Reserve is not ideal, the Reserve Committee has agreed with Council that it is the most practical location provided adequate room is left for ambulances entering the Reserve to deliver patients to emergency helicopters that land at the Reserve on a regular basis. Some people have expressed an opinion that the skate ramp is not very attractive, that it receives very little use and can be noisy for nearby residents when it is used. Others have said that they are happy for it to be at the Reserve.

Before making a recommendation to Council about the future of the skate ramp, the Reserve Committee would like your input, whether it be positive or negative.

Mayor's Chair by Cr Margaret Rae

Rates are on everyone's mind at the moment as councils in Victoria release their draft budgets and declare their proposed rate levels for the coming year. There can be a tendency to compare councils and their respective rate increases and, while it is only natural to do that, it is all too easy to lose sight of the fact that every council is significantly different – in its size, its infrastructure, its population distribution, its community needs, and so forth. It is also worth reflecting on the fact that not every issue is dealt with in every year – that there has to be a prioritisation of needs – and that can also result in peaks and troughs. Expenditure, as we all know from household budgets, is not a smooth line – if only it were! So forward planning is the best tool we have.

You may be aware of a pre-election policy issued recently by the State Labor Opposition in which they are proposing a rate cap aligned with Consumer Price Index (CPI). On the surface, this seems to be very logical and attractive; however, it totally disregards the matters just referred to. Whilst I have no wish to enter into the politics of the matter, it is very important that relevant issues are highlighted.

Firstly CPI is based on a 'basket' of goods and services related to everyday living; the services that are provided by councils are not included in this calculation. The increases in these costs are variable and can be as high as 10%. Costs related to maintenance, upgrade and replacement of infrastructure are constantly rising, so also are other costs such as State taxes which have gone up significantly more than rates over past years. It begs the question, if Council's ability to maintain a viable revenue stream is curtailed by a cap, then would it not also be reasonable to expect a similar cap on State taxes?

The consequence of a restriction on rate rises has been experienced before when the Kennett government introduced a similar reform which was deemed a failure and the consequences of which lasted for a long time. It resulted in a deterioration of much infrastructure and led to the closing of public buildings because there was insufficient means to do anything else with them. We are already behind the eightball, given the quantum of additional assets we have received since 2009. A cap on rates would mean that nothing could be put aside into our infrastructure reserve – a path we have been diligently pursuing for some time. In fact there would not be enough to manage the basic ongoing costs, let alone the cost shifting that has to be picked up in supporting underfunded state and federal services, such as emergency management, home and community care, public libraries and kindergartens, for example. We would also not be able to cover potential shortfalls in defined benefit superannuation liabilities which we have to fund without any input into the operation of these. Our ability to forward plan would be severely hampered. There is no doubt in my mind that there would be significant impact on what services could be delivered and what infrastructure could be adequately maintained. You, as the community, need the opportunity to have a say in what you see as the most important. This is a conversation I have already signalled we will be having with you; this announcement will necessarily bring it into sharper focus.

Time is Precious, Spend it Fishing

I recently purchased a fishing book called 'A Guide to the Inland Angling Waters of Victoria' from a local second hand shop. It was published in 1976 by the then Department of Conservation & Environment.

When I opened the book I found inside an original copy of a Yea Fishing Map which was "prepared by the Yea Development Committee" and printed on their behalf by the original Yea Chronicle. Each of the local streams and the Goulburn River is marked by about twenty five 'recommended fishing spots' on the advice of the Yea Angling Club which still actively promotes local fishing.

I recently took the advice from the map and tried one of the recommended spots along the Yea River. My fishing gear is pretty basic and of the sort that most blokes have in their shed or garage and although I didn't catch anything of note it was a delight to spend a couple of hours in the sunshine. In fact, it was one of those beautiful autumn afternoons that provokes a bit of reflection and thinking!

I was reminded that recreational fishing is one of the features of our Shire which we don't recognise or promote widely or well enough. Fishing visitors already make a fairly significant contribution to the local economy through their purchases of accommodation, fuel, food and even fishing tackle since Yea, Eildon and Alexandra offer well equipped shops with plenty of gear and local advice available.

A couple of visitors I met at the recent Regional Victoria Living Expo told me that they were regular visitors to Eildon and our local rivers and thought their annual weekend or longer fishing trips were a great experience in Murrindindi Shire.

But I don't think we are selling this message well or widely enough. I also receive a weekly email fishing update from Tackleworld, a prominent multiple store chain that is associated with the iFish television program which only appears on Channel 31 and thus is not able to be seen locally. But I read their reports out of interest and it's not hard to judge just how popular fishing is currently as a family recreational activity.

Clearly Port Phillip and Westernport Bays provide major appeal to the recreational angler and there are a number of charter operators who offer almost daily excursions in search of tuna, marlin and other off-shore species in places like Portland and the south coast of NSW. But rarely does this report mention anything about inland angling and the opportunities that Murrindindi Shire offers in our rivers and streams and Lake Eildon in particular.

This brings me to the coming Big Fish Challenge.

The inaugural event held at Eildon in October last year was well organised, widely supported by locals and visitors and offered attractive rewards for those able to land a good catch. The next Big Fish Challenge will be held over the third weekend in October at the Eildon Pondage incorporating a food and wine festival.

Again there will be substantial prizes on offer for those who land a fish or two with trade displays, market stalls, raffles, prize draws and an auction.

\$9.58 million capital works to benefit the Shire

Murrindindi Shire Council's Capital Works Program for 2014/15 will total \$9,580,000 and will deliver a range of projects to be rolled out across the shire to improve assets used by the community.

Mayor Margaret Rae said that she was pleased with what was going to be achieved in this year's Capital Works Program considering the financial challenges that Council is facing.

"Nearly half of this year's capital works budget relates to works on Council's road network, bridges and footpaths as well as road safety initiatives. The program includes resealing works to 14km of sealed roads and road rehabilitation and resheeting of approximately 65km of Council's unsealed road network," said Cr Rae.

The Capital Works Program also identifies a major bridge replacement project for Ghin Ghin which Council has been fortunate to receive \$1 million from the Country Roads and Bridges Initiative Program to be put towards the \$1,594,000 works.

"Footpath works will include a number of projects aimed to improve access along Council's pedestrian network. Council's landfill and Resource Recovery Centres will also see improvements. \$870,000 will be put towards improving operations at all sites including the construction of a new cell at the Alexandra Landfill to receive waste as well as improvements to onsite leachate management."

Works carried forward from the 2013-14 budget will begin in the Eildon shopping precinct including landscaping, footpath, signage and car parking upgrades. Yarck township is also set to benefit from landscaping works.

\$770,000 will be put towards improvements to all four swimming pools across the Shire with a major refurbishment of the Yea Swimming Pool to be carried out through a grant from the Local Government Infrastructure Program. In addition, a number of minor works to pools in Alexandra, Eildon and Marysville totalling \$230,000 will also be undertaken with the assistance of funding from the Community Facility Funding Program. The Kinglake Arts History Walk will be completed to the value of \$250,000.

Eildon's Moores Park will see the installation of improved playground equipment and Alexandra's Leckie Park and Rotary Park will receive disability upgrades to existing public toilets to make these facilities accessible for everyone.

At Glenburn Community Centre, the public toilets will receive painting and repairs and the Taggerty Community Project will be completed with funding from the Victorian Bushfire Appeal Fund.

The Capital Works Program will also provide funding towards the resurfacing of the Terip Terip Tennis Courts and renewal works to the Clubhouse. Funding is being provided in support of a grant from Sport and Recreation Victoria's Community Facility Program.

"Meeting the needs of our vast and widespread communities is something that takes our utmost consideration. I believe that this year's Capital Works Program will provide a fair and equitable scope of projects and renewal programs," said Cr Rae.

Cr Rae encouraged the community to look at the draft Budget and the further projects it supports. The Council Plan Review and Strategic Resource Plan are also available for viewing.

"These documents are out for public exhibition until Friday 6 June and I invite those wishing to make a submission to do so by this time. It's the input that we receive that will help us shape a financial future that we can all enjoy," said Cr Rae.

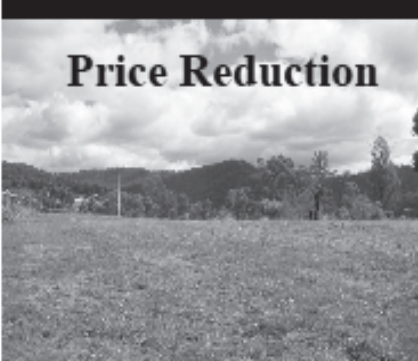

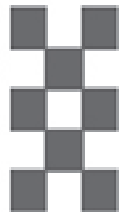

How do you react to the following:

1 "I was delighted to receive the gifts you sent. I could distribute them to our children, some for themselves and others for them to give to their parents. I was grateful for the many different things." (From the Head-teacher of an isolated aboriginal school out of Katharine.)

2 "We really appreciated the caps you sent. It is so hot during much of the year. The sturdy baseball caps are just what the children need. They fill them with water and then slap them on their head! This reduces the heat exposure when they are out playing." (From the Head-teacher in another isolated NT school.)

3 An aboriginal Mother in Alice Springs told her child's teacher at Yipirinya School: "I send my children to school to learn and to be out of the violence around them ... both outside in the community and in my family."

4 "No aboriginal person, or anyone else without shoes on their feet, can enter a prison to visit a friend or relative. We would be grateful if you could include all sizes of thongs and any other sort of sandals." (Part of a telephone conversation with the Rector of the Alice Springs Anglican Church of the Ascension.)

5 "Art supplies would be wonderful as we try to bring in women from the outlying areas and teach them painting skills. This helps them develop independence." (Sr Liz who works at the St Teresa Mission out of Alice Springs.)

If your reaction is a practical one, you may like to support our efforts. This is what we do.

For the past 10 years, the members of the Guild of Christ Church Marysville and St Thomas Buxton have been sending boxes of materials to the NT. The goods we collect are in response to specific requests. We have contact with 4 isolated aboriginal schools, St Teresa Mission, and the Anglican Church in Alice Springs. Needs change but over the years we have sent a range of sporting equipment, art supplies, and clothing for all ages. We have knitted squares and made woollen rugs for St Teresa — requested because people having dialysis in Alice Springs get cold on their way home. Recently a Buxton supporter made 80 toilet bags which we filled with toileteries. These have gone to a women's Shelter in Alice Springs.

When the time comes to send goods north, we need manpower to box and cart the goods to Melbourne. The boxes are transported by the regular Greyhound bus and this can cost as much as \$400. Donations to help us cover the cost would be very welcome.

Council continues to advocate for funding support

Murrindindi Shire Mayor Margaret Rae has declared that Council is continuing to advocate to the State Government for financial assistance.

"In February 2012, Council completed its evaluation and review of the long term financial costs associated with the gifted assets received by Council following the 2009 bushfires.

"The evaluation was undertaken in conjunction with independent audit firm KPMG which found that Council needs to allocate an additional \$1.8 million per annum to operate, maintain and renew its gifted assets. This formed the basis of Council's request for additional funding from the State Government to assist with these costs," said Cr Rae.

In addition Council undertook a major review of its services between 2011 and 2013 which delivered cost savings to Council through streamlining operations, land and assets sales and increases to fees and charges for a range of services provided to the community.

The request that was made of the State Government was for an upfront payment of \$14.1 million, which was determined to be the most suitable of a range of options presented to Council. This option provided Council with the flexibility to invest the upfront payment and earn a return to assist in meeting future recurrent obligations. It also did not require an additional increase in rates over and above the projected annual rate increases of 6% over ten years, which are incorporated in Council's Strategic Resource Plan.

Council has since prepared its budgets for 2012/13, 2013/14 and 2014/15 on this basis whilst seeking to progress the funding request through the appropriate channels within State Government.

"Much of Council's future decision making is still hinging on the State Government's response to the request for financial support.

"Council is facing some challenging financial decisions moving forward in relation to its ability to fund the maintenance and renewal of its infrastructure assets. Consideration is also being given to what services and facilities the Council is required or expected to deliver, and how much the community can afford – or is prepared to contribute – towards those services." said Councillor Rae.

Council will be considering options to meet its future financial needs in the event that the funding request is not met and will be looking to its communities for input on what measures may need to be taken to secure a sustainable future.

In the lead-up to the State Government election that is scheduled for 20 November 2014, Council is maintaining its advocacy efforts for financial assistance for the Murrindindi Shire.
