## Ultrafox slink into town.

Just Shows to Go keeps the faith with its far flung clients in the remote out posts of Victorian culture with number three in this year's Café Culture Series - the outstanding Ultrafox.

Up front are the sparkling guitars of Peter Baylor and Jon Delaney. On violin is Andy Baylor whose command of all things swinging is legendary and bassist Kain Borlase laying the foundations as only he can. They present the finest in Le Jazz Hot. Showing influences from, amongst others, Django Reinhardt and the Hot Club of France, however, they are in no way derivative and make all the tunes in their formidable repertoire their own.

A professional musician since 1980, Peter Baylor has played with countless bands in various styles in Melbourne and Sydney. In recent years Peter has toured Australia, the USA, Europe and Japan with a variety of groups including Doug Parkinson, The Dancehall Racketeers, Stringbusters, Flatfoot Shakers and many more. Peter plays and sings in various styles. His eclectic guitar and vocal style move effortlessly from jazz and swing to blues, rockabilly and country.

His brother, Andy Baylor has been

playing professionally since the mid-seventies and has been a driving force behind many acts. Andy is no stranger to the Cafe Culture Series having appeared on stage with Banana Oil in 2004, The Baylor Brothers in 2005, and most recently with Irwell Street String Band last year. Over the years Andy has honed a highly personal style on vocals, fiddle and guitar and has been one of the leaders in the emerging 'roots' [musical styles in Australia and was hand-picked by Bob Dylan to support some of his shows.](#)

Jon Delaney began his performance career in 1994, and has gone on to perform all over Australia in his own bands and as a sideman with countless other acts. He spent 2008 playing in and around Berlin, and has also performed in the United Kingdom and Canada. In 2011 he travelled to Belgium to study with manouche legend Fapy Lafertin. Double bassist Kain Borlase has worked with a number of artists and groups including The Ken Schroder Quartet, Mark Lockett Trio, Julie O'Hara, and The Brunswick Blues Shooters. He has participated in numerous east coast tours and festivals, television and live to air radio performances. A frequent traveller on the festival circuit his stops include: The Queenscliff Music Festi-

val, The Gympie Music Muster and The Melbourne International Jazz Festival.

With a set of musical credentials like that one can only wonder and wait in high anticipation for the musical feast to come. It is a tribute to the reputation of Mary Sounes and Just Shows to Go that the band could be lured from their usual Melbourne haunts like The Spotted Malard, Bennet's Lane and Paris Cat to venture into the wilds of regional Victoria. So if your tastes run to Swing, Elegant or Blue Jazz, tender ballads, gypsy waltzes and hot rhythm and/or are an admirer of seriously inspired musicianship then make sure you reserve your seat for what promises to be a night of truly inspired music.

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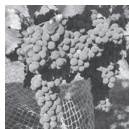
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**Council rejects Minister's misleading claims**

It appears Murrindindi Shire Council's advocacy efforts aimed at securing funding assistance to the tune of \$1.76 million per annum to meet the costs of new and gifted assets continue to grab the attention of the State Government. An interview with Council's General Manager for Corporate and Community Services Michael Chesworth about Council's funding situation was aired on WIN TV on 4 September 2014. Minister for Local Government the Hon. Tim Bull was also interviewed by phone about the support the Government had provided to Council.

Minister Bull said that the Murrindindi Shire Council's Mayor and CEO had "signed off" on a \$1 million grant from the State Government for the new and gifted assets, suggesting Council had agreed that this grant was the end of State Government assistance to Council in support of the new and gifted assets.

Margaret Abbey, CEO of Murrindindi Shire Council said the Minister's comments did not reflect what actually happened.

"Two things in particular need to be corrected – one is that the grant wasn't a one-off payment of \$1 million – it was two tranches of \$550,000 and \$370,000 over the two financial years of 2011-2012 and 2012-2013, totaling \$920,000.

"The other is the important question of what was agreed between Council and the State Government at that time. The Minister's suggestion that Council "signed off" on assistance as final is factually incorrect. I have a very clear recollection of an animated discussion with the then CEO of State Government's Victorian Bushfire Reconstruction and Recovery Authority when the State budget was announced, where I made it very clear that the offer of \$920,000 had to be seen as the start of support to Council and not the end of the support.

"This claim also makes little sense given Council has not stopped advocating for additional funding at any time since that meeting. This is acknowledged by the fact that Minister Bull wrote to me in June this year stating that the State Government would not be providing further funding assistance in support of the new and gifted assets. He would have had no requirement to do so if Council had signed off on the previous grant as final," said Ms Abbey.

Council will continue to lobby the State Government to provide funding assistance to cover the \$1.76 million cost to Council of the State Government's decision to transfer responsibility to Council of the new and gifted assets. This is particularly important to avoid transferring the burden of these additional costs to the community of Murrindindi Shire.

## Mayor's chair by Cr Margaret Rae

Since we mailed the letter to ratepayers regarding our funding shortfall and options for consideration in bridging that gap, we have received a steady stream of responses, ideas and comments. These are very welcome and are being collated for inclusion in all the responses to be taken into consideration by Council in making its final decision.

I might add that, although the mail out has gone to ratepayers, the options and ideas outlined do have the potential to affect all our residents and so I would encourage everyone who lives in our Shire to look at our website, to read the fact sheets and the options paper and to follow the more detailed information as it becomes available.

A number of the responses so far have made comments along the line of "the total shortfall figure is given but how does that relate to the actual assets? Where do the numbers come from? And can we see the figures?"

The answer is yes. A spreadsheet which shows the operating and maintenance costs for the new and gifted assets arising from the bushfires is available on our website. These figures show what costs are involved in providing an appropriate level of service to operate and maintain these assets. Without further support from the State Government, decisions will have to be made on whether to reduce service levels, or discontinue use of certain assets, or dispose of others or to increase revenue to ensure that Council can afford to continue these services and assets.

On Council's web page on fact sheet for option no. 4, there is one group of assets labelled Crown Land (Reserves) Act Committees of Management that comprises more than 25 assets owned by the Department of Primary Industries (DEPI), that sit on DEPI land and run by DEPI committees of management. These committees work very hard to keep these assets going but have at times sought assistance from Council to meet costs, including insurance. This results in considerable costs for Council to be putting into assets for which it has no responsibility and over which it has no control.

In this circumstance should these assets be returned to DEPI to relieve Council of this burden? Or should we be asking the committees to shoulder the responsibility themselves? Do they have the capacity now to raise sufficient funds to look after their basic annual operating and maintenance costs?

A similar consideration can be given to those assets for which Council is a nominated manager of Crown land on behalf of DEPI or where we have delegated this to a Section 86 Committee. The Section 86 committees that have responsibility for these assets are being increasingly required to raise sufficient revenue to cover their operating and maintenance costs. This is hard for them as well - but will need to be the way of the future.

What do these committees think and feel about this approach? There are members of the community who either think this already happens or that it should happen. How achievable is that degree of self sufficiency? Council has written to these committees to let them know that Council is reviewing its options in relation to current arrangements and to advise that Council will be in contact to discuss this in more detail shortly.

These are some examples from the range of options we are looking at and it is becoming increasingly clear that no one option by itself can provide the amount needed. However, a combination of options may well take us a fair way forward. And whatever resourcing can be found by other methods means the potential reliance on a further rate increase (as outlined in Option 1) is reduced. So please keep your ideas and comments coming.



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## Councillor Comment by Cr Bernie Magner Eildon Ward

I recently went on a 61 kilometre hike through some very tough terrain in the Northern Territory. It was hot, isolated and the flies and bugs were relentless. We carried our packs full of food, water, tents, cooking equipment, clothes and medical packs. I got blisters and bites that ran up both legs and plenty of cuts and bruises. With all of this, you may well ask, why? The answer is very simple. I got to spend quality time with family and friends. The challenges we faced, we met head on together. We encouraged each other, helped each other up when the going got tough, sat under waterfalls together and enjoyed the moments of wonder looking up at the stars. Given the weight of our packs, we had little room for luxuries so it was a highlight when someone pulled out a simple bag of lollies to share. It makes you think that if we don't need much to be happy in life. We don't have to surround ourselves with things we don't really need, but merely want. 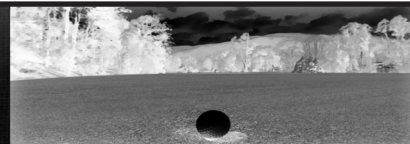

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## Working together for the good of our roadsides

Council at its ordinary meeting on Wednesday 27 August formally adopted its Rural Roadside Management Plan and associated Guidelines.

Environment and Climate Change Portfolio spokesperson Councillor John Kennedy said that roadside management involves a wide range of factors.

“Road safety, fire management, habitat conservation, weed and pest animal management, recreation and provision of utility services all need to be considered as part of responsible road management practices.

“The Rural Roadside Management Plan and associated Guidelines has taken over 18 months to develop due to the wide range of stakeholder engagement undertaken to ensure it has a balanced approach in addressing roadside safety concerns, provision of services and environmental conservation.

“In developing the Plan, all of these aspects have been brought together into an easily understood and practical format to help the community understand the significance of our roadsides and how to manage them”, said Cr Kennedy.

Council held a workshop in May 2013 which provided important input for the Plan. Subsequent meetings have since been held with key organisations including the Country Fire Authority and the Murrindindi Environment Advisory Committee.

“Valuable community feedback was also received during a four week exhibition period of the Rural Roadside Management Plan.

“Council’s roles, responsibilities and expectations are made clear in the Plan and the incorporated Guidelines provide helpful information on how to conduct specific activities with consideration to protecting the roadside conservation value.

“The Guidelines are a broader resource for Council staff, contractors, agencies and community members”, said Cr Kennedy.

The Rural Roadside Management Plan outlines what can and cannot be done in Council owned roadsides, which will help improve communication and provide a better customer service experience for people wishing to undertake works or activities in a Council roadside.

“Improving the way activities are managed on roadsides will help Council and the wider community meet their legal and moral responsibilities,” said Cr Kennedy.

The adopted Rural Roadside Management Plan will be made available on council’s website at [www.murrindindi.vic.gov.au](http://www.murrindindi.vic.gov.au) in the coming weeks and will also be available at council’s offices in Alexandra, Kinglake and Yea. In meantime, a plain text version of the document can be requested through Council’s Environmental Programs Unit on 5772 0702.

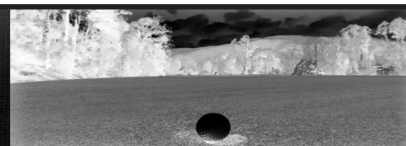
