Where did you get hold of the rumour
about us going to Italy. They only sent Tommy down there after
the Italian mess-up. I believe the Deigos “had the “wind up”
properly & if it had not been for the British troops, they would
have collapsed altogether. I think that next time we have a
war we'll have it on our own. All through the piece we
have been carrying some — messing fools, & Frizy
gets the benefit of it all. He could never break through
on the Western Front. The Cambrai stunt was a mess-up,
& could have ~~been~~ been avoided & the Frizy counter attack was
expected.

Of course you can't help having casualties.
There is so much gear, artillery, ammunition & (men, of course)
concentrated behind the line that Frizy can't help hitting
something if he chuck's a shell over; & of course it is not our
policy (as the offensive or attacking party) to build such

elaborate gas pits, pill-boxes & dugouts. as Fritz. can get
a little benefit from his defences when we push him back a few
inches. I was in one of his pill-boxes one day when he lobbed a
small shell on top of it. It hardly made any impression on the
concrete. Well, to get out of France for a bit. Fritz had
two air-raids near here last week (Mon & Tues.) On Monday one
bomb blew the — out of Thorac Bottomley's printing establish-
ment with the result that "John Bull's" circulation was curtailed
a trifle. You'd almost think that Fritz had got out with
"John Bull" for "slinging off" at him & so dropped a "hot one"
(as the soldiers say) on his building. I think there were over
50 people killed there; so you can see that air-raids are
particularly rotten. In France, on certain parts of the line, —
for instance - while the Passchendaele stunt was on - Fritz used
to come over every night & his planes would go back & forth
with loads of bombs, half the night; but one expects it there;
while over here it makes you feel horrible to see the
crowds of people taking cover. All the tubes stop running & the
people ~~are~~ get down below. You see them in various stages
of dress, some with camp stools, others with cushions, blankets
etc. trying to make themselves comfortable. I tell 'ee digger
~~the~~ half the mob over in Aussie don't know there is
a war on. Let some of the crowd over here imagine
their tin-pot little town, to be a village in France or Belgium
& mean one of those moth-eaten affairs I told you about once
before, where the crowd had to leave suddenly & pack up what
