

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

## THE BIRTH OF OUR CHURCH

Gold was discovered in the Inglewood district in 1859, and hundreds of miners flocked here to try and win an easy fortune for themselves. These were closely followed by craftsmen, merchants, and professional men, who soon helped to establish a more permanent settlement. Thus the present township of Inglewood was born.

It is not surprising that Services were soon organised for the members of the Church of England, the very first Service being held in a tent in

the year 1860, by Archdeacon Crawford of Castlemaine. Following that, local lay Readers carried on, one of whom 27 years later, became the 7th Vicar of the Parish, namely the Rev. Rowland Hayward. It is recorded that the Rev. W. Croxton of Bendigo, visited Inglewood in January 1861, officiating at Divine Worship in a store then owned by a Mr. R. Millen.

In the following month, all persons interested in forming a Parish, held a meeting at which a "very active and influential committee" was elected to build a church. Tenders were called, but none being accepted, no building eventuated.

In April 1861 Bishop Perry, the first Bishop of Melbourne, paid his first visit to Inglewood, then a part of his Diocese. It was in March 1862, that an iron building in Brooke

shop Perry, rood, then a ng in Brooke Street was bought by Mr. Thompson, a schoolteacher, to be used both as a school and a place of worship. A parsonage had been found, for which the committee was in debt for several years, to the Rev. W. "Parson" Hall of Kingower.

With a Church and a Parsonage, the people became insistent for a resident Minister, and in May 1862, the Rev. W. Chalmers, a former Missionary from Sarawak in Borneo, was appointed to take charge of the district.

On May 19th there was a public meeting of the members of the Church of England to elect a committee. The organisers really meant business, as this note appeared in the local paper—"It is to be hoped that all members will shake off the lukewarmness for which they are noted."

Sub-districts were formed with a committeeman in control of each. The men were to canvass for sub-

scriptions, mainly in the form of pew rents (ten shillings per annum), and, as an incentive, were paid a commission on the amount of money they collected.

For £170 the committee purchased the school from Mr. Thompson, which meant, that now, they could plan for the future with a building of their own. About that time, a festival was held to raise money to erect a fence around the Parsonage.

The joy of having the schoolroom as a place of Worship was short-lived, as, on the night of July 31st 1863, it was blown down by a violent storm. But this did not deter the eagerness of our early pioneers, who only four days later, held a meeting to discuss its replacement. On August 11th it was agreed, at a general meeting of the Parishioners, to build a new church on its present site.

Advertisements were placed in the local paper asking for plans for the new Church, offering a bonus of £10 for the best design. This was showing great faith, as the old schoolroom had not been completely paid for, so the materials salvaged from the wrecked Church were sold, the debt repaid, and the remainder placed in a new Church Building Fund. In a further effort to raise more money, the Vicar offered to take two Services every Sunday.

By December 3rd 1863, a tender from Mr. Rose, a local builder, for £910 for the erection of the Nave only, was accepted, as due to lack of funds, the tower as planned, was not included.

The new Church was to be named "St. Augustine's", and the foundation stone was laid on Tuesday, February 2nd. In April, tenders were called for the making of seats, pulpit and communion table. Therefore on June 16th 1864, the Church committee was able to present to the Parish a solid, well designed and dignified place of Worship, which was duly dedicated by Archdeacon Crawford. The Rev. W. Chalmers made this note in his diary — "Miserable rainy day; St. Augustine's Church solemnly opened for Divine Worship at 11 a.m."

During the next decade the gold production declined, the population decreased, and consequently the committee was hard pressed to meet all

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

the expenses connected with the Church. This has been a major problem during its history, resulting in numerous "special efforts" to raise money. Picnics were organised and at one meeting a motion was passed . . . "That a glass of beer be provided for each person at lunch." Picnics in those times were extremely popular! In fact the situation became so serious, that in 1881, it was decided, due to the acute shortage of funds, the Vicar's stipend be the balance after all expenses were paid. In September of the same year, Inglewood became a part of the newly formed Diocese of Ballarat.

In December 1882, the ladies of the Church established a Church Improvement and Chancel Fund. They collected small monthly subscriptions, which eventually freed the Church from debt.

Tenders were called in September 1883 for the erection of the Chancel. The first Bishop of Ballarat, the Right Rev. S. Thornton was later presented with the trowel he used when laying the foundation stone in May 1884; the Chancel being consecrated the following October.

St. Augustine's Ladies' Guild held their first meeting in 1888, organising an "Olde English Faire" to augment the funds of the Church. The work done by the ladies of this time

effectively pioneered the way for 76 years of loyal service to the Parish. At a bazaar in 1889, they raised the grand total of £84, which was made available to the Vestry when the Sunday School was being built in 1894.



SUNDAY SCHOOL

Throughout the nineties and the early part of this century, the people experienced severe hardship due to depression and drought, but it was the softly spoken old Vicar, the Rev. Rowland Hayward, who for twenty-two years inspired the congregation by his faith and leadership, to a greater sense of unity and devotion.

The present Rectory was built in 1912, at a cost of £611, and dedicated the following year.

The Golden Jubilee of St. Augustine's was held in 1914, Bishop Green of Ballarat, and Archbishop Lowther Clarke of Melbourne, being present at the celebrations, conducting the Services on the Sundays preceding and following the actual day. Soon after these celebrations however, war was declared, and many men from the Parish left to fight overseas.

When the Diocese of St. Arnaud was formed in 1924, our Parish automatically became part of it.





preaching on the first Sunday, and the Most Rev. J. J. Booth, then Archbishop of Melbourne, officiating on the following Sunday. Addresses that week reminded the people of the value of looking back through history — "The Greatness of the Church in the past, assured it of Greatness in the Future."

In 1954, St. Augustine's held its Ninetieth Anniversary with a week of celebrations, commencing with a Service conducted by Archdeacon Walter Walters, a former assistant curate of Inglewood. On the following Sunday, the present Bishop of St. Arnaud, the Right Rev. A. E. Winter, dedicated the new West Window which had been given by the congregation as a Thanks-offering on this occasion.

Today, we celebrate One Hundred Years of worship in our Church, and we trust that we, who are here now, and those, who come after, will be worthy of the heritage our Pioneers have left us.


