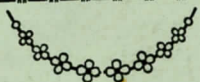


Golden Square Methodist Sunday School.

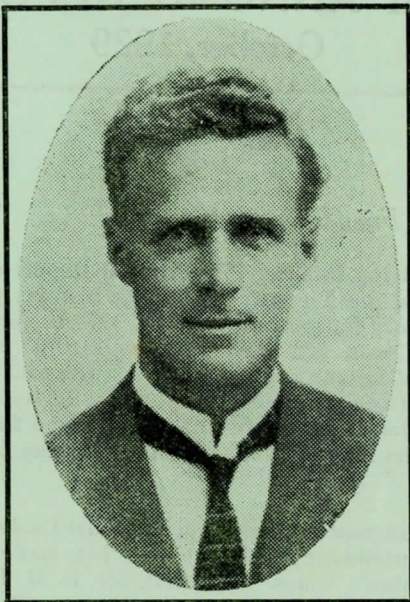
Thanking God for His past mercies we pray that He will richly and abundantly bless our school, and give us strength and courage to carry on our great work through another year.

Miss Millie Pollard, one of our younger teachers, after an illness which lasted only a few weeks, passed away to the Higher Life. Our sympathy is extended to her sorrowing mother and family.

An old and highly respected friend and brother, Mr. G. A. Pethard, who after only been ill for a very short period was called to his eternal rest. He was an ex-superintendent of our School, an ex-president of the Augustonian Fair, and as we all know an ardent worker for the church, and the various tasks entrusted to him were always carried out with a thoroughness that always achieved success, through his untiring efforts he will be greatly

missed. To Mrs. Pethard and family our loving sympathy goes out and we trust they will be comforted and consoled in their hour of sorrow.

In consequence of Mr. Wood's death there were two positions to be filled, in that of superintendent and leader of the Young Men's Class, and for a short time the prospect was anything but bright for our school, but although the loss of our loved friend seemed hard to bear, we have been greatly compensated by the action of our friend, Mr. J. E. Mamouney, who came forward and volunteered his services for the position of superintendent and this was willingly and unanimously accepted. Through the efforts of Mr. Mamouney, Mr. Wishart was approached and he wholeheartedly consented to accept the position of leader of the Young Men's Class. We are greatly indebted to these gentlemen for stepping in and carrying on the great work in our midst. And we trust and pray that our school will prosper and succeed in its great aims under the leadership of these gentlemen as it did under our late superintendent. The young men are rallying around their new leader with the result that pleasant and profitable afternoons are being spent in the class. An invitation is extended to all young men to come along and join.

Our loving sympathy goes out to Mrs. Wood and the members of his household, who we feel sure, will be comforted and sustained from the knowledge of the wonderful

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Mr. W. Stanley, who assisted in the Library, severed his connection therewith during the year, and to him we extend our best thanks. Mr. Mel. Warne one of our young men is filling the vacancy with great credit.

Another of our young men, Mr. Cecil Nicholas, is our Mission Secretary, and is doing good work.

Through the Education Department transferring from Bendigo one of our capable teachers, Miss Eileen Graham, we unfortunately were compelled to remove her name from the list of our teachers and we pray that God will bless her in her new sphere.

Although the numbers of our scholars are slightly below those of the previous year we are glad to report that the standard of our school has been well maintained. We have now 89 boys and 120 girls with an average attendance of 72 and 108 respectfully and 33 teachers and officers with an average attendance of 28.5.

Our Library is still in the capable hands of Mr. F. Trenear, assisted by Messrs. A. Jones and M. Warne. 1,680 books were issued on 48 Sundays making an average of 35 books per Sunday. 40 new books have been added during the year including a fine parcel from Mr. J. Y. Allan. There are now about 1,150 books which any of our scholars may loan for the small membership fee of 1/- per year.

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During the year the school was addressed by our own pastor, Rev. R. B. McConchie, Mr. Barkla of the Foreign Mission deputation, and Miss Miller of the Methodist Y.W.M.M., and several members of the Melbourne Local Preachers Association, also Rev. Ballard and Dr. Douglas Thomas, who confined their addresses to the Young Men's Class. The outcome of the latter's address was that our young men decided to support a cot in the new Methodist Babies' Home.

The social side of our school has again been well looked after. The Girl's Guild, which was formed a year or two ago, progressed well enough to enter the competition and were successful in winning two prizes. The boys have also formed a guild and have had a very enjoyable season under the leadership of Mr. A. Arthur of the Y.M.C.A. Once again our Basket Ball Boys have been successful in the inter-church league and gained a place in the final four.

During the year we received an appeal from the Rev. Day of the South Melbourne Mission, and decided to hold a pound Sunday with the fine result that a box of groceries weighing 125 lbs. nett was forwarded for distribution among the poor.

Our usual Xmas Tree was held on Xmas Sunday and we had a fine collection of toys to forward to the Benevolent Asylum for distribution.

The Annual Tea and Concert last year was in charge of the men, and the profits were credited to the funds of the Forward Association.

The Picnic will again be held at Ravenswood, and will be conducted by the Forward Association. We hope to see a fine gathering of our friends at the old spot on November 13th.

The Kindergarten department in charge of Misses M. Teasdale and D. Goddard has had a most successful year. There are now 54 children on the roll in this department and any children from 3 years of age will be gladly welcomed. These little folk contributed to Foreign Mission last year by means of their half-penny roll £2 4s. 6½d. This is independent of the usual collection.

The Christian Endeavour Society under the leadership of Rev. McConchie still carries on its valuable work in conjunction with our church and school, and to these people we must offer our very best thanks for the decoration of the church for the Anniversary.

The Morning School is still carried on and meets every Sunday morning at 9.45. There are now on the roll 47 scholars
