A list of the available pools — most of them bone-dry — shows why Bendigonians this year are just not "in the swim".

Bendigo is by far the most unfortunate city of its size in Australia — with the greatest number of waterless so-called "swimming pools" — and the smallest number of pools in operation.

"As our pool contains only 50,000 gallons of water, that would mean we would have changed the water 69 times during the season. This, of course, is absolutely ridiculous—we don't change the water every day, as we also use chlorination."

(For comparison: Golden Square swimming pool contains 1,750,000 gallons of water, 35 times as much—but they were served with an excess water bill of only £65 for last season) He said the City Council had finally agreed to pay the bill.

Long Gully — the oldest pool in the district—constructed about 70 years ago — will soon have filtration plant.

The rather unique unit will be constructed of 44 gallon drums, a small pump and some piping.
