The report states:—Two hundred and seventy persons were relieved indoor, viz., 195 men and 75 women, and on June 30 101 men and 75 women were being accommedated at the institution. The daily average was 159. The number of deaths last year was 40, the average age of deceased persons being 72 years. As in former years, our outdoor relief work has been a heavy draft upon the financial resources of the institution. To outdoor relief cases 7907 distributed the committee also granted boots, blankets and clothing to specially necessificus cases, while 25 families who reside some distance from the institution also receive outdoor relief by means of horders on storekeepers. A great deal of destitution has existed, brought about mainly by the large amount of unemployment throughout the state.
