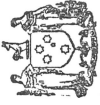

at each side of the bodice and rucked into soft folds. She wore a double row of pearls at the square neckline and held a trail of white and blue hyacinths and stocks with her prayer book. A plait of the same material as her frock bound the veil to her head.

Youthful maids were Margaret Bourke and Ruth Marriott, whose pretty frocks of lemon marquisette over taffeta were tucked from neckline to hem, and puffed sleeves. The maids wore lemon and blue flowers on their hair and carried posies of daffodils, forget-me-nots and stocks, in gold holders.
