

## NEWS OF SOLDIERS.

10 OCT. 1918

Mr. George Carter, of Rosebrook, near Horsham (formerly of Bungil Station), has been notified that his second son, Private Robert A. E. Carter, had died of wounds on 10th September at the Exeter War Hospital. Private Robert Carter enlisted with his brother Tom in December, 1915, and left together in April, 1916, and was with his brother until Tom was invalided home about twelve months ago. The day prior to the notification of his death his parents received a cable to say that no serious results were anticipated. The deceased was a nephew of Mrs. P. Sutherland, of Thologolong.

Mrs. Neil Walsh has received word that her husband, Gunner A. N. Walsh, was admitted on 8th September to the 1st Southern General Hospital, Birmingham, England, suffering from pyrexia.

Lieutenant Scales and Signaller M'Cann on Friday passed through Tallangatta on their way home to Scow Creek on furlough. They arrived here unannounced, but several gentlemen hunted them up, welcomed them home and thanked them for what they had done.

Corporal Edward Boyce, a Valley boy (whose return to Australia was mentioned in last issue), arrived at Tallangatta on Monday, intending to visit his native heath. Having been advised by his intelligence department of the soldier's coming, Mr. B. T. Pearse made known the fact, and a goodly number of townspeople assembled at the railway station to meet the returned hero. Speeches of welcome were made by Mr. Pearse and Mr. Hill, and the soldier was lustily cheered by the children. Corporal Boyce briefly replied, thanking the people for their welcome, and assuring them that he was very glad indeed to be back amongst them again.

Signaller H. M. Polmear, of 37th Battalion, has been officially reported wounded (second occasion).
