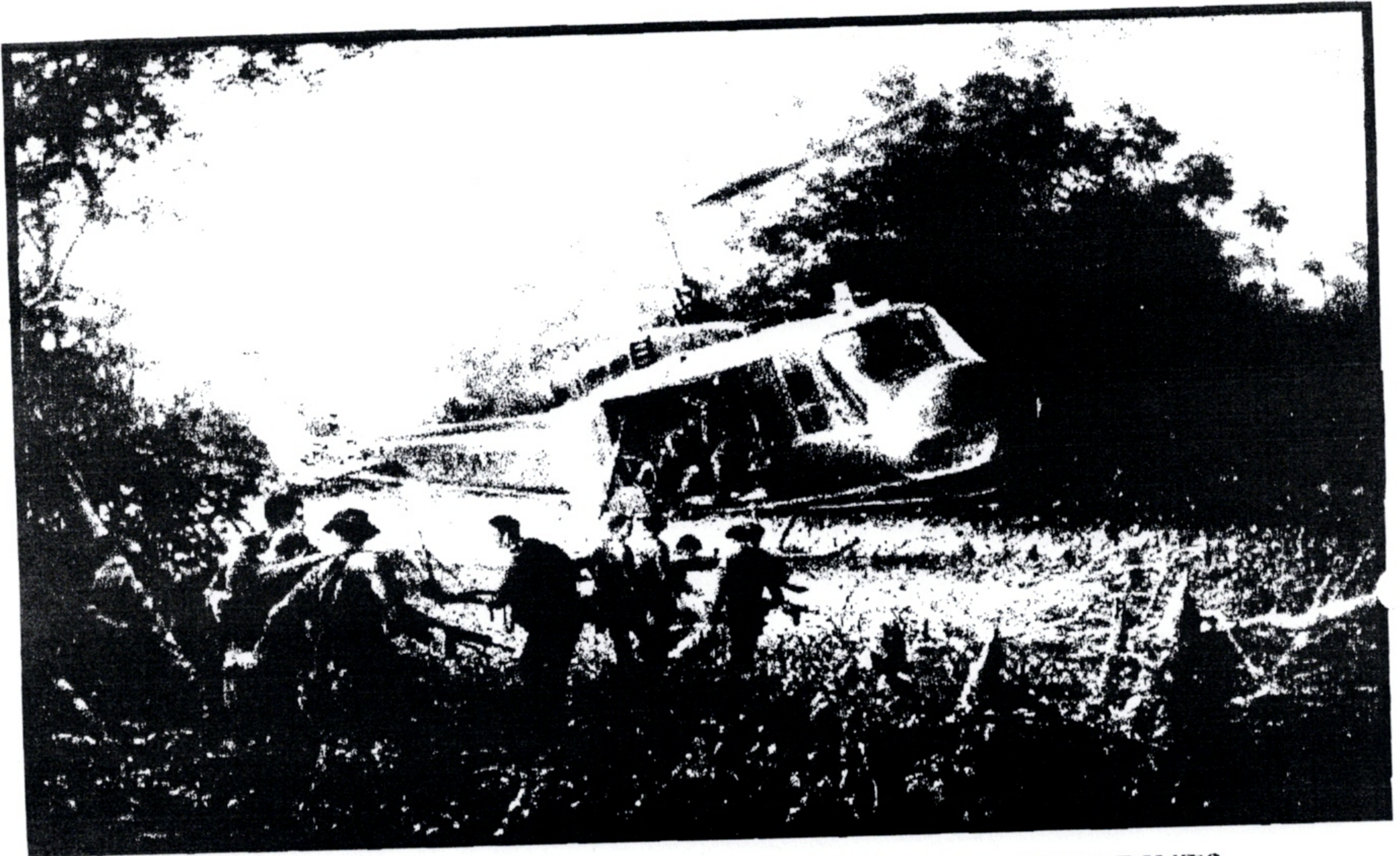

5/7 RAR UPDATE FEB – MAY 01

The battalion welcomed back LT COL M.G. Tucker, MBE (a previous PL COMD and ADJT) to take up the reigns as the Commanding Officer and the previous Commanding Officer, LT COL S.C. Gould, DSC was posted to the UK to assume an instructor position at the Staff College in Camberley.

The significant event for the Tiger Battalion so far this year has been the ADF HQ directed Single Entitlement Document (SED) Review. The SED Review scrutinised every manpower position and item of equipment that the unit believed it was entitled to and if it wasn't justifiable it was removed. All units across the Army will eventually undertake the process and it has been designed to remove hollowness from units. The positive outcome from the review has been the increase from 553 ARA positions to 607. The increase in personnel has mainly occurred in the area of RAEME support to the battalion's 85 A vehicles.

Currently part of the battalion is on exercise in Shoalwater Bay for Tandem Thrust with US forces and will be joined by the rest of the unit for the 1 Bde exercise Predators Gallop and return to Darwin by a combination of land, sea and air by early July. So for some a ten week stint in the field.

The B Coy group is currently at Rifle Company Butterworth and will undertake a number of live fire exercises with the Malaysian and Singaporean forces and are due to return to Darwin early August.

The unit recently held a reception in the area museum to showcase the battalion's history and memorabilia. The activity was well attended by representatives from government, local business and local 5 RAR and 7 RAR association members. A substantial amount of work has gone into the research and presentation of the collection and if you are ever in Darwin please feel free to drop in during work hours to have a look and pass any comment.

The battalion participated in the recent Darwin City ANZAC Day parade. The CO led the battalion and directly behind him were members of 5 RAR and 7 RAR heading the rest of the unit. It was great to witness a good turn out of the olds and bolds and the significance was not lost on the younger soldiers.

Presently an ambitious plan is on the drawing board for the battalion and that is the creation of a Memorial Walk similar to the one at Gallipoli Barracks, Enoggera, in memory of those soldiers from 5 RAR and 7 RAR who died on active service. The unit believes it is important to have a local focal area in order for the newer soldiers to understand a little more about their unit history. Liaison with the QLD Branch of the RAR Association has been established to gather information and the plan is to officially open the Memorial Walk on ANZAC Day 2002, prior to the unit's second tour to East Timor.

An invitation to the Memorial Walk opening will be extended to all RAR members past and present and it is certainly anticipated that a number of family representatives will take the opportunity to unveil their family members memorial plaque.

The current plan is to conduct a dawn service within the unit area, participate in the Darwin ANZAC Day parade and hold a lunch for all battalion members their families and all RAR members and their families. Expressions of interest will be passed separately to the 5 RAR and 7 RAR associations.

The CO would like to thank the RAR Foundation for its kind donation of \$200 for the 2001 RAR Foundation Prize. CPL Greig was presented with a number of military history books for achieving the student of merit award on the recent unit sponsored Subject 2 CPL course. Part of the donation will be used for a similar award for the CPL promotion course towards the end of this year and will include a copy of the recently released 5 RAR book 'Crossfire'.

'Willy' the pig is not the only one to go feral on the odd occasion in Darwin and recently was witnessed head butting two dingoes out of her pen and still refuses injections from the local vet. Due to the tyranny of distance the unit uses a local Sumatran Tiger 'Sabre' from Crocodylus Park for some ceremonial duties and 'Sabre' will see his next outing during the battalion's Freedom of Darwin parade in conjunction with unit birthday celebrations later in the year.

The Tiger battalion continues to grow in strength in the frontiers of Darwin. Joining the expanded Ready Deployment Force and the revision of the unit's degrees of notice to move for Military Support and War Fighting operations has attracted resources to train and the culture of being a short readiness organisation has been adopted by all.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT – AND VISIT TO KOREA

Your Committee again in early April and discussed a number of matters including a reprint of book 'The Year of the Tiger' and the question of a new Association Plaque. Both these matters need needed further investigation. We mainly discussed the holding of an AGM, possibly later this year, to which State Representatives would be assisted to attend to represent state members. We are still waiting a response on this from some Representatives.

The main activity over our recent months was Anzac Day and although I was away overseas at the time, I hear most gatherings were well attended by members; numbers were a little down on the previous year. Members will be pleased to hear, that after a long battle, and thanks to Kerry O'Connor of Victoria, Reg Sutton was made a T.P.I. I visit Reg, who is now in a nursing home in Canberra, and while he remains in a very poor condition he is least in a position to be better cared for and his wife assisted.

I was fortunate, over the Anzac Day period, to have been invited to join a group of 30 Korean War Veterans to return to South Korea for the 50th Anniversary of the war. The 30 veterans consisted of primarily an Army group of 1, 2, and 3 Battalions and proportionate representation from the Navy, Air Force, Nurses, and widows.

Of the 17,000 Australians who served between 1950 – 53, - 339 were KIA {293 soldiers and 41 RAAF}; 1200 were wounded and 29 become POW's. Over 4 million people were killed during the war mainly Korean & Chinese but 37,000 U.N. troops died, mainly US, from the 22 countries that went to help South Korea.

Our trip of some 10 days included:

- A ceremony at the Korean National War Cemetery and War memorial – Seoul.
- A major UN service at the UN Cemetery – Pusan where all Australian KIA are buried and the missing commemorated.
- A dinner attended by 2000 South Korean Veterans where we were presented with Korean War medals.
- A visit to PANMUNJOM in the Demilitarized Zone between North & South Korea. Although the war had finished in 1953, no peace treaty had been concluded. I was amazed at the high-level state of war readiness that existed on the South Korean side, which we could see and obviously on the North Korean side we were told. Troops, tanks, and guns face each other in a constant state of combat readiness. At Panmunjun {where truce negotiations take place} we could photograph South & North Korean guards who face each other unarmed, but in the aggressive 'Tae Kwan Do' of readiness to attack! Even though the war is over, someone has not yet got the message.
- We visited another site in the Demilitarized Zone very close to the heart of the Australian soldiers, the battlefields of MARYANG SAN, 355, and the HOOK. Many of us present had been WIA on these features and it was memorable to see the same ground 50 years later.

We also spent a day the battlefield of KAPYONG where 3 RAR made military history in 1951 holding a major Chinese attack. We walked down the old Company positions {and still found South Korean Army units still dug in guarding the approach to SEOUL} Unfortunately, the hill where 'A' Company 3 RAR, who took the main brunt of the attack, had been bulldozed away to make room for a factory—such was progress evident in South Korea. Indeed none of us could equate the war torn cities and landscape of the 1950's with the modern, high rise, economic society of the modern South Korea.

Despite there being no peace, we left the country feeling satisfied that we had done our part in fulfilling our Government's intentions and requirements of that time—exactly as we in 5 RAR did to fulfil our Government's in South Vietnam in 1969 – 70.

A LETTER FROM Vo Xuan Thu Representative of the war Veterans Liaison Committee Member of the 33 Regiment South Vietnam Liberation Army October 2000 – Vung Tau.

In 1999 Merv Hains, ex 7 RAR and president of the Cairns RSL Sub Branch went on a holiday to Vietnam.

During the trip he visited the White Palace in Vung Tau and meet a guide Vo Thi Hoa. She was of great assistance in showing Merv around Vung Tau and Phuoc Tuy Province.

On his return to Australia, Merv suggested that we sponsor her to learn English at a school in Cairns.

She subsequently arrived and was billeted out to a number of Vietnamese families. We found out that her father was in the NVA and still lived in the north.
