When the State Electricity Commission took over the Ballarat Tramway system in 1934, they found a worn out tram network. It would have not been capable of coping for the almost three fold increase in passengers that occurred by 1942, the height of activity in Ballarat during the Second World War, when Australia was under the greatest threat. In 1934, such a war was only a possibility and would not have been planned for.

The attack on Pearl harbour in December 1941 saw the introduction of brownout conditions in Ballarat. Shades were placed over the headlights of the trams to prevent the spread of light. This made operation of the trams difficult and caused visibility problems for tram drivers, passengers and other road users. Everyone had to cope as best as they could. White bands were applied to the bumper bars and steps of the trams as shown here on Ballarat Tramway Museum's tram No. 27 to make them safer to see and to board.

The war also saw shortages of materials such as paint and spare parts. The staff had to make do, but the rehabilitation of the tramway system in the mid 1930's saw this cope better than some other tramways in Australia.

Title - Conductresses' Triumph! here

An important part of the war effort was the raising of patriotic funds. In 1944 a most popular conductress competition from amongst the 12 Victorian government tram and bus depots was run to raise money for the Red Cross Prisoners of War Fund. Ballarat's Sylvia Mitchell raised over 3,500 pounds, twice that of any other depot. This excellent result was the outcome of a well organised effort around Ballarat to raise funds, including many balls, concerts, boxing and wrestling tournaments and a grand raffle that featured a 'Treasure Tram' full of hard to get items. The Treasure tram brought in a thousand pounds, a great effort in 1944.

The fundraising went to assist the many Australian Prisoners of War. In a 3BA interview in late 1944 between Sylvia Mitchell and a former prisoner of War, Sergeant Staples, he said that the clothing, food and books bought by the funds 'helped quite a lot to cure what we called barbed-wire-itis"




