TRAMCAR AND DEPOT WORKS

In the last two months, work at the depot has primarily been confined to the restoration of Horse Tram No. 1. The roof slats are being prepared to be placed back on the car. Prior to doing this, all the slats will have been varnished on one side. We had sufficient slats from the old car's roof to do the central portion of the roof, but new ones had to be cut for the sides of the car. The roof ribs have been completed and varnished. Two of the original side panels have been screwed back into place. These are the upper panels on the cars. New lower panels are currently being made up from ply wood, laminated together to form the curved panels. One other job completed has been the installation of the glass in the new window frames and the fitting of the numerous window components.

The repainting of the Museum Display car has recommenced, following the completion of the preparation of the sides of the car. The sectioning of the various portions of the MV101 motor have been completed and the motor reassembled. It is planned to install it the 22E truck within the next couple of months. Some special fabrications will be necessary to support the motor as it is smaller than the normal motors that the trucks are designed for.

Tram car 13 returned to service after a break of some 16 years. Prior to returning to traffic, the seat bases were recovered in the same vinyl material that we have used in a number of cars. Quite a few minor jobs were necessary prior to the car returning to service, including cleaning out the sand boxes, which were full of rubbish, old tickets etc.

The SEC recently removed some old DC street light fittings from the Ballarat. An alert storeman noticed them and contacted us prior to them being carted off in the scrap bins. They were converted to AC light fittings many years ago. A quick survey of Ballarat streets showed that a number of them are still in service, complete with glasses.

Two truck loads of fine crushed rock have been purchased to continue to fill the depot fan trackwork to rail level.

SEASHORE TROLLEY MUSEUM USA

The Society exchanges journals with the Seashore Trolley Museum, The Museum of Mass Transit, at Kennebunkport, Maine USA. From their recent mailout came the sad news that they founder and President, Theodore Santarelli passed away in Dec. 1987. Seashore was a pioneer in preserving electric trams, thus setting the scene for many similar bodies around the world.

On a more happy note, Seashore reported that they recently acquired the body of Lake Shore Electric Railway car No. 177. The 60 foot long, 35 (imperial) ton car; with 4x140 HP motors was used until recently as a "Diner" in Ohio.

TRAM BODY DISPOSAL

The Board has deliberated over the position of the future of tram bodies 121 and 32. Number 121 is a HTT maximum traction tram and was sold by the MMTB in 1939 to a property owner at Mount Evelyn. It was given to the Society in 1975 for possible restoration, and is currently stored on leased land at Bungaree. Number 32 is a former SEC single truck tram and was disposed of by the SEC in 1971 to a group in Maryborough. The Society purchased the remains, primarily for the truck and motors a few years ago.

In considering the matter, the Board has decided to seek expressions of interest from other museums, through COTMA, to ascertain if any would be interested in acquiring these bodies. In the case of 32, only the body portion, no mechanical components would be disposed of. The Board's determination was urged on by the fact that No. 121 is in the weather at Bungaree and the condition of its body can only further deteriorate. The body of No. 32 would require a lot of restoration work and the Board feels that the Society has a considerable numbers of similar single truck cars. This will allow the truck to be used for other restoration projects.

During the Queens Birthday weekend from 11 to 13 June inclusive the Society will have a stand at the Ballarat Model Railway Spectacular. The event will be held at the Ranger Barracks Drill Hall, Curtis St. Ballarat. On Sunday 23 Oct. a public open day will be held at Spencer St. Station consisting of a static display of all the locomotives and other railway equipment The veteran restored electric trains will be operating trips for the public.

The tram, bus and other historic vehicle groups have also been invited to attend and as such our Society has been asked. A service of vintage trams will operate along Spencer St. during the day and our Society has advised the organisers that we wish to operate the cable tram set.
