Museum Accreditation

The Board and Museum workers are proud to announce to our members and supporters that the Museum has become an Accredited Museum under the Museum Accreditation Programme managed by Museums Australia (Victoria). The Museum is one of nine Victorian museums to achieve this level.

The formal announcement was made at International Museums Day by the Mrs. Lorraine Elliott, MLA, Parliamentary Secretary to the Premier for the Arts. Announcing the achievements, Mrs. Elliot said that the museums were at the forefront of quality improvements in the sector and the Museum Accreditation Program was itself a landmark program for the arts.

The Museums, which have been independently appraised and meet appropriate standards of museum practice in accordance with the program requirements, show a high level of commitment to the future of the museums in Victoria and support continual improvement in each of their operations. The Museum President Richard Gilbert received the framed certificate on behalf of our Members. The Certificate will be displayed in our Display area within the depot.

The museums that received accreditation range from trams to ceramics, electronic exhibitions to regional history, from paintings to indigenous gardens. The museums now accredited excluding us are:

Photostory 1 Looking Back at the Ballarat Tramway System

Bridge Street today is a mall with raised paving, seating, recreational equipment and other facilities. Although it remains one of Ballarat's principal shopping strips, the street itself is very different to the times when the trams ran in it.

In the electric tramway days, the track passed down the centre of the street. It was often the most difficult part of Ballarat to drive through, with cars seeking to park, trams running along the street and even the occasional double-parked car, while

someone "ran" into a nearby shop. Ballarat's traffic in the early 1970's prior to tramway closure, was quiet when compared to today.

There was not a lot of room to move in Bridge St, with two lanes of parked cars, two lanes of traffic and a single tram line that served the Mt Pleasant and Victoria Street routes. Naturally there was the occasional accident. In this case, during June 1969, a car has possibly tried Io beat the tram into Bridge St. or did not see the tram at all! No. 18 has ended up in the gutter after the collision, looking as if it was trying to find a car parking spot. Fortunately there was no parked car!



While cars drive around the scene, a bogie car in the background approaches the scene, probably to reverse and run back up the Sturt. St. hill in order to keep the system going. The other Courier photograph shows the tow truck driver about to sweep the road and the policeman making out his report. This photo also shows that the overhead wires had become tangled together. In the background, appears to be another tram within Bridge St., which would most likely have reversed to run an outbound service. At least with the tram well clear of the tramlines, the depot recovery crew did not have worry about getting the tram

rerailed quickly in order to resume services.

Though the rails still remain under the bricks in the mall, many of the shops on either side have changed owners or use. Gone also is the Neptune motor spirit advertisement on the side of one of the buildings (on the right hand side of the second photograph).

Grant for fire main to depot

The City of Ballarat has made available a grant of \$5,000 towards the cost of installing a fire service to the rear of the tram depot. This will enable the provision of a fire hydrant at the rear of our building, a fire hose reel and later on, the installation of a fire sprinkler service to the whole of the building.

The Museum thanks the City of Ballarat for its continued support. The installation will occur in the next few months during the reconstruction of Gillies Sreet at the rear of the depot by the City of Ballarat. This work will require the relocation of the water main along the western side of Gillies St. and the reconstruction of the road surface. This will allow the installation to be done at the same time and at a cheaper rate than normally would be able to be done.

Around the Depot

33's Motor. After a run of many years without any trouble from motors, No. 33 was struck down with an armature failure in the No. 2 motor early in May, following the failure of motors on Nos. 40 and 13 in recent years. This underlines the age of the equipment that we use, with the possibility of expensive and time consuming problems cropping up at any time. It is anticipated that the armature will have to be sent away for professional (and costly) repairs. While the car is out of service the opportunity has been taken to repaint the saloon windows, replace a much-knotted bell cord and attend to any other minor problems.

28's Motor. The previous troublesome motor, that from No. 13, has now been sent to AC/DC Motors in Adelaide for attention. When it returns it will be assigned to No. 28, which donated a motor to No. 13 in order to speed its return to traffic. The work on the body of No. 28 continues on, with a considerable amount of work still required before it returns to active service.

No. 26 With the completion of summer running, No. 26 has been handed over to the maintenance staff for some detail work. The rocker panels have been rubbed down and one has already been repainted in a different shade of yellow, similar to the colour of the horse tram. This is thought to be more accurate than the lighter shade previously applied, and certainly stands out.

No. 14 With winter arriving, No. 14 has been set up for wet weather running with the addition of the Perspex weather shields in the drop ends. When the warmer weather returns this car will come in for repainting of the cream trim.

As if the maintenance staff has not had enough to do, supervising the younger staff in recent times, there is now a trio of even younger enthusiasts. These are known as the junior juniors to distinguish them from the senior juniors who continue on as always. At the moment the junior juniors are mainly concerned with annoying the roster clerk, but it is hoped that in time they will be trained to make a very useful contribution. Their most recent task has been wet and dry sanding on the side panels of No. 28, a thankless task which will certainly test out their staying power.

Model Railway Exhibition

Layout Notes (by the crew)

The Ballarat Model Railway Exhibition is on the forthcoming June long weekend 6-8th and the Tramway was represented here two years ago. We were asked to come again and as always up to the challenge. We have come up with another innovation - a new model tramway layout. Six weeks to make a tramway layout to a running and finished standard is certainly a challenge. This meant we have had to make buildings trees and also overhead wiring. Well, a group of us came together and decided we

could make the layout and so the first meeting of the Ballarat tramway modelers was held at the depot.

Alastair Reither, Paul Mong, Simon Jenkins, Anita Bagley and Darren Hutchesson formed the group. It was decided that we should make a Ballarat tramway layout based on the entire tram system of the SEC in HO scale. However it was realised it would be about as big as our Wendouree Parade depot. We scaled it down to a 3m x 2m layout. The next task was to draw the layout out onto a piece of paper in the scale we wanted it and then lay

the track out. Laying the track out was hard enough because there isn't much room. But we did it and at the time of writing the plaster was being put down and the layout wired. In all, four buildings have been made so far and a forest of trees. Overhead poles are getting the scroll work put on which is a delicate job. So by June the 6th the layout will look superb. Thanks go to Travis Jeffery for donation of track, and also to Len Millar for a donation of \$100 dollars which was put to point motors and points. The Tramway Museum itself put up \$200 towards the project and we thank the Museum. There are too many people to mention who have put a lot of time and effort into making the layout, giving us donations of wood, carpet (grass) etc and to them we thank you.
