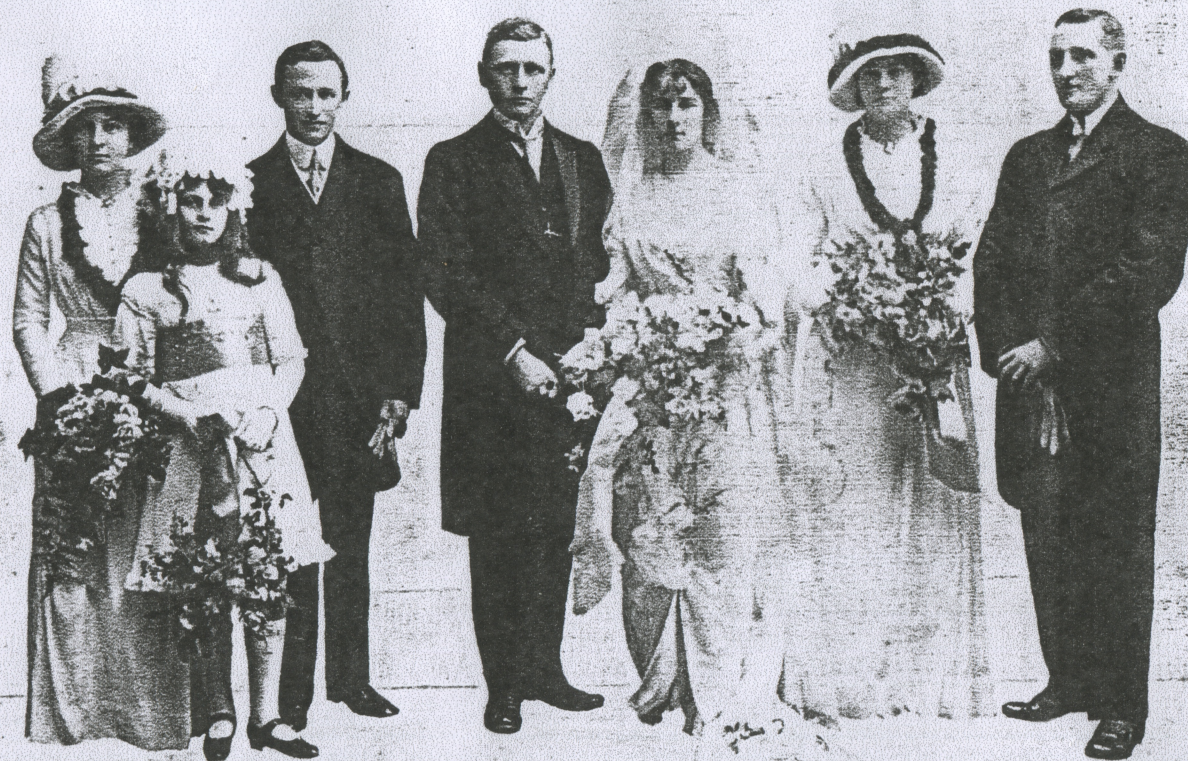

WELL-KNOWN BALLARAT DOCTOR TO RETIRE

A. O. H. Salter, one of the best-known members of the medical profession in Ballarat, has been in practice for 51 years, and will retire on Monday.

Dr Salter has sold his practice to Dr. W. Hill, medical superintendent of the Ballarat Base Hospital, but will remain in his present Sturt street residence.

Dr Salter graduated from Melbourne University in 1909, and his medical career began at his assistant's residence, Sleeman street.

He then moved to the 1910s, where he was over the door for J. T. Ry and

Dr Salter's present home, which was built and occupied by Dr. Charles Dennis.

Dr Salter has moved further back than his 40 years of medical association with the city, for he was educated at Ballarat College and knew Ballarat and district well when his father, the late Dr. G. H. Salter, was in practice at Leamington.

His father also practised at

Gisborne, where Dr A. O. H. Salter was born, and at Ballarat for many years.

A long association with the Ballarat Base Hospital began for Dr Salter in 1917 when he was appointed honorary physician. At the termination of 10 years in this position, he was appointed an honorary consultant physician in 1927.

In 1931 Dr Salter was elected to the committee of management of the hospital. He is still a member, and has been president of the hospital.

He was honorary secretary of the Ballarat sub-branch of the British Medical Association for 19 years, and during the 1914-18 war was a member of a medical board which examined men called up for military service.

Dr Salter's colleagues on the board, now all dead, were Drs Affleck Scott, Champion and A. H. Campbell.

A keen golfer, Dr Salter was a member of the Ballarat Golf Club for many years and was its president for a term.

Hospital committee member resigns

Dr A. C. H. Salter, veteran member of the committee of management of the Ballarat Base Hospital, resigned from the committee at its meeting last night.

The president, Mr. R. P. Strickland, said Dr Salter's resignation was accepted with a great deal of regret and he would be greatly missed.

Mr Strickland said Dr Salter had been associated with the hospital for nearly 50 years. He joined the honorary professional staff in 1917 and served on the committee of the hospital for 35 years. He was president in 1933-40.

He added that Dr Salter had made an able contribution to the hospital both professionally and as a committeeman, and was always a great supporter of hospital functions.

Mr Strickland moved that a

life governorship be conferred on Dr Salter in recognition of his fine service. Mr R. Humphreys, the treasurer, seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

Dr Salter said he was proud of his long association with the hospital. If he had been of any service to the institution, he had received a wonderful return for it. He had gained valuable experience at the Base Hospital and Eldon House, and had made many friends.

His esteem for the hospital was shared by members of his family, and his daughter and two grand-daughters trained in general nursing there.

Dr Salter thanked his colleagues and wished the hospital continued progress in the future.

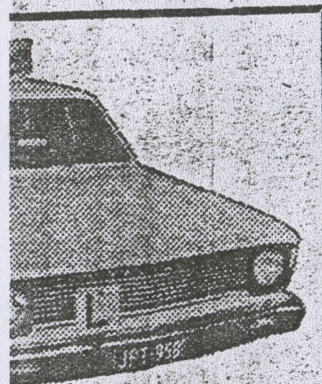

Death of Well-Known Ballarat doctor

Dr A. C. H. Salter, one of the best-known members of the medical profession in Ballarat, died suddenly yesterday.

Dr. Salter was in practice for 51 years. He retired early in 1961 after practising in Ballarat for 46 years, but continued to live in his Sturt street home.

He was associated with the Ballarat Base Hospital for more than 50 years, and joined the honorary professional staff in 1917.

Dr. Salter served on the committee of management of the hospital for 35 years and was president in 1939-40.

On his retirement from the committee last June, he was appointed a life governor of the hospital in recognition of his able contribution professionally and as a committeeman.

Graduating from Melbourne

University in 1909, Dr. Salter's medical career began at Portland where he was assistant to the late Dr. J. H. Sleeman for three years.

HERE IN 1911

He then practised at Balmoral for two years and in 1915 came to Ballarat to take over the practice of the late Dr. J. T. Mitchell.

Dr. Salter's links with Ballarat went much further back than the term of his medical association with the city.

He was educated at Ballarat College, and knew Ballarat and district well when his father, the late Dr. G. H. Salter, practised at Learmonth.

He was born at Gisborne, where his father was in practice, and also lived at Ballarat.

For 10 years, Dr. Salter was honorary secretary of the Ballarat sub-branch of the British Medical Association, and during the 1914-18 war was a member of a medical board which examined men called up for military service.

At the termination of his 10 years as honorary physician at the Base Hospital, Dr. Salter was appointed an honorary consultant physician.

Keen golfer in earlier days, Dr. Salter was a member of the Ballarat Golf Club for many years, and was its president for a term.
