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## College Principal

Taking a few moments to look back on another year in the life of our school has allowed me to reflect on what is really important about schools, and the learning that takes place in them.

For some people the answer to that question is simple; student results. The grades of the students are enough for them to judge the students and the school they attend. But those of us who are fortunate enough to work with these young people and the team of adults who create, manage and support their learning know that there is far more to a school than an academic score taken from a test. Our school, like every other one, does pay a great deal of attention to exams and the resulting grades. But whether these are the best measure of the success of our place is questionable, mainly because almost every day here presents us with another example of the rich learning that takes place in ways that are not measurable by simple tests. Let me give a few examples.

Throughout 2012 we have been fortunate to witness and participate in some really rewarding events and interactions which could never be measured in a test. I think back to our brilliant production of "The Three Penny Opera" from earlier in the year. I think of the stunning performances of our bands, ensembles and debating teams, who with the help of our very enthusiastic coaches and teachers met great success. I also look at the performance of our sports teams, and in particular the girls' senior netball team who have remained undefeated in their six years at WHS.

These are all fairly high profile, but on another level there has also been great growth. The fund raising and activities of our student leadership teams have resulted in thousands of dollars being donated to worthwhile charities chosen by the students, and some very important awareness days taking place led by students. Our extra-curricular activities have also really taken off, with students involved in a huge range of activities and clubs each day. Our programs have also continued to develop and have been through an accreditation process. We have been able to offer students a wider selection of VET subjects at our local cluster schools. VCAL has continued to prosper, and good physical examples of the work of the students can be found in the development of the recording studio and the building and maintenance of a herb garden for the food room, where students planted and cared for a number of plants. VCAL students also ran an Amazing Race around Williamstown. In each of these examples it has been the growth and interactions of the people that have been the main learning, the responsibility shared, the initiative shown, and the risks taken and rewarded or learned from. And whilst at the end of the year we will look at the test results and reflect on what they mean, they are only a tiny part of a very big picture. Schools should be so much more, and I am happy to say that ours is.

Can I finish by again thanking the families who support us so well every year? Your help when we do run into problems, and the support you give us generally, is truly appreciated. I hope there is a memory for every student and family in this magazine. There certainly are many from 2012 for me.

# Schapl Cauncil

This is the fourth time I have had the privilege of contributing

to High Tide on behalf of the School Council. Every year I am amazed at the breadth of the school's activities and the wealth of opportunities here for our students.

Our school is a big business led by many talented and hard-working people. I see great commitment from our principals and staff, great talent from the students and great support from groups such as the Parents and Friends and the WHS Ex-Students and Staff associations.

This year has been a difficult one for the education sector. Financial constraints have resulted in reduced services from the education department and brought about a disruptive dispute with the teacher unions. In addition, some independent schools in the West have been forced to close their doors.

Despite this, Williamstown High School continues to set ambitious goals for itself and its students. School Council's purpose is to set a vision for the school and to write policies that ensure we get there.

This year we come to the end of our current strategic plan and next year will begin setting new goals. We note with pride that the school will have achieved all the goals of the 2010-2013 strategic plan, including quantifiable improvement in our VCE results, significant improvement in student engagement through reduced absentee rates, and noticeable improvement in student pathways and transitions. Further, our school curriculum has been critically reviewed and all subjects will be accredited by early 2013.

This work has been done by dedicated staff, supported by Council through its Education Policy sub-committee, and they deserve our thanks.

On top of this, Council has been working hard during the year to plan for the school's Centenary and, in particular, to start fund-raising for the WHS Centenary Theatre. To help us in this endeavor, Council employed education and marketing consultants to provide advice and expertise.


We have taken their advice and in late August launched the campaign to raise \$2 million, a sum that will comfortably enable us to build a theatre suitable for our needs.

It is not uncommon for a government school to raise significant funds to improve infrastructure and others have built facilities such as theatres. However, it has not been commonplace at Williamstown High School. Despite this, Council remains confident that the community, including past students of the school, will see the addition of a theatre in the school as a great asset and willingly contribute.


Already, many staff, parents and past students and staff have given much time to help with the fund raising but this project will last several years and others will be required to help. Many in our community might find their skills ideal for this project.

#### The 2012 Senior School Council (SSC)

2012 was the second year I had the privilege of coordinating student leadership at Williamstown High School's Pasco Campus. The 2012 SSC was comprised of an extraordinary group of students who regularly inspired and impressed not only their peers but also their teachers and principals. From Year Seven onwards, there are always a group of special students who distinguish themselves with their capacity to lead, to organise, to speak their minds and to contribute towards a better world and educational environment. 

# Environmental Leadership Team

This semester, our Environmental Team have been busy with Kids Teaching Kids week, setting up vegetable gardens and working at the Jawbone.

During Kids Teaching Kids week, our Environmental Leaders and SRC Leaders taught their Year 7 peers about the Jawbone Marine Sanctuary and what they could do to protect it and their Year 8 peers about Recycling, offering practical ideas for recycling at school and at home.

During Term 4 the Environmental Team are undertaking two new projects. They are working closely with Melbourne Water at the Jawbone. Students are learning about the North Pacific Sea Star and how they can help to remove them from the bay. They are also testing water, monitoring fish and supplying the data they collect to the Jawbone Marine Sanctuary. Students are also working hard to develop two new raised vegetable gardens. They are growing corn, tomatoes, baby spinach, mixed lettuce and carrots.

Next year our Environmental Leadership team will grow. We will be electing an Environmental Captain at Year 9 and a Vice Captain at Year 8 or 9. ### VCAL@WHS

The Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) program at Williamstown High School has seen the delivery of both Year 11 Intermediate and Year 12 Senior certificates in 2012. The program is an equivalent to VCE that centres on providing an educational and training program for students wishing to enter into apprenticeships, employment or further study.

Students attend WHS three days per week and undertake a TAFE course one day per week. TAFE courses selected by students in 2012 varied from Automotive at Kangan, Carpentry, Plumbing, Engineering and Childcare at Victoria University, Fitness at Smart Connections to Fashion at Point Cook Secondary College. WHS students were well received by the training organisations and they completed all the required outcomes.

The other day that is not spent at school is taken up with work-placement. It's a daunting task approaching a business and convincing them to take on a student for an extended period of time. It's a credit to both Intermediate and Senior students that they were successful in completing their required number of hours. WHS enlisted the assistance of Youth Now again in 2012 in facilitating a number of placements for our students and they did a remarkable job, so we look forward to a continuing relationship with them.

Year 12 Senior students had a visit from Constable Scott Sutton, the Youth Research Officer from Victoria Police. He spoke to the group about rights and responsibilities in the Victorian legal system and how young people must be, not only aware of their rights, but also respectful of the right of others.

Year 11 Intermediate students joined with VCE students in participating in the Fit2Drive program, where they learned valuable skills and focussed on personal safety, responsibility and strategies to make them safer drivers and passengers.

They also participated in a team project at Yarraville West Primary School's Athletics Carnival. Students were required to run the activities for the P-2 students, where they ran games such as hurdles, long jump and parachute games, in order to give the children some understanding of how to get involved in athletics, once they reach Grade 3. WHS would like to thank YWPS for allowing us to participate and especially to Re Casey for organising such a great project for our Year 11 Intermediate students.

Another community project they worked on was with the Williamstown Childcare Centre to redevelop the vegetable garden and paint a prehistoric jungle theme mural in the big play area at the crèche. They conducted a site assessment, where they measured the work space and discussed design ideas with the manager and chairperson, before costing and completing the work. The project simulated a tradesperson/client relationship, with the crèche as the client and VCAL students as the tradespeople. The client was happy with the results and the students had a great learning experience.

Both Senior and Intermediate students were involved in other projects to assist them with real-world learning. With the help of Literacy teacher Rowan Cairns, the students worked tirelessly to clear weeds and debris from the school's chicken and duck enclosure; the residents were clucking happily in their new and improved environment. Rowan is also planning the building and maintenance of a herb garden for the food room, where students will be planting and caring for a number of plants. And with assistance from Steve Jones, students ran an Amazing Race around Williamstown, where they planned a problem solving activity to be completed by the rest of the group. Despite the torrential rain on the day, both teachers and students had a great time. The results of these projects have been really rewarding and the students have had positive learning experiences.

At the conclusion of classes Intermediate students completed the Polish program delivered by the Beacon Foundation, which prepares young people for the workplace. They learnt deportment, grooming, interview tactics and employers' expectations. They also attended a lunch with local business leaders and had the opportunity to utilise the skills they'd learned in the program.

A number of guest speakers and programs were delivered into the Senior VCAL classrooms throughout the year. These included speakers from the Department of Justice and Consumer Affairs, an industry specialist from the









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Mictorian Employer's Chamber of Commerce and Industry and a consultant from MEGT Group Training. Senior students gained valuable knowledge from these speakers that they could utilise in the fast approaching world of work.

Senior students also undertook Level II First Aid Training Course. It was a rigorous test of their ability to respond to emergency situations and will be a great asset for future employment prospects. All participating students successfully completed the course.

at TAFE and University, continuing the journey of gaining extra qualifications. For others still, it's a complete change of career choice altogether, perhaps even beginning again in a different workplace or TAFE. Congratulations to all students and completed their VCAL certificates and best wishes to those who are leaving WHS to pursue apprenticeships, employment or further education.


















## HAPE @ Bayview




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
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

#### **OUTDOOR EDUCATION**

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
Our Outdoor Education Program has incorporated a number of adventure activities including ski camps at Mt Buller and Bogong Outdoor Education Centre.



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


#### MOUNT BULLER 21 TO 24 AUGUST

Everyone then had to complete a research project on an area of marinecraft, safety or related careers or organisations and present their work to the class. Some of the Power Point presentations were particularly impressive.

#### Term 4

Sailing lessons resumed at Royals and we learned to roll tack and improved our racing techniques. We investigated the history of the Williamstown maritime precinct and the future plans for the Seaworks site. We visited Seaworks, the old morgue and toured the Sea Shepherd ship 'Steve Irwin' prior to its next anti-whaling campaign to Antarctica.

We also did a Fire Safety and Extinguisher Training session with a Community Education Officer from the Metropolitan Fire Brigade. We practised putting out fires with powder, water and foam extinguishers. We also learned how to use a fire blanket and set off flares. That was pretty exciting and hopefully the neighbours weren't too panicked!

Some students have completed their Duke of Ed. Bronze Award. Well done Sean Fell, Adam Wilkinson and Stacey Cockram - hopefully others will complete theirs in the near future.






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

























# Food Styling & Make a Meal














which they will take with them through the remainder of their

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




















## YEAR 9

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## YEAR 10



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




# YEAR 12




