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Our purpose at Williamstown High School is to provide a dynamic learning culture that promotes integrity, innovation and the individual. 2013 has been an exciting year for Williamstown High School. We have worked hard to ensure students have many different learning opportunities and the chance to experience different and suitable challenges.

We are looking forward to our centenary celebration in 2014-2015. The celebrations will begin in October 2014. To mark this great occasion we have been working hard to alert the community to our project to build a Centenary Theatre. When I began at Williamstown in 2009 I had very high aims and expectations for the school and for myself as Principal. We have, according to the responses to the Parent survey, vastly improved the communications with parents and guardians and have encouraged far more parent input. Thank you to the parents who completed the surveys. The information has greatly helped in setting our new priorities. The use of SMS messaging, Facebook links, the website and emailing has really helped us connect with families regularly and quickly.

We have moved towards 21st century learning with laptops, the use of programs like Edmodo and many other digital resources. The planned introduction of iPads for year 10 in 2014 is another exciting improvement.

In 2012, we had the best VCE results ever. Our improvements, however, involve far more than academic results. The successful introduction of VCAL in 2009 has also enabled us to offer an applied learning pathway to our senior students. Our extracurricular activities continue to grow including marine club, environmental club, debating, accelerated sport, instrumental music, World Challenge trips, vocal group and even the homework club is extremely popular ... and this list goes on. Parents commented on the success of this strongly in the survey. Our clubs and sporting activities allow students to fully develop and have a range of experiences.

There are, of course, areas for improvement. Our new Strategic Plan will address these areas with a clear process

and priorities.

This High Tide magazine shows the diversity of what happens in a day at Williamstown High School. It is like you are taking a stroll around the school on any day of the week.

I am lucky - I get to do this regularly- it still excites me. I love to see students enjoying their learning. I love to view visitors' faces as they experience firsthand how great the learning is at Williamstown High. It makes me appreciate how lucky we are.

I would like to thank the teachers and educational support staff for all the additional things they do. So much of the greatness comes from their donation of time. For example, the four overseas trips this year to France, Indonesia, USA and Singapore entailed an enormous amount of work for the organising teachers. The teachers were lucky to experience an overseas trip but they also gave up holiday and family time to do so. Many parents have written to me to thank the teachers for organising these exciting, educational and fun trips for their children.

We have had amazing concerts including the Warchild Charity event run by the VET music students, a thought provoking production in our new converted drill hall, Spring Soiree and Spring Concert. I've lost count of how many sporting events and camps and excursions that have taken place. You will see references to and photographs of these activities in this *High Tide* magazine.

Former Headmaster, PH Powell, restated a quotation from a speaker in his 1962 *High Tide* article. I believe the sentiment is still the same at Williamstown High:

'Take what you want and pay for it' If your standards are low you will pay one day. If your standards are high you are 'Holding fast' to those things that matter most in life.

Things that matter take effort. We will continue to strive and 'Holdfast' to the things that matter at Williamstown High School.

BAYVIEW CAMPUS PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I have been delighted with the breadth of opportunities for growth and for learning offered to our students at Bayview Campus this year.

Many of those opportunities are to be found in the day-today classroom learning program - in the things that are offered and the way they are taught. For some students, Williamstown High School is the first time they experience laboratory science or ancient history or a new language. It is a time when they are introduced to a range of technologies, a variety of arts and numerous new sports. Our challenge units this year provided opportunities in boat building, movie making, advanced food technology, cartooning, fitness development, marine biology, outdoor education, and many more diverse and challenging areas. Equally exciting to me is the variety of ways I see students undertaking their learning, sometimes in the same classroom at the same time, but doing things differently depending on what is the appropriate way for them at the time. The recognition of the need for diversity in the level at which students are learning and in the way this learning happens is greatly pleasing.

Just as exciting are the great range of opportunities for growth available beyond the classroom. In the arts, for example, there have been opportunities in drama, in music and in the visual arts. The 2013 school production ran in May, and we had fifty Year 9 students take part. Drama showcases have also been run at Bayview Campus, and the opportunities that this offered for our actors and for those interested in back stage roles (lighting, sound, makeup, costuming) have been great. Our musicians have performed on the big stage at the Warchild Benefit, the Spring Soiree, and the Spring Concert (at the Town Hall) and at numerous more intimate musical evenings. A group of our students participated in the Young Researchers program at the National Gallery of Victoria. The program this year was called Monet's Garden and the students were inspired by the exhibition masterpieces from the Musee Marmottan. We have had students winning prizes in the Botanical Gardens competition for painting, and the Hobsons Bay Council Pixel 8 Competition for photography. Some of our 2012 Year 9 students have their hard edge abstract works flying as flags at the Altona Meadows Skate Park as part of the Airtime exhibition earlier in the year.

Our students continue to have a range of opportunities in sport. Our annual swimming and athletics carnivals were a great success, with a wonderful spirit and atmosphere and with some of our students going on to compete at state and national level. Our students participated in interschool sports in many traditional sports (softball, hockey, baseball, table tennis, lacrosse, rugby, cross country, badminton, cricket, soccer, volleyball, AFL, tennis, golf, etc.). We have also expanded the program this year to include school aerobics (in which our team placed second in the national championships held in Brisbane) and competitive sailing. Our accelerated sport program continues to grow. The cricket program initiated last year has blossomed, and we have added triathlon this year with a significant amount of interest. Our basketballers have represented the school at an international tournament in Singapore, and there's a camp at the AIS in Canberra for our accelerated netball

program for the second year in a row.

Our leadership program continues to grow. I would like to acknowledge the enormous impact of our student leaders this year – our school captains, SRC members and the SRC executive team, house captains, ambassadors, girls unit leaders, social justice group (and social justice captains), sports captains, the environmental initiatives group (and environmental captains), debating captains, library leaders, drama representatives and others in both official and unofficial roles. These young people have made a difference to the school and, in many cases, beyond.

There has been debating (a competition for Year 8 and 9 early in the year and a beginners course for Year 7s in Term 4), maths games days, a medieval history day, numerous fundraisers and special events, chess competitions, lunchtime sports competitions, a linguistics club, a marine science club, year level camps at years 7, 8 and 9, sailing cadets, snow camp, leadership camp, and the list goes on. Education at Williamstown High School is more than just what happens in the classroom – as important and central as that is!

I would like to thank all those teachers who worked above and beyond to make the classroom an engaging and effective place for student learning and who volunteered their time this year to offer many of the opportunities outlined above. The students' response to these opportunities makes it clear that these offerings are important and appreciated.

Adolescence is an important time in a young person's development. It is a time when young people develop many of their values and beliefs, when they begin to decide what is important to them and where their skills lie, and when they develop some of the interests and passions that enrich their youth and will be with them through their adult life. It is important that they have a range of opportunities to try things out and search for the things that will bring them joy and meaning. I am pleased that Williamstown High School has been able to offer those opportunities in 2013, and I hope you enjoy reading about some of them in this year's edition of *High Tide*.





T's been a busy year for the Bayview Library. There have been lots of activities and displays that keep the library buzzing.

Melbourne Writer's Festival



Improving Literacy across the college

The 2013 NAPLAN results again maintained the improvement seen over the last few years thanks to the whole school approach where vocabulary is covered in all classes, students get opportunities to read and practise comprehension strategies and writing is scaffolded. These improved results at the junior level are one factor flowing into the continued upwards trend in VCE results, both generally and in English. As well as the work of our dedicated teachers, we have been lucky to have the work of a Literacy Aide, Margaret O'Donnell, who supports our reading program.

You would probably be less aware of the changes behind the scenes. In 2012 Willi High developed and endorsed a literacy policy. In 2013 teachers have been looking at student reading data to better know the students in their classes. We have designed learning plans for the students at the top and bottom ends of the huge range of abilities in our classrooms. In 2014 we will be rolling out all of these plans from the beginning of the year. This, together with our continued whole school focus on literacy will help us to continue to shift the whole range of results upwards.


ENGLISH @ PASCO







Marg set out a structured programed that built on the previous year's training. This program aimed to cover all essential game play mechanisms that the teams would use during their competitions, their fitness levels and continue the skill development of all.

In competitions the Williamstown High School teams were too strong for the schools in our local division with all teams winning through to the Western Metropolitan finals. The Year 7's and 8's teams faired best in the Western Metropolitan finals with the Year 8's falling just short in the final and were unlucky not to progress to the state finals losing by just 3 goals. The Year 7 team were missing players due to the rescheduled Year 7 camp, but that didn't dampen the spirit and effort of the girls competing and just missed out on the final by two goals to the eventual champions. The Year 9 and 10 team played hard all day but failed to qualify for the final losing two pool games.

The competitions didn't stop there as all junior teams competed in a friendly competition against a visiting Northern Territory squad. This opportunity gave the girls a chance to put in place the skills and strategies they had been practising. Even though the Northern Territory squad were both older and taller all the Williamstown High teams managed some strong victories.

During late November 20 netballers will head to the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra to compete in a competition with some schools in the Canberra area. Whilst there, the students will stay in the athletes dormitories, eat in the athlete cafeteria, utilise the training facilities, complete fitness activities and use the recovery equipment available at the AIS.

Basketball...

The introduction of our Year 10 students who have combined with our Year 9 students has been a very successful initiative. This has been so successful that word has spread to some of our Year 11 students and they have joined the program. This is a great result as they are prepared to give up their own time as they have seen the benefits of the training.

On Tuesday February 26 our Year 7 and year 8 students competed in the Hobson's Bay Community Cup tournament. This day was put together to promote organ donation. Unlike most tournaments this

one was a mixed competition involving all sectors of the Hobson's Bay community, from school children, young disadvantaged teens to a police representative team and members of a youth league team.

Both teams were extremely competitive on the day only dropping one game each in their pool to the eventual finalists. The skills shown by our students when playing older, more mature



bodies was fantastic. The Year 8 team missed out on the final by 4 points losing a tight match to the police representative team. The Year 7 team battled hard often beating much older and stronger players. Unfortunately coming up some taller and more skilful players undid them against the youth league team. Congratulations to all who competed on the day. Darren Hindle was impressed with the way the groups put into play the structures that had been worked on during the first term.

All teams were entered into the Victorian College Championships (VCC). The Intermediate teams finished third in their qualification rounds. Both teams were depleted on the qualifying days and finished the day strong but unfortunately missed out on qualifying for the state finals. The junior teams both won through to the state finals after both winning the qualifying rounds held at MSAC and Werribee respectfully. The girls team won 3 of 4 games in the round robin finals and made it through to the semi-finals. Facing Rowville the girls held their own in the first half going in up by 3 points at half time. Unfortunately the girls couldn't hold on and tired in the second half losing to the eventual champions by 5 points. After this the girls had one more game in this gruelling day a 3rd place playoff against Maribyrnong. In an up and down game the girls fell behind late in the second half and then fought back to fall short by 3 points and finish in fourth spot. The boys teams didn't fare as well winning only 2 out of 4 games and finishing in 7th

In the School Sport Victoria competition Williamstown High won through in all year levels in the Hobsons Bay Division. The most comprehensive wins going to the Intermediate girls who by an average of 53 points.

At the time of writing this article we hadn't yet had our first International trip to Singapore. 24 students from Years 8, 9, 10 and 11 will be participating in an International tournament at the Australian International School in Singapore. This will be a weeklong event and the students will not only participate in the tournament, they will also experience the culture and the school as well. We are very excited about this opportunity and it is great that we have 24 students participating in this fantastic opportunity.

We look forward to 2014 and the continued success of our students in the accelerated sport program.





Students attend WHS three days per week and undertake a VET/TAFE course one day per week. VET/TAFE courses selected by students in 2013 ranged from Automotive, Carpentry, Plumbing, Electrical, Engineering, Childcare, Fitness, Fashion and Hospitality. WHS students were well received by the training organisations and they completed all the required outcomes.



The other day that is not spent at school is taken up with work-placement. It's a daunting task approaching a business and convincing them to take on a student for an extended period of time. It's a credit to both Intermediate and Senior students that they were successful in completing their required number of hours. WHS enlisted the assistance of parents and businesses from the local community with finding placements for our students and they did a remarkable job, so we look forward to a continuing relationship with them.



Year 12 Senior students had a visit from Constable Scott Sutton, the Youth Research Officer from Victoria Police. He spoke to the group about rights and responsibilities in the Victorian legal system and how young people must be, not only aware of their rights, but also respectful of the right of others.



Year 11 Intermediate students joined with VCE students in participating in the Fit2Drive program, where they learned valuable skills and focussed on personal safety, responsibility and strategies to make them safer drivers and passengers.

They also participated in a team project at Yarraville West Primary School's





Athletics Carnival. Students were required to run the activities for the P–2 students, where they ran games such as hurdles, long jump and parachute games, in order to give the children some understanding of how to get involved in athletics, once they reach Grade 3. WHS would like to thank YWPS for allowing us to participate and especially to Re Casey for organising such a great project for our Year 11 Intermediate students.

Both Year 11 and 12 VCAL classes combined to participate in the CARE program. This focused on violence prevention and the promotion of respectful and healthy relationships.

Another project they worked on was the annual Occupational Health & Safety audit around the school. Students assessed the OH&S issues and presented them at a staff morning tea (which the students provided). Their report was then tabled with the Principal to action.

Year 11 students also focussed on social issues, preparing a presentation on issues within society, such as hooning, drugs and alcohol and cyber bullying. They were required to research the statistics and developed their interviewing skills by talking to three stakeholders affected by the issue. They conducted interviews with lawyers, police and victims to get a sense of the real affect of the issue.

In conjunction with a youth worker from Hobson's Bay Youth Services, they also collaborated to design and produce the cover and inner sleeves for the Hobson's Bay Cool Schools CD. This CD is produced every year and features recordings of bands from schools within Hobson's Bay.

At the conclusion of classes Year 11 students completed a workshop program delivered by the Reach Foundation. The program aims to: enhance

students' social and emotional skills; improve peer connection, empathy and relationship building Improve self awareness and efficacy; create a safe and respectful space to enable students to express themselves openly; strengthen resilience in the





context of universal challenges and offer students practical tools to encourage informed decision-making.

A number of guest speakers and programs were delivered into the Work Skills VCAL classrooms throughout the year. These included an industry specialist from the Housing Industry Association and a consultant from Australian Apprenticeships Group Training. Students gained valuable knowledge from these speakers that they could utilise in the fast approaching world of work.

Year 12 Senior VCAL students were thrilled to participate in the Wheeltalk School Awareness program, where they were challenged to spend some time in a wheel chair. The program is sponsored by Disability Sport & Recreation and encourages young people to get out and have a go, no matter what may be holding them back. The students found the going pretty tough on the arms but managed to put in a long and competitive session of wheel chair basketball, with coach Sam from Wheeltalk.

Senior students also undertook Level II First Aid Training Course. It was a rigorous test of their ability to respond to emergency situations and will be a great asset for future employment prospects. All participating students successfully completed the course.

In the Personal Development strand of the course, Year 12 students are required to focus on their place in the community and to plan, organise and complete a range of projects. This year the students refurbished the Memorial garden within the school, raised money for the Red Cross Blood service, baked and sold cupcakes to raise money and awareness of the work of the RSPCA. In addition, they organised the collection of used mobile phones in partnership with the Melbourne Zoo as part of a wider programme to bring attention to how the manufacture of mobile phone devices can impact gorilla habitat in Africa.

A number of students have confirmed apprenticeships; others are off to further study at TAFE and University, continuing the journey of gaining extra qualifications. For others still, it's a complete change of career choice altogether, perhaps even beginning again in a different workplace or TAFE. Congratulations to all students who completed

their VCAL certificates and best wishes to those who are leaving WHS to pursue apprenticeships, employment or further education.

The 2013 VCAL teaching team consisted of myself (Work Skills - Senior), Melissa English (Work Skills -Intermediate), **Rowan Cairns** (Literacy - Senior and Intermediate), Brett Russell (Numeracy -Senior), Jarryd Mills (Numeracy -Intermediate), Tony Fear (Personal Development -Senior) and Steve Jones (Personal Development -Intermediate). Some were old hands and others were new to the VCAL program. Teaching VCAL is a challenging but ultimately very rewarding experience and on behalf of the students and myself, I would like to thank all the teachers for a wonderful year's work.

Bringing the classroom outside and the outside into the classroom


Psychology

In 2013, VCE Chemistry students went to Victoria University to analyse the calcium content in milk and ethanol content in wine.














VCE Biology

In VCE Biology, students take part in a range of practical activities.

In Year 11 Biology, students visited the Jawbone Marine Sanctuary to assess the environment by measuring water pH, turbidity and salinity. Students also carried out biological surveys on the native marine organisms. Furthermore, trip to Werribee Zoo allowed students to explore the ecological relationships between organisms that typically live in the Savanna.

Our Year 12 Biology students visited Ecolink to use the molecular tools of genetic engineers. They tested a variety of food by extracting DNA and amplifying mown GMO sequences. The DNA sequences were run on an electrophoresis gel to determine if the food products were genetically modified.

















TECHNOLOGY & DESIGN

Horticulture has continued to expand the work they have been doing around the school, with an extensive veggie garden, a chook pen and extensive landscape design work of the Year 9 students. Over the last three years Horticulture have been nominated in the State School Garden Awards of the year winning in total \$1500, which has helped to assist the program. The students are involved in planting, germinating and designing hydroponics systems as part of the Horticulture course. Thanks to Doug Leckie and Tony Lopreiato for their guidance and stimulating work.

Textiles & Challenge Unit Iron Chief

This year the Year 7 and 8 Textiles students explored a range of colouration and decorative techniques including: sequinning, beading, fabric paints and dyes, applique, and stencilling. They worked from a brief to design and produce expertly crafted bags, pin cushions and fabric

storage solutions.



Twenty-Five of our Year 9 Textiles students participated in a Kick-start workshop offered at the Whitehouse Institute of Design. The day was coordinated and run by Todd Heggie, a costume designer for many years in England. The aim of the day was to introduce students to design concepts and develop skills and techniques to further enhance studies in Design. During the morning session, students worked from a brief and used magazine imagery to generate new ideas. After lunch

students selected teams to design and then produce a garment using pattern making paper, tape, pins and a mannequin. On completing the workshop two highly commended certificates were issued to: Emily Gill and Amina Soubjaki and a \$600.00 scholarship was awarded to Natalia Scally. A fantastic achievement!

Thanks to Margaret Ross, Kerri Wangeman, Sonia Aldons and Michelle Jepsen for their dedicated work with all their classes in Technology this year.

Iron Chef

Year 9 students designed and produced products using a range of ingredients and processes with particular emphasis on the creative use of ingredients and food styling and presentation. Students were presented with weekly challenges, which may have included: a mystery box of ingredients, rotation challenges, invention challenges and pressure tests. They also participate in a special cook cooking class with our guest chef Doug Leckie.

Years 7, 8 & 9 Woodwork

Room 14 has, for another year, been alive with the sound of hammering, sawing and sanding. The set models haven't changed much from previous years. But what our students do with the basic design constraints i.e. how they adapt, modify and elaborate the set model to address individual design needs has once again been

astoundingly good.

The Year 7/8 students were asked to construct a simple box according to strict design constraints. They were then asked to modify their box by cutting it up into at least two pieces and rearranging these pieces any way they liked. You'd think that after six years of doing this that we would have just about seen it all. Not so. Just like Kane Bokhove



astounded everyone last year with his South Park's "Kenny" interpretation, Mr Metherall and Mr Bersée have continued to be surprised by the creativity of our students. From the simple elegance of Mohammed Saoud's and Ariel Woolston's pencil boxes to Luisa Salvado's colourful cubist arrangement, the work







has continued to excite.

Similarly, the Year 9s have once again risen to the occasion by producing not only excellent dovetail joinery but also modifying their proscribed task to meet individual needs. The production work of Lachlan Rycroft, Jade Mustard-Ackary and Danica Naidoo to name but a few was of an excellent standard, as was the graphic work of James Black.

Skateboards Challenge Unit

As any skateboard enthusiast will tell you, skateboards ain't skateboards. As our students discovered, in making one, all kinds of decisions need to be made such as, which materials to use, what kind of adhesive, how many veneers to laminate, what kind of curves or "kicks" to press into the laminates and what kind of shape to cut the pressed "block" into. All have an impact on how the deck will perform and what kind of riding it is best suited to. In other words, skateboards, much like musical instruments, have a personality of their own.





















It has been a great year for art this year at Bayview.

We are also participating in the 'Achieve Thru Art' program run through Art Education Victoria. The theme for 2013 is 'Explore Incredible India'.

































ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP
































SCHOOL SPORT




















LEADERSHIP TOURS



Congratulations also to Bert Henkel of 7MC who won through to the state finals in the mountain bike championships.


All of our team sports performed very well with the majority winning through to the Western Metropolitan final.
























YEAR 12
