


















# Bayview Business

In term three a group of six students from Williamstown High School:

Lexi Di Pietro and Aretha StewartBrown attended the School for
Student Leadership (SSL) at the
Snowy River Campus.

Placements at this exclusive school are only offered to two percent of the Year 9 students from state schools across Victoria. The application process required the six of us to submit an extensive form and to partake in an intensive interview.

At the Snowy River Campus, there were students from eight other schools from all around the state metro and regional. This was interesting as most of us learnt about the differences and similarities about twing in different parts of Victoria, where there are different issues affecting each community. The city students experienced a very large thange in scenery, as we would wake up to cows and kangaroos each day.

The camp introduced us to new leadership and life skills that we would practise throughout the duration of the camp, and continue after. We all did classes such as thinking and learning', 'beliefs and values', 'emotional intelligence', psychology' and 'global issues'. These classes introduced us to new skills that we can now incorporate and day-to-day life in many

situations. They also extended our knowledge of the world at large, informing us of issues such as poverty, politics, environmental impacts and natural disasters.

Throughout the camp we participated in two expeditions and an array of other outdoor activities that tested our skill in leadership, persistence, courage and teamwork. These activities included bridge building, raft building, an amazing race, surfing, canoeing and camping.

One of the highlights of the group activities was raft building. This required us to build a (floatable) raft with logs, barrels and ropes. This activity was toward the end of the trip, which highlighted our improvement in leadership and particularly teamwork throughout the term. This was a nice and rewarding experience because it showed how much we had grown together.

A significant aspect of our learning was our "passport." This was a portfolio of our learning throughout the term. This focused on a few aspects such as building social relationships, community engagement, teamwork, managing personal learning, individual learning styles, listening, viewing, and responding and presenting. As students at the SSL, we were required to set goals for each of the categories and work on making improvements in these areas which are the key attributes of a leader.

In our time at the SSL we were also offered an amazing opportunity to work with the local Aboriginal community. We were welcomed to country in a ceremony that involved us being welcomed by smoking gum leaves waved over us. We were also fortunate enough to be invited to a local meeting place where we learnt about the history of the local tribes, and skills such as how to weave a basket from reeds.

In school groups we were then required to create a Community Learning Project (CLP) that addressed a pressing issue in an local community of Williams. 

On behalf of all the Arts teaching staff I'd like to congratulate all of our students and staff for a creative and enjoyable year of the Arts.







This year was WarChild's 10th year, I'm so glad that I was apart of it. Featured bands from across both campuses performed.


The centenary concert was a great evening of music featuring past and present musicians from Willy High, spanning over 50 years.






Let us peek into the future. The class of 2014 are celebrating their 50th year reunion. The year is 2064.





#### **HUMANITIES AT BAYVIEW**

Michael Mann Humanities CAT Leader

# Humanities at Bayview sees students of all year levels undertaking studies in both history and geography.

Beginning at Year 7, students begin their high school life with looking at the skills they need to fully immerse themselves in history before delving into Ancient Egyptian history and Ancient Chinese history. Geography looks at natural resources focusing specifically on water, its uses and how we can manage our resources. Finishing the year students go on a field trip to Williamstown, Yarraville and Footscray looking at the livability of the suburbs.

Year 8 continues on with history looking at medieval history. Students research daily life throughout the medieval period focusing heavily on the social structure and how the black death affected Europe and the rest of the world. Students got a hands on experience with an excursion to Kryal Castle near Ballarat where students experienced knight fighting, jousting and torture in the medieval days. For geography students experienced the coastline of Williamstown, researching and collecting fieldwork data on how we use and manage the coastline.

Finishing the year we look at the megacities in the world, looking specifically at urban areas and how those spaces are managed for so many people.

In their last year at the Bayview Campus, students in year 9 begin the year with history. They explore migration and people's movements from the mid 1700's. Students research the causes of migration for people and what life was like when they arrived in Australia. Students continue on from that time period to Australia's Federation in 1901, looking at the reasons and benefits for Australia's people. Finishing off, students immerse themselves in the study of WWI and Australia's involvement. They analyse the after affects on the people of Australia once the war was over.

In geography, students studied natural environments and their characteristics and how that can affect the world's food security. They then move seamlessly into exploring the interconnections between countries, food and technology. Finally, to finish off the year a trip to the city looking at Melbourne's tourism and how the city manages the large number of people each year.

#### Anthony Fear Humanities CAT Leader

When I was asked to contribute something to High Tide for 2015, I started to think about some of the things I like about the study of Humanities generally. Like my colleagues in the Humanities faculty, I am passionate about my own subject area and take great delight in teaching this wonderful discipline to young people. Ask me about why I like the Humanities and I could talk about this for some considerable time. I did find this the other day that seemed to capture the essence of my thoughts without the potential embarrassment of talking too long about something close to my heart that might not be as close for others.

# Nine good reasons to study the Humanities

The humanities help us understand others through their languages, histories and cultures.

- 1. They foster social justice and equality.
- They reveal how people have tried to make moral, spiritual and intellectual sense of the world.
- 3. The humanities teach empathy.
- 4. They teach us to deal critically and logically with subjective, complex, imperfect information.
- 5. They teach us to weigh evidence skeptically and consider more than one side of every question.
- 6. Humanities students build skills in writing and critical reading.
- The humanities encourage us to think creatively. They teach us to reason about being human and to ask questions about our world.
- 8. The humanities develop informed and critical citizens.

Without a doubt Humanities subjects at Williamstown High School are very popular and are taught with skill and enthusiasm by our excellent teachers. Our students also bring to the classroom a desire to learn about and understand their world. At Pasco Street we are delighted by the fact that all of our subject offerings are chosen in large numbers. Some subjects are so popular that multiple classes are run. As teachers we like to point out to our students that not only is the study of the Humanities interesting, but there are specific academic skills that complement just about every other subject on offer.

So, what have been some of the highlights of 2015?

#### **Business Management**

The Year 11 Business Management classes held a market day in term two that was a great success. The students planned and undertook a real business enterprise. The learning objective was to put into practise sound planning and marketing strategies in order to sell goods at a profit.

A range of food stalls offered a variety of tasty options for students and staff to choose from.

All profits raised from the market day were donated to charity. The students were delighted to hand over a cheque for \$850.00 to the Lighthouse foundation, a charity that supports homeless young people. Well done to Ben Jolly and the Business Management students.

#### **Legal Studies**

The Year 11 Legal studies classes were fortunate to experience the legal system first hand by visiting the County Court. Even better was the fact that all classes were able to see interesting cases, as this is not guaranteed.

The Year 12 Legal Studies classes visited Barwon and Loddon Prisons. They were fortunate to be part of a highly sought after programme that allows students to hear prisoners speak



of their experiences of life in prison and quite frank summations of how they got to prison in the first place. Even in Year 12 there is still a place for excursions to support the highly structured nature of VCE studies. Many thanks to Ian Hume and Matthew Grossman for their organisation and leadership.

#### **Twentieth Century History**

Our Year 11 Twentieth Century History students, as part of their studies of Nazi Germany and the Holocaust, attended the Holocaust Museum in Elsternwick. Students were fortunate enough to hear an address by a holocaust survivor and had the opportunity to ask questions. Our students were respectful and attentive and the staff of the centre made it clear that they were very impressed by the high level of knowledge of the period demonstrated by our students. Feedback such as this is an excellent reflection of the work of Williamstown High School Humanities students and teachers. Many thanks to Olivera Nikolovska for her organisation and planning of the event.

#### **Global Politics**

The VCE Global politics classes were involved in an all day event that replicated the United Nations General Assembly. Students were assigned particular countries and were given the task of drafting and presenting resolutions to



be voted on by the "Assembly". In this way students experienced the "politics" and "manoeuvring" that is the reality of Global politics generally and part and parcel of the workings of the United Nations specifically.

Students experienced the highs of getting a resolution through by effective argument and persuasion and the lows of seeing hard work and passionate argument blocked by veto.

In terms of hands on learning this initiative is hard to beat. Well done to Olivera Nikolovska and the VCE Global Politics students. A very impressive display of knowledge and understanding of a complex and challenging subject area.

I would like to take the opportunity to thank every Humanities student this year. It is your curiosity and desire to understand that sets the foundation for a genuine learning environment. Many thanks to the Pasco Humanities team for your exemplary leadership and enthusiasm.

Sexual Health. The highlight for many has been the Ready or Not program. Each Unit 2 HHD student was required to care for a virtual baby for 24 hours. The students were very keen for their turn to look after the baby for 24 hours, but equally enthusiastic to hand the baby back after caring for it overnight!

#### **Physical Education**

In Year 10 Physical Education students have been looking to improve their own fitness levels by participating in Spin/Cycle and Fitness classes at a local gym as well as completing fitness activities in class. Hopefully, students will begin to understand the benefits of an active lifestyle well into the future! The VCE classes have been focussing on bodies in Motion, sports coaching and the importance of physically active lifestyles. After completing these units, we hope that students have an increased awareness of the importance of physical activity in their lives and that this knowledge will motivate them to remain physically active as they move into adulthood. Students have also been enjoying using the facilities in the weight room.

#### Netball

It was a very successful year in Netball for our Williamstown High School teams. Coach Marg Lind set out a structured programed that built on the previous year's training. #### Netball Victoria Schools Championships

The Netball Victoria Schools Championships were played for the junior competition (years 7 and 8). Entering two teams that were mixed 7's and 8's together, both teams worked well together with both teams fiercely competing. Unfortunately only one team advanced through to the final of Netball Victoria's premier competition.

On Wednesday, September 2 our Junior Girls Netball team competed in the finals of Victoria's most prestigious Netball competition, the Netball Victoria Schools Championships.



These championships are held every year with over 600 teams starting out in the Junior Girls division alone. After competing and winning through to the finals day, the Junior girls faced a tough ask to progress through to the finals, needing to finish in the top two of the pool (10 teams) to qualify for the crossover semi-finals.

Our team consisted of 6 year 8 students and 6 year 7 students, in the junior competition.

The format of the games was two halves of only 6 minutes each. it is important to get off to strong starts and to capitalise when in possession.

The girls overcame a slow start, losing 2 of their first 3 games, to finish on top of pool A by percentage only, winning seven of the nine games.

In the Semi Final against Catholic College

Bendigo, the Williamstown girls jumped out the blocks leading by 4 at halftime on the back of strong defending by Lillian Schroder, Tiarah Minns and Ella Day. This trend continued in the second half with Williamstown capitalising on the great defensive work running out victors 11-2 and progressing to the final.

In the final the Williamstown girls let early opportunities slip and missed some easy goals. Again the defenders kept Williamstown in the game trailing 6-1 at halftime. The second half Williamstown displayed a much more competitive game but the first half deficit was too much to overcome, eventually losing 11-5.

#### School Sport Victoria (SSV) Championships

It was then onto the SSV tournament. All year levels advanced through to the Western Metropolitan round after easily dispatching their opposition within the Hobsons Bay district. The Year 7 and 8 teams easily won through to the final. The year 7 team continued their dominance and got through to the State Finals, whilst the intermediate team lost gallantly by 2 goals. The Year 8 girls whilst making the finals were undermanned and fell short in the final.

The SSV state final for our year 7 girls Netball team was held on Monday August 31 at the Waverley Netball Centre. An early start to the morning saw the team gather at 7:30am to head off.

Our first game was against CC Bendigo, which started out goal for goal in the opening quarter. Williamstown got on top in the second and third quarters with great defending from Emma Gray. Lauren Wood was able to capitalise on good team work and shot some crucial goals. In the last quarter CC Bendigo fought back and drew level, but was unable to wrestle away Williamstown's lead. Williamstown pulled away again to win by 2 goals.

In the second game Williamstown High played against perennially netball powerhouse Rowville Secondary College. Williamstown jumped out of the blocks early opening up a 3 goal lead

at quarter time. Strong mid court play from Ella Day and Kelly Rocker maintained the lead in the early part of the second quarter and Captain Chelsea Henshall finished the hard work off in goals. #### Basketball

The Senior Girls had a dream run beating schools such as Maribyrnong and Rowville to fall in the final against Box Hill SC. The Intermediate Boys also fell to Box Hill SC however this was in the semi-finals. The Junior Girls fell in the quarter finals.

It was a fantastic effort by all involved particularly the Senior Girls team.

It was then onto the McDonalds Cup Basketball Competition which pits the top 32 schools in each age group against each other to see who will represent Victoria at the National Schools Championships later this year. Williamstown High entered teams in the Senior Girls, Intermediate Boys and Junior Girls sections.

Due to other school commitments the Senior Girls competed undermanned and battled hard but failed to qualify for the Elite Eight stage. Both the Intermediate Boys and Junior Girls advanced through to the Elite Eight stage with great victories on the day. The Elite Eight stage of the McDonalds Cup competition will be held later this term.

On the Elite Eight competition day the Intermediate Boys team found it hard finishing off the games losing 3 of 4 games by under 3 points and winning the fourth to place them seventh overall. The junior girls had a shaky start losing to eventual runners up St Margaret's in the first game but bounced back to beat Templestowe College, Fairhills HS, MacKillop College to make the final four stage. At this point Williamstown High came up against powerhouse Rowville SC and battled wilfully but dropped away in the final ten minutes defeated by 16 points in the end. Well done to both teams earning their way into the top eight in the state of all secondary schools.

The School Sport Victoria (SSV) competition was held and all teams qualified for the Western

Metropolitan finals after breezing through the Hobsons Bay District round. The Senior Girls set the court alight throughout the competition winning the Metropolitan final comfortably and blazing a trail to the SSV State Final against Ballarat HS. In the final the Williamstown girls held a slight lead through the majority of the game eventually winning by 4 points.

At the time of writing this article the Western Metropolitan Finals has yet to be held for Intermediate and Junior teams.

#### Cricket

On April 20 the Williamstown High School Accelerated Cricket team took on Maribyrnong Sports Academy. Losing the toss and sent in, WHS started positively with the opening partnership putting on 25. Jay Vine looked ominous launching a 6 and a 4 consecutively before swiping outside off stump resulting in being caught behind the wicket. Consolidation was required but Angus Cameron succumbed to a groin injury and Felix Sutter was bowled by a very good delivery shortly after.

Cameron Jackson and Aiden Salvado, in their debut, were able to develop a very important partnership. Aiden and Cameron moved the team total to 61 before Aidan was caught. Running 15 meters and diving full stretch to complete a one handed blinder.

As the saying goes 'catches win matches' and this certainly turned the tide. But Cameron Jackson wasn't quiet done just yet. 

#### **Badminton**




#### **Australian Rules Football**


















#### SPORT CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The Year 7s are sure to recount:


- their hair raising experiences with the Van de Graaff generator

# SCIENCE AT PASCO









Science at Pasco has been full of experiments, digital technologies, hands-on activities and excursions to help reinforce fundamental theoretical concepts. The year 10 students in core science worked in collaborative groups to make DNA models for Biology and balloon rockets for Physics. They also investigated the effects of temperature and concentration on rates of reaction in a Chemistry practical. In Forensic Science,

students analysed fingerprints, investigated crime scenes and compared the angles of blood platter using trajectories. In Mind and Body, students explored the structure and function of cells as well as examining memory and attraction in a Biology and Psychology based subject. Year 11 Science subjects have been jam-packed with students visiting the zoo for year 11 Biology and running titrations and making batteries in Chemistry.

It was very eyeopening to hear a first hand account at how dark that time in history was. They learnt a lot from the museum and grew because of the experience.

The year 11 legal students went to the County Court. As they entered they were given instructions on the courts they were allowed into and what the proper court etiquette was. They were then given the opportunity to go off on their own and pick a case to view. One of the more interesting ones was a case where the accused had several charges, such as breaking and entering, theft, and holding someone against their will. It was a fascinating experience and was really informative in how courtrooms work in practice.

The year 11 economics students had the opportunity to go to the

Victoria Market to spend some time investigating how businesses have been impacted over the last couple of years and how the prices of our everyday necessities have been influenced. They spent the day enjoying the freedom of the marketplace whilst learning all about the influences of the economy on trading. They had the opportunity to talk to local traders and understand how the pricing works on goods and services and the different factors that impact the prices like seasons and demand.

Many of the year 11 students took part in the school production. Many hours of hard work and practise resulted in a fantastic school show that reflects our high school and the people in it. # VCAL vibes

The Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning offers students an opportunity to complete a hands on equivalent to year 11 and 12 VCE. The program focuses on students physically constructing their learning environments and is assessed on their involvement in the activity or project. It is an excellent option for students who have a strong kinaesthetic approach to their learning or students who wish to peruse a trade in industries such as hair and make up, carpentry or community services.







The course delivered at
Williamstown High School is made
up of three components. Students
attend classes at WHS on Monday,
Tuesday and Friday which makes
up their course work component.
Students also complete a VET course
one day per week and one day of
work placement throughout the year.

Students are required to obtain their work placement independently which can prove difficult at times. Students in Year 11 do have time to work on this during the first semester though and have a number of school resources to assist them with the process. Many students enjoy the aspect of work placement because it provides them with an opportunity to work in their chosen area and gain valuable insight into their trade.

It has been a busy year for both our Year 11 and 12 VCAL groups. One of the highlights of the year was the Year 12 group creating the first VCAL camp which they had to plan in its entirety.

The group decided upon Lorne as the location and had to factor in accommodation, food, and activities to participate in while away. Daniel Pearce and Gavin Clifford provided great support for the students and accompanied the group to Lorne. While in Lorne the group participated in a surfing session, which by many accounts was the highlight of the trip. It was a fantastic effort by all members of the senior VCAL group to plan and organise such a complex task and is something that we are looking to make a regular fixture in the VCAL program.

Recently the senior VCAL group also completed a Market Day that raised money for the Lighthouse Foundation. The students received a small amount of money from the VCAL budget and brought various ingredients and made a fantastic range of cup cakes and slices as well as running a BBQ. Under the guidance of Ben Jolley who specialises in Business Studies, the group then proceeded to sell their produce at the Bayview campus during lunchtime. They managed to raise \$780 for the Lighthouse Foundation which was an amazing achievement.

One of the Year 12's other major tasks for the year was their Donations in Kind project. Donations In Kind is a major recycling operation, run by volunteers from Rotary that gives suitable goods to people in need.

During the Year our year 12's visited a packing station in Yarraville and filled a number of containers with donations that were sent to East Timor. They also ran a fund raising event which included a sausage sizzle and out of uniform day that

raised over \$500 for DIK. Upon reflection many of the students who participated in the project talked about how worthwhile and relevant the project was and the satisfaction gained knowing that they were making a significant difference to others in need.

Our Year 11 group has also accomplished some fantastic achievements this year. One of their ongoing projects throughout the year was the Breakfast Club that saw the VCAL students assisting with the delivery of breakfast to students from 8am to 8:45am on a Tuesday morning. Sebastian Bettiol drove the project and was well supported each week by our Year 11 VCAL students. Seb also organised for his father, who is an aircraft engineer to come in and deliver an introductory car mechanic workshop that covered the essentials of car maintenance. The students described this as an excellent opportunity to learn about basic car maintenance such as changing the oil in a car and how to change a tyre.

The Year 11's again completed a garden project and identified the area under the L – Block stairs as the area in most need of repair. The class was required to research suitable plant types before

commencing the renovation of the area and they also installed a first class watering system. This task was made a lot easier with the assistance of our plumbing students. The students then embarked on a trip to Bunnings to purchase their chosen flora. The plants had to be shade tolerant and require relatively low water. The group chose a great range of plants and were able to transform the once barren looking area into a real feature of the school.

Once again this year the year 11 class participated in a Wheel Talk session. The program encourages students to think about diversity, acceptance and disability sports as well as give a greater understanding of the issues facing people with a disability. It is accompanied with an hour of wheelchair basketball at the end of the verbal presentation, which provides students with a physical understanding of what it is like to live with a disability. The session provided students with a valuable learning experience while having a little fun at the same time.

The final major event that took place in both VCAL year levels this year was the Amazing Race. This was the first time an event like this had been staged at Williamstown High School and required the students to make their way to various locations around Melbourne. When at the specific location they were required to complete a series of challenges for bonus points. Both year levels did an outstanding job of navigating their way around Melbourne and were keen to get their hands on the \$100 JB Hi Fi gift voucher that was up for grabs as well as movie tickets and a \$30 canteen voucher. The event was a huge success and something that we will now be looking to make a regular event in the future.

From a personal perspective it has been incredibly enjoyablable coordinating the VCAL progaram this year and our students should be congratulated on their achievements throughout the year. Finally I would like to thank the staff, Ben Jolley, Sebastian Bettiol, Brianna Murray, Gavin Clifford, Daniel Pearce, Jaryd Mills and Brett Russell who have all contributed enormously to the VCAL program this year. Needless to say without their ongoing assistance and comittment to VCAL the program would not be able to run. I look forwad to working with the next group of VCAL students and wish our graduating senior VCAL students all the best for the future.

We set off on our journey in late November last year, and after spending 24 hours on planes and at airports we were definitely happy to arrive. As we stepped off the plane we all got hit instantly by the African heat, it was probably about 35 degrees. We then spent the next few days planning our food, accommodation and transport for the rest of the trip.

Our first stop was at Ranaka Village in southern Botswana. This is where we did the project phase, which involved helping out the locals to build a library at their school. When our bus pulled into the school, the kids met us with a rock star reception. About 600 small African primary school students swarmed our bus and were trying to shake our hands and give us high-5s.

We slept under mosquito nets in the classrooms at the school, and despite the hundreds of flies, beetles, spiders and snakes, we managed to survive. This was close to the best experience on the trip as we got to spend a whole week chatting to the local kids and got to see first hand how happy they are in living conditions

which were incomparable to life in Melbourne. We also bonded really well as a team in the first week and built friendships, which will (hopefully) last a lifetime. After the project phase, we went on our first trek.

The treks through both the villages and the savannah were amazing. We got to experience local foods, walk through amazing landscape, and see local wildlife and even meet and live with many of the locals. We were pushed to work as a team and cooperate without any of the luxuries that we would have back home, and although it was exhausting, it was an incredible experience for all of us. Despite being at different levels of physical strength, we all went at the same pace and motivated each other to finish together.

Now for the food, this was definitely interesting at times, however we were never let down by those in charge of the cooking. Access to nutritious food is essential while backpacking through 40-degree weather with 20kg on your back. On a staple diet of cous cous, peanut butter, toppers biscuits and tuna,

it was (almost) enough to get us through our daily 6-hour treks. I think we all underestimated our ability to feed 20 people everyday for a month. But we got there. We were forced to improvise and use the utilities we had which really tested our patience, but we did learn some useful life-skills such as cooking on an open fire.

At the end of our trip, we had around 1 week to relax and enjou the tourist attractions that Africa has to offer. In our last few days in Botswana we went to the Okavango delta and got to witness animals that were 100% in the wild, such as elephants, hippos, giraffes and zebras. We also went to Chobe National Park, which is a massive area that is fenced off and protected so that poachers can't kill the wildlife. In there we got to see more animals, such as lions, gazelles, honey badgers and monkeys, as well as the ones we had already seen in the Okavango. This was great because the animals are protected and aren't scared of humans, so we got within 3 metres of a pack of female lions.

Our final days, which were spent in

Zambia, we were left torn between wanting to stay and continue exploring Africa, and wanting to return to our lives back at home. A month is a long time to be gone, and after spending what felt like an eternity where every step we took was a new experience, we were left wondering what the rest of the world had been up to. We spent the last few days reminiscing on our great trip and just relaxing and enjoying one of the seven natural wonders of the world, which was Victoria Falls. This was the perfect way to finish the trip as we had a chance to reflect on the great journey, which we all shared together

### Team 2

The expedition was undoubtedly a life changing experience. Not only was the destination aesthetically and culturally very different, but also the travelling situation was very unique. As a team of 20, we each had to rely on each other to organise food, transportation and accommodation. There were no five star hotels, no three course meals and often, not even a toilet seat!

The travelling situation required each person to support and provide for the entire group, which was a very new responsibility to all of us. By the end of the trip we were all incredibly close and identified as one big family. Our two world challenge leaders Nikki and John, and Williamstown High School teacher Ms. Gaylard, were the most wonderful people to travel with. I could not have asked for more intelligent or supportive people to guide us through the journey. It was very comforting to always have the support of everyone in the group and we are all still in close contact.

Alongside the positive and uplifting moments, as the title suggests, there are also many challenges, but the expedition would not be complete without them. As a group, we overcame trekking in the intense African heat, cooking dinner in the middle of the dessert during a storm and most importantly, confronting the harsh realities of poverty in underdeveloped countries. Despite living conditions not always being sufficient, I was overwhelmed by how incredibly positive and welcoming the people we met along our journey were. I can certainly speak for my entire group when I say that we all came home with a very different attitude towards our own living conditions; the realisation of how fortunate we are and how much we take living in a developed country for granted.

Some highlights of my trip to Africa include; visiting Victoria Falls - one of the seven wonders of the world, spending five days in the Kalahari desert with kooky bushman, going on a walk and spotting hippos, lions, zebras, giraffes, elephants and wildebeests only metres away, and last but certainly not least, our project in the small village Mwandi.

We stayed in Mwandi for a week and our community project was to build a mud hut for a local villager, help out at a hospital and a nursing home (which was the most confronting part of the trip). We were also able to attend a very special Sunday church mass, which went for 3 hours! Although many people in our group did not follow a religion, we were all blown away by the intensity of the sermon and the incredible church choirs.

## Team 3

"Knock, knock, knock". This was the sound for many of us leading up to our soon to be unparalleled journey through Botswana and Zambia. Through countless hours of fundraising, knocking on doors, selling sausages and saving every dollar we had, we met and defeated the first obstacle in our way.

Once we set foot on Botswana soil, we discovered our home away from home for the next month- Mokolodi; a small backpackers that was akin to a resort compared to some of our latter camping locations. We also grew to know our foster parents for the next month, Team Leader Rich, Assistant Leader Dave and School Representative Ms English (or 'Mel').

Within the first couple of days our group, 'Team Three', established our true team name. With half the team in the pool at Mokolodi, and the other half cheering us on, we decided to create a vortex in the water, as you do when you're children, running around in circles continuously. Although what we didn't realise was that another team had left their food supply by the pool. This incident thus had us branded 'Whirlpool'. We also later coined our own language, 'Poolian', similar to Pig Latin, which only brought us closer together.

A highlight for many of us included, the Okavango Delta, where we travelled by canoe with the aid of our guides. Here, we camped for roughly three days and discovered the beauty of African wildlife.

Walks through the delta allowed us to be no further than 20 metres away from wild elephants, zebras and giraffes, with us keeping a little bit more distance when it came to lions, wildebeest, hippopotami and buffalos. Being able to see animals such as this, including their baby counterparts, left many of us awestruck, not quite being able to comprehend how close we were to these creatures- only grassy planes separating us from them.

While abroad, we also helped lay the foundations for a school library in the village of Ranaka, whereby we dug out trenches using our pick and rea our fort

One piece of this journey that really resonated with a lot of us included the breathtaking view and sheer magnitude of Victoria Falls in Zambia. As we watched people bungee jump just across the border in Zimbabwe, we vowed to return to fulfil our adrenaline junkies within.

Our expedition through Botswana and Zambia opened a lot of our eyes to what we have and what we don't need when it comes to material goods. The first week or so left some grappling for Wi-Fi connection at every port they could find, although towards the end, it seemed as superfluous as bathing when trekking through the Kalahari desert (our collective stench only brought us closer). This experience taught us the value in face-to-face communication, learning that making connections with people, not phones, made life far easier when trying to get home from a restaurant; one time leaving us stranded for hours on end.

As the expedition came to a close, we were all both exhausted and saddened that such an incredible experience had come to a close. Through our trip we made friends we never thought we would have and gained skills we'll carry with us for life. We would not have traded this adventure for the world.

### Team 4

Three Williamstown High School students, Jordan, Kelly & I set off on our World Challenge experience to Vietnam and Cambodia late November last year. We joined Wheelers Hill Seciondary to complete a month long journey exploring, trekking and volunteering in various cities around the two

countries.

This trip was one of the most exciting and educational adventures I have ever experienced. Where do I begin...it was extremely nerve racking meeting the other kids we were going to spend every minute of everyday for a month with! But to our surprise they were all amazing and interesting people in their own ways.

On our expedition we were required to arrange transport, accommodation, food, budgets, media, heath and hygiene and culture. Each day we would rotate these roles and responsibilities including leader and deputy leader.

Every destination we travelled to was either hour-long buses and/or trains.

We arrived in Siem Reap, Cambodia, November 24th. Our first activity was a bike ride around Angkor Wat to see all the temples. It was so beautiful to see all the historical religious temples.

For our first big adventure we trekked for 5 days though the Ratanakiri National Park. This was probably the most exhausting thing any of us have ever done. We had to carry all the food which was to last us the 5 days, our clothes, water and our hammocks. We had 3 guides who cooked and lead us through the jungle. The food they prepared was rice or noodles with carrots and onions every single day for breakfast, lunch and dinner. By the 5th day we couldn't wait to get back to our hotels and sleep.

Our second big adventure was our project at Kia's Village, just out of Phnom Penh, Cambodia. We slept in a big house all in one room on the floor with our fly nets over us. Kai's Village is a community orphanage home to 37 children, including newborns, many which have special needs.

At the village we bought supplies, helped farm and water the garden, clean and feed the babies, teach and entertain the children. We got into groups and had to cook our own meals for our team in our house every day. It was probably one of the saddest things having to leave those children behind. We all grew feelings for these kids we played and laughed with. Leaving Kai's village was the hardest part of the trip for me.

The journey from Cambodia to Vietnam was so draining, changing buses, getting visas and our passports checked took up a whole day and night. In Vietnam we completed our third big adventure, which happened to be another project. T

his was at the Tu Hanh Pagoda, which is, and orphanage and caring center. This project was very hard as communicating to the monks didn't really work out how we had planned; we all had a really fun time together helping clean and looking after the young children. As we did not spend as much time at the Pagoda and were not allowed to stay on the site we weren't able to build relationships with the kids like we did at Kai's Village.

Overall this World Challenge experience was both physically and mentally challenging. Jordan, Kelly and myself have all made life long friends we still keep in contact with and would not have had the trip any other way. Our expedition leader Peter was amazing and probably one of the most interesting people we have all ever met, he always had a story to tell. We all highly recommend attending a World Challenge expedition, as it is a life changing experience.


**Doug Heywood** left WHS in 1956. His specialty: Classical, choral, orchestra, voice and conducting.

A student at Williamstown High School during 1955-56, Doug has fond memories of performing in The Pirates of Penzance.

Throughout the 1960s, Douglas was employed as a technician with the P.M.G., now Telstra, and managed to coordinate his demanding schedule as a performer with his work commitments for the P.M.G. In order to undertake a professional career in music, he returned to study at the University of Melbourne in 1969, graduating with a Bachelor of Music Education (Honours) in 1973 and a Bachelor of Education in 1975.

Since 1974 he has been the Musical Director of the Camberwell Chorale and in 1976 he established the Camerata Orchestra. From 1982 until 1991 he was also the Musical Director of the Caulfield City Choir and in 1983 he established the 320-voice Victorian Concert Choir.

Since 1989 Douglas has been the Choral Director for G.T.V. Channel 9's national television production of 'Carols by Candlelight'. From 2000 - 2006 he was Musical Director of the Melbourne Welsh Male Voice Choir. The Melbourne music community probably knows Doug best as the Choral Director, since 1988, for Channel Nine's Christmas Eve production of "Carols by Candlelight" at the Myer Music



In recognition of his service to Music Education and Community Music, Douglas was awarded the Order of Australia Medal in 1995.
