I made my first direct contact with Dandenong High School when, as a young teacher, I took a football team from Essendon High School to play Dandenong High School on the oval at the rear of the school. I think the year was 1927. I remember that it was a rough oval in those days, with one end appreciably higher than the other, and that the school building then consisted entirely of the original two-storey brick block, open on the northern side. As a matter of historical fact I have to record that Essendon won the match, but Essendon High was then a big school and Dandenong a small one.

However, Dandenong High School was known to me before this time, as I had been in Teachers' College with some ex-students of that school, notably Reg Singleton, Fred Searle, and Marie Facey, and found that there was a strong loyalty to the old school. I well remember the head master, Mr. P. Langford, then a staunch bachelor and still a cricketer of some note, whose friendly personality made a deep impression on me. By the end of the 1920's Dandenong High School was no longer a young high school; it had an assured place among the secondary schools of the State and was going from strength to strength.

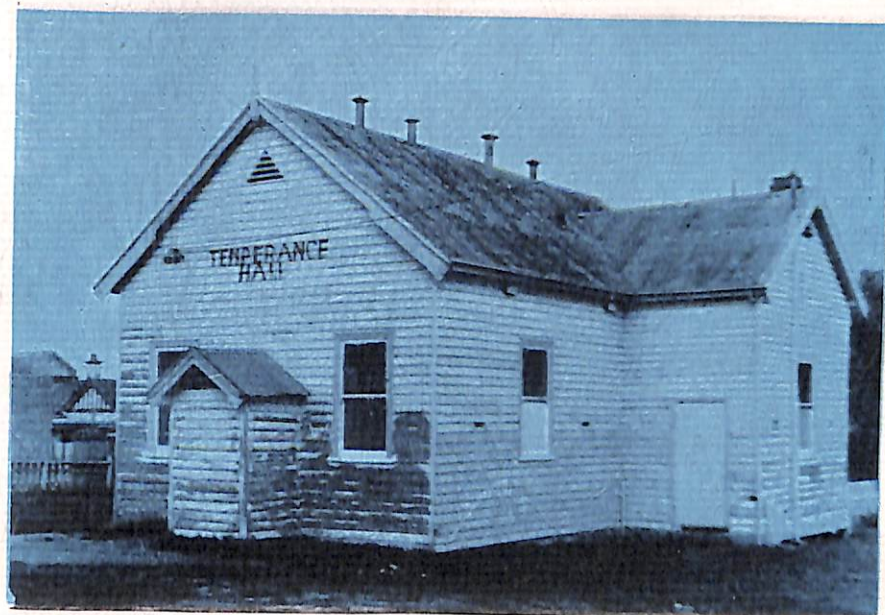
I feel that it has never looked back. It has had its problems and difficulties at times, too many pupils at some stages, hardly ever enough room, poor facilities for special subjects and the rest of it, but it never lost its unique character, which appeared to me to combine rugged independence with a forthright approach to school matters. Perhaps it owed something to its semirural environment in the early days. It has never lacked progressive principals, great teachers, distinguished pupils, or enthusiastic and determined parents, and many of the improvements that have taken place in its buildings and facilities have resulted from the persistent drive of people such as these.

As a building, Dandenong High School will always be something of an agglomerate, because so many parts of it have been erected at different times, but as a school it will always have cohesion. Dandenong High School is people, past, present and future. It is these people who give it strength. Long may it continue to flourish!

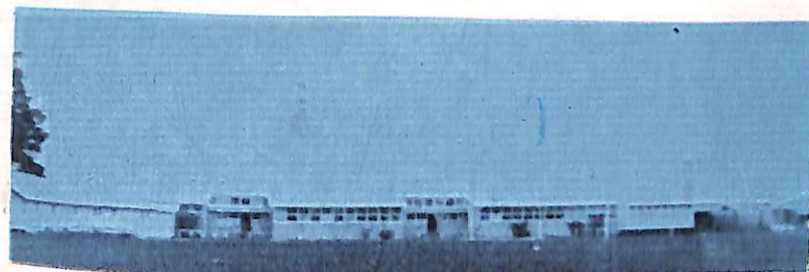
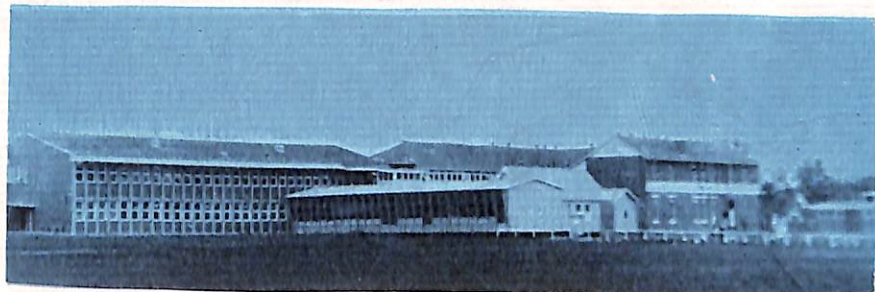

BEGINNINGS

The first recorded correspondence in connection with the establishment of a High School at Dandenong consists of a letter from Mr. M. P. Hansen, Chief Inspector of Secondary Schools, as follows —

Education Office.
Melbourne.
29th August, 1918

Rev. H. A. Buntine,
The Manse,
Dandenong.
Dear Mr. Buntine,

The Public Works Department is now preparing plans for the new High School at Dandenong, but it is necessary that we should go slowly as the amount of money available for building is very limited, and the expense of building at present is very high. I do not think it is possible to squeeze more out of our present vote than is sufficient to build rooms enough to accommodate about 100 pupils, but I am anxious that good plans should be prepared so that extensions which I have no doubt will be very much needed, will be possible during the next financial year. The limitation of building is purely due to the present financial stress.

Personally I do not think we would be making provision for more than sufficient if the school were made for 200 pupils, but the cost makes this out of the question for the present.

The Rev. H. A. Buntine had been the leader of a small group of Dandenong citizens who had worked for some years towards the establishment of the school. At the first meeting of the Advisory Council, held in the Fire Brigade Hall on Monday, 23rd June, 1919, he was unanimously elected as Chairman, in recognition of his services.

The school opened in temporary premises on March 10, 1919. This was later in the year than the normal school opening date and the delay was due to the outbreak of pneumonic influenza, then sweeping the world as an aftermath of World War I.

Junior students were accommodated in the old Fire Station, and the seniors in the Temperance Hall and the Church of Christ.

On 21st November, 1919, the foundation stone of the new building was laid by the Hon. W. Hutchinson, M.L.A., Minister of Public Instruction, on a site of 7½ acres in Bushy Park, an estate to the north of the town. This property was purchased at a cost of £100 per acre.

The original members of the teaching staff were Mr. P. C. W. Langford (Head Master), Mr. R. Frencham, Mr. A. J. Stephen and Misses A. M. Frusher, T. Kirkham and D. McKinnon.

Enrolment of students as at 31st March, 1919, as recorded during the first visit to the school of an Education Department Inspector (Miss J. T. Flynn) was 104, with 55 boys and 49 girls.

According to existing school records, each of these attended the school during 1919, and may claim to be original students of Dandenong High School —

From these students the first school Prefects were appointed —

As its colours the school adopted the red and two blues from the regimental colours of the 4th Light Horse, with which the Headmaster had been associated during World War I. As its motto, the school chose "FABER, QUISQUE,

FORTUNAE" — "Every man is the architect of his own destiny."

Available school records give little indication of the day to day progress of the school during 1919. It is known that 6 girls and 9 boys obtained their Merit Certificates, then a good qualification, at the end of that first year, and the following extracts from the first report of the Board of Secondary School Inspectors, dated 9/5/1919 gives some idea of the pioneering difficulties of that year — "The school has opened with the accommodation taxed to the utmost, and the establishment of the High School has been justified by the large enrolment of pupils anxious to continue secondary education."

"The equipment is insufficient but there is no way of adding to it at present."

"Science is not taught, as there is no provision for practical work."

"The school work is carried on smoothly and this is very commendable, considering the conditions of accommodation."

"The school has already achieved much in the way of securing a secondary spirit. The pupils are well behaved and industrious and are interested in their school."

"The Headmaster has established the High School on very sound lines, and there is every indication that the school will develop into a successful High School. He has been helped very materially by the present teachers, and great credit is due to all concerned."

The full list of High Schools already established in Victoria prior to 1919, is as follows —

Mr. Langford entered the Education Department as a student teacher at S.S. Craigieburn, and in 1905, commenced a two year course at the Melbourne Teachers' College, where one of his fellow students was Mr. Griffiths. After some years as teacher in charge of rural schools, he joined the staff of University High School in 1912, and remained in the position until he enlisted in the A.I.F. in August 1914. Mr. Langford served in the 4th Light Horse Regiment, with

which unit he was associated in the Sinai-Palestine campaign. He was invalided to Western Australia in 1916, and then carried out recruiting work for the Army.

In 1919, he was appointed to the new Dandenong High School as Headmaster, and remained in charge until 1934, when it was necessary to adjust his position by transfer to Mildura High School. In 1937, he took charge of Frankston High School, from which position he retired from the Education Department in 1948. Mr. Langford later rejoined the staff of Dandenong High School for a period from 1950, then lived in retirement at Frankston, where he died in 1964.

THE CONTINUING STORY, 1920-1968

No attempt can be made in a work of this nature to record all details of the progress of the school over a period of fifty years. An effort has been made, however, to cover those events which marked an important area of development. In particular, the aim is to give as many personal glimpses as possible, of students, teachers and friends of the school who participated, through half a century, in building up a fine tradition of scholarship and service to the community.

1920

The school was officially opened late in this year, in the presence of Sir Alexander Peacock (Minister), Mr. F. Tate (Director), Professor John Smyth, and the Rev. H. Buntine.

The following students obtained the Intermediate Certificate —

Jean Abbott, Katie Bloomfield, Charlie Buckley, Maggie Campbell, Austin Mehrens, Fred Searle, Allan Shannon, Madge Slater, Ena Tharle.

These were the first students to obtain this qualification at Dandenong High School.

The names and colours of the Houses were selected by Miss Dora Taylor, Senior Mistress. There were originally six Houses—Bluegum, Clematis, Orchid, Wattle, Boronia and Waratah.

The Headmaster's salary was £312 per annum.

The school building was occupied late in the year, when the enrolment was already greater than the new accommodation, which consisted of the cookery centre, Headmaster's office, entrance hall, art room, chemistry room. Above the cookery centre was a science room, and behind it class-room buildings on one floor extended for about 30 feet. Prompt action by the Director of Edu-

cation, Mr. Frank Tate, soon resulted in the building of additional classrooms.

Enrolment in 1920, was approximately 150, including 60 from Bunyip, Pakenham, Berwick, Garfield, Lyndhurst, Hallam, Kooweerup, Carnegie and Murrumbeena areas.

The School Crest was designed by the Art Mistress, Miss D. McKinnon (Mrs. Roche).

1921

The first school flag and pole were presented by Chief Officer Woolcott, who had rescued the flag when his ship "Perth" was wrecked on a trading voyage to New Zealand.

Jean Abbott, Isobel Allen, Kitty Bloomfield, Marie Facey, Ena Tharle and Fred Searle qualified for the Leaving Certificate, and became the first students of the school to achieve this distinction.

From Minutes of Advisory Council meeting, 11/7/21 — "As trees had been planted in the school grounds it was necessary to keep the ponies tethered on fenced off portion of the ground. Mr. Hemming's paddock was suggested as a grazing area." (This was later made available, at a rental of 1/6 a week — now Hemming's Park).

1922

At the Leaving Honors examinations Isobel Allen, Kitty Bloomfield and Ena Tharle each gained Honors in two subjects, and Marie Facey in three.

Dandenong joined with Leongatha and Warragul High Schools to form the Gippsland Sports Association. Other schools which subsequently joined were Sale, Bairnsdale, Traralgon and Orbost. Because of travel and accommodation difficulties, the Association later broke up into smaller sections.

The Combined Sports Official Luncheon was held at the Club Hotel, at a cost of 2/- per head.

At this stage, meetings of the Advisory

Council were held in the Shire Council Chambers.

1923

Students who presented for the Intermediate Certificate in this year were — Elvie Cadle, Derrick Chapple, Clarence Corrigan, Margaret Freshney, George Funston, Herbert Godfrey, Aileen Griffin, Guy Halahan, William Herkes, Pearl Hughes, Arnold Keys, Lindsay Lawson, Jack McAleese, Ivan McAlpine, Charles McCord, Janie McCord, Jessie Mitchell, Jack Mudge, Alan Russell, Ella Service, Jack Standish, Jack Tomlinson, James Thomson, Arthur Weetman, Grace Wadsley, Jean Wallace, Gilbert Dyke. 24 of these students qualified.

The Rev. H. Buntine was elected President of the Advisory Council for the period 1923-1926.

From Inspectors' report — "greater tidiness is desirable in the boys' locker room."

Miss Roberts resigned from the teaching staff, and considerable difficulty was experienced in obtaining a replacement.

Nineteen branches of the A.N.A. met at Bairnsdale, and donated an amount of £25 towards trophies for inter-school sport in the Gippsland area.

Mr. McAfee, a member of the Advisory Council, was congratulated on his recent marriage.

Mr. Sims sought permission from the Advisory Council to place a turnstile opposite his shop in James Street.

Ivan McAlpine, later to join Footscray, coach Hawthorn, and secure second place to Syd. Coventry in the award of the Brownlow Medal, was a prominent member of the school football team.

1924

The High Schools Comedy Company, consisting of ex-students and teachers of Coburg, Dandenong, Geelong, Melbourne and University High Schools

was formed, and gave two performances of "The Lilies of the Field."

The only High Schools in the Melbourne Metropolitan area were Coburg, Dandenong, Essendon, Frankston, Melbourne, Mordialloc, Williamstown and University.

On 9th September, eight palms and 24 cypress trees were planted along the frontage, by pupils representative of all forms. They were Gwen Abbott, Elvie Cadle, G. Wadsley, Phyllis Powell, Lorna Currie, Marjorie Painter, Rita O'Connor, Richard Sorensen, Elma Manks, Nancy Gardner, Annie Manks, N. Bailey, Chrissie Wolls-Cobb, F. Vizard, L. Andrews (the palms were still standing in their original situation in 1968).

On the resignation of the Rev. Buntine as President of the Advisory Council consequent on his transfer from the district, Mr. Singleton was unanimously elected to the position.

From Inspectors' report — "the extension of the fence to separate the boys' and girls' grounds is very necessary."

The first recorded meeting of the Old Pupils' Association was held on 15th April. Mr. P. C. Langford was elected President; Miss McKinnon and Charles Buckley, Vice-Presidents; J. Hall, Secretary and Jim Sharkie, Treasurer. Other members of the Executive were Misses G. Wilson, K. Bloomfield, M. Facey, E. Tharle, J. Abbott, and Messrs. K. Gregg, F. Searle and R. Taylor.

Consequent on a trip to England, Mr. Abbott was extended six months leave by the Advisory Council.

School Honor Boards were prepared and lettered during this year.

1925

Tenders were called by the Advisory Council for fencing the oval on the side adjoining the school buildings. This was later erected at a cost of £26.

From cookery inspector's report — "school visited at 3 p.m. The class had all gone home."

114 new students entered the school. 71 were from grade 6 (63 having passed the Qualifying Examination) 10 from grade 7, and 33 from grade 8 (27 having qualified for the Merit Certificate). At the end of 1924, 98 students left school.

All students in the highest form, preparing for Leaving Certificate, were required to take 5 subjects, from English, History, French, Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Mechanics, Physics and Drawing.

From Inspector's report — "a tendency to talk too much at times rather detracts from the work of this teacher."

Members of the visiting Board of Inspectors were L. J. Wrigley, J. T. Flynn, J. A. Seitz, L. S. Davies and S. Llewellyn.

Louis Garlick, later to become Chairman of the Teachers' Tribunal, was awarded a Junior Swimming Certificate.

1926

The Education Department promised to provide additional accommodation — four classrooms, a new sloyd room and new out-offices.

Enrolment, June: 152 boys, 169 girls. Of these, 200 came from outside the town. Four typewriters were purchased for commercial students — the Department paid half the cost!

As book lockers were not available from the Education Department, a set of 24 was made at the school.

From Inspectors' report — "rather too much of the experienced teachers' time is given to the two pupils doing Leaving Certificate Honors." "There is no doubt that the school enjoys a very good reputation in the community, and that it is serving its purpose excellently as a district High School."

Muriel Schinckel won a Swimming Medallion.

1927

The first volume of the school magazine was published. The name — "The Gate" — was suggested by Kathleen Brumley (Form E), who wrote — "The Gate is a good name, because Dandenong is the gate to Gippsland; our School is the gate to learning, and our magazine is the gate by which many of us hope to reach literary fame."

Athletics championships were won by Thelma Hocking, Thelma Lindsay, Marjorie Scoble, B. Myring, E. Pelling, C. Wynne, L. Roberts.

Two tennis courts were constructed in the grounds, at a cost of £173 4s. 1d. An Accident Fund was established, to give students insurance cover at a cost of 1/- per year.

The Dramatic Club presented "Followers," under the direction of Miss Schneider, Miss Watson and Miss Little.

Kathleen Twendale, Elsie Grant, Maisie Dobson and Beryl Randall each obtained a Pass with Credit at the Technical School examination in Elementary Typing.

For House Competitions established in this year, points were awarded for athletics, basketball, cricket, football, hockey, rounders, swimming, tennis and service. Examination results were included after 1929.

In a spelling test conducted by the Board of Inspectors, Joy Dawson and Frank Asling were best with one error in twenty words given. One boy (name withheld) had 17 errors!

1928

On 23rd August, the Dramatic Club presented J. M. Barrie's "Quality Street" in the Boomerang Theatre (later the "Mayfair"). Principal parts were played by Enid Keddie, A. Donohue and Gwenda Bush.

News of ex-students: Dave Lombard (3rd year Engineering), Fred Searle

(B.Sc., completing Dip.Ed.), Jessie Mitchell (3rd year Arts).

At the Teachers' College were Ella Service, Eric Simpson, Marie Jaboor, Jack Rice, Violet Chapman, Edna Griffiths, Thirza Quinn, Maggie Norris, Marjorie Painter, Agnes Rice, Mollie Walsh. Ida Hillard was at the Alfred Hospital, and Madge Slater at the Pharmacy College. Many were teaching in the Education Department. To name a few — Vern. Fleming (Colac), Ethel Vincent (Oakleigh), Doris Hopkins (Dandenong

West), Reg. Singleton (Essendon H.S.), Ivan McAlpine (Reedy Creek).

Home room for Forms A and B was the entrance hall; later in the year they were housed in the Headmaster's office.

Quote — "F1 is one of the lowest forms in the school."

Miss E. R. Little resigned from the staff, to marry Mr. E. Fisher, and to live at Warrnambool.

Inter-House Swimming: Orchid (108), Bluegum (87), Clematis (79), Waratah (74), Wattle (54), Boronia (46).

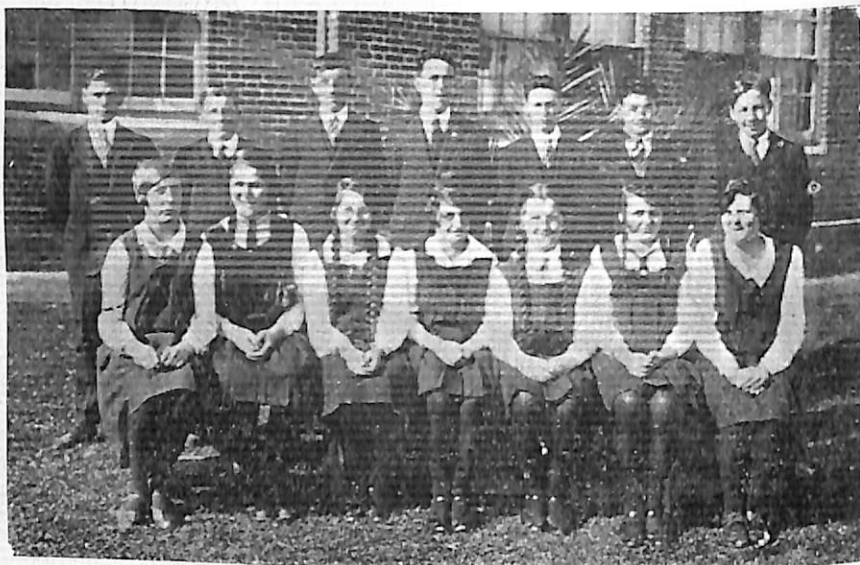

1929

Enrolment: Boys — 196; Girls — 203.
 Hec. Randall, an original student of the school in 1919, was appointed to the cleaning staff. Hec. is still on the job, providing efficient and cheerful service to the school around which his life has been centred.

Ex-student Kitty Bloomfield was the first woman in Victoria to obtain a pilot's licence.

The school was connected by telephone with the outside world!

Senior Mistress, Miss D. B. Taylor was granted an exchange for twelve months to the Girls' School in Fleetwood, England.

Farewells: at school social, to Miss Schneider and Miss Watson prior to a trip abroad.

Prize for spelling bee — a piece of Mr. Langford's birthday cake, won by Ray Johnson.

The death occurred in this year of Cr. W. B. Tharle, J.P., an original member of the Advisory Council.

At Speech Night, Mr. Langford was presented by past and present students with a writing desk.

1930

Entrance gates to the school were erected as a memorial to the late Councillor Tharle, who had done much to support and develop the work of the School in its early days.

Miss McKinnon (12 years on staff) and Miss Denton (4 years) resigned from the Education Department.

Four new classrooms and a sloyd room were completed, and a concrete entrance drive constructed.

A new song, "The school on the hill at the top of the town", was published in "The Gate".

Oh gone are the days with the bat and the ball,
 The hours that we spent in the best school of all;

The wild stirring times with the world
 at our feet,

When youth in our blood made our
 hearts faster beat,

As loud rose the call from the field rising
 clear,

"Play up, the Old High!" And away
 went our fear.

1933

Enrolment dropped to 202, because
of introduction of fees for Forms F and
E, as well as for higher forms.

In this year the Old Pupils' Associa-

tion was disbanded, not to be revived
until 1937.

1934

Enrolment rose to 288 through the
introduction of a Domestic Arts course
for girls, but total enrolment was still
well below that of previous years. For
this reason the school was reduced in
status to Class 2. As a result, Mr.
Langford had to adjust his position, and
transferred to the position of Headmaster
at Mildura High School, at the end of
1934.

Severe flooding occurred throughout
the Kooweerup swamp area, and many
residents had to be evacuated. Some of
the women and children came to Dan-
denong, and slept in the school class-
rooms.

Fanny Amor topped the temperance
examination conducted annually by the
Independent Order of Rechabites.

1935

The Dandenong High School Ladies'
Auxiliary was formed, with Mesdames
Corbel, Mitchell, Amor, Ronaldson,
Trebilcock, Male, Chandler, Hopkins,
Smith, Griffin, Cloke and Dobson as
original members.

The organization was disbanded in
1936, but re-formed as a Committee
working in association with the Advisory
Council.

Dr. A. V. G. James, a well-known
geographer and geologist, succeeded Mr.
Langford as Headmaster, and came to
Dandenong from Colac High School.

Edna H. Dawson was awarded a
Junior Scholarship.

In the Metropolitan area, there were
now twelve High Schools — Box Hill,
Coburg, Dandenong, Essendon, Frank-
ston, Hampton, MacRobertson Girls',
Melbourne Boys', Mordialloc, Northcote,
University, Williamstown.

A request was made to the Education
Department for the erection of a care-
taker's cottage within the school grounds.

Members of the Advisory Council were
unanimous in the opinion that children
should not be brought to social func-
tions organized for parents.

It was considered desirable that, as
soon as funds became available, a wire-
less set should be obtained for school
use. A set borrowed for the Armistice
Day broadcast had been a great success.

The Guest Speaker at Speech Day was
Mr. Frank Tate, formerly Director of
Education.

1936

A Reunion Ball was held in the Town
Hall, with dancing 8.30 to 2 a.m. Tickets
were 2/6 (18th November).

At a meeting of the Advisory Council
held on 13th November, Dr. James,
Headmaster, received a formal farewell.

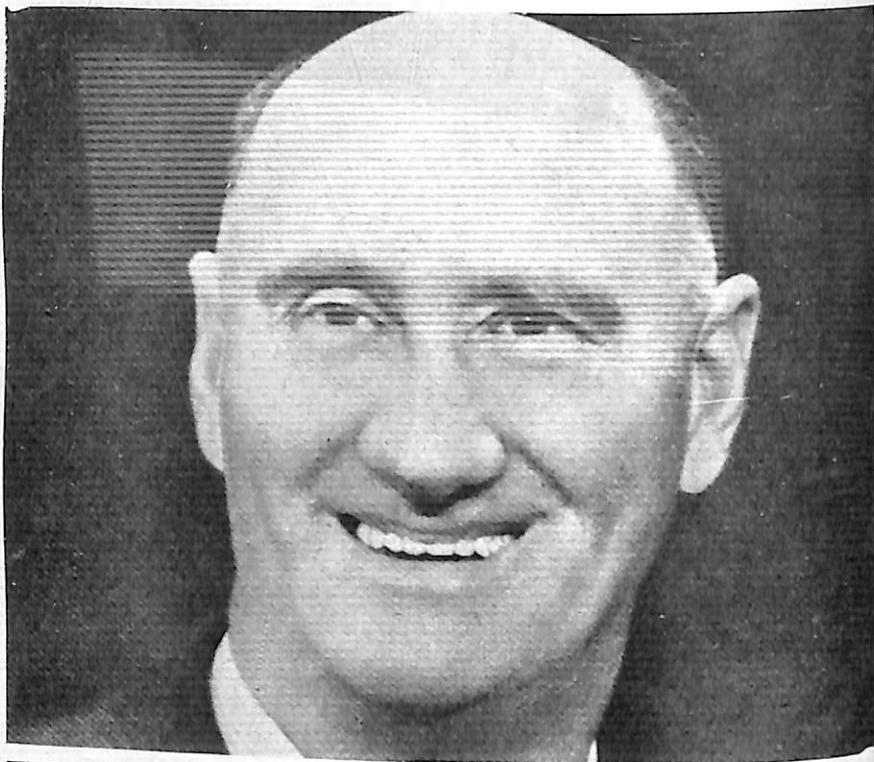

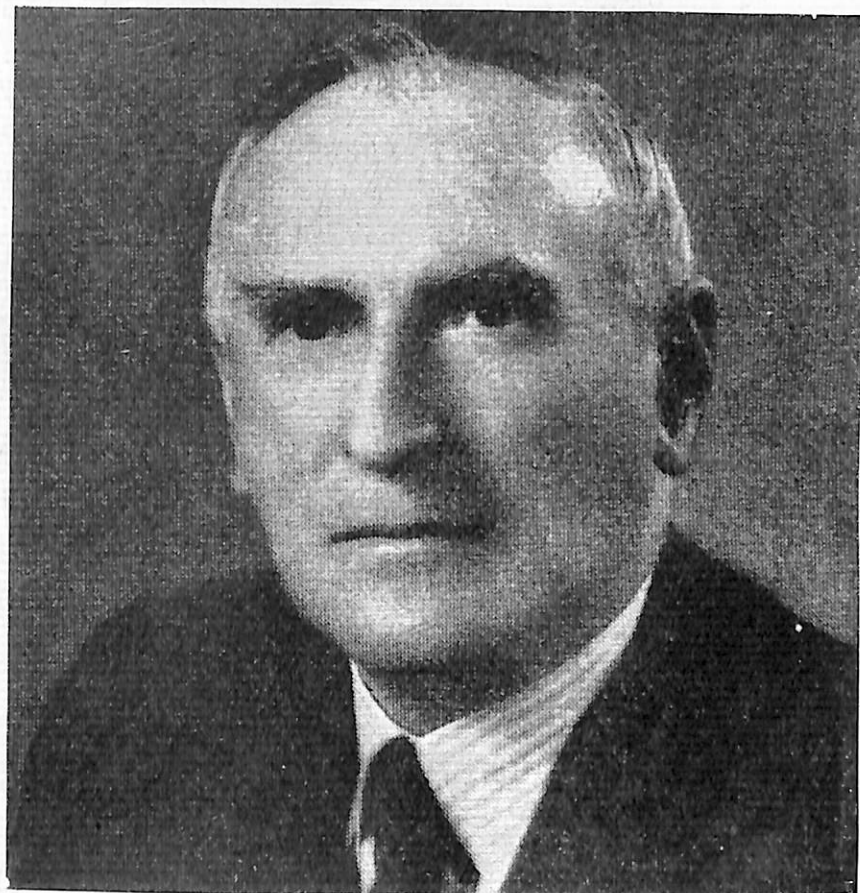
Dr. James entered the Education Department as a Monitor at S.S. 1490, Fitzroy North, in 1899, and in 1901 was appointed to the same school as a Pupil Teacher. After gaining the Trained Teachers Certificate at Melbourne Teachers' College in 1904, he was appointed in 1905 as Head Teacher of S.S. 746, Moliogul, the township where the "Welcome Stranger" nugget had been found some years before.

In 1907 he completed a specialist nature study course, and taught this subject in the Warragul, Seymour, Melbourne and Geelong districts. Teaching appoint-

ments followed at the Melbourne Continuation School (now Melbourne H.S.), and at Coburg, Bendigo, St. Arnaud and Colac High Schools, the last two as Headmaster.

During this period, Dr. James commenced the writing of the geography text books which became so widely used in Victorian secondary schools, in which work he was later joined by Professor G. S. Browne as co-author.

He came to Dandenong from Colac in 1935 and remained until the end of 1936. After a short period at Northcote H.S., he was appointed inaugural Headmaster of Camberwell H.S., from which school he retired from the Education Department on 21/12/47. During 1957, Dr. James died, survived by his widow and two of his three sons, Max and Des. Ken, 460 Squadron R.A.A.F., is buried in Denmark.



Mr. J. L. I. GRIFFITHS,
B.A., Dip.Ed.
Headmaster, 1937-1952

After training at the Melbourne Teachers' College in 1906, Mr. Griffiths taught in rural schools for some years, then entered Melbourne University as a member of the "Diploma Twenty." He joined the staff of University High School in 1912, was appointed Vice-Principal in 1915, and remained at the school until 1936, when he became Headmaster of Dandenong High School. He remained in this position until his

retirement from the Education Department in 1952.

In addition to his demanding duties as the Head of an expanding school, Mr. Griffiths was at various times President of the Victorian Teachers' Union, Teachers' Representative of the Secondary Division of the Board of Classifiers, a member of the Executive of the Schools' Board and of the Standing Committee of Convocation of the University of Melbourne.

Since his retirement he has continued to live in Dandenong, and retains his interest in the welfare of the school and in educational progress generally.

As a meeting of the Advisory Council held on 12th March a formal welcome was extended to the new Headmaster, Mr. Griffiths.

At a meeting convened by the Headmaster on 14th April, the Old Pupils' Association was re-formed. Charles Buckley was appointed President, Alma Tharle and L. Green as Vice-Presidents, Lloyd Stuart as Secretary and Eric Renfree as Treasurer.

The Dandenong Council decided to make an annual grant of £10 10s. for the provision of bursaries to students of the School.

Colonel Knox, M.L.A., was invited to an Advisory Council meeting to discuss ways and means towards the provision of an adequate school library.

Marion Dawson obtained top marks of 92 in the I.O.R. temperance examination.

The school was approved under the Class A system to conduct internal examinations for the Intermediate Certificate.

First awards of Dandenong Council Bursaries were made to Norma Fyfe, R. Warburton, W. Murphy and J. Peterson.

The Advisory Council decided that the financial condition of the State was such that it would be inopportune to continue agitation in favour of required school extensions.

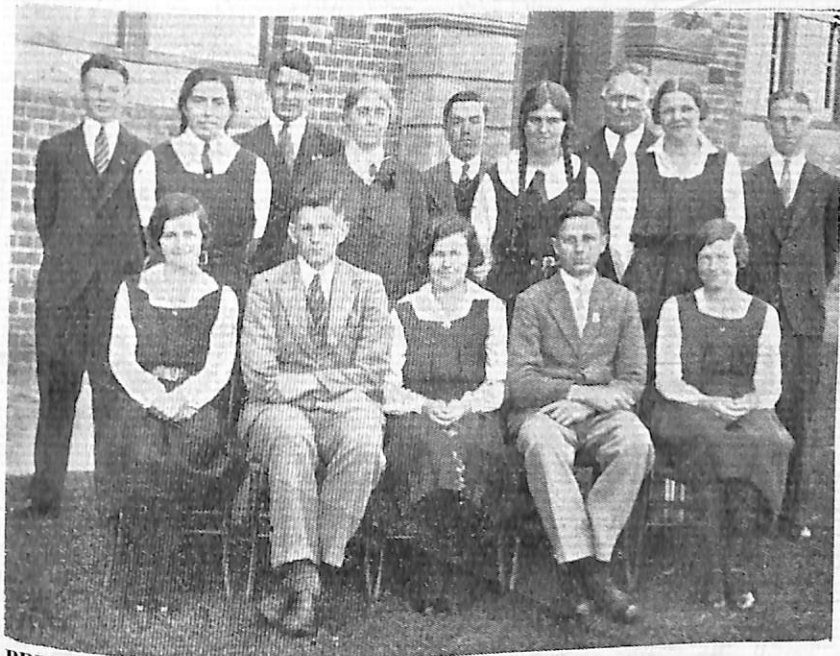

1939

An Entertainment on 29th August included a play "Elizabeth Refuses" presented by students of Form 5. The cast included Lorna Corbel, Vera Coventry, Mary Harmer, Constance McFarlane and Mildred Carpenter.

The school was approved under the Class A system to conduct internal examinations for the Leaving Certificate.

World War 2 commenced, and soon many fine ex-students of the school were in the Armed Forces.

Frederick Alan Bishop, a former pupil of the school, was the first Australian in the armed forces killed abroad after the outbreak of war.

Thomas Lewis Rothfield, an ex-student, was in London, presenting his play "The Immigrant" at the Torch Theatre.

Visitors to the school during the year included two members of the U.S.A. Mormon basketball team, a Mr. Pocklington who had travelled in Tibet, Mr. Mel. Morris (well known sporting commentator) and Mr. Harry Curtis (former star League footballer).

House Sports Results: Bluegum 309, Orchid 302, Clematis 211, Wattle 267.

The school won the life-saving premiership of Victoria, in open competition with adult bayside clubs. This was the first occasion on which a High School had gained such a high distinction.

Editors of "The Gate" were Mildred Carpenter and Ken Griffiths.

Dave Morris and Trevor Jones won trebles at the Combined Athletic Sports.

1940

Leaving Honours (Matriculation) classes were instituted.

Because of the outbreak of war, it was decided that after the Annual Ball

the Old Pupils' Association be disbanded until circumstances were more favourable.

Mr. Henry left the teaching staff to take up a position as Headmaster of Maryborough High School.

Miss Jessie Mitchell, who joined the teaching staff in 1939, and who was an original student of the school, transferred to the Matthew Flinders Girls' School in Geelong. She subsequently returned to Dandenong, and retired in 1967 as Senior Mistress of the School.

From "The Gate" — **The Berwick Bus:** The Berwick Bus is green and white, As o'er the hill it comes in sight.

A groan goes up, "Here comes the tub",

Then there is a great hubbub".

Owing to the acute shortage of teachers, woodwork had been discontinued temporarily as a school subject. Inspectors reported that short answer tests used at the Intermediate level were generally ineffective, except in the hands of very experienced teachers.

The Headmaster (Mr. J. L. Griffiths) approached the Shire Council with a plan to utilize more fully Hemmings Park as a sports ground.

At an Entertainment on 24th September, a detective comedy, "The Man on the Sofa", was presented. Players were: Ronald Weeks, Max McCallum, Helen Pagan, Marion Dawson, Jean Sinclair, Kenneth Griffiths, Joan Taylor, Maurice Nixon, John Griggs and Betty Crump.

1941

The Editorial Committee of "The Gate" consisted of R. Westmoreland, F. Adamson, K. Child, T. Whitehead, J. Sinclair, P. Johns.

Flight-Lieutenant Austin Lewin, an ex-student, was killed on a daylight raid over Germany while serving with the R.A.F.

The football team won six of the eight matches played, but was twice defeated by Frankston.

At the Combined Sports, the hockey girls gained three first places in the hockey dribble. In individual events, K. Murphy, W. Adamson, G. Brown and E. Mitchell gained first places, and the girls also won the intermediate shuttle relay.

The school won the Life Saving Premiership of Victoria for the third consecutive year.

News of ex-students: Elvie Adamson (Melbourne Hospital), Max McCallum (Bank of N.S.W.), Harry Garlick and Cliff Hunt (graduated in Medicine). Doris Crockett was awarded a Free Place to the University of Melbourne.

A new brown rubber flooring, incorporating the school crest, was provided for the entrance hall by the Ladies' Welfare Club.

1942

8000 eggs were collected for the hospitals. Wattle collected the most.

Mr. C. C. Fisher was appointed as Headmaster of Castlemaine High School.

The teaching staff requested the Advisory Council to take action against "the intolerable stench emanating from the Council rubbish tip".

1944

The Education Department authorised the erection of an Assembly Hall to seat 1000 persons, on the understanding that the Advisory Council would contribute £3000 towards the cost over a period of

five years.

A Concert was held on 22nd August. Lois Nicholson, Pat Hosking, Bob Wills, Wilma Trewern, John Dawson and Andrew Brown presented a one-act play — "The Dear Departed."

Editors of "The Gate" were Shirley Lewis and Robert Wills.

Ex-students at the University included Doris Crockett, Marion Dawson, Muriel Dowling, Alison McKenzie, Gillian Ward, Robert Canterbury.

Elaine Brumley finished her B.A. Degree with First Class Honours in Classical Philology, and won the H.B. Higgins Scholarship, the Wyselaskie Scholarship and the R.G. Wilson Prize.

Margaret Smith won the Dr. Jeffrey Ward Gold Medal, presented annually to the most outstanding nurse of the year (Children's Hospital).

Miss Egerton left the staff to take up a position on promotion to Ararat High School.

For the first time in many years a boxing tournament was conducted, with Mr. Jones in charge. Bluegum proved to be the best House in this sport.

An ex-D.H.S. Hockey Club was formed and captained by Edna Cascoigne. During the year the team was unbeaten in the Victorian Women's Hockey Association, B. Grade.

Wattle collected 3,742 of the total 11,752 eggs collected for the hospitals.

Produced by Miss E. S. Carpenter, "Daddy Long-Legs" was presented by the school at the Town Hall.

Trevor Birchill and Archie Cashmore received the Award of Merit from the Royal Life Saving Society.

1945

Inspectors' report: "The school has secured permissive occupancy of mili-

tary hospital huts for overflow classes and this has relieved congestion in the main building for the present."

"The ceiling and walls are discoloured through leakage from drainpipes in the Science room" (this continued until 1967!).

"More than £700 has been raised for a School Hall."

Mrs. Randall retired in this year as school cleaner, a position she had occupied since the establishment of the school in 1919. Her place was taken by her daughter, Mrs. Lambert, who still holds the position, and carries out her duties in the best family tradition.

Ladies' Welfare Club in this year had Mrs. Griffiths as President, Mrs. Richards as Secretary and Mrs. Pike as Treasurer.

Ex-students who returned home after release as prisoners-of-war included: Harry Bishop, Ian Jack, Dudley McLerie, Douglas Brumley, Keith Nicholson, Dal Lethbridge, Keith McKay.

The first school orchestra was formed with staff assistance from Misses Cantwell, Carpenter and Thompson.

Corporal William Lancaster, a former member of the staff, died on 7th June, while a prisoner-of-war in Borneo.

Inspectors' report — "the main building is structurally sound but in urgent need of repair and renovation." (this was done in 1967-68!).

The Assembly Hall Fund reached £2,100.

The Old Pupils' Association was again re-formed, but received little support at this stage.

Following the transfer on promotion of Miss Carpenter, Miss V. Armstrong commenced duty as Senior Mistress.

The Hon. Francis Field, Minister of Public Instruction, presented to the school a water colour of the Dandenong Creek by Kenneth Jack.

The "Sun News-Pictorial" announced that Frankston won at the Metropolitan High Schools Sports. In fact, the honours went to Dandenong!

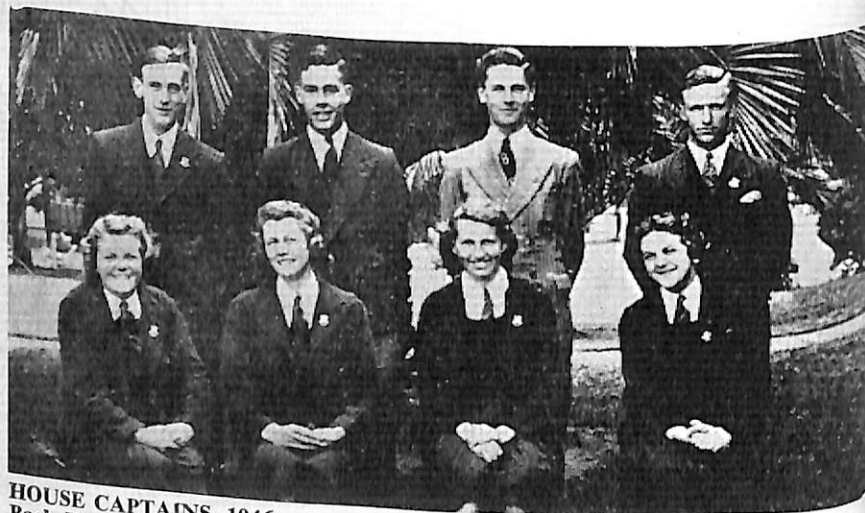

1949

1950

Inspector's report: "the two new tennis courts are now completed, the area for basket ball has been extended and the oval is now in excellent order."

Mr. Langford returned to the school as a temporary member of staff.

The school won the Inter-school Athletic Carnival, with wins in their events to M. Smith, R. Diggins, B. Ridd, G. Maughan, D. Rose, J. Ellis, C. Young, D. Biles. The events were held on the D.H.S. oval, which had been carefully prepared by Mr. Hector Randall. Senior socials, previously held at the school (Rooms 23 and 24) were for the first time conducted in the Scout Hall.

For the Hospital Appeal, 1759 dozen eggs were collected, with Orchid the winning House (701 dozen).

Miss O. T. Smith left the staff, to become Headmistress of Richmond Girls' School.

Four pre-fabricated rooms were erected at the rear of the main building ("The Bristol"). A detached room used for commercial work was moved to the western boundary ("Siberia").

Inspectors' report — "The Headmaster has this year reached the retiring age, after many years' service as a senior officer of the Department. During that period he has been prominent in the management of large secondary schools, in the training of teachers as well as in other professional activities and consequently has played an important part in the development of the present State Secondary system. The Secondary Inspectors wish to place on record their appreciation of the contribution he has thus made to Victorian education and to wish him a long and happy period of retirement." (A reference to the retirement of Mr. J. L. Griffiths in this year.)

Headmaster, 1953-1957**

Mr. Andrews trained at the Melbourne Teachers' College during the period 1917-1920, and graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Science, and subsequently as Bachelor of Education. From 1921 until 1939, he taught science and mathematics at Ballarat, Essendon, Geelong, Mildura and Kyneton High Schools. In 1940, he commenced his long and distinguished career in school administration, first as Headmaster of

Warrnambool High School (1940-1947), and later at Camberwell (1948-1952) and Dandenong (1953-1957).

In 1958, he returned as Principal of Camberwell and occupied one of the senior positions in the service. Mr. Andrews remained at Camberwell until his retirement from the Education Department in 1965. During his career he occupied various positions of professional distinction, including that of President of the Victorian High Schools Principals Association, and as a member of the Australian College of Education. 1955

and each graduated in Science from the University of Melbourne. The eldest daughter Gillian, was subsequently awarded the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, while engaged in research work in England.

HEADMASTER, 1958-1964

Mr. Cooke entered the Education Department in 1922, as a Junior Teacher at Eastern Road State School, South Melbourne. In the same year he was awarded a Senior Government Scholarship and a Secondary Studentship to Melbourne University, from where he graduated Bachelor of Science in 1924 and Diploma of Education in 1925.

His first secondary teaching appointment was to Castlemaine High School in 1926, followed by subsequent transfers on promotion to Donald, Frankston, Melbourne and University High Schools. In 1944, Mr. Cooke became Lecturer in Methods of Science and Mathematics at

the University of Melbourne, and in 1954 was appointed Vice-Principal of University High School. In 1956 he received his first appointment as Headmaster, to the new Benteleigh High School, and transferred on promotion to Dandenong in 1958, and then to Brighton High School as Principal in 1965, to occupy one of the most senior positions in the service.

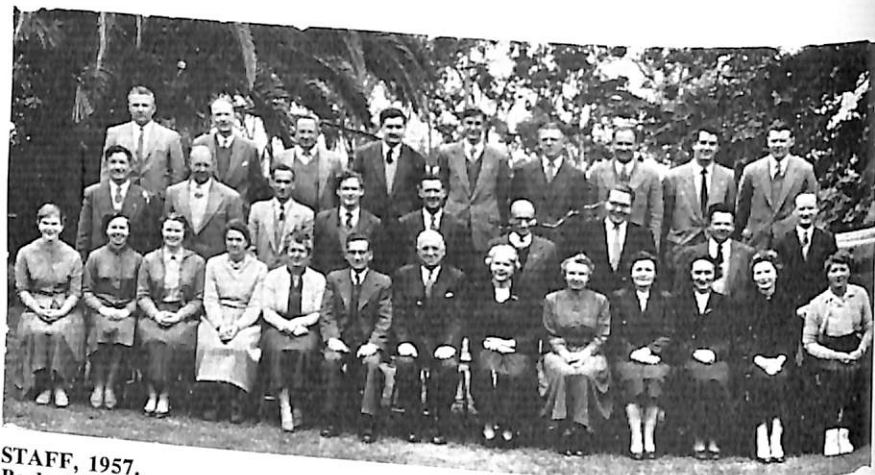

Headmaster, 1965-**

After 1½ years as a Junior Teacher at S.S. Brunswick South-West, Mr. Mitchell completed a one year primary teacher training course at Bendigo Teachers' College in 1929. He was then in charge of one teacher rural schools, returning to Melbourne in 1935, to undertake a nominated course at Melbourne University. During this period he taught full time at Collingwood and Footscray Technical Schools, and completed degrees in Arts, Commerce and Education. Subsequently he transferred to the Second

dary Schools Division, and taught at Mildura, Horsham, Warrnambool and Bendigo High Schools.

In 1959, Mr. Mitchell was appointed as Headmaster of Newlands High School, and was responsible for the development of that school over the first four years of its establishment. Subsequently he carried out the same pioneering work at Thornbury High School during the period 1963-64, and in 1965 was appointed to Dandenong High School as Headmaster, a position he still occupies under the new title of Principal.

In 1960, he was admitted as a member of the Australian College of Education.

Mr. K. B. Mitchell commenced duty as Headmaster, after having filled this position at Newlands and Thornbury High Schools.

The canteen was firmly established, and making a major contribution to school funds. Mrs. G. Howard, assisted by Mrs. D. Hawkeworth, was doing a fine job as supervisor, and the voluntary assistants associated with the Mothers' Club were making an outstanding contribution.

The second formal Sixth Form Dinner was held at Monash University. The Chairman was Albert Callewaert (Senior Prefect), and the Guest Speaker was Dr. K. R. Griffiths, M.B., B.S., a former Senior Prefect of the School.

The death occurred in this year of Mr. F. A. Singleton, who had served the school for many years as member and President of the Advisory Council.

Mrs. J. Barlee resigned from the Advisory Council, after years of service to the school.

The Secretary was asked to note in the minutes Advisory Council's awareness and appreciation of the emphasis being placed on scholarship throughout the school, and of the new system of reporting on students, which was being introduced on an experimental basis.

Students, under the supervision of Mr. Szidat and Mr. Adams, had produced and screened a film showing many aspects of the school year.

Mrs. Filcock was President of the Mothers' Club, Mrs. Pretty was Secretary and Mrs. Hall, Treasurer.

Senior students demonstrated within the city area, in support of teachers' demands for better school conditions.

School Prefects — the last group to be elected under the traditional system — were Christine Bates, Brenda Baxter, Robyn Browne, Mary Cameron, Pauline Yates, Karen Jolly (Senior), Glenise Rice, Robyn Golding, Anna Dackiw, Cheryl Sangwell, Ian Berry, Gilbert Augustin, Colin Smith, Bruce Filcock, Graeme Schmutter, Ross Gilham, Geoff. Hayres, George de George, Ray Pateron, Albert Callewaert (Senior).

Conductors of House Choirs were Christine Yates, Pauline Yates (Orchid); Judy Stubbs, John Finning (Wattle); Jenny O'Dea, Anna Dackiw (Clematis); Sue Jarvis, Lilian Frankel (Bluegum).

The Prefect system was abolished, and all students of Form 6 were requested to accept responsibility and service in association with a wide range of Committees established to suit their individual interests.

Cr. R. K. Wagstaff, an ex-student of the school, was appointed as Mayor of Dandenong.

The new wing was completed late in the year, including a fine Commonwealth Science block, new woodwork rooms and additional specialist classrooms. The old section of the building was remodelled, providing additional staff and library amenities.

The Sixth Form Dinner was held at "The Windsor". Guest Speaker was Miss

Houston, a former Senior Mistress.

Under new Government regulations, all Advisory Councils were to include two representatives of the Mothers' Club — Mrs. B. E. M. Francis and Mrs. C. J. Hendrick were nominated to fill these positions.

Form 4 students of this year were the last groups to sit for the Intermediate examinations, to be abolished.

Mr. Max Oldmeadow, after a long association with the school as student and teacher, received promotion for 1968, as Senior Master at Doveton High School.

Karen Jolly, Brenda Baxter, Robyn Brown, Glenise Rice, Linda Robins, Cheryl Sangwell, Robert Walsh and Helene Wilton were all at Frankston Teachers' College.

A Students' Representative Council was formed, with John Finning as Chairman, and including representatives from all forms.

Sixty-six students and seven teachers toured Central Australia (4,054 miles, 16 days).

The Assembly Hall, for which fund raising commenced in 1944, was completed and occupied early in the year. This beautiful and functional building immediately became the long awaited centre of the social and cultural life of the school.

Committees were organized to commence preliminary planning for Jubilee celebrations in 1969.

Wendy Jobbling, a Form 5 student, was selected to represent Victoria in the High Jump at the Australian Women's Athletic Championships.

Accompanied by the Mayor of Dandenong (Cr. R. K. Wagstaff), members of the Duke of Edinburgh's Commonwealth Study Tour visited the school.

Mr. Peter Rich and Mr. Ion Whykes were promoted to senior positions for 1969, Mr. Rich was to remain at Dandenong; Mr. Whykes to go to Pakenham as Senior Master.

Visiting speakers at Assemblies included Pastor Doug Nicholls, Mr. Thorold Merrett; the Minister for Immigration the Hon. B. M. Sneddon, and Mr. Gordon Bryant, M.H.R.

Jennifer Simmons, Lilian Frankel, Carol Gillbee, Helen Aldridge, Susan Johnson, Alison MacLeod, David Brown, Daryl Cheeseman, Geoffrey Elliott, John McPhee, Peter Statton, Peter Whitmore and the Principal attended a Mayoral Reception given to the Governor-General, Lord Casey, and Lady Casey.

Inter-House Debates were adjudicated by Mr. Barry Jones, prominent in academic and television activities, and a former member of the teaching staff. Bluegum won the Senior and Junior sections and Clematis the Intermediate.

The House Choral Festival was held in the Assembly Hall. Conductors were Yvonne Daly, Coralie Hayes (Bluegum);

Helen Stubbs, Annechris Vat (Wattle); Helen Kirkham, Christine Yates (Orchid); Andrew Green, Robyn Pretty (Clematis). The adjudicator (Mrs. Margaret Prior) awarded first place in the Junior section to Orchid, and in the Senior section to Wattle.

Helen Aldridge (Bluegum), Lorri Meers, Alex Kariko (Clematis), Margot Hargrove (Orchid), Lynne Synot (Wattle) were producers of plays entered in the Senior Drama Festival. The adjudicator (Mr. Max Bartlett), awarded first place to Bluegum. The best individual performance award was made to Marilyn Selway.

In September, a very successful Art Exhibition was held in the Assembly Hall over a three day period. On display were some 200 paintings, representative of the work of all age groups, and in addition a fine selection of works in sculpture and the plastic arts.

Mr. Graham Miller, who served the school with distinction as Senior Master, had taken up his appointment as Headmaster of Maribyrnong High School.

In this year, the title of "Principal" was substituted for that of "Headmaster" in all Victorian High Schools.

The school won the aggregate and the boys section awards at the Athletic Sports of the East Section, Monash Division, Metropolitan High Schools Sports Association.

Members of the office staff were Mrs. E. J. Funston, Miss H. L. Nichols and Miss A. L. Ellis. The school maintenance staff consisted of Mr. H. T. Randall, Mrs. N. Lambert, Mr. J. Whitehead, Mr. W. Dow, Mrs. S. J. Whitehead, and Mrs. F. Senior. "Hec" had completed 40 years of service to the school.

The Rev. K. Heath had completed his fourth year as School Chaplain, and continued to make a major contribution to the moral, social and economic welfare of his charges.



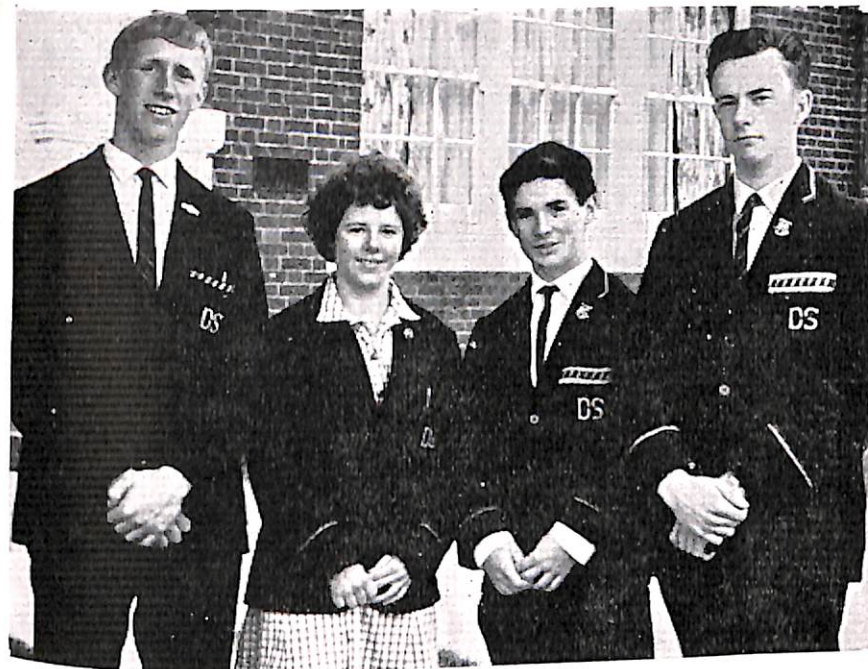

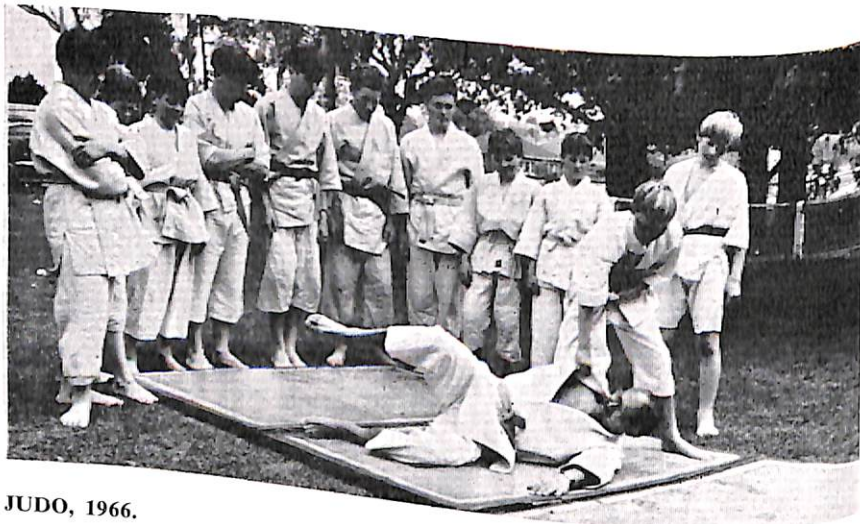

In 1967, the traditional Prefect system was abolished, in favour of one which aimed at involving all senior students in an area of responsibility within the school environment. This resulted from problems of leadership associated with a large senior student body (up to 300 in Forms 5 and 6), and from the comparatively big intake each year of Matriculation students from area schools.

All senior students were invited to join a Committee suited to individual interests and abilities, and to accept responsibility and leadership within such groups. The plan is still in its experimental stages but has gained wide student acceptance, and has already produced leadership in a form which was sometimes lacking under the Prefect system.

The editor regrets any omissions which may have resulted from incomplete records. A tribute is paid to three members of Council in particular. Mr. F. A. Singleton was a member of the original Advisory Council, formed in 1919, and on the resignation of the Rev. H. Buntine, as President in 1924, was unanimously elected to the position, which he held with distinction until his resignation in 1953 — a period of 30 years. The same period of service was given by Mr. J. W. McAfee, who gave devoted and practical attention to the advancement of the school both as member and as office-bearer. On the resignation of Mr. Singleton, the office of President passed to Mr. C. G. Hartley, who has now occupied the position for 16 years, and continues to give the school the benefit of his commercial and social experience.

THE TEACHING STAFF

Nearly 400 Victoria Education Department teachers have served on the staff of the school over the fifty year period. This is not a large staff turnover, and is an indication of what has become almost a tradition of long association with the school by many individual members of staff. Some have remained without a break, others have returned to the staff on separate occasions. This is not the general pattern in Victorian secondary schools, and must surely be regarded as a manifestation of what can be loosely defined as the development of a school tradition.

Many of those whose names appear on the list have subsequently achieved distinction within the Education Department, and in other career activities. All have shared, according to their differing qualities and abilities, in the development of a great school.

Every effort has been made to present a list which includes the name of every teacher who served the school. However, records are not always complete, and there may be omissions and inaccuracies. If so, this is to be regretted, and the Principal would welcome further details which would enable him to amend the list. In general, where a female teacher married, and rejoined the staff, her maiden name only has been included in the list.

FACTORS INFLUENCING MAJOR MOVEMENTS IN ENROLMENT OVER THE PERIOD 1919-1968

From 1919 to 1930 there was a steady annual increase in enrolment, consequent on the normal development of the school, the provision of additional transport facilities from rural areas, and an increasing awareness of the benefits resulting from a secondary education.

This movement was reversed during the period 1930 to 1935, and total enrolment had dropped to just over 200. This was partly due to the effects of a major economic depression, which forced many young people to enter commerce and industry, but an additional reason was the imposition of tuition fees, payable at all form levels by students attending secondary schools. From 1935 to 1953 there was a further period of steady growth punctuated by a fall during the years 1945 to 1947 consequent on a new zoning system, and by a marked rise in 1953 due to the extension of bus services.

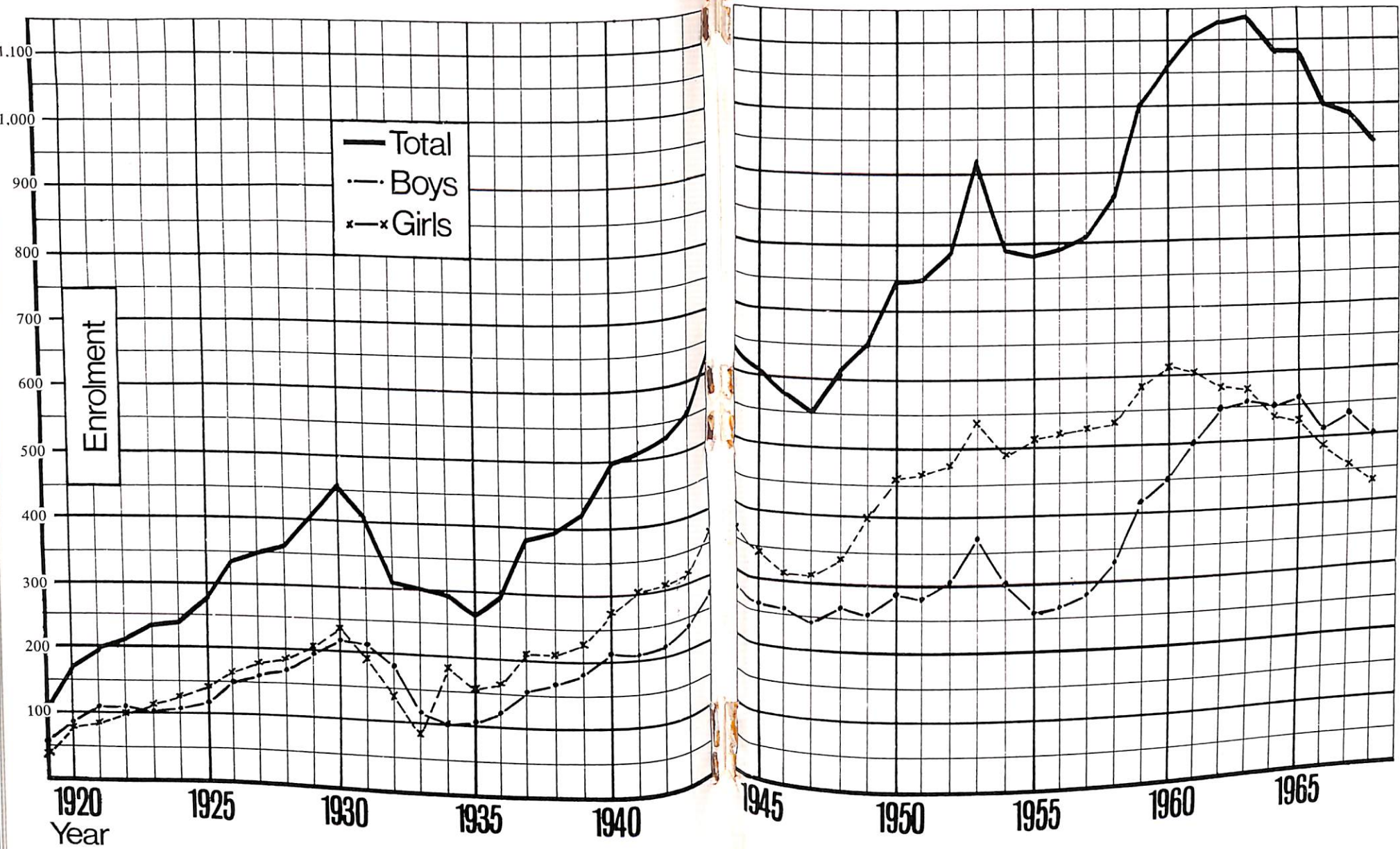
To this stage, the school had been taking students from an area extending westwards to Oakleigh and eastwards to Waragul. During the period 1953-1961 High Schools were established at Springvale (1953), Dandenong (1957), Doveton (1960), Noble Park (1961), Lyndale (1961)

and a Technical School at Dandenong (1953). This temporarily levelled out D.H.S. enrolment at about 800, but remarkable growth again followed, to reach an all time high of 1,140 in 1963. This was due mainly to extraordinary industrial activity within the City of Dandenong, now virtually the zoned area of the school, and the attraction to the city of a greatly increased population.

From 1963, there has been another fall in the school population, which it is expected will settle around the 900 student level. This has resulted from the development and extension of the other secondary schools in the area, now in most cases able to provide full courses at all levels. A feature of the D.H.S. enrolment pattern remains the establishment in each year of a large Form VI, usually over 100, with a very wide range of subjects available for study.

As indicated by the enrolment graph, for the approximate period 1933-1960, there was a marked disparity between numbers of boys and girls in attendance. This followed from the introduction of domestic science and commercial courses for girls in 1933, and tended to remain the pattern until the early 1960's, when the Dandenong Girls' High School had become fully established, and D.H.S. teaching was directed more towards entrance to some form of tertiary education.
