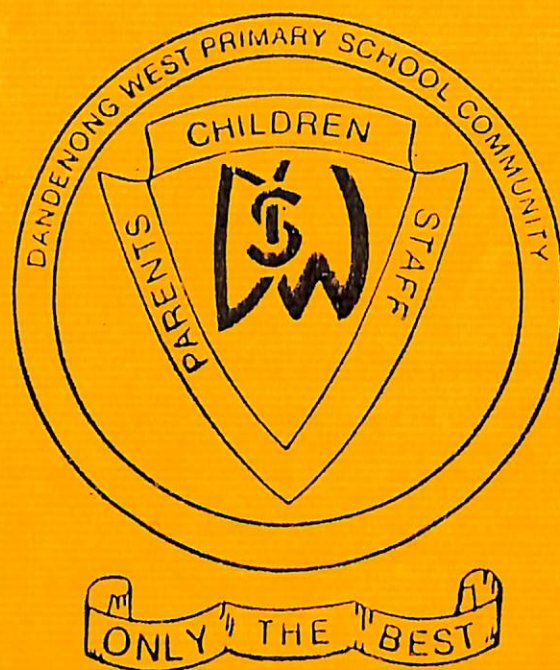

## TWO LADIES BEGIN IT ALL!

In the year 1923, two ladies, namely, Mrs. Downey and Mrs. Hugh Murray (wife of the founder of Hugh Murray & Son), took the initiative in starting a movement for a new school in the West of Dandenong. At that time there was an organisation known as the Dandenong Improvement Association, with Mr. E. C. Butler as President, Mr. A. Branston as Secretary, and another well-known member was Mr. W. F. Roulston, prop. of "Dandenong Journal", all who gave their support in preparing a case to put to the then Minister of Public Instruction, Sir Alexander Peacock.

## SITE PURCHASED

Portion of the present site, consisting of over 2 acres, was purchased for £910 (\$1,820) and eventually a contract was let to Jas. C. Brockey & Sons, of Black Rock, for the sum of £8,900 (\$17,800) to erect an eight class room brick school to accommodate 420 pupils. It is on record that the school was completed 10 weeks ahead of time.

## SCHOOL OPENED IN 1925

The article in a September issue of the "Dandenong Journal" in 1925 tells of the official opening of the school on Wednesday, 26th August, 1925. It was a gala occasion — a public half holiday was declared within the Shire of Dandenong and the records show that it was the largest crowd seen in Dandenong (excepting Dandenong Show Day). What a fun day for the youngsters — Punch and Judy Show, Merry Go Round, Ocean Wave, children's sports, and the big marquee where that band of 24 ladies were preparing luncheon from 9 a.m. for an expected 1,000 visitors.

The Victorian Government was represented by Sir Alexander Peacock, Minister of Public Instruction; Mr. F. Groves, M.L.A. and Mr. Cotter, M.L.A. The foundation stone was laid by Mr. Frank Groves, M.L.A., who was presented with the silver trowel with which he had laid the stone.

Mr. A. Branston, secretary of Dandenong Improvement Association, unfurled the Union Jack, while a presentation of a gold key was made to Sir Alexander Peacock to open the new building.

The infant room was the venue for afternoon tea for the official guests. The toast to the visitors was proposed by Cr. W. B. Tharle and supported by Rev. F. E. Lewin and Mr. A. Branston. As far as the records show this concluded the official function, but outside in the school ground children of all ages were enjoying the sports, entertainment, sweets, etc.

## STARTED WITH 229 PUPILS

On the day school opened, a total of 229 students were enrolled; 180 transferred from Dandenong S.S. 1403, 24 from Noble Park and 7 youngsters attending for the first time on that day. (Later in this booklet we will trace the growth of the school, both in classrooms and pupils).

## JAMES HILLARD WAS FIRST "HEAD"

The first head teacher was Mr. James Hillard who was promoted from the position of head teacher of Noble Park. At the time of his appointment little did he realize the difficulties that were ahead — a school in an area that had many acres of land yet to be built on, unmade roads, Jones Road from the highway to Railway Bridge, Birdwood Avenue and Hemming Street from Potter Street, but undaunted by this with the West Progress Association he collected money with which eventually, on £1 for £1 basis from the Government, gravel was procured and working bees held to form, first, roads in Birdwood Avenue and Jones Road. Then came the depression and funds needed for school improvements were no longer available, but undaunted and with the loyal support of teachers, committee and Mothers' Club, the school progressed slowly. It was during this period that school attendance rose to 390 students and by the time of Mr. Hillard being transferred from Dandenong West, the numbers had fallen to 300.

Many of us who were privileged to be students under his care and guidance are ever thankful for his friendship, moral training to help us to become good citizens.

### MORE CLASSROOMS ADDED

After Mr. Hillard transferred on 24th July, 1937, there were eight head teachers appointed within the next 15 years. In 1949, 2 portable classrooms were added, then in 1963 a further 2 classrooms were added.

Towards the end of 1954, Mr. Ron Macdonald was appointed head master. He took up his appointment at the commencement of the school year in 1955. Before that he had been at the Bendigo Teachers' College. At the time of his appointment, I doubt if Mr. Macdonald could have envisaged the challenge that he was to face over the next few years. He came to a school with 569 pupils, 12 classrooms; also grade V and VI from Dandenong North were attending Dandenong West. In 1956 one additional classroom was opened and in spite of a transfer of 71 children to the new Harrisfield School, numbers kept growing. In 1957, attendance soared to 609, with some infant grades being accommodated at St. Luke's Hall. Two more classrooms were added in 1958. By this time the attendance reached 673 in 15 classrooms. September 1958 saw the transfer of 73 pupils to Yarraman Park, which gave temporary relief. At this stage 20 pupils were accommodated in a corridor. The school attendance was still growing and, by February 1966, 2 more classrooms were opened — the enrolment being 637. The school attendance kept growing and reached a peak of 771 in 1968 and, at the beginning of the school year in 1969, there was a total of 23 classrooms.

## **OPPORTUNITY GRADE STARTED**

It was during the early part of Mr. Macdonald's span that an opportunity grade was commenced at Dandenong West. Many of the pupils of that grade went on to secondary schools, or were able to be apprenticed to trades. In 1965 the opportunity grade was transferred to Yarraman Park.

In 1961 the school was raised to the classification of a special class with Mr. Macdonald receiving promotion to remain in charge of the school.

## **TRAINING SCHOOL STATUS GRANTED**

Dandenong West was proclaimed a training school for students of Frankston Teachers' College in 1962, and in the same year received the highest classification for a Primary School in the Victorian Education Department, as a special class training school.

## **Mr. RON MACDONALD RETIRES AFTER 14 YEARS**

Mr. Macdonald had been in poor health for some time and in March 1969 he retired on this account.

In 1970 Mr. T. C. Chellew took up the appointment as head master — a position he held until 1973. It was during this period that more pupils were transferred to the new school, Chandler Park. As will be seen by the figures in 1970, the enrolment was then 724, but in 1973 it dropped to 626.

In 1974 Mr. W. F. Maher took up his position as head master with an enrolment of 584 students.

## **550 PUPILS TODAY**

This brings us to the 50th anniversary year and the appointment of Mr. D. Culph. There are 550 pupils enrolled. As very often happens with a school of this age there is a large amount of repair and maintenance required. Recently we had read in the local papers, the "Dandenong Journal" and "The News", of the very bad state of repair of the main school, and fences around the oval, but according to present reports this work is to be done within the next few weeks.

## **LIBRARY OPENING IN NOVEMBER**

We will all have the opportunity of seeing the official opening of the library on Saturday, 22nd November. On reading back through minutes of the School Committee, this has been mooted since the early days of the school.

## **FINE SPORTING RECORD**

In the first 50 years, students were encouraged to take up other than the academic subjects. Dandenong West was always to the forefront in athletics, football, basketball, cricket, swimming and, later, softball. (Dandenong West was the starting point for the formation of the Dandenong Softball Association). On reading through the old records we find Dandenong West won the first contest for Primary Schools choirs at the Dandenong Festival in 1957. 1952 saw the commencement of the school magazine "West Wind," and it continued with an unbroken publication for many years.

## SCHOOL MOTTO HAS BUILT A TRADITION

The school motto "Only the Best" has been applied to all facets of school life, and the school, through the staff, has developed a tradition for all to live up to this motto.

The staff, from the day the school opened, up to the present day, has endeavoured to teach not only the classroom subjects, but, initiative, competition, honesty, integrity and loyalty — the results are shown over the passing years by the many, varied and often important positions Ex Students have achieved. We see many of our ex students too, assisting in Community Service Organisations.

### "LEST WE FORGET"

We remember with reverence today those of our fellow ex students who paid the supreme sacrifice in service to their country.

### FIRST SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Dandenong West has been fortunate in having many parents who were always willing to assist with school activities, such as Mothers' Club, School Committee, working bees, etc., and we note firstly from the School Committee minute books the first committee was elected and commenced on 17th February, 1926 — Mr. A. Toyne (chairman), Mr. E. C. Butler (secretary), Mr. E. Cashmore, Mr. W. B. Tharle and Messdames McPherson, Jennings and Wangman. A few extracts from the minutes worth noting:

- Feb. 1926 Neighbouring people be allowed to get domestic water from school.
- Mar. 1926 Tenders received for erection of Shelter Sheds. Mr. W. Brown's tender for £141/15/- accepted.
- July 1926 Council to put down footpath, Birdwood Avenue from Potter Street to school.
- Nov. 1926 Application for electricity for school.
- July 1927 Dandenong West Station league be granted use of room for monthly meeting. Fee: 2/- per meeting.
- June 1931 West Dandenong Athletic Club granted use of room for meeting.
- Feb. 1932 Committee applied for loan of £2 for 3 months from Picnic Committee on individual guarantee.

August 1932 saw the commencement of the envelope system of monthly voluntary contributions which continued right up to 1973. Nowadays it is a yearly donation.

### LEADING ROLE FOR MOTHERS' CLUB

The Mothers' Club, right from the opening day, has played a leading part in the advancement of the school. On opening day they were that band of 24 ladies who prepared food and drinks for that multitude of people; and right through the passing years, they have provided playground equipment, books for the library, teaching aids, projectors, sporting equipment, etc. What a magnificent record the ladies have over all these years! Now for a few extracts from the Club's minutes:

- 1932 45 financial members 1/- per year
- 1933 30 " " " " "
- 1934 27 " " " " "
- April 1931 Children to be entertained at Boomerang Theatre Empire Day.
- July 1932 Euchre parties to be held in Memorial Hall.
- Dec. 1932 Funds low — could only donate £1 towards prizes

but, as always, the Mothers' Club, whilst a most energetic body, had to work under direction of School Committee as far as monies raised were concerned.

It should be stated clearly that Dandenong West, even in the lean years of the depression, was fortunate to have had a hard working Mothers' Club providing the monies that were necessary, and a School Committee ever alert to use up all Departmental subsidies. This has been the story all through the years and is still the same today. So, too, the support from the parents — this was demonstrated in 1974 when a walkathon was organised, raising some \$1,800.

### NOT ONLY THE 3 R's

The school over the years has become more than a place of "the 3 R's". We have seen the following groups formed in that red brick building:

- Dandenong West Station League
- Dandenong West Progress Association
- Dandenong West Football Club
- Dandenong West Cricket Club
- Dandenong West Athletic Club

Dandenong West has been fortunate in the assistance given by the various State Parliamentarians of the day — Mr. Frank Groves, Mr. Frank Field, Mr. Ray Wiltshire, Mr. Len Reid and Mr. Alan Lind. To all these gentlemen, on behalf of Staff, Parents and Pupils, we say a big "thank you."

### MAJOR EVENTS:

1975

Opening of the new school Library to coincide with the 50th. Anniversary celebrations.

Formation of a "Back to Dandenong West" Committee. 50th. Anniversary celebrations including an Open Day at the school. Dinner dance at Menzies Avenue Hall in North Dandenong.

1976

Our first "Carols by Candlelight" held on the school oval. End of year concerts now held at the Dandenong High School Hall.

1977

School Fete held in October.

Nature garden established adjacent to the main entrance of the school. Upgraded and restructured in 1985 by the State Schools' Nursery.

Large scale buildings' renovations program commenced late in 1977.

First major Multicultural Week with a full Library display.

1978

Renovation program continued to include re-siting of the toilet block, brick veneering of the wooden classrooms, renewing of the ceilings, laying of linoleum on the floors, renewal of chalkboards in the main building and renovation of the Library and linking of this facility to the main building with a covered way.

Establishment of an Adventure Playground with assistance from the Dandenong Council to form a Community Playground.

1980

Introduction of the Supplementary Grants Program. Inclusion of the school in the Facilities Grants Program.

1982-83

Through the Supplementary Grants Program, the establishment of a "Kalparri" Committee ("Kalparri" - an aboriginal word meaning "held carry a heavy load") to assist with social and welfare problems. Our first welfare worker was Mr. Stephen Dorian. The present welfare worker is Mrs. Anne Tandy and our program aide since 1983 has been Mrs. Jan. Sherlock.

Construction of Drop-In-Centre for parents. Photography development room established. Renovation of Bristol building to include kitchen, storage and toilet facilities. Cyclone wire fencing erected around school boundaries. Benga Avenue garden area established. Roofing of assembly area project completed under Facilities Grants Program and \$1 for \$1 Grants Program.

1984 - Computer Room established.

1985 - Extensive landscape gardening project carried out by the State Schools' Nursery under the Facilities Grants Program.

School Improvement Plan initiated.

Security fencing erected around courtyard/ assembly areas.

Extensive funding provided through the Facilities Grants Program for a total upgrade of the Adventure Playground. Significant local contributions made towards new playground equipment.

Additional relocatable classroom provided and covered way constructed.

Sixtieth Anniversary celebrations held.

Reprint of the report in "The South Bourke and Mornington Journal" (now "The Dandenong Journal") of the Formal Opening Ceremony of Dandenong West Primary School on Thursday September 3rd. 1925.

FORMAL OPENING CEREMONY:

Ideal spring weather was experienced on Wednesday, afternoon, 26th. ult., the date chosen for the opening of the splendid school just erected at Dandenong West. Dandenong is rapidly expanding in every direction and it has been long evident that one State School was not nearly sufficient for requirements. Residents, assisted by the Improvement Association, have been agitating since 1922 for a school at Dandenong West, and a petition was sent to the Department in November of that year, through Mr. F. Groves, M.L.A. The district inspector, Mr. Burgess, recommended that the school on a site of nearly 2½ Acres fronting Birdwood Avenue, Jones Road, and another street, the land being purchased for £910. It was first intended to erect a school for 300 pupils, but it was found that it would be necessary to accommodate at least 400. Mr. Toucher, who was then the Minister for Education, approved of a tender by Messrs. Brockey and Sons at £8,750, and no time was lost in commencing the work. When the building was well advanced, a provisional committee of members of the Improvement Association and other residents was formed to make preparation for a suitable opening ceremony. Numerous meetings were held and the ladies committee with Mrs. Downey as president, and Mrs. Toyne as secretary was very active. Cr. Butler president of the Association and Mr. A. Branston (he was a local dentist) secretary were elected Chairman and Secretary respectively of the provisional committee and they, with other members and the ladies committee, spared neither time nor trouble to ensure the success of the proceedings. Immediately the date of the opening was definitely known, a half holiday for district schools was proclaimed by the Shire Council, invitations being sent to the head teachers and staffs, leading Politicians and others. The Minister for Education (Sir Alexander Peacock) consented to perform the opening ceremony. Mr. Groves agreed to place the foundation stone.

Great interest was taken on all sides of the proceedings and a combined schools picnic and sports was decided on. It was quickly seen that arrangements would have to be made to cater for about 1,000 school children, and at least an equal number of adults. Residents responded liberally to appeals for cash donations and supplies of cakes, meat, tea, sugar, etc., so that on the appointed day there was enough and to spare for all. The general arrangements were excellent, the children receiving their supplies in large and convenient paper bags with handles attached, while the adults were accommodated at a large marquee, everyone being attended to without delay or confusion. A Merry-go-round and ocean wave were engaged, and were well patronised all the afternoon, and an Ice-cream and sweets stall also did a thriving business. In addition there were sports and games for the younger generation who have every reason to remember the gathering with pleasure. As anticipated, there were over 2,000 present, including 1,000 pupils from Dandenong, Noble Park, and Bangholme schools and Dandenong High School, and the really great work of providing for this number was carried out in a manner which reflects the highest credit on all concerned, particularly the ladies Committee.

Perhaps the chief attraction of the day was the school itself; it was literally invaded all day, everybody making a more or less critical inspection. There was no doubt of the buildings being approved, opinions were unanimous that it was a magnificent building, worthy of the Department and District. The school well deserves all the praise it received. It is a splendidly built and imposing structure, in an elevated position, and with beautiful surroundings. There are eight large classrooms, each 26 ft. 6 ins. by 24 ft., also teachers' room and office with a long wide corridor. With a space of 10 sq. ft. for each pupil the school will conveniently accommodate 405, and allowance of 12 sq. ft., 420 can be accommodated. Each room has a fire place and every provision is made for health, comfort and satisfactory instruction. The building is solidly constructed of brick with tile roof, and ventilation, sanitation, light and warmth adequately provided. Electric light and water are installed, and fittings and furniture of the most modern and approved description, and there are cabinets, cupboards, washing basins, drinking taps and other conveniences in easily accessible positions.

The playground is divided for boys and girls and is perhaps a trifle cramped, although there is plenty of room at present on the vacant land adjoining. This however is not likely to be always available and the Committee should not delay in urging the Department to purchase more land for play grounds and probable school extensions. A Working Bee consisting of members of the Committee planted about 50 Mahogany gums and other trees on the southern side of the grounds, and if these thrive properly they will be of great benefit in a few years, also being ornamental, but will need a fair amount of attention. Several drinking taps are provided in the grounds, also necessary out-buildings. Besides expressing complete approval of the school and appointments many visitors congratulated Mr. J. Hillard of Noble Park school on being appointed the first Head Teacher.

MORE LAND

Cr. Butler complimented Mr. Groves on the interest he had taken in the district and said that it was desired to make sure of more land. While the Minister and Mr. Groves were there, the speaker suggested that they inspect the grounds, and that the Minister recommend to the Department to purchase another ½ acre while it could be bought cheaply.

BANQUET

The Minister and Mr. and Mrs. Groves, clergymen and other visitors were entertained at a banquet in the school, Cr. Butler presiding.
