ing, coercing women to bake cakes and man stalls, and during the past 18 months concerned with day-to-day running of the kindergarten.

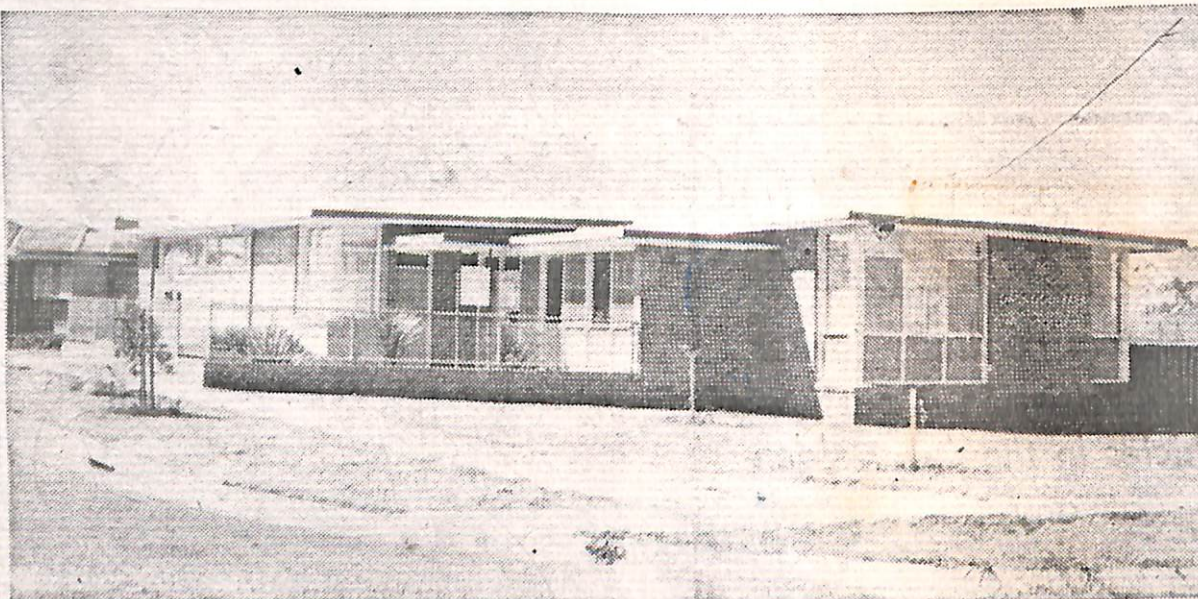

Mr and Mrs G. A. Hellyer. Mr Hellyer was a member of the team that plied their way backwards and forwards over the district collecting items that were eventually turned into cash. Mrs Hellyer: Ladies' auxiliary president for a number of years. Called the public meeting which culminated in a committee being formed to establish the building. 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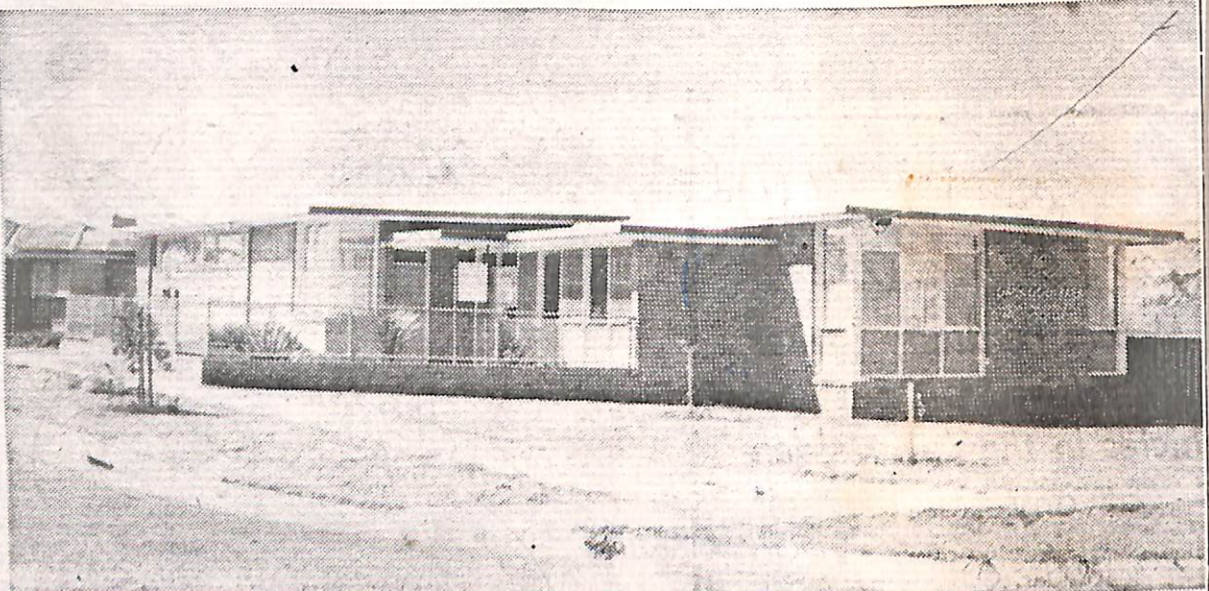

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COTTAGE ON PARK GUTTED

A four-roomed weatherboard cottage, on the historic Oakwood Park Estate, corner Mollison and Irving Streets, was totally gutted by fire in a spectacular early evening blaze last Saturday.

It was one of the original buildings connected with the old homestead, and had been used latterly by the local Pre-School to store waste paper and rags from their rag drives.

The Brigade was first alerted at 5.45 p.m., and from then on the switchboard was jammed with 15 telephone calls being received in a matter of minutes. The flames were reaching far into the air and smoke was clearly visible from the Brigade Station.

Sub-Station Officer L. Smith and P. F. Fawcett and a crew of volunteers rushed to the scene in the First Aid Unit, and worked for 1½ hours, running out 800 ft. of 2½-in. hose in an effort to quell the flames. They pumped water from two separate hydrants in Mollison St.

The buildings are now owned by the County Roads Board, and the cottage was on the site of the proposed new rink road.

Oakwood Park Infant Centre

The Department of Health forwarded Dandenong Council last week formal approval of the opening of the temporary infant welfare centre at Oakwood Park subject to the front porch being enclosed as a pram park, and the Health Commission reserving the right to issue any electrical requirements after an official electrical inspection.

OAKWOOD PARK

A public meeting will be held in the Health Centre, Heyington Cres, Oakwood Park, on Wednesday, October 17, to elect a committee to work for a new Health Centre and pre-school building.

The meeting, to start at 8 p.m., will be chaired by Cr. Downard.

The Oakwood Park Infant Welfare Committee has worked hard to establish a temporary health centre but this building will have to be demolished when the ring road is constructed.

Although the Government gives the committee a grant on a £2 to £1 basis a strong committee is needed to raise funds.

All Oakwood Park residents are urged to attend this important meeting.

On November 3, a barbecue and bonfire will be held in the parkland off Mollison St.

Centre grant

Dandenong. — The Minister of Health, Mr. Dickie, has advised Mr. G. Chandler M.L.C., that a capital grant of \$12,000, on a \$2 for \$1 basis, will be made to the City of Dandenong.

The grant is for construction of a combined pre-school and infant welfare centre at Oakwood Park.

PRE-SCHOOL GRANT REJECTED

Oakwood Park. — The Minister of Health has turned down an application by Dandenong Council for a grant for a combined infant welfare and pre-school centre at Oakwood Park but promises favorable consideration later this financial year or high priority next year.

A suggestion by the Town Clerk, Mr. Cal Elliott, that council could consider going ahead with the project provided the Department of Health would make money available later was deferred until a reply was received from the department.

Mr. Elliott said he had written to the Department of Health asking if it would make the grant available at a later date if council went ahead with the building.

"I would suggest that council could consider going ahead with the building if the answer is favorable," he said. "The committee has money in hand and the plans are nearing completion."

Oakwood Park Pre-School must raise £2100

Before applying for a Government grant for the proposed infant welfare and pre-school centre at Oakwood Park, Dandenong Council will require an undertaking from the local committee to raise £2100 towards the actual cost of the pre-school.

This was decided last week by council on the recommendation of the recreation committee which had received a deputation from the infant welfare and pre-school committee.

Other recommendations which were adopted were:

• When the land in Heyington Cres. has been formally transferred to the council, a notice will be erected on the site indicating that it is the site for the proposed centre.

• A modified plan similar to that to be used for the new pre-school centre at Dandenong North would be more suitable for the Oakwood Park site. (The deputation had asked if it would be possible to use the same plan as Yarraman Park with any necessary modifications).

PRE-SCHOOL

Oakwood Park. — Parents of pre-school age children in Oakwood Park will be delighted to learn that tenders have been called for the combined infant welfare and pre-school centre, to be built at the corner of Kingswood Cr. and Briarfield Rd.

It is hoped that the centre will be open by mid-year. Enrolment forms are being prepared and will soon be available. Interested parents should watch the notice boards at the health centre in Heyington Cr. or near the shops in Stevenson Ave. Further information will also be published in The Journal.

Land for Child Centre at Oakwood Park

Enquiries had not been finalised into the purchase of land for an infant welfare centre at Oakwood Park, said the City Engineer (Mr. Wright) at last week's Dandenong Council meeting.

Replying to Cr. Donnelly, Mr. Wright said he and the Town Clerk (Mr. Elliott) had inspected three lots of land which were considered suitable. They were awaiting a reply in connection with a fourth block. One of those inspected had changed hands and was not now available.

PRE-SCHOOL PLANS

Oakwood Park Pre-school committee was delighted to learn that Dandenong Council has purchased two blocks of land at the cor-

ner of Kingswood Cres. and Briarfield Rd., and that plans for the new centre will shortly be drawn up by council's architect.

The committee has sufficient money in hand for the furnishings but more funds are still needed.

To raise further funds, a bus excursion was arranged to the Sanitarium Health Food factory at Windsor.

The tour included a cooking demonstration, and sample products were distributed.

Successful But Soggy Day At Oakwood Park

The first bottle drive and waste collection by the Oakwood Park Infant Welfare Centre and Pre-School Centre Committee was held on November 10. Despite the rain more than 170 doz. bottles and two tons of paper were collected.

Oakwood Park asks for child centre

The recreation committee reported to Dandenong Council last week that a deputation was received from the Oakwood Park Infant Welfare Committee to discuss the establishment of a combined centre in the Oakwood Park area.

The members of the Oakwood Park Committee present were Messrs Potter, Whykes, Hepworth and Mrs. Hellyer.

Mr. Whykes was spokesman for the deputation and he indicated that this combined committee was formed in October, 1962, with the express purpose of establishing a permanent combined centre in the area bounded by Gladstone Rd., Heatnerton Rd., Princes Hwy. and Elenora Rd.

Since the inception of this committee, it has raised £400 and it was confident it could raise approximately £80 per month.

Mr. Whykes said that the committee could guarantee £1000 and it was confident of raising £1100 to £1200 by the end of the year.

He stressed the need for a combined centre in this area by adding that last month 60 visits were made to the present temporary centre which was held one afternoon per week.

The committee had conducted a survey of the area and there are over 50 known families with children in the 1½ to 2½ age group who would send children to the pre-school centre.

The following questions were put to the recreation committee and the chairman (Cr. Hill) indicated that these would be answered by the full council at a later date:

1. Would council continue to support the attempts to gain this public amenity for the Oakwood Park area?

2. Would council apply immediately for the government grants towards the cost of establishing the centre.

3. Has the site for the centre been finalised? (We understand from discussions with Mr. Elliott that a site in Heyington Cres. has been tentatively proposed) and could a notice be erected on the site?

4. If the council is agreeable to support the project, would it be possible to use the same plan as Yarraman Park, together with any modifications they or the engineer may suggest?

5. Can the recreation committee or council suggest any other ways in which the Oakwood Park committee could be of assistance.

6. What would be the financial help required of this committee.

The city engineer was able to give the deputation some information with regard to the proposed sites for the combined centre and the possibility of using similar plans as those used for the Yarraman Centre, the report concluded.

During the past two years we have been conducting monthly waste collections to raise money for a combined Health Centre and Kindergarten. You may be interested to know that you have contributed more than 8000 doz. bottles, 9000 lb. rags, and 70 tons of paper, as well as various other items. On behalf of the Committee I wish to thank you most sincerely for this generous support.

The present situation is that the block of land has recently been purchased for the Centre by the Council. The Committee is most hopeful that the building will be started early in 1965.

Since the Committee has raised the required amount of money, it does not propose to continue the waste collections next year. As a wind-up effort, we would like to make the final collection on Dec. 12th a bumper success. May I suggest that you make a special effort to put out your waste paper, bottles, etc., on this day.

As well as expressing the very real gratitude of the Committee, may I extend to you their wishes for a Merry Christmas.

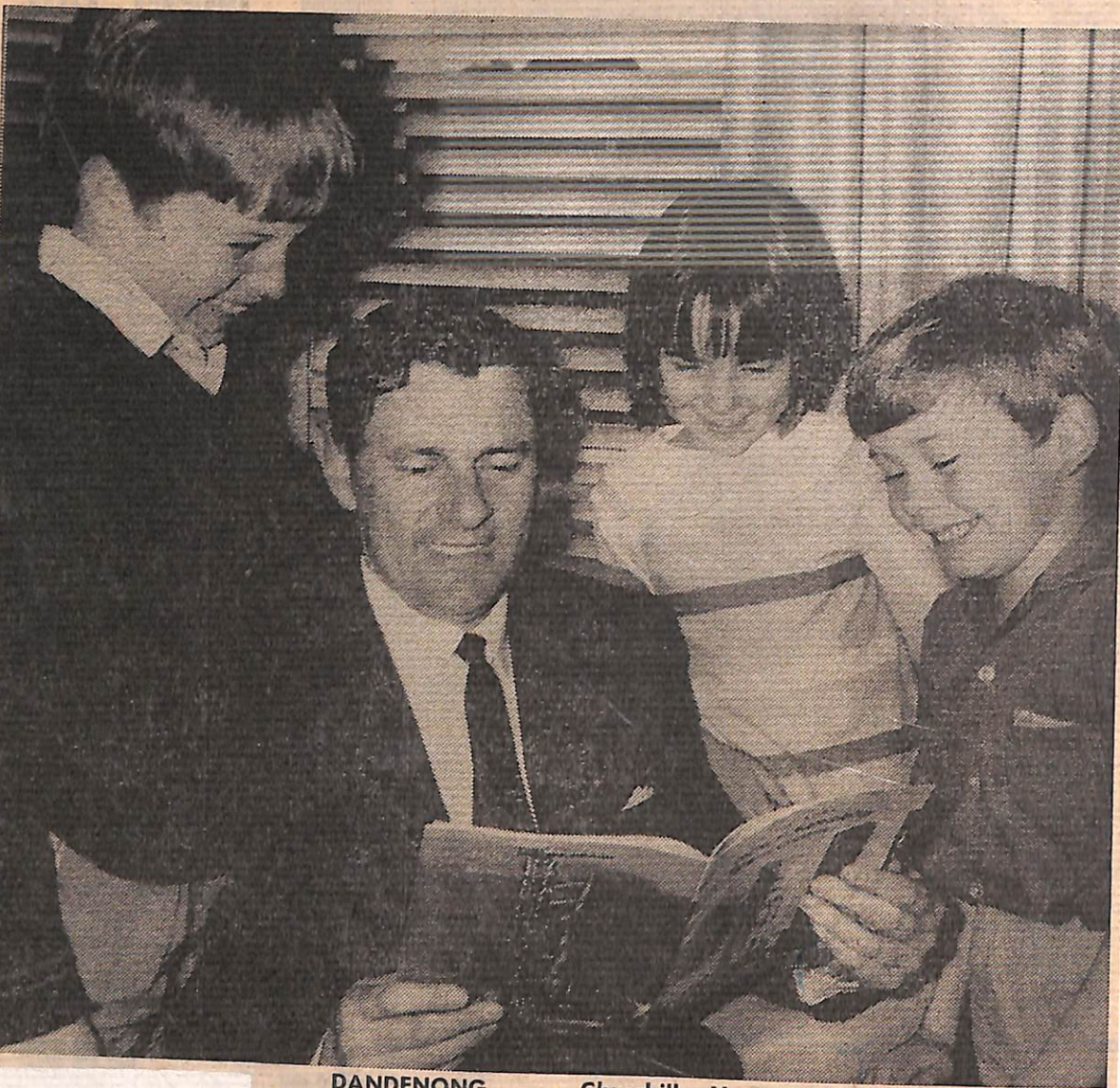

DANDENONG. — Churchill Memorial Scholarship winner, Mr. Ion Whykes, 36, of Barbara Ave., Dandenong, returned home on Saturday after six months in America, Canada, and England, still convinced "Australia is the best country in the world."

He said: "We have many wonderful memories, we made many lasting friendships.

"I benefited greatly from my trip, but I still feel Australia is the country in which I want to bring up my children.

"I say this with due deference to my hosts in America, Canada, and England, as everywhere we went we met lavish hospitality and kindness."

Mr. Whykes, a teacher at Pakenham High School, "looked in" on secondary schools organisation, particularly non-graded schools where every child was working at his or her own achievement level.

He said this was "fantastic to see."

Mr. Whykes said it was interesting to compare the education theories to what was actually happening on a practical level.

Mr. Whykes, accompanied by his wife Wilma, and three children (pictured) visited Los Angeles, Washington, Boston, Detroit, Chicago, Alabama, Florida, Ontario, and England.

Mr. Whykes said his main objective was to see in the different types of schools what is regarded as conventional and non-conventional.

He added: "I feel as Australians we underestimate ourselves and our own achievements in education, particularly in Victoria.

"Admittedly, we don't put the money into education, but our science teachers, in Victoria in particular, are as good as anywhere else in the world."

English schools were more similar in organisation to Australian schools than those in America, and in many ways English schools were more conventional than Australian schools.

Emphasis in England was still on classroom teaching rather than individual teaching, but he found some examples of progressive work, although being disappointed in the absence of individual learning.

Mr. Whykes also felt emphasis was placed on the brighter student than on the plodder.

5. To elect and determine the remuneration of the Auditor. In accordance with Rule 125 of the Co-Operative, Mr. W.C. Keenan retires as Auditor and being eligible offers himself for re-election.
