

\$10,000 AWARDS

TO THREE

SYDNEY. — Three Australians were last night chosen as 1971 Britannica Award winners.

The awards, each of \$10,000 and a gold medal, went to Arthur Boyd (arts), Prof. D. H. Pike (humanities) and Prof. R. Hanbury-Brown (science).

The awards are made

annually by Encyclopaedia Britannica of Australia Pty. Ltd., and cover art, education, literature, medicine and science.

Arthur Boyd, 51, probably the best-known member of the famous Boyd family, returned to Australia six weeks ago to take up a fellowship in the creative arts at the Australian National University, Canberra.

Since 1959 Arthur Boyd has mainly lived and exhibited in London, where he has established an international reputation as a painter.
