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Funeral today of Robin Boyd

MELBOURNE, Sunday. - A private family funeral service will be held tomorrow morning for Mr Robin Boyd, the Melbourne architect and author, who died on Friday night at the age 52.

The architect Sir Osborn McCutcheon said: "His wis-dom and liveliness of mind made it a joy to work with

"He was able to add a special quality to the dis-

cussion.

"He has had an influence on architecture for a long time — one could not have had a better adviser."

Professor Joseph Burke,

Professor Joseph Burke, Professor of Fine Arts at Melbourne University, said: "He was a creative archi-tect of great originality and his philosophical and historical writings on architecture had already brought him international fame.

"He was the artistic con-cience of his country, in the future of which he passionately believed and to which he had made an outstanding contribution at a comparatively early age."

Mr Peter McIntyre, im-

mediate past-president of the Victorian chapter of the Royal Australian In-stitute of Architects, said: "He is going to leave a void we will never be able to fill."

Sir Roy Grounds, design-

er of the Melbourne Arts Centre, said: "Robin had an approach of a knight in shining armour that most of us as kids imagine but never really achieve in real life.

"His combination as practising architect, critic, lecturer and writer, his initiative as a leader in his profession at every level he touched upon, marked him for all of the as the man live. for all of us as the man living at times." the height of his

Victorian Premier, The Sir Henry Bolte, said Mr Boyd's death was a loss to Australia. He had been a creative Australian who had made his mark on the country.

Mr Boyd caught a virus infection in Britain during a world tour he began in July. He was suffering from loss of weight when he re-turned to Melbourne four weeks ago.

He went to the Royal Melbourne Hospital, where

he died, a week ago.

Tributes will be paid to him by members of his profession, clients and friends at 3 pm tomorrow at Robert Russell House, Melbourne.

Probably the best known of Mr Boyd's books was "The Australian Ugliness."

He is survived by his wife, a son Penleigh, 23, and two daughters, Mandy and Susan.
