


News from Kyneton

Whooping it up!

The no fail easy Christmas Cake - courtesy of RVIB's Ian McDonald!

Ingredients:

I cup sugar

I cup butter

4 large eggs

I cup dried fruit

I tsp baking powder

I tsp salt

I cup lemon juice

I cup brown sugar

½ cup nuts

I or 2 bottles whisky

Method:

Did you know?




Did you know that RVIB once employed an academy award winner? Well, maybe not a Hollywood academy award winner, but a so-called 'Academy Award' of the dancing variety nonetheless.

Joan Delahunty, an accomplished ballroom dancer, was a student at RVIB and in the 1960s was taken on as a staff member of the public relations department. In an article from an edition of Viewpoints - a magazine once produced by RVIB, Joan details her interest in dancing:

"I love dancing and work very hard at it — hours of practice with my partner at times, to perfect one step or movement in a particular routine. I compete with my teacher, Mr K Sims, in the Medallist Section and have gained the highest awards possible in Old Time and Modern. I'm told that I'm the only person to hold these two academy awards. I expect to be examined before the end of the year for the Latin American Award — I hope I can pass. If so, my medal total will be 33."

RVIB Bursaries give students a helping hand

Ten students who are blind or vision impaired have each been awarded grants by RVIB for the purchase of adaptive technology that will assist them with further study.

The RVIB Bursary Awards are made available each year to students who display a passion for their chosen fields of learning and who may be unable to meet the high cost of adaptive technology.

RVIB Education Consultant, Jo
Webber says that the bursaries are
designed to make tertiary education
more accessible for people who are
blind or vision impaired and help to
create equity in the learning
environment.

"The high cost of the technology, essential to students who are blind or vision impaired, prohibits many of them from participating in further education and ultimately pursuing their chosen careers," Jo says.

"The RVIB Bursary aims to address this situation by enabling the students to

purchase adaptive equipment, such as Braille note-takers, computers with voice output, voice operated organisers and scanners."

Bursary recipient, Brandon Ah Tong, is currently undertaking a Bachelor of Social Science at RMIT. Brandon has already completed four subjects with excellent results, however minimal access to technology has made it difficult for him to complete the required course reading.

"I've got retinitis pigmentosa, and my sight has deteriorated over the last five years," Brandon says. "Reading, even with large text on a computer monitor has always been difficult and I often get headaches as a result of eye strain."

Brandon says that he is enjoying his course and looks forward to approaching the next semester with the software he will acquire through the bursary.

"I'm going to use the bursary to acquire the JAWS software program

so that I can audibly navigate my computer, have my computer read back my course materials and get through them faster," he says.


"RVIB have been such a help to me over the years and without their assistance I probably wouldn't be where I am at the moment. They've helped me get back to where I am now."

Jo says that these awards have significantly reduced the barriers faced by people who are blind or vision impaired in the field of further education.

"As basic requirements, students who are blind or vision impaired need laptops, screen reading software and equipment to translate print into braille or audio formats just so that they are able to take and read lecture notes."

Up to ten bursaries – each valued at up to \$4500 – are awarded annually and applications are open to students of any age. They must be able to demonstrate financial need, that they are enrolled in further education and that they are legally blind.

Hope the brolga is nesting!



There, with the assistance of two of Mrs Bath's great-grandchildren, the traditional cake was cut, and a tree was planted in the lawn adjacent to the community lounge.


Expressing her own thanks to all who had contributed to the success of so memorable a day, Mrs Bath spoke of "the simple things that make life worth living".

A little card play for good cause




THURGOOD, Hilda


Later in the afternoon Kerri presented Glenice with a lovely plaque decorated with white roses to thank her for her commitment and support to RVIB over the years.

The story of Louis Braille

Louis Braille was born a sighted child in a small town called Coupvray about 30 miles from Paris.

His father was a harness maker and young Louis loved to go into his father's workroom and watch him. Louis was not allowed to touch anything in the workroom but one day, when he was three years old, he went into the room and picked up an awl — a long tool for punching holes. He began punching holes into some leather when suddenly the awl slipped and plunged into Louis' eye, leaving him blind.

When Louis was six years old, a priest arranged for him to attend school.

The school day lasted from eight in the morning till five at night. He had to listen very hard so that he would remember everything. Louis could work out arithmetic problems in his head as fast as the other students could using paper. But Louis was not able to read.

When Louis was 10, Father Palleuy found a new school for him in Paris called the Royal Institute for Blind Youth. The school taught many subjects, including how to read.

In February 1819, Louis went to the school. He was the youngest in the school but from the beginning he was often at the top of his class.

In 1820 there was only one way for a blind boys to read – by using raised print. Each letter of the alphabet was raised from the page so that it stood up from the paper background.

This sounded easy, but it wasn't. Some of the letters were simple to feel but others were almost impossible to tell apart. Louis was determined. He kept on tracing the raised letters until he could tell them apart but he often forgot the beginning of the sentence and then had to go back to the start. It would take months to read a single book.

Louis became frustrated and knew there had to be a better way.

In the spring of 1821, Captain Charles Barbier came to the Institute. He had worked out a way for his soldiers to send messages to each other in the dark. He called it Night Writing Using Raised Dots. At first the blind boys were very excited but soon they began to realise that this was not a great system. There was no way to make capital letters or to write numbers. There was also no way to make commas or exclamation marks. It was also hard to learn.

Louis became determined to develop his own system. The Captain heard that someone was trying to change his night writing letters, so he visited the Institute. However, the Captain was not interested in listening to the ideas of a 12-year-old boy, and therefore Louis realised that from then on he would have to work alone. Louis used every spare minute developing his ideas. He kept simplifying Captain Barbier's pattern of dots but still found that as Night Writing was based on sounds, it sometimes took almost 100 dots to write a simple word. This was far too many

to feel easily with the fingertips. This is when Louis came up with the idea of dots standing for letters of the alphabet.

First Louis took a pencil and marked six dots on a heavy piece of paper. Then he took his stylus and raised dot number one so that it would stand for the letter "A". He raised dot numbers one and two to stand for the letter "B" etc. Soon, he found that all the letters of the alphabet could be made out of six dots used over and over again in different patterns.

News of the alphabet spread quickly and Louis was greatly praised by the director of the school.

When Louis was 19 he graduated from the Institute, and won prizes in nearly every subject. He then stayed on as a teacher at the school.

In 1844 at the age of 35, Louise contracted tuberculosis and was confined to his bed. He died on 6 January 1852, a relatively unknown man and no newspaper in Paris reported his death. But in 1952 – 100 years later, he was known by all.

Louis' coffin was moved from a little cemetery in Coupvray to Paris. He was then laid to rest in the Pantheon – France's burial place for the country's most honoured men. Today, France and the rest of the world honours a great man - Louis Braille.

proved to be very successful. Attendance rates increased in many regions. If you have any suggestions for changes to the format for next year, please let me know.


Some of our auxiliaries are celebrating 75th birthdays this year! I would love to help you celebrate so please contact me to discuss some possibilities.




We report with sadness, the passing of Mark Lemon at 92 years of age.



Ms Davidson has extensive experience working with children, having


previously been employed as a nanny and worked with emotionally disturbed children in her home country of Scotland.




I remember many years ago, before I was a member, attending the RVIB
