News from RVIB School



Five students who are vision impaired had the trip of a lifetime recently when they visited the NASA Space Camp in Alabama. Fifteen-year-old Katy Webb, an RVIB visiting teacher service client from Traralgon, reports.

During the September holidays I travelled to the US to attend NASA Space Camp for vision impaired students, which was a fantastic experience.

During the week we competed against the other teams in various space missions and activities. On our first space mission I was the cabcom which means I was responsible for all the communication between the cabin crew and the ground control. In our second mission I was a station operator and went out of the space station and put on a space suit. We were put into so-called '5 degrees of freedom' chairs, which move you around and simulate the feeling of having no gravity.

During our stay in the US we also went to the Texas School for the Blind and local Austin High School, which was interesting and exciting.

I can feel the words

The RVIB Early Childhood Braille Book Library is a newly created resource for families of children who are blind or vision impaired between the ages of one and six. Individual storybook kits are posted out to families containing a storybook with Braille, a tape or CD, some tactile aids to help the child enter the world of the story and a small handbook with only tactile pictures for imaginary story telling. Our symbol is an echidna called Feelix. Each child will receive a hand held echidna with their name attached as their borrowing card. This project has been possible through the generous funding of Tattersall's and a memorial donation in honour of Helen Smith.


Having my books in Braille with tactile enhanced 'feelie' illustrations means entering another dimension where touch matters more than sight. This is the international translation, which has given me the greatest pleasure although when I was first asked permission for my picture books to be translated into Braille, I said, "They're *picture* books. You can't translate *pictures* for children who are blind."

Fortunately, I was wrong.

Recently, my book 'There's a Hippopotamus on our Roof Eating Cake' (Hodder) was included in the Feelix Braille project to familiarise blind pre-schoolers with the concept of books. In a bright yellow case, (delivered free by Australia Post) there is a picture book, with either Level I or 2 Braille text added, a hand-made mini book with feelie pictures to read and a soft toy hippo with cake to cuddle. In addition, there is an audio tape of the story and original hippo music. These cases are available for a period of three

weeks for families with a sightimpaired pre-schooler.

So I do regard these 'Feelix' books as translations which travel.

When 'There's a Hippopotamus on Our Roof Eating Cake' was first published in 1980, an earlier Braille version with tactile enhanced pictures was produced and widely used. I showed it in schools to sighted students who were fascinated by the feel-reading concept in a book which has both the print page plus an inserted page of Braille which could be shared simultaneously with a sighted parent or sibling. Often I would wind a scarf around a sighted child's head and get them to read with their fingers while the class looked at the print. More than the story was being translated.

Now I am literary mentor to Karen, a legally blind author, and I'm convinced that any translation provides insight into another culture, especially Braille.

The Southern Cross Games will also be the first time that many of the students take part in competitive events. There have been a number of students from

previous Games who ended up representing Australia in the Paralympics, so who knows where the Games may lead!

Staff, students, parents and volunteers are all looking forward to five fantastic days of sporting events, team spirit, making new friends and plenty of fun.

The training is designed to provide students with greater independence and an enhanced quality of life through the provision of skills, which lead to pathways for employment, independent living or further education in addition to promoting a philosophy of life long learning.

Students are assisted in achieving their learning outcomes with the provision of the latest adaptive technology and teaching techniques. Materials for all courses are provided in each clients preferred format including Braille, electronic format, large print or cassette.

Courses provide Adaptive Technology Training, which assists students to read newspapers/stock market reports/letters/pamphlets and bills. Computer skills enable families to keep in touch via email, and a new world of information is opened through the Internet.

Adult Literacy programs enhance student's communication skills and Braille courses give parents the opportunity to read their child a favourite bedtime story.

Attending to home maintenance or even making a coffee table becomes a reality through the provision of Industrial Skills training.

Courses are also available to support those who teach people who are blind or vision impaired. These courses enable students to develop orientation and mobility support skills training; to understand disability legislation and the impact this has on the workplace; to develop the skills and tools necessary to teach people with a vision impairment; to understand common eye conditions and; to learn how to read Braille.




