Zest for life the key to success

The head of street furniture manufacturer Draffin-Inwel admits that being blind can be a set back at times but has had little impact on his vision for life or big business. Corey Nassau reports.

Living with a disability is all about putting alternative things in place so that you can continue to enjoy the pleasantries in life according to the Managing Director of Draffin-Inwel, Don Draffin.

Don, who is also an RVIB Board Member, lost his eyesight 20 years ago and whilst he sometimes finds it testing, his attitude toward life is more positive now than when he had his sight.

"I think I've become more positive since losing my eyesight and I, just like others who are blind or vision impaired, have to be that way because the challenges are great and the hurdles high," he said.

"Becoming blind meant that I had to change the way in which I approached a lot of things, not only in my vocation, but also in the common tasks I was used to doing every day."

Don acknowledges that there are things that he used to do in comfort that he no longer can, but says that his new life is about finding other things that give him equal pleasure and satisfaction.

Draffin-Inwel, a Bayswater-based company with an annual turnover of more than \$4 million, is one of those pleasures and he runs it alongside his two brothers; John, who is vision impaired also, and Brian. Don and John are both RVIB clients and Brian is a regular volunteer.

"We specialise in the manufacture of street furniture and many Australians would, perhaps unknowingly, already be familiar with our park benches and rubbish bins because they're everywhere," Don said.

RVIB College offers a broad curriculum of accredited adaptive technology training for people who are blind or

vision impaired and Don agrees that the training he has received from RVIB over the past seven years has been crucial to his business performance.

Using voice-synthesised computers he has mastered many of the products common to office use, such as Word, PowerPoint, Excel and is now tackling a complex database program.

"Ironically when I was sighted I had a secretary type my letters. Now I'm blind and I type my own," he said.

Recently in Sydney on a sales exercise with the NSW Government, Don took some time out for an interview with RVIB's weekly radio program on 3RPH, Around the Institute.

Competing with the background noise of moving forklifts, he explained that he was about 20 minutes out of the city and he and his team were in the process of dismantling a furniture display so they could make their flight home that evening.

"I love doing this and I do it because I can. Sometimes you have to rely on others and it provides a challenging workplace, but it also means that our team skills with our staff have to be that much better and we take pride in that," Don said.

"We have 35 people working for us and we have a tremendous team spirit with all of them. You just do the things that you can do."

Away from the office Don pursues his love of trains by delving into railway history, hobby trains and railway tours. He reads a few talking books each week and also spends time at his beach house when he can find the time.

"We're always very busy and I like it that way. It's so important to create situations in life that keep you challenged," he said.

"There are always things you can put in place to help you reach your goals, whether you have lost your sight, hearing, smell or touch, and I look up to many of the people I meet at RVIB who cope with these issues day by day."

Children, aged 0 to 3 years who are blind or vision impaired, will soon be able to benefit from a new RVIB textbook, "Little Steps", thanks to a generous grant received from the Paul Newman Foundation to help develop this resource.

The textbook, written by RVIB Early Childhood Educators Liz Haughton and Sandie Mackevicius, will address the special needs of children during these critical early years and will be an invaluable resource for teachers and the children's families.

Ron Dann, Manager of Trusts and Foundations at RVIB, was delighted that the Paul Newman Foundation agreed to lend their support to the project, providing much needed funding to cover the book's printing and photography costs.

Mr Newman, best known for his skills as an actor, has developed a foundation to support charities worldwide by giving away all profits, after taxes, from the sale of his salad dressings and pasta sauces to charities in countries where his products are sold. Since his business started over 20 years ago, the Newman Foundation has donated over \$200 million, including \$8 million to Australian based organisations.

RVIB partner introduces new eye treatment in Australia



RVIB corporate partner Medownick Laser Clinic at Epworth Medical Centre in Melbourne, is pleased to announce that treatment is now available in Victoria for patients with very high refractive errors who are unsuitable for laser vision correction.

RVIB History Project - Update

Earlier this year RVIB initiated a history project to consolidate information about RVIB's past. History Project Coordinator Patsy Vizents provides an update on her fascinating journey through RVIB's 137 year history.

I have been working on the History Project for three months now and have managed to get a great deal done in that time.

As more people find out about the project, donations of items are forthcoming. For instance, a gentleman contacted me with a donation of the 1952 RVIB Christmas Appeal Cup presented to the hotel where his late uncle resided. The hotel had raised the most money during this appeal. Uncle Jack had kept this cup and other memorabilia from the past, and it is now time for it to be returned.

Through the process of sorting stored records, many items of interest have been found. A report was written by an unknown author, who was possibly the instigator of a model railway club that began soon after the Burwood School was opened in the 1960. The report details how the club was organised and how locomotives and rolling stock worked together to form the

stations and tracks that the boys of the club could use. Newspaper articles from June 1962 have been found that detail some of the club's activities.

Another piece of information from newspaper clippings details the way that RVIB raised money. The hotels, as mentioned above, had donation tins or ran special events to raise money for the Institute and in 1962 a particularly novel appeal called "Operation Neighbour" was held. About 33.000 tins were distributed throughout Victoria. Voluntary helpers gave these to the first house in each street within the collection area, with instructions to pass the tin to the next-door neighbour. The Appeal aimed to raise \$500,000 (250,000 pounds) and after 1/3 of the tins were returned, \$194,000 (97,000 pounds) had been raised. Doesn't that say a lot about trust in the community when money can be collected by passing the tin from neighbour to neighbour?

Being able to dip back into the past through the newspaper articles and the photographs, some taken for RVIB promotional purposes, is a wonderful way to weave together the individual strands of this organisation.
