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

I am a married woman at 26 McGregor Street Middle Park. Sworn States:-I have known him about 18 months. He was in the habit of I know accused Morris. visiting at my place to go out with my son. About end of September last I had some conversation with him in consequence of what I had been told. He said "I want to get away, will you go out and see Mr Bruin". He accompanied me with my son. Before that accused Morris told me accused Bruin had committed an unnatural offence upon him on many ofcasions. He said "I first met Bruin in Snowden Gardens, I was taken to the pictures by him and then visited him at Auburn where Bruin committed committed unnatural offences upon me. He gave me money at the commencement and later on fruit and he also promised to give me a diamond ring. I said "I will tell your mother and father if you go there again". He - "Will you return these two books to Mr Bruin?" (handing me two books, one of theme which was Oscar Wilde and the other was about boys). I went to Mr Bruin's accompanied by accused Morris and my son. I knocked at Bruin's gate. Accused Bruin answered. I said to him "Are you Mr Bruin?" He "Yes". I -"Benny Morris wished me to return these two books" (handing him the two I had received) and to let you know your relations have been found out, also your letters and telegrams have been given up by Morris. The letters and telegrams produced (Ex. "A") are those I I - "No". He referred to. He said "Oh my goodness where is he? Is he at home?" "Where will I find him?" I - "You will find that in the book". He - "Who might I be speaking to?" I - "That also you will find in the book as Benny Morris has put it there". He - "I will be in the city to-morrow at 3 and I will call and see him". Later

I told Benny Morris that Mr Bruin would call next day. The boy did not hear my conversation with accused Bruin. Accused Morris had just a name and address in one of the books. Accused Bruin never came to that address. Ben said "I will send a telegram to feared Mr Bruin". He wanted to get away because he ** * Later Morris accompanied me to the Detective Office where we saw Detective Coonan. Previous to that I had handed in a bundle of letters now produced (Ex. "A"). Morris informed Det. Coonan that unnatural offences had been committed upon him by Bruin. He wanted to make a statement. He refused. He said "I know I am over the age and it would go against me". Detective Coonan asked him to give it 2 or 3 days consideration and come again on Friday night. Morris said "I am afraid". I said "I will accompany you". I rang him up on Friday morning when he said to me "I am not going to the Detective Office, I intend to drop everything". I said "Don't be foolish". On the Friday afternoon Morris came to my place between 2 and 3 o'clock. I said "Not working Ben?" He said "No I got the afternoon off". He then stated "I will go with you tonight". He left for the City about 3 o'clock promising to return to tea, my son accompanied him. I did not see then again until they were in trouble in Sydney. There I said to Morris "Will you make a statement now?" At first he said "No - one thing at a time. Let me get back to Melbourne". I then had a conversation with Morris's brother. Subsequently a statement was handed to me by a Detective at Milson Point Sydney. I handed that statement to Detective Coonan at my house.

XXD - My son had been a companion of Morris. About January of last year I knew my son was carrying on with men. I knew it then of Morris also. He continued coming to my house up to the time he was arrested about a week ago. I knew they were carrying on this business with men all the time. Money has never entered into this matter with me. I am out to help the boys by getting at the men who are corrupting them. I frequently spoke to them and their companions. The Police did not assist me owing to technical difficulties. I know a man named Watson. He was with my son on one occasion. I received money from him on behalf of my son, I think it was £9 for his fare to Bristane He also bought him clothes. That was about 6 weeks after my son deserted from the navy. I interviewed Watson on many occasions on behalf of my son and Morris. The first was in January 1919. I mentioned Watson's name to the Police when my son was arrested

never received money from a man in Footscray. I have never thought of taking money from accused Bruin. I have complained about 3 men to the Police. I received the letter produced (Ex. "A") and handed them to the Police a day or two after. I went to Bruin in the public interest. I did not go to get money. I expected to get help for Morris from Bruin so text that Morris could get away. I wanted to get him away from his hateful surroundings. My interview with Bruin was not longer than 3 or 4 minutes. It was dark. I cannot say that Bruin was the man I spoke to but I believe he was Bruin. I did not say "Only money would settle it". Nothing like that was said. Ben suggested Bruin coming to my house and sent the telegram himself.

By the Bench - Watson denied having anything to do with my son but said "I will assist your son" and so gave him the £9 and clothes. I did not knowthen he had committed the offence. The £9 was given in January.

THOMAS COONAN

Sworn States:- I am a Sergeant Detective at Melbourne. At 7.45 p.m. on 2nd October last the witness Mrs Smith brought the accused Morris to the Detective Office. She had made a complaint a few days before to the officer in charge. I said to Morris in the presence of Mrs Smith "Do you wish to make a statement and sign it about Bruin He - "I am 20 years of age and if I sign committing unnatural offences upon you?" a statement I will be charged with him". I - "Where did you meet this man Bruin?" He -"About 5 years ago outside the Snowden pictures and he has been committing unnatural He - "I used to visit him for the week-end at offences on me since". I - "Where?" his house 102 Harcourt Street Auburn but I don't want to make a statement now, I'll consider it for a couple of days and return with Mrs Smith". I - "its Very well its a serious matter, consider it and come back again". Mrs Smith handed me the bundle of letters produced (Ex. "A"). They are addressed to accused Morris and signed "Harry". I also produce carbon copies of those letters (Ex. "B") They were handed to me by accused Bruin at his house on the 10th October last. I also produce letters from accused Morris to Bruin which were handed to me at the same time by Bruin (Ex. "C"). Accused Morris

and Mrs Smith then left. Morris did not return. On 10th October last in company with Det. Sickerdick I called on accused Bruin at his house. I said "Are you Mr Harry Bruin?" He - "Yes". I - "We are detectives making enquiries about a statement made by Benjamin Morris". He - "I know Benny Morris for about 5 years". I - "He alleges that you have been committing unnatural offences on him here". He - "It is not true. Morris has visited me here and stopped for the week-end". I - "Will you make a statement. Where did Morris sleep at the week-end?" He - "In bed with me there - pointing to a bunk which was the only bed in the house. Bruin then made a statement which I reduced to writing. That statement I now produce (Ex. "D") and read to the Court. I said to accused Bruin "Have you any letters of Morris's?" He xxx looked round the Bench and handed me the letters already produced (Exs. "B" and "C"). I now fead those sent by accused Bruin to accused Morris. I said to accused Bruin "Have you any Oscar Wildes He said "Yes" and handed me over the two produced (Ex. "E"). I asked for them books?" to verify the statement made to me by Mr Smith concerning some books she had returned from Morris to Bruin. On 22nd November last Mrs Smith handed me a statement purporting to be made by accused Morris. On 13th inst. I obtained warrants for the arrest of accused. On 16th inst. at 8 o'clock Detective Mulfahey and I arrested accused Morris on this charge. At the Detective Office I showed him the statement handed to me by Mrs Smith. He acknowledged it as his. On 17th inst. I arrested accused Bruin. I said to him "I have a warrant for your arrest for committing an unnatural offence on Benny Morris". He made no reply. We took him to the Detective office and presented him to Morris and there I read to them the statement handed to me by Mrs Smith (Ex. "F"). I said to Morris "Is that statement true?" He said "Yes". I said to Bruin "What have you to say to that?" He - "What I said before". I - "What do you mean by that?" He - "What I said before". I - "Are you referring to your statement?" He - "Yes". He was there charged with the offence". I made enquiries at Alfred Hospital and failed to get any information of Morris being treated there. There has been no Customs office named Robinson on the wharf for some years.

XXD - Bruin denied theoffence from beginning to end.

HECTOR PERRIN SMITH

I am an iron worker and reside at 24 McGregor Street Sworn States:-Middle Park. I know both accused. About 1.30 p.m. on 3rd October last I met accused Morris in the City. We had lunch at Sargents and the nwent to my place at Middle Park. We went back to town and remained there till 5 p.m. and then out to Morris's place & 91 Palmerston Crescent South Melbourne. Morris packed up his clothes and we brought them into Victoria Coffee Palace where we engaged a room. During the afternoon Morris said "I am going out to Bruin's, will you come with me?" I agreed and we went out that evening about 7 o'clock to Bruin's place. He was not in so we came back to town. I made a ststement in which I said he was there. That statement is not true as to the latter portion. The first part of the statement is correct. The statement produced (EX "G") is the one I made. If Morris made a similar statement it is not true as to Bruin committing an offence. I told the lie or Morris had a hold over me. I wanted to help Morris by accusing Bruin. No one except detectives have interviewed me in this matter. I saw accused Morris last night and told him I was going to tell the truth and then I walked away. I have since told my mother all about what I feared from Morris and so I can now speak the truth. I was knocking about with Morris for some time in Sydney. I there stole a suit of clothes and was arrested and convicted. My mother paid half the fine.

Your dear wonderful letters to hand, three of them, you can never know how I felt, I expected one from you Tuesday as usual, three days past then I received three, you can imagine my relief, my feelings, my brain was in a whirl and I felt an utter longing to sit and write you straight away. Harry how intimate we must be for me to write you like this and the weeks we have made it up, so few. I believe we are beginning to feel and know one another so closely. I am glad to know you so intimately that I can picture each hour what you are doing, think of me Harry bored and wearied to death in a stuffy old office with men of a different kind. I want you to send me your thoughts so that in time we can without knowing, help one another. If I do not express to you how greatly I enjoy your letters, please understand I am doing so now, you tell me my letters help you and you like them, my letters to you are nothing compared to your letters to me. You say I have opened my sould to you, I wish I could, and be able to let you know about myself, things I am sure you understand.

Letter writing I hate for indeed it seems to me, after I have written a letter that I have not expressed just what I have wanted to say, or I have presumed too much in writing what is in my mind, things that have a meaning for me, are quite different to other people; but you are not one of the other people to whom I refer, you can understand only too well my thought.

You ask me to explain one sentence from my letter of June 12. "It was something far back in my mind that made me write to you, I tried to put it off in the end I gave way". I wonder what I can write; many months ago I was destitute, anything and everything was out to me, there were times when I was savage with pain and times when I was exhaused from it, times when I felt so much out that even a word of sympathy from anyone brought forth a flood of tears, times when pity for myself left me incapable of realizing anything beyond my wrongs. I once told you, that once I was filled with the wildest hopes and I had outlived them. I have always thought of you Harry of the little back room in Harcourt Street of the Hawthorn Coffee Palace, of the week end with you of everything and anything connected with you and every time I do think I blame myself for being too restless, my imaginative powers, were nearly the ruin of my whole life,

I don't think you can forget our little tears together, they were the start of our friendship, they are ever fresh in my memory now, but when I try to recall you, well I don't think I could forget you. I thought often of writing to you and asking your forgiveness, but I admit I am stupid, and my thoughts ever running wild, told me it would mean me humbling myself at your feet, only to be laughed at as one of the curious stock; and after I had penned my first letter to you I thought a long time over it but, I conquered my thought and sent the letter to you; you can never know how I felt when a note arrived from you, you had written me after all, you are a friend Harry.

You will never divulge anything I write to you Harry and I thank you for mentioning it to me, I trust the interest we will find in one another will help us in any and every way, I live for you and if I could ever do you a good turn, do not I improre you belittle the possibility of a true friendship, I shall be ever helpful ever true towards you and I want you to feel the same way for me.

You say love can never die, no, love can never die, but, "is ours love", never mind love will bloom in both our hearts, for I know in re-reading your letters that there is a ring of genuineness in them.

Well Harry I do sincerely believe in this Wireless Telepathy of which you speak, it will exist between you and I and I sometimes feel that it is existing now; often I get a thought about you when I least expect it and then I think to myself, what will Harry think, is he thinking about me. I believe I am always thinking about you expecially in these last few weeks of our renewal of friendship. We are friends Harry.

Next month will bring you to me, when you do come we will not dwell in the past rather we shall look to the future, ahead we go together firm in the belief that we are friends. Sometimes I feel that we are going to be very happy together. I am going to get some picture postcards with small space for writing this letter paper demoralizes me.

"D" HARRY HARDY BRUIN

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I am a carpenter and builder and live at 102 Harcourt Street Auburn. I am a single man and live alone. I know Ben Morris and have been corresponding with him for about 5 years. I met him about 5 years ago near the Snowden pictures on the South side of the Yarra. I had an appointment to meet a friend there between 7 and 8 p.m. on this evening and while I was waiting I got into conversation with Morris who was then only a boy. My friendid not turn up and I walked along St.Kilda Road with Morris towards his home which he told me was in Palmerston Crescent, South Melbourne. In conversation I told him I was a builder and he asked me if I could make him a propeller for a small aeroplane. I said I would think over the matter and gavehim my address. A few days after I received a letter from him with a sketch of the propeller he require d I replied to his letter and we then kept up a correspondence afterwards. I have kept a copy of several of the letters I write to him. He afterwards contracted a venereal disease and I took him to the Alfred Hospital where he was attended. He told me he got it from a Customs Officer named Robinson. It would be about $2\frac{1}{2}$ years ago that Morris was attending the Alfred Hospital for this complaint. I have carbon copies of

letters which I have written to Morris. After he was cured of his complaint I never heard from him till the first week in June last. I had been away at Mildura for some time. When I first met Morris I often took him to the pictures in the City. I returned from Mildura about the 16th August last. While I was at Mildura I received a letter from him and when I was returning to Melbourne I sent him a telegram asking him to meet me on my return at the train. He did not turn up. I then wrote a letter to him asking him to come to my house at Auburn on the 20th August 1919. He came out and stopped with me for about an hour and a half. He came to my place again on Saturday evening 23rd August 1919 and I took him to the Camberwell pictures. We returned to my house that evening and he slept with me that night. He remained with me the next day and left at 7.30 p.m. I did not commit any offence on him that night or at any time and if he says I did it is not true. As regards the wording in my letters to Ben of love and other endearing remarks I wrote as I felt for I loved him and wanted to be his friend. & I onlt slept with him one night, and that was when I returned from Mildura. He had visited me at my place when I first made his acquaintance. On the 30th September 1919 a woman called on me about 8.30 p.m. She brought back two books which Ben Morris borrowed from me. One is Chamides Poems by Oscar Wilde and the other "De Profundus" by Oscar Wilde. She said to me "Ben Morris is in a bad way and must be got away". I said to her "Whom am I speaking to?" She said "My address is in one of the books and if you like to come out and see him you may". She did not say anything about money. Next day I received a telegram from Morris asking me to come and see him. I did not go but went to Cawsey and Ward of the Australian Detective Agency and asked them to make some inquiries as I thought an attempt was being made to blackmail me. Mr Cawsey afterwards told me it was a matter for the Police. The foregoing statement has been read over to me and it is true and correct. I do not wish to sign it.

Benjamin Morris states:- I am a clerk lately residing at 91 Palmerston Crescent South Melbourne. I am desirous of making a statement against a man named Harry Bruin, a builder of Harcourt Street Auburn, Victoria. In October last Bruin gave me the sum of £15 to leave Melbourne as he Bruin had been committing unnatural offences on me, and knew that Detective Coonan was desirous of getting a statement from me as he had the matter in hand. I have known Bruin for about 5 years and during that time he has committed unnatural offences with me on various occasions, the last time being in October last at his residence in Auburn when he handed me the money to leave Melbourne. Since coming to Sydney I have seen and spoken to Bruin but havenot kept his company. Hector Smith of 24 McGregor Street Middle Park Melbourne accompanied me to Bruin's residence and saw Bruin commit an unnatural offence upon me on the night prior to

leaving for Sydney. I wish to state that I havemade this statement of my own free will.

HECTOR PERRIN SMITH States:-

Long Bay. I formerly lived at Middle Park Victoria. I left Victoria in the mixthe of October this year in company with Ben Morris and Jimmy Stowers and came to Sydney. I know a man named Harry Bruin. I havebeen at his place once or twice. I went to Bruin's place in company with Ben Morris, the night before we left for Sydney. The place is a kind of workshop but it has a bed there. Morris got on the bed and took down his pants and Bruin committed an unnatural offence on him. I was present and saw all that took place. I saw Bruin give Morris £15 afterwards. We both told Bruin we were going to Perth. After we arrived in Sydney we met Bruin here in the street one day. Only a few words passed between Morris and Bruin and we then parted and I have not seen him since. I make this statement of my own free will and I am prepared to give evidence in the Court if required against Bruin.
