

Construction at Willsmere to Commence

Construction of the Willsmere residential development was officially launched by the Premier of Victoria, the Honourable Jeff Kennett, on 27th October with the unveiling of a plaque.

The Mayor of Kew, Cr Tom Indovino, and other Councillors and Council Staff, also attended the opening along with the Minister for Major Projects, the Honourable Mark Birrell and the Minister for Planning, the Honourable Rob Maclellan.

In his speech the Premier congratulated the Kew Council on its efficiency in assessing the project. He said the Council had played a positive role in the development.

The Mayor of Kew, Cr Tom Indovino, said "Council has always been aware of the need to balance a satisfying long term result for the wider community and the new residents of Kew. Council's Planning Scheme stipulates that the site be developed in a way which ensures minimal

detrimental impact on the existing character of the area and retains significant historical sections of the building."

Redevelopment of the site is also being carried out in close consultation with the Historic Building Council, the Victorian Ministry of Planning and Yarra Bend Park Trust.

Construction of the Willsmere project is expected to cost Central Equity close to \$30 million, and the company's directors estimate that work associated with the development will create 500 construction jobs and more than 1,000 indirect jobs.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S COLUMN

Changes Occurring in Kew

Old Library

Council is currently carrying out improvements to the "Old Library" area of the Municipal Offices. This area has been largely unused since the Library was relocated to the old Civic Hall approximately seven years ago.

During this period, the only regular uses have been for health immunisation sessions and the annual Rotary Art Show. Because neither of these uses have generated any income, no work has previously been carried out to this area.

The current works are dividing the area into a leaseable office space and improving the remainder of the area by making it into an attractive public meeting area.

The office space has been leased out at market rental rates to the Waste Management Council. This is a new authority created under the Environment Protection Act to undertake research and assist all metropolitan Councils with waste management.

The public meeting space is also being improved with new decor. When completed, it will be of a standard which will be attractive for uses such as conferences, seminars and other similar functions.

Due to Kew's location close to the central business district, easy access and the availability of car parking, our market research has shown that the space should be well utilised.

Therefore the space will not only

start to generate some income for Council but also provide a good facility for use by our community. The new public meeting space will be available in early 1994. Bookings for its use can be made with Chris Moutafis on 854 5203. The Waste Management Council will be moving into the offices in December this year.


Recreation Centre

A new carpark has just been completed at the Kew Recreation Centre. The carpark is constructed in the northwest area of the Recreation Centre and will provide in excess of 40 carparking spaces. The construction of the carpark has been undertaken so that when the extensions to the Recreation Centre are completed mid next year, adequate parking will continue to be available.

McDonalds

The Council had earlier this year issued a Notice of Decision to grant a town planning permit to McDonalds restaurant chain with extensive conditions, for the construction of a McDonalds Restaurant on the south east corner of High Street and Highfield Grove. Since granting that permit, the owner of the property applied for, and has now been granted, a town planning permit for the construction of 34 apartments on the land.

It is understood that many of these apartments have been "sold off the plan" over the last few weeks and

thus it now appears that the site will be used for apartments rather than a McDonalds Restaurant.

Willsmere

Central Equity Limited, following its purchase of the residential land component at Willsmere, has now submitted a town planning application to Council for subdivision of that land.

Under the application, Central Equity propose to subdivide the land into 105 allotments, of which three allotments are proposed to be for medium density housing development.

The formal application was received by Council on 27th September and it is currently being publicly advertised. Once the period of public notification and period for receipt of any objections has elapsed, Council will then consider the application. At this stage, that will probably be in November.

A public display providing details of the application has been erected in the Municipal Offices foyer and anyone interested is invited to inspect that display.

MAYOR'S COMMENT

One of the great pleasures of being Mayor is the opportunity to meet so many people in the community. I have been to the meetings of many different community groups since being elected, and am proud of the way each one of them serves our community.

I recently visited Kew Community House and was impressed with the range of programs they offer and the support they give to specific groups in the community. The House runs a number of educational activities such as literacy classes, English as a second language, computer skills courses, art and cooking classes.

It also offers other services which are useful to local residents. There is an occasional child care centre every Tuesday and Thursday, and each Wednesday a community lunch is provided for a special \$2.00 cost.

Community House is open to all the members of the community and I encourage people to take advantage of this friendly, informal environment to meet new people and discover new talents.

Another important resource in our community is 'Marriage Guidance Victoria'. The agency has had its headquarters in Kew for over 25 years and is the largest relationship counselling service in the state.

The work the agency performs has played an important role in our local community and neighbouring areas. Especially during the recession, the demand for MGV's specialist family services has increased.

In a recent study on living standards for Melbourne couples with children, undertaken by the Australian Institute of Family Studies, it was found that marriage counselling was one of the community services couples most desired access to. The Kew community is fortunate for the important work


MGV does to promote the well being of family life in our city. The effects of its work are felt on many levels in our community.

A very special contributor to our community was Mother Teresa of Jesus, Prioress of the Kew Carmelite Monastery. I, together with Councillors and Council Staff, was greatly saddened by her death on October 13.

Born in 1906, Marie Josephine Teresa McGuire was the first young woman to enter the newly built Carmelite Monastery in July 1929. After Perpetual Profession in 1934, she was elected Sub-Prioress, and in 1938 was elected Prioress, although well below the canonical age.

Mother Teresa was endowed with an exceptionally warm, outgoing personality, great musical talents and a love of life. A path finder, Mother Teresa gave courageous leadership and inspiration not only to her religious community, but to the Church of Melbourne and to extensions of the




Participants explored issues such as self-expression, communication, values, motivation and leadership. We were challenged and have learnt life long skills.

New Automated Loans System for Kew Library

The Kew Library has become even more 'user friendly' with the introduction of a new automated loans system. The Data Library System, which became operational on 3 November, will enable the Library to offer a range of new and improved services.

Library patrons now have the added convenience of being able to extend the period of their loans by telephone. They can also request details of items they currently have on loan. Another advantage of the new system is maximising the availability of books and other resources to the general public. The status of items (on loan, in process, or on the shelves) is listed on a public access catalogue, and the system will ensure reserved items are more promptly received by borrowers. Patrons will receive more prompt notification of overdue items. The automated system will also help provide Library Staff with detailed information on use of the books and other items for loan, so that they can be more closely matched to public needs.

In order to avoid any problems during the change over period, the Council has declared an amnesty of overdue items until Sunday 5th December 1993. This is an opportunity for patrons to return overdue items and start with a fresh slate.

New Playground for Outer Circle Reserve

The Council has allocated \$40,000 in its 1993/94 budget for the development of a new playground at the Outer Circle Reserve.

The existing play equipment along the reserve between Burke Road and Argyle Road has become isolated and outdated. It will be removed and replaced by a centralised playground within the vicinity of Normanby Road and Campbell Street. It is envisaged that the new playground will be developed to suit a wide age group ranging from toddlers to 12 year olds.

Council is seeking the community's input into the planning and design of the playground, and encourages those people who will be using the area, or are interested in contributing to its planning, to attend a public meeting on Saturday 20 November at 2.00 pm in Meeting Hall No. 3 (situated at the rear of the Municipal Library in Cotham Road).

Design options for the playground site will be discussed, which are both affordable and meet the needs and desires of those using the area. Interested parties may also write to Bruce Schroder, the Executive Officer Parks and Recreation, with any specific design ideas which could be raised at the meeting. No Ban for Tin Shakers

Council has decided not to ban charity tin shakers from collecting money at local intersections at present.

Pending the outcome of a state government working party review of highway collections, Council stipulated that recognised charities will still be able to seek approval but will be required to take out a \$10 million joint insurance cover with the Council.

Council will review its policy once the recommendations of the working party are released, and after consultation with the community.

Community Group to Back Waste Minimisation







The service assists approximately 160 older people each year, and plays an important role in helping people to move around the community and participate in every day activities such shopping and recreational as activities.


The service is run by the Council with the help of volunteers. New volunteers are always welcome and your services would be most appreciated. Volunteer drivers are needed on a Thursday
