

New Radar Speed Device For Kew Police

The Mayor of Kew, Cr Tom Indovino, last month presented the Kew Police with a radar speed device for use by Kew members within the municipal boundaries of Kew.

The Kustom Falcon radar device was purchased by the City of Kew at a cost of \$3,650 following discussions between police and Council.

It will be used on roads and streets throughout Kew in accordance with priorities established by Kew Police and those requested by Council, and

will enable increased enforcement of speed limits on local streets.

"The radar will make an important contribution to Council's traffic management strategy." said Russell

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Fairlie, Council's Executive Officer of Transport.

"With the impending enactment of new State Government legislation later this year to reduce urban speed limits on local streets from 60 km/h to 50 km/h, speed enforcement will become an increasingly important demand.

"It is hoped that the introduction of these lower speed limits, together with increased enforcement and publicity, will help to create safer streets and improved residential amenity for Kew residents. In that context it is a very good investment compared to the cost of constructing other traffic management devices."

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S COLUMN

Council's 1993/94 Budget

When Councils adopt their Budget, they need to forecast all their costs for the next year, taking into account expected CPI increases.

Despite the Federal Government forecasting a CPI increase for 1993/ 94 of 3.5%, the City of Kew is about to adopt a Budget which will result in an increase in total income from rates and charges of less than 1%.

This has been achieved, mainly through the implementation of efficiencies which have resulted in substantial savings in some areas of Council's operations.

The increase of 0.82%, comprises a decrease of total rate revenue of 0.4%, a decrease of \$9.30 in the Waste Services Charge from \$96.80 to \$87.50 and a \$25.00 increase in the Municipal Charge from \$25.00 to \$50.00.

In previous articles in *Kewriosity*, I have described how Council is required by legislation to completely phase out minimum rates by 1996/ 97 and how Council is replacing the revenue lost from this requirement, by increases in the Municipal Charge. This approach continues to maintain an equitable distribution of rates contribution. The cost of the phase out of minimum rates for 1993/94 results in a loss of approximately \$252,000 from this source.

As a result of the phasing out process, minimum rate A (for properties with a site value of between \$35,000 and \$80,000) has been reduced from \$450.00 to \$375.00. Minimum rate B (for properties with a site value of less than \$35,000), has been reduced from \$325.00 to \$250.00. Therefore with the inclusion of the Municipal Charge and Waste Services Charge, these properties will receive a total decrease in rates and charges of 10.37% and 13.27% respectively.


However, whilst these properties receive a significant decrease, the cost of these decreases will have a varying impact in terms of the total amount payable for the remaining properties in the municipality. Therefore it is not possible to state that for every ratepayer, the increase will only be 0.82%.

The amount will vary according to the valuation of each property. It is again worth noting that the requirement to phase out minimum rates is a decision of the State Government and is beyond the control of Council.

Therefore, when we refer to a total increase of 0.82%, it is the level of total revenue received by Council from rates and charges which is being measured.

In that context, the budget result is pleasing despite a continuing decrease in Government funding and a decrease in other forms of income arising from the depressed economy.

The recent ratepayer survey conducted through *Kewriosity*, showed overwhelmingly the wish by residents to have more works undertaken on the City's footpaths.

Consequently, the allocation for footpath works within the 1993/94 Budget has been increased threefold.

Council continues to seek to minimise the level of contribution to its operating expenses required from rates and charges, and to this end, it is concentrating upon its core business services and conducting reviews of those services to ensure that the maximum efficiencies are obtained at the minimum cost.




MAYOR'S COMMENT

During October the new rate for the 1993/94 year will be struck by Council. This follows a long and detailed examination by Councillors and Council Staff of our existing services and commitments.

We are very aware of the delicate balance between providing essential and compassionate services and the need to provide adequate future reserves. The Council recognises the hardship experienced by residents, especially those on fixed incomes during these times of economic downturn.

All ratepayers will be pleased to know that the Council has kept the total general rate and charges increase to 0.8%. This is substantially below the 3.5% increase in Consumer Price Index, forecasted by the Federal Government. Most other charges have been kept at the 1992/93 level. One of the most pleasing aspects of this budget is the obvious increase in efficiency in some area's of Council's operations. These efficiencies are the main reason that Council increases are less than CPI.

The new Waste Management Strategy is an example of how improved Council services and community involvement combine to reduce costs. Decreased volume in waste being tipped, and increased participation by residents in recycling programs has produced savings. These savings are being directly reflected in the Waste Services Charge, which over the past three years has decreased from \$104.30 to \$96.80 to \$87.50.

One of the exciting projects included in this year's budget is the extension to the gymnasium and aerobic area of the Kew Recreation Centre. This will enable more access to facilities at the Centre which are ever increasing in popularity.

The Council also plans to inject \$200,000 into the ongoing development of Kew Junction. This is in keeping with our commitment to the Main Street Program and the upgrade of services and amenities in the area.

Raoul Wallenberg Monument


Kew residents are familiar with the statue on the corner of Princess and High Streets, but how many people are aware of the history behind it?

The statue was unveiled in January 1985 as a monument to missing Swedish diplomat, Raoul Wallenberg, on the fortieth anniversary of his disappearance in Budapest.

Wallenberg is credited with saving the lives of thousands of Jews during World War 2. He was last seen in Budapest in 1945, when he was captured by Soviet troops. The Soviet Union claims he died in a Moscow prison in 1947, but Free Wallenberg Committees around the world believe he is still alive in jail.

The bronze and rock statue was commissioned by the Melbourne Free Wallenberg Committee, headed by Dr Frank Vajda. Funds for the statue, by Melbourne artist Karl Duldig, were raised by public subscription.

Waste Collection Services

The introduction of Council's **weekly** rubbish and recycling collection has been very successful. However, since its implementation in mid July, some residents have expressed confusion about the new services.

Domestic Rubbish Collection

Your new Mobile Garbage Bin is now collected <u>once</u> a week. Your household may have a new collection day and you might find your bin is emptied later in the day. The new collection days are specified on the back page of Council's brochure *Your Guide to Total Waste Management*. If you do not have this brochure, or require further information, please telephone the Physical Services Department on 854 5277.


Dustbins are no longer collected, nor are loose bags placed beside your mobile bin. The lid of your new bin should always be fully closed.

Please place smaller and lighter bags of rubbish in the bottom of the bin and bulky items at the top. You should not try to force awkward items into the bin. Bags of rubbish can become lodged in the bottom and are difficult to empty even when the bin is turned upside down.

Kerbside Recycling Collection

Your recycling crate is emptied on the **same day** as your mobile garbage bin. However, since a separate truck is used, the collection occurs at a different time of the day.

If you do not have a recycling create, recyclables can be put in a plastic shopping bag and placed beside your mobile bin. Please place your recycling crate approximately 1/2



metre away from your bin to give the truck easy clearance.

Pre-Booked Hard Rubbish & Pre-Booked Garden Waste Services

The twice yearly Hard Rubbish Collection has been replaced by two separate pre-booked collection services: Pre-Booked Garden Waste Service and Pre-Booked Hard Rubbish Service.

From September you can ring the Physical Services Department and arrange for your garden waste or hard rubbish to be collected at a nominated time. Each household is entitled to two free garden waste and two free hard rubbish collections per year.

Parking in Kew

Parking resources need to be carefully managed to ensure that they work for the community. Consequently, in some areas of Kew parking restrictions apply. These are enforced to accommodate the conflicting expectations between different groups within the community: between residents and businesses; between parked cars and moving traffic; and between commercial and private vehicles.

Unfortunately at times parking can be an emotive issue and Parking Officers are subjected to verbal abuse. A person was recently convicted in the Heidelberg Magistrates Court for abusing a Parking Officer and was fined \$200 for the use of indecent language in a public place.

Parking Officers are employed to ensure that everyone has equal access to parking resources. They are only doing their job to protect the interests of the community.




Help Stamp Out European Wasps





Primary School Students Learn to Reduce, Reuse & Recycle

In an initiative by Kew Council, local primary schools are to be offered hands-on activity-based education sessions to help students put their environmental syllabus into practice.

The School Community Education Program was piloted at Kew Primary in July, and received an encouraging response by both students and teachers. Grade One students learnt that the traditional "Three R's" have an new and important meaning in the 90's - Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle.

The Program forms an integral part of Council's Waste Management Strategy. The positive involvement of schools and school age children is a critical factor in the longer term success of recycling. The next generation will have the greatest impact on current and future household attitudes. Children, as well as being future community leaders, play an important role in waste management today; directly by their actions at home, at play and at school, and also through the effect they have on their parent's attitudes.

The Council intends to extend the program to all local primary schools as part of an on-going practical education program.
