## RATES DUE

2nd Instalment Reminder DUE 1ST MARCH, 1993

The Local Government Act provides that interest shall be applied to all rate payments not received by the due date. The current prescribed rate of interest is 12 per cent.

Interest on late payments is calculated from the date the rate became due and payable (10th December, 1992), until payment is received by Council.

The **Final Days** on which payments can be accepted; free of interest charges are:

- 1. In one amount 14th April, 1993
- 2. Second Instalment 1st March, 1993
- 3. Part Payments Balance by 14th April, 1993

It is the ratepayers' responsibility to ensure that all payments are received on or before these due dates. **No responsibility can be accepted for payments delayed in the post.** Interest charges are a statutory requirement of Council.



## New Mobile Garbage Bins & Recycling Crates

A new domestic garbage collection system comprising mobile garbage bins and recycling crates will be introduced by Council in April and May. This is part of a range of improved waste services designed to minimise landfill and make Kew a cleaner and more attractive place to live.

To assist Council in implementing the new system, residents will soon be receiving an order form in the mail asking households to select their new bin and crate size.

Each household will receive the standard 120 litre mobile garbage bin provided for by the waste services charge unless you choose to pay an additional annual charge of \$100 to receive a 240 litre bin. The additional annual charge for the larger bin has been set to encourage residents to maximise their recycling and composting efforts.

Each household will also receive a 50 litre recycling crate unless you choose a 20 litre crate. The smaller crate has a single handle designed to make handling easier for elderly residents, or for use in flats. Both the 20 litre and 50 litre crates are provided as part of the waste services charge.

A 120 litre mobile bin and a 50 litre recycling crate will be delivered as a standard to households. Thus, for many people it may not be necessary to complete the order form. The order form must be returned only by those households requiring a 240 litre mobile bin or a 20 litre crate.

Residents in flats will have the option to choose a 50 litre or 20 litre recycling crate. However a 120 litre mobile bin will be delivered automatically as the option of a 240 litre bin is not available for flat dwellers.

Please think carefully before choosing your mobile bin and recycling crate. Council will be providing many other services to help residents reduce domestic waste. These include a Pre-Booked Garden Waste Collection (for an 'at cost' fee), a free Pre-Booked Hard Rubbish Collection, the Recycling Depot and Heidelberg Transfer Station, and Compost Bins at reduced costs. Our goal is to substantially reduce the amount of waste going to landfill, which in turn reduces waste disposal costs.

# PARKING SIGNS

'New' parking control signs have now been in place in some areas of Kew and the wider metropolitan area for 12 months. The signs are designed to provide clear symbols which make interpretation simpler. However in some instances residents are still confused about the exact meaning of the signs, particularly in relation to *No Parking, No Standing* and the various *Zone* signs.

To improve community understanding of these signs, examples of the more common signs and their meanings are presented below:



#### No Standing

This sign means you are not permitted to stop unless traffic conditions require it.



#### **No Parking**

This sign means you may stop briefly while picking up or dropping off people or goods. The maximum time that you may stop is 15 minutes.



#### Clearway

A Clearway is a section of road along which you must not stop during the time specified unless required by traffic conditions.

#### **5 Minute Parking**

When the time displayed on the sign is very short the word *minute* is shown with the number. Another example is P2 Minute — two minute parking.



#### **2 Hour Parking**

This sign permits you to park for the time shown by a number beside the letter **P** (parking), in this case for two hours. Another example is 1P — one hour parking or 1/2P half hour parking.



#### **One Hour Parking Area**

Parking within the designated area is restricted to the time limit for the specified period, in this case for one hour. The restriction applies until you reach an **END AREA** sign. That is, the restriction applies in the area which falls between the two signs.



#### **Disabled Persons Parking**

Parking in these areas is only available to vehicles displaying a disabled persons parking permit.



#### Zone

Zone signs reserve a section of road for the use named on the sign.



#### Loading Zone

This sign allows only commercially registered vehicles to stand for 15 minutes maximum when loading or unloading.



Bus Zone A Bus Zone is for buses only.



#### Permit Zone

This sign allows vehicles displaying a valid permit for that zone to park.

Compliance with these and other parking signs will contribute to the safe and equitable use of our roadways.

Every second Saturday evening the Kew Youth Resource Centre fills with noisy teenagers looking for something to do. They come to *Saturday Night Live* because it is a place where they are provided with the space to meet and enjoy each others' company with organised activities, games and supper.

Aimed at young people from 11 to 15 years, the *Saturday Night Live* program is set up and funded by Kew Council. Guidance and supervision is provided by a program worker, volunteers from Kew Rotaract, and the program's coordinator Gina Maxwell, a teacher with more than 20 years experience.

Since beginning in July 1992, the
