STRATEGIC BICYCLE PLAN

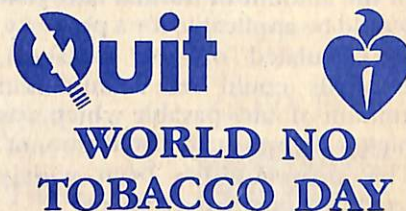
The City of Kew is set to develop a joint Strategic Bicycle Plan with the City of Hawthorn. The aims of the study are to identify the extent and nature of existing cycling, develop programs to encourage cycling, create improved on and off-road cycle networks and to improve safety for cyclists.

A Steering Committee, comprising of representatives from Vic Roads, Council, Victoria Police, Ministry of Education, Bicycle Victoria and local bicyclists will over-

see the development and implementation of the study. Consultants Gutteridge, Haskins and Davey Pty. Limited have recently been appointed to carry out the main tasks of the study.

The consultation program of the study will include surveys of schools, cyclists, residents and major employers in the study area.

New approach to Rates and Charges

The provisions of the 1989 *Local Government Act* that cover the financial requirements for Councils, come into operation on 1st October this year. The main effect of these new provisions on ratepayers, will be some redistribution of the level of rates for most properties. This will be in addition to the redistribution effects caused by the dramatic decrease in commercial property values.

Articles recently appearing in the Press, have speculated that rates in the City of Melbourne will increase by as much as 50% for residential properties, as a result of the reduced values of commercial properties in the CBD. This effect will not be anywhere near as significant in the City of Kew, due to the limited number of commercial properties in this City compared to the number of residential properties. Early estimations reveal that the shift will be between 2% to 3%.

The influence on rates brought about by the new Local Government Act, will be a significant reduction in the level of *minimum rates*, with that reduction being funded by rates on properties that are not on a *minimum rate*. Since 1973, Councils have been able to charge *minimum rates* for property. This means that regardless of the amount of normal rates that would be applicable for a property, as calculated on the valuation, Councils could set a minimum amount of rates payable which was higher than the calculated amount. This provision has been widely used by Local Government.

The philosophical basis for this approach, is that all property occupiers utilise and obtain some benefits from Council's services and therefore should contribute to the costs of those services in an equitable manner. Those services could be as basic as roads and drainage. Prior to the minimum rate provision, there was a tremendous range in the level of rates paid by different ratepayers. With minimum rates,

there is a cut off point below which all properties are rated for the same amount.

Another use made of minimum rates, has been as a tax equalisation factor. It is this use of minimum rates that resulted in the legislative provision for minimum rates not being included in the new Local Government Act. Therefore Council is required to phase out minimum rates over the next four years. Because there are a number of properties in Kew being charged minimum rates, this will result in a relatively significant redistribution of the rate cost amongst Kew ratepayers.

The new Local Government Act however, still permits the philosophical basis of minimum rates, being contribution to services, to be continued through the ability to apply a municipal charge. The differences between a municipal charge and a minimum rate are that a municipal charge must be applied to all rateable properties, it must be a charge for administrative costs and the total raised from the charge can be no more than 20% of the sum total of all revenue raised by the charge and rates. There are no such limitations for minimum rates.

For a number of years, Kew Council has had three levels of minimum rates being for properties in the site valuation ranges of \$1 to \$17,000; \$17,001 to \$20,000 and \$20,001 and the value at which the normal application of the rate in the dollar becomes the greater. Over the next four years, the level of minimum rate for these properties will be reduced and from 1996/97, all Minimum Rates will be removed.

In order to reduce the effects of the redistribution of the rate cost amongst Kew ratepayers, Council will introduce a Municipal Charge of \$25.00 pa for all rateable properties. This action will enable the cost of phasing out Minimum Rates to be more equally shared by all rate payers. During the phase out period the Municipal Charge will equally apply

to minimum rated properties and non minimum properties, because it is a set charge.

The use of fixed charges ensures that all ratepayers contribute to the City's needs in an equitable way, in a similar fashion to the original intent of the minimum rate. This was a factor considered by Council when it introduced the Waste Services Charge in 1990. At that time, minimum rates were reduced to commence the transition process. The end result will be however, that property valuations will be the primary factor in determining individual rate levels.

From 1992/93, the rate notice received by all ratepayers will contain a total made up of three components being a general rate, a municipal charge and a waste service charge. The two charges will be the same amount for all properties and the general rate amount will vary from property to property, depending upon the valuation or whether or not the property is still receiving a minimum rate.

Finally, it should be noted that the total amount of dollars raised by Council from these charges and rates does not alter. It is the way in which those dollars are raised and the level of contribution from each property which does. This, in turn, means that whilst some properties will have a reduction, in the total amount payable (Charges and Rate), others will incur an increase.

MAYOR'S COMMENT

New Accounting Standard for Local Government

Recent changes to the 1989 Local Government Act and the release of the new Australian Accounting Standard, known as AAS 27, will change the way local government reports on financial matters.

The new standard addresses the unique financial reporting issues of local government and will be similar to the type of financial reporting practised by commercial organisations. These major changes increase accountability to the community and enable the public to easily understand Council's financial reports.

The new standard of accounting will apply to Australian Local Government reporting periods ending on or after July 1, 1993. It introduces major changes to the way in which local governments prepare their annual general purpose financial reports. The emphasis has changed from funding information to concentrate on the performance

and financial position of local government.

The Chief Executive in his column has provided some information on the changes which will affect most ratepayers. If you require any further information on these changes or the new standard of accounting please feel free to contact our staff at the Municipal Offices.

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ST GEORGE'S HOSPITAL — REDEVELOPMENT PLAN

The St George's Hospital and Inner Geriatric Service is a product of the recent amalgamation of the St George's Hospital (Kew), the Victoria Parade Geriatric Centre (Collingwood) and the Henry Pride Wing (Studley Park). It also encompasses the Northcote Day Care Centre, the Camberwell Day Hospital and Day Centre and the Hawthorn and Kew Day Hospital.

In order to reinforce the organisational amalgamation and enhance the delivery of Health Services in a rational and cost effective manner, it is seen appropriate to undertake a Redevelopment Masterplan to review the potential for amalgamation and rationalisation.

Consultants have been appointed by St George's Hospital to undertake this Redevelopment plan in accordance with a programme of work and Health Department guide-lines.

The hospital is located within a residential neighbourhood and as part of the development, the hospital recognises the need to actively consult with its resident neighbours and encourage them to participate in the development of this plan.

With the encouragement of Council a Consultative Committee consisting of Hospital Management, Consultants, Councillors, Council staff and a number of nearby residents has been set up, as a forum for information interchange between the Hospital and the Kew community.

A number of options are being considered all of which incorporate rebuilding of parts of the site, improvement and enhancement of medical services to the community.

The basis for development of the Plan is to:

- Retain the existing general acute services, which includes 140

beds, with clinical emphasis on Obstetrics, Surgery and Medicine.

- Incorporate an additional 60-72 Geriatric Rehabilitation and Assessment beds.
- Relocate the Hawthorn/Kew Day Hospital on site.
- Provide appropriate Allied Health Services to support general acute and geriatric patients.

Details of these options are available for inspection at Council's Planning and Development Department and through resident members of the Committee.

PLANNING FOR OPTIMUM COMMUNITY HEALTH, MUNICIPAL PUBLIC HEALTH PLANS

Local government has always played a key role in the delivery of public health programs, especially in the areas of infectious disease control, food quality surveillance, Maternal & Child health care and domiciliary care. Municipal Public Health Plans (MPHP) are a new responsibility of local government. In 1988 the State government reformed the Health Act and made it a requirement for all local councils to prepare a Health Plan every three years and review it annually.

The Health Plans introduce a planning framework to local government's role in public health. The framework involves:

(1) Identifying and assessing actual and potential public health dangers affecting the municipality.

(2) Developing programmes and strategies that will prevent or minimise those dangers and enable people living in the municipality to achieve maximum well-being.

Council's MPHP development process commenced in 1991 and the primary community consultation and health issues identification have now been completed. A Public Health Plan Committee, whose members represent the local Kew health sector, the Kew community and Council, has been established to utilise the information obtained and develop a plan that will seek to reduce preventable mortality and premature mortality and to help people live as full a life as possible, regardless of their pre-existing level of health.

The Committee is currently assessing what health issues can be addressed in the plan. As a guide, the committee has looked at the ten major causes of sickness and death in Australia:

- Cardiovascular disease.
- Diabetes.
- Injury.
- Communicable diseases.
- Musculoskeletal diseases.
- Cancers.
- Disability.
- Dental disease.
- Mental illness.
- Asthma.

TREES Vs POWER LINES

Kew deserves its reputation as a suburb with leafy avenues of large deciduous trees: Sackville Street, Barrington Avenue and Fenwick Street are prime examples. Keeping these trees clear of power lines is one of the biggest jobs for Council's Parks and Gardens section.

Kew Council, recognizing the importance of its street trees, has adopted a policy of protecting the old trees while also planting new avenues of large deciduous trees wherever conditions allow.

A major problem, which result in the most unpleasant visual impact, is that of keeping trees away from overhead electrical power lines.

Progressively, Aerial Bundled Conductors (A.B.C.s) are replacing the traditional 4 or 5 separate cables. These A.B.C.s have the same num-

ber of cables as before, but with an important difference — each line is insulated and all are bound into one larger cable. It does the same job as before but is visually less obtrusive.

The State Electricity Commission favours the use of A.B.C.s and provides grants to help offset installation costs. Kew Council, having set aside \$25,000 in this year's budget for such a purpose, has applied to the appropriate SECV committee for a matching amount of money. If this application is successful, Council intends to use the grants to re-wire seven streets.

WEED CONTROL

The use of herbicides in Kew is restricted to *Roundup* which is a non-residual herbicide that is immediately absorbed through the leaves of the plant.

This month Council has begun using a blue/green dye with its weedicide. This dye is harmless because it is vegetable based. Depending on the weather the dye can remain visible for up to two weeks.

Other municipalities have found that the addition of dye to herbicides results in a more efficient weed control program, as over-spraying previously treated areas is eliminated.

If you happen to notice an area that has been sprayed blue there is no need for concern. The herbicide used is considered safe and is only active on the plant for several hours.
