

LOOKING FOR DEREGULATION IN NORTH AMERICA

As the fortunate recipient from the Institute of Municipal Management, Victoria, of the Andrew N. Walls Scholarship for 1991, I visited Canada and the United States in September/October of that year. The theme of the tour was set in the context of pressures for microeconomic reform in statutory services and the more general pressure on local governments to provide relevant services which are oriented towards customer needs. My topic was 'Managing Deregulation in Statutory Services' which encompasses planning, building, health, traffic and bylaws regulations.

A wide variety of approaches and techniques was found in visits to five Canadian and two American municipalities. Three major types of approaches were identified which included the linking of land-use planning in a strategic sense to budget processes, reorganising staff resources and improvements to approval processes.

In two municipalities in New Brunswick, Canada, major efforts have been made to link the strategic land-use plans for the municipality with the capital and operational budgets. In both instances particular attention was given to the timeframe within which actions should occur to reflect council priorities and, in the case of Fredericton, an Action Agenda was developed which specified both time-frames and departments responsible for work outputs.

In Vancouver, British Columbia, part of the preparatory process for the annual capital planning process is the preparation of the Community Development Policy which is based on planning initiatives and



sets out information and advice useful to evaluate projects against city objectives. This Policy reflects the priorities of the Strategic Plan for the Vancouver area and makes a direct contribution to the development of the city budget. This technique of linking land-use and financial planning sets a directive and more certain context within which the development industry can operate and appropriate development can be located and encouraged.

In all the municipalities visited on the tour, a strong emphasis was given to training of staff. Two particular examples developed this emphasis in a priority way. The first was in the City of Fort Collins, Colorado, where a Quality Improvement Project had been undertaken to improve services by focusing on the customer, both internal and external to the organisation. The emphasis here was to develop a vision for the future and ensure that as a service provider in the community Fort Collins itself became known as

one of the best. A fundamental aspect of that project in developing and improving customer service was the need for continuous training, education and self improvement of staff.

In Mercer Island, just east of Seattle, Washington, a major innovative project was in the process of implementation. The Development Services Department was formed early in 1991, as a result of a Continuous Improvement Project undertaken in a city of a similar type to that described in Fort Collins but a specific part of the project resulted in a combination of Engineering, Planning, Building Maintenance and Fire Service Functions into a new Department. The vision for the provision of services in this Department relies on team work, performance and relations with external customers. The operation of the Department was structured in teams which relate to customer needs, rather than teams based on professional areas of expertise.

An eighteen month process had preceded the implementation of the Development Services Department in Mercer Island and a whole range of complementary actions, including staff training and feedback to management were in the course of being implemented. The project has generated considerable interest across the United States and represents an innovative, human resource based approach to customer service.

Other customer service improvements and responses to pressures for regulatory improvements include a range of minor and major techniques which can be adopted alone or in conjunction with others. A few of these found on this study tour included approaches to streamlining permit approvals in the City

of Vancouver, by upgrading computer based systems, customer area layouts and administrative processes, the use of citizen expert referral bodies and fast tracking of minor approvals.

In Saint John, New Brunswick, the message conveyed on pamphlets in the Department Information Section was helpful and positive. In Mercer Island an accelerated permit review had been developed for defined works and facilities had been provided for customers to ensure the experience of visiting the Department became a pleasant one. In Kirkland, Washington, basic information was available freely on who was in the Department, what the Department did and who was responsible.

The challenge of deregulation in statutory services is significant because substantial pressure is likely to be exerted to either remove or greatly simplify some of the regulations which local communities currently value highly. The key element ap-

pears to be the clarity of information made available to the community and the development industry who become the customers.

Whether techniques involve establishment of fairly sophisticated strategic policy documents which could at first sight appear to be cumbersome in themselves, the linking of those and the implementation of those policies in a concerted and clear manner provides an accepted direction. In all the municipalities visited it was apparent that regardless of the systems it was the way those systems were understood by the customers that was critical to their success.

Overall, it is clear that statutory services even in the present regulatory environment could, by adopting simple measures become much more customer oriented. In addition, it is possible that a clearer linking of a strategic policy framework between land-use and financial components provides a better policy environment for simplifying

planning and building regulations in particular.

There are many ways in which public sector departments and local government in particular can improve their approach to their customers. Many of the opportunities available are human resource based rather than regulation based because many of the regulations are administered by other levels of government. As customers from outside the organisation and inside the organisation well know, it is the attitude of the person conveying the information which so often sets the climate for cooperation or conflict. My belief is that local government management can contribute significantly to managing deregulation in a way which will better serve the community and the development industry.

Grateful thanks are extended to the Council of the City of Kew for granting leave to undertake the tour. My aim is to ensure the benefit returns to the Kew community.

NEW PARKING SIGNS

The new parking signs, despite their intent to simplify existing signs, have created the need for further explanation of their content.

The following are examples of more commonly found signs and their meanings:



No Standing — You are not permitted to stop unless traffic conditions require it.



No Parking — You may stop briefly to pick up or set down goods or people. Maximum time you may stop is 15 minutes.



Clearway — is a section of road along which you must not stop, unless required by traffic conditions.



5 Minute Park — Where the time limit is very short the word minute is shown with the number. Another example is P10 Minute — ten minute parking.



2 Hour Park — you are permitted to park for the time shown by a number beside the letter P(park), in this case two hours. Other examples 1P - one hour Park and 1/2 P - half hour Park.



Zone signs reserve a section of road for the use named on the sign.



Area set aside for commercially registered vehicles whilst loading and unloading goods (15 minute limit).



Buses only



For vehicles displaying a valid permit for that zone.

Compliance with these and other parking signs will contribute to a safe and equitable use of our roadway.

Disabled Persons Parking Permits Have you got the latest permit?

Kew Council has recently attempted to contact everyone who holds a Disabled Persons Parking Permit to ensure they have the new permits. If you are using an old permit you may be booked as illegally parked. If you have not changed your permit, over the last 12 months, you will most likely need a new one.

The new permits are plastic cards with black suction caps (refer to picture). They show the name of your Council and have an expiry date engraved on them.

LONG TERM PARKING

Long term car parking spaces are available in the Fenton Avenue Off Street Car Park, Kew. Preference will be given to applicants from commercial premises who do not have and can not develop any private off street parking facilities.

The current fee is \$250 per annum. This entitles a permit holder to a reserved parking space, for one calendar year.



VALE — JOHN HOGAN GERVASONI J.P. 1929-1992

The many friends, acquaintances, students and colleagues of former Kew mayor, Jack Gervasoni, were greatly saddened by his recent and sudden death.

On Thursday 13th February, 1992 at Sacred Heart Church about 1100 people attended the Burke Hall teacher's funeral.

The Burke Hall Chaplain, Father Geoff James, led the service. He was assisted by 12 priests, many of whom were representative of Xavier and the Jesuit order.

Kew Councillor, Gery Petrie delivered a sterling tribute about his friend and colleague. Cr. Petrie recalled, 'His encouraging quick words to team mates on the field lifted their games. His students adored his tall stories. His Council colleagues eagerly awaited his interjections which would bring everyone back to reality. He was so quick with the apt reply.'

Mr Gervasoni was a man of many talents. Not only was he a gifted teacher, he was a star past player for Fitzroy Football Club. He played 90 senior games and was an energetic committee person for the Lions. He was a dedicated coach of many teams and always offered a welcoming hand to migrants. He was also a champion bowler and had been your 'friendly neighbourhood newsagent.' He was a great supporter and leader of youth activities. He and friends converted a disused police station into a Youth Centre, known as the Cop Shop.

Mayor of the City of Kew from 1978 to 1979 and long serving Kew Councillor from 1971 to 1980 Jack Gervasoni, was a great contributor to the community but above all he was a dedicated family man. On behalf of the residents of Kew and Council we extend our condolences to his wife Kathleen and children Ann, Clare and Lisa. He will be remembered and greatly missed.

DRAFT GAMING MACHINE POLICY

Gaming Machine Control Act 1991

Kew Council is concerned that the State Government legislation which permits the installation and use of gaming machines, in licensed premises, does not take into consideration any issues that directly relate to local amenities, such as noise nuisance or parking requirements.

A Draft Gaming Machine Policy has been prepared by Kew Council in an endeavour to provide adequate safeguards for the amenities of Kew.


