Commentary

At the outset of my column I would like to mention the passing of, Albert Samuel George Stevens, last month, at 89 years of age. He was elected Mayor of Kew on two separate occasions, being the term 1953-54 and 1963-64. Bert's contribution to the City of Kew was vast and I would like just to mention a few of his many achievements.

Albert Stevens served the community in many ways. He was a Justice of the Peace and served continuously for 24 years as a Councillor of the City of Kew, from 1948 to 1972. The Sports Pavilion at Stradbroke Park bears his name. He was involved with the establishment of the Red Cross Calling Appeal in Kew and throughout Victoria. He also promoted First Aid training for Civil Defence in the City of Kew. He worked for Lions International, founding and serving as first president of the Kew Lions Club. He assisted in the formation of the East Kew Branch of the Liberal Party. In addition the Auburn Heights Bowling Club and St Hilary's Church Tennis Club, benefitted from his energies and skills for 30 years or more.

Albert Stevens will be remembered as a great contributor to the City of Kew and on behalf of the Kew Community, I offer my condolences to his children and their families.

The final report of the "120 Litre Mobile Bin Recycling Trial" was released in August. It was attended by representatives from local industries and government, most notably the previous Minister for Conservation and Environment, Steve Crabb.

As a Council, we are committed to minimising the amount of waste taken to landfill sites and providing the best possible waste management services. Council's Waste Management Committee is currently considering the results of the survey which was carried out over a six month period, by more then 200 households in Kew.

The main conclusions from the trial are that a solid container is generally preferred by residents. It would appear, there is overwhelming support for wheeled bins to collect recyclables, instead of the bags which are currently available. In fact, approximately half the residents who participated in the trial stated that they would be willing to pay \$15 per year for three years to cover the cost of 120 litre bins.

Nearly 80 per cent of residents asked to participate became involved in the recycling trial, which compares to a participation rate of just over 50 per cent in Kew's current kerbside bag recycling collection scheme.

It was evident from the trial that the provision of the 120 litre bin, together with increased public awareness of recycling, resulted in more materials being recovered from the waste stream than is currently achieved with the kerbside bag collection.

The "120 Litre Mobile Bin Recycling Trial" Report is available to residents of Kew, from the



Kew Municipal Library, corner of Cotham Road and Charles Street, Kew (entrance via Cotham Road, rear of the Municipal Offices). The results of the trial are being used by Council to help determine the best methods for Council to adopt for disposal of all waste. It is anticipated that a decision on the type of system to be adopted will be made during the first half of 1992, with implementation in early 1993.



CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S COLUMN HOW COUNCILS RAISE REVENUE

One question that I am regularly asked about local government, is how do Councils raise revenue? Basically funds are raised from five main areas being rates, charges or fees, government grants, loans and "business" activities.

Business activities in this context relate to rentals from properties owned by Council, fee for service activities and joint ventures with the private sector. The percentage of the total revenue raised from each of these five main areas, varies from Council to Council, depending upon their level of disadvantage or ability to invest.

In Kew the break-up between the four areas is approximately: rates — 61%, charges — 13%, government grants — 10%, loans — 8% and "business" activities — 8%.

Of all the revenue raising areas, the way in which a Council raises rates is the *most* mis-understood. As explained in my last Kewriosity column, rates are a charge made against each property as a "property tax", based upon the valuation of that property.

For the purpose of raising rates, it does not matter which type of valuation base is used, be it site value, improved capital value or nett annual value. Nor does it matter if property values in the municipal district are increasing, or even decreasing at 6% per annum or 60% per annum. This is because the way that Council, like all Councils in Australia, determines the rate of "property tax" (or rate in the dollar) is to determine the amount of money that it requires to provide all works and services for the year, then divides that amount by the total relevant valuation of all rateable properties in the city.

The resulting figure is the rate in the dollar applied to the valuation of each property to give the amount of rate which is due. Currently there is an equalizing factor called a minimum rate. This is a figure determined by Council as the minimum rate which should be paid by each property, regardless of its valuation. It is based upon Council's assessment of the level of payment that each property should contribute to the city, for the use by that property's occupiers of the services provided by the city.

From October, 1992, minimum rates must be phased out in accordance with the *Local Government Act 1989*. At that time, Councils will be able to follow through the philosophy of a minimum charge for services by applying a "Municipal Charge". The difference however will

be, that all properties will be charged with that standard "Municipal Charge". That is, regardless of the valuation of a property, all rate notices will comprise three separate charges being: a rate (calculated on the property's valuation), a municipal charge and a garbage charge.

This was one of the reasons why Kew introduced a garbage charge this year. A restriction placed on Councils' use of the municipal charge, is that a maximum of 20% of the total rate revenue can be raised from the charge. Currently, Kew raises 10.52% of its rate revenue through the application of minimum rates.

Therefore, the only influence that different valuation bases or movements in property values have, is on the amount that individual properties are taxed. It is the total value of all properties in the city, that makes the difference to the rate in the dollar charged. This is one of the many reasons why Kew has one of the lowest level of rates in Victoria.

The advantage that developing municipalities enjoy over established municipalities, is that through the development of low value farm land to high value residential land, they obtain an increase to the *total value* of properties in their municipal district and as a consequence, additional sources of rate revenue.

A couple of years ago, at a local government meeting, the then Federal Treasurer was reported as saying, that he could not understand why local government needed more money, when it must be "rolling in it", because property values had been "pushed through the roof". I hope that this column has explained why this is not the case, especially in established areas.






TRINITY GRAMMAR PRIZE WINNING STUDENTS
