## REPORT ON EAST KEW "OVERDEVELOPMENT"

The possible threat to the mix of housing stock in an area of East Kew has prompted a residential survey, and some recommendations to the Kew Council. The area encompassing Kitchener Street, Hamilton Street, Valerie Street, Windella Avenue, Cadow Street, Strathalbyn Street, Westbrook Street, Hartwood Street and Clyde Street was developed with houses between 1915 and 1939. However, since that time, 'multi unit' developments, such as blocks of flats, villa units, and, in more recent years, dual occupancy buildings, have led to a reduction in the number of original homes.

A total of 1982 residents sent back questionnaires, representing a high response rate of 32%. According to the Council's analysis of the questionnaire, there was serious concern expressed about the number of multi-unit developments.

"In particular, those in houses, and families with children, feel themselves to be adversely

affected by the changing social mix", the report

"Further multi-unit development will only serve to gradually undermine this balance by demolishing the single houses necessary to attract families with children into the area", it adds. Further multi unit development would undermine the "suitable level of families with children".

The report recommends that the Ministry of Planning and Environment be requested to support an amendment to the Kew Planning Scheme, so that flats and dual occupancy developments would be prohibited in the Residential 'C' parts of the East Kew study area. It also suggests a similar change to the Council's 'Policy for the Multi Unit Residential Development', to irclude a comment that: 'development within the study area is inappropriate, and contrary to the objective of providing diversity in dwelling density and dwelling types'.

#### Kew's Nod to Power Line Suggestion

Kew Council has expressed its support for the Powerline Review Panel's "City Streets" alternative to the previously proposed Brunswick to Richmond powerline.

The "City Streets" alternative — the Panel's second option — would mean development of an underground 66Kv cable to run under city streets connecting West Melbourne and Richmond terminal stations, with concurrent installations of short 66Kv cables at Malvern and Kew.

Under the plan, the present 11,000 volt line under Eglinton Street between Peel and Princess Streets, would be changed to a 66,000 volt cable. This cable is substantially the same as the one suggested by the State Electricity Commission last year, in its contingency plan to provide partial electricity supply to inner Melbourne in the event of loss of supply from the Richmond Terminal Station.

In expressing its support for the "City Streets" option, the Council is insisting that any new line in Eglinton Street be put underground.

The Powerline Review Panel's first option—already rejected by the Council — favours a 22,000 volt cable run along either Hoddle Street or Nicholson Street and part of the Merri Creek.

Kew Council opposes any power line, above or below ground, which may be proposed for either Merri Creek or the Yarra River, for the same reasons it rejected the Brunswick-Richmond line — the line would not be acceptable in the environmentally sensitive creek and river corridor and could be dangerous to health.

#### **New Councillor**

Councillor Tom Indovino has replaced Joe Ormando in the Kew City Council. After representing the Willsmere ward on the Council for 10½ years, Mr Ormando retired last month.

Since there was only one candidate for the position, an extraordinary election was not required — Councillor Indovino, a solicitor from Grandview Crescent, was declared elected unopposed. He will be representing Willsmere ward until his term expires in August 1991, at which time he will face re-election in that year's annual local government election.

Mr Ormando was congratulated on his period of service, in which he displayed a conscientious contribution to all the issues. He was Mayor of Kew in 1986-7; a member of the Yarra Bend Park Trust; and an active participant in the planning of the Recreation Centre.

Meanwhile, voters' rolls close at the end of this month for elegibility to vote in the annual election scheduled for 5th August. To be able to vote, Kew residents need to have their names recorded on the roll. This record of names is similar to one that is used by the State and Commonwealth Governments for their elections. However, an additional group of people is allowed an optional vote in local government elections, although not in other mandates; these are non-resident owners of property in Kew. In the case of joint owners of property, the Municipal Office should be contacted regarding the choice of which individual would like to take up the opportunity of exercising the vote, on behalf of that group.

Kew residents are automatically entitled to vote if they are enrolled voters for Commonwealth and State elections. To apply for enrolment, an individual needs to be a non-British subject, over 18 years of age, and a resident of Australia for six months, Victoria for three months, and Kew for one month.

Once a name is recorded on the voters' roll, it is compulsory for that person to vote at all local, State and Commonwealth elections; the

only exceptions are owners of property in Kew who live outside the municipality, and residents over the age of 70.

#### Cotham Road Reconstructed

Some traffic delays will be caused by the re-construction of Cotham Road, between Normanby Road and Bradford Avenue, until August. The cost of \$850,000, to be shared by the Road Construction Authority and the Kew Council, will pay for new road pavements; kerbs and channels; footpaths and naturestrips.

In the meantime, work has been completed on the re-surfacing of Lofts Avenue. The total cost was \$24,500, of which \$14,500 was contributed by Methodist Ladies' College. During the construction of the sports centre at MLC, trucks had left behind them some damaged sections of the roadway.

And affecting the whole of Kew will be a future 'Streetscaping Master Plan'. The Council has invited submissions from consultants for the development of such a Plan.

Last year, the Council formed a Streetscaping Committee to consider, and advise on, streetscaping issues. The Committee, which consists of resident landscape architects, Councillors and Council staff, recommended to the Council that a Master Plan should be developed, to ensure a consistent approach towards street landscaping works.

A brief has been developed, and adopted by the Council. It is proposed that a consultant should be appointed this month, and that the final report should be presented to the Council in August. The Engineering Department, on phone 860 5234, has full details.

### Traffic Management Updates

AREA 5 (bounded by High, Valerie, Asquith, Earl and Princess Streets). The installation of road humps in Pakington Street has now been completed. After a settling down period of a few months, the precinct will be subject to traffic surveys, to assess the impact of the humps. The Area's Traffic Management Committee will be meeting shortly, to discuss detailed designs for, and priorities for, works outstanding for the area. Further details will be provided as they become available.

AREA 6 (bounded by Cotham and Burke Roads, and High and Charles Streets). The review of the traffic management scheme installed in Area 6 in 1988 has commenced, with traffic counts, speed surveys and on-site observations taking place. Residents are invited to contribute their views; the Area's committee will assess the surveys, and the residents' comments, and make recommendations to the Kew Council concerning any possible changes. Its report is expected to be presented to the Council in June.

AREA 7 (bounded by Barkers Road, High St South, Studley Park Road and Walmer Street).

This Area's Traffic Management Committee has met with Ove Arup Transportation Planning, to discuss the response to the draft traffic management plan which was circulated to residents of the area in December. Ove Arup is now finalising its report to the Council on its study of the traffic in this area.

AREA 10 (bounded by Barkers, Burke, Cotham and Glenferrie Roads). Ove Arup

Transportation Planning is reviewing the traffic management plan prepared by the Area 10 Traffic Management Committee. Subject to the Council's consideration of the review, a draft traffic management plan for the area is likely to be circulated to residents for comment in May or June.

REVIEW OF PARKING PERMIT POLICY
Kew Council has received a report reviewing
its parking permit policy. Based on comments
received from residents and business people,
a number of changes to the draft policy
circulated for comment have been proposed.
The Council has decided to defer consideration
of the report to allow further discussion with
business people, particularly those around Kew
Junction. In the meantime, the Council's current
parking permit policy for residents remains in
force.

### IN FOR A PENNY. . .

All stray dogs found in Kew are now being sent to the dog pound located at the Malvern Council depot, in Tooronga Road . This building, constructed in 1983, takes lost dogs from Prahran, Malvern and Hawthorn, as well as Kew; the costs of running it are shared by these municipalities.

Over one hundred stray dogs each year are picked-up in Kew. Many are unregistered, making the task of tracing the owners most difficult.

As part of a blitz on unregistered dogs, the by-laws department staff will be checking randomly selected areas for such animals. Any dog over the age of six months which is found to be unregistered could lead to a \$200 fine for the owner. The current year's tag should always be displayed on the dog.

A dog wandering at large outside an owner's premises could result in a fine of \$100 during the day, and \$200 at night time. If a dog goes missing, the owner should telephone Council's By-Laws staff on 860 5253. It is often a good idea to contact neighbouring municipalities, as well. #### AS RUYTON LIKES IT

To mark the opening of a new classroom block, students from Ruyton Girls' School performed 'As You Like It' for the assembled guests. The location for the performance on the 1st March opening day was the open-air stage nestled into the landscaped 'Hiscock Court'. Designed as an ancient Greek inspired amphitheatre, the stage is thought to be the first one of its type to be built into an Australian school.

The Margaret McRae Centre, as the new building is known, contains five science laboratories downstairs, with English, Maths and seminar rooms upstairs. It was officially opened by Margaret McRae, a former Head Mistress of the school.

The current principal, Mrs Prue Gillies, commented: "The new centre is the first stage of a building program which is a realization of a long term master plan; however, Ruyton is still committed to maintaining those timeless qualities which enable every student to be valued for her worth".

The building features a sky-light, outside staircase, first floor walkways to three adjoining buildings, and surrounding landscaping.

Former laboratories and classrooms, left empty by the move into the new centre, have been turned into music and drama rooms; they all open-out onto the new landscaped area known as 'Hiscock Court', with its centrepiece of open air stage.

The new Centre is the first stage of a building program reflecting Ruyton's commitment to what it calls "a small school ethos". Among additional features, Ruyton plans an indoor gymnasium, extra computer facilities and multi all-weather courts.



The swimmers are taught how being physically fit can improve lung capacity and improve resistance against asthma, thus

minimising attacks. They are also taught appropriate warm-up exercises to inhibit exercise-induced asthma, and given advice on improved posture, physique and muscle tone. Their lung function is measured each lesson and they are taught to self monitor their lung performance using a peak flow meter.

- Engrave or mark your accessories with the letter V (for Victoria) followed by your driver's licence number.
- Don't leave luggage, packages or other easily removed items on view inside your car.
- Don't move goods from the inside of your car to the boot, at the same location as it is to be parked. A thief may well be watching.
- When leaving your car always remove the ignition keys, lock the doors, windows and glass vents.

- Steering locks and alarms are very good value. Always engage them before you leave the car.
- Never leave your car keys in the ignition at home, and never keep your car keys on the same ring as your house keys.

#### KEEPING YOU INFORMED

Last month we outlined briefly the origins of the Citizens' Advice Bureau in wartime Britain and we now look at its development in Victoria. The end of World War II saw a widespread strengthening of Government financed welfare services in Western countries. In Australia there had been much reliance on church oriented organisations such as the Salvation Army, the Brotherhood of St. Laurence and St. Vincent de Paul. While these bodies still maintain their vital community services, a multiplicity of other support groups has been developed to help with almost every human need. It was partly to assist people find the most appropriate source of help and information that the early Citizens' Advice Bureaux were established in Victoria.

A seminar conducted by the Victorian Family Council in May 1960 drew attention to the need for a comprehensive advisory and information service. This led to the opening of Victoria's first CAB at Box Hill in 1962. Since then there has been a rapid expansion, and there are now 65 Bureaux in Metropolitan and Country Victoria. Though each is autonomous, all Bureaux operate to standards developed by the Victorian Association of Citizens' Advice Bureaux, which was founded in 1970. The Association is supported by Community Services Victoria, and most Bureaux receive encouragement and financial help from local Councils.

The Kew Bureau is located at the rear of the Library, and opens each weekday between 10am and 3pm. The telephone number is 861 5244.
