

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S COLUMN

Kew's Future ?

Over the past few weeks, the media has been providing coverage on Local Government Boundary changes, predominantly as a consequence of the changes to the City of Melbourne's boundaries.

The recent discussion of Kew's boundaries in the *Progress Press*, has been precipitated by the exploration of an option by the Cities of Richmond and Collingwood, of a merger of the municipalities of Kew, Hawthorn, Richmond and Collingwood.

The City of Kew has assessed this option and rejected it as a possibility. There are a number of reasons for this decision including:

* The lack of a community of interest which extends to philosophical differences.

* The natural boundaries between the areas created by the Yarra River and the Yarra Bend Park, which would negate in many cases the economies of scales advantages of a merger.

* The historical differences in industrial relations and service provisions between the municipalities. * The conflicting interest which would result at a community level in the allocation of priority and resources.

In addition, it has been concluded that such a merger would result in a significant increase in the level of rates and charges for Kew ratepayers. This is largely the result of the different philosophical approaches to service provision adopted by the municipalities.

Whilst rejecting this option, the City of Kew welcomes the ongoing review of Local Government by the State Government and in particular, the review of municipal boundaries.

In undertaking a review of its own services, the City of Kew is aware of the benefits that can be obtained in some service areas from economies of scale. Council has been reviewing each of its service areas over the past few years as an essential component of its Forward Planning process. These reviews have resulted in substantial savings in many service areas, together with a number of service improvements. As a consequence, the City of Kew now has a reputation throughout Australia as a leader in the Local Government industry.

The State Government has noted its intention to introduce Compulsory Competitive Tendering for Local Government in 1994. This is another area of change which Council welcomes because it is a practice which this Council has been following for several years. Such changes can only benefit the community in general and ratepayers in particular.


In addition, the State Government is currently legislating to require Councils to adopt a Corporate Management structure and to appoint a Chief Executive Officer. The City of Kew was one of the first municipalities in Australia to adopt this approach in 1978.

Therefore the changes being introduced to Local Government by the State Government are almost without exception, following the examples provided by the City of Kew. They therefore vindicate the pioneering steps which have been taken by the City of Kew.

One of the other pioneering moves made by the City of Kew was the introduction of public participation in Council's decision-making process. This approach has since been followed by many other Councils throughout Australia.

The potential loss of this approach is the major concern which Council has in regard to changes in municipal boundaries.

Council has expressed a willingness to discuss the subject of Local Government Boundary reform with the State Government, the Local Government Board and neighbouring municipalities. In doing so however, the criteria which

the City of Kew believes should be fundamental to any assessment are:

* Achieving a municipality with a community of interest.

* Providing a municipality of a size which has the ability to provide community participation in its decisionmaking process.

* Achieving economies of scale for service areas which can benefit by provision on a larger scale.

Overriding each of these criteria, is an aim to ensure that the Kew community is not disadvantaged by any restructuring of its boundaries. Such disadvantages could include increases in the level of rating, loss of a say in how the area is developed or how resources are allocated to this area and a reduction in service provision.

Council believes however, that solutions are available that maximise the benefits for its community. Consequently Council will pursue these solutions and in doing so, keep its community informed of the options available in order to encourage community debate and participation in formulating the best solution.

We are aware that there are residents of Camberwell who would welcome the approach to Local Government provided by the City of Kew. It is our intention to ensure that the benefits of Kew's approach to service provision and management, are not lost in any restructure debate and that Kew continues to be seen as a leader in the Local Government industry.

MAYOR'S COMMENT

One of the greatest pleasures of being Mayor is the opportunity to meet so many people in the community. To date, the City of Kew has been fortunate in its size, as such allows a greater level of involvement with the community.





Area 4 Traffic Management Study

The Area 4 Traffic Management Study has recently commenced and three public meetings have been held to identify traffic problems in the area and elect a Residents Traffic Committee. Area 4 covers the area bounded by Yarra Boulevard, Studley Park Road, Princess Street and Chandler Highway.

Composting With Worms

Worm Farms are an ideal way to compost kitchen waste. The worms consume food and vegetable scraps, reducing the amount of garbage collected, and as a by-product, produce arich fertiliser. The farms breed quickly and are an ideal source of fishing bait. Reln Worm Farms are now available from the Municipal Offices at a cost of \$40.00. They are a compact unit that can be used in all homes including small flats and units, and include three working trays with a ventilated lid and a collector tray with a tap fitting for the worm castings. For an additional \$20.00, 1,000 worms can be purchased to start the process.

Fire Prevention

With the advent of summer, Council's fire prevention program is again fully operational.

In order to minimise the possibility of fires spreading within the municipality, owners and occupiers are encouraged to keep their land free from undergrowth. Grass, weeds and other materials which are likely to fuel a fire and cause a fire menace to property, should be cleared.

If any resident is aware of property which is overgrown and likely to constitute a fire hazard, please contact Council's Local Laws Office on 854 5213.

Pet Desexing Vouchers Available

Council has introduced a new scheme which entitles qualifying pet owners to a reduction in the cost of desexing their dog or cat.

Residents who hold a Federal Government Social Security Card, Pensioner Health Benefits Card, Pharmaceutical Benefits Concession Card, Health Benefits Card or Health Care Card are eligible. Residents who receive remission on Council rates are also eligible.

Desexing of pets is important for population control. Research also shows that desexed pets are usually less of a problem to the owner and the general community than other pets. Castrated male dogs are 90% less likely to roam, there is a noticeable reduction in aggression to other male dogs and a reduction in aggressive behaviour towards people. Female desexing prevents problems when the animal is 'in season'.




New Pokies for Kew RSL Club


The Mayor of Kew, Cr Tom Indovino, trys his luck on the pokies with State R.S.L President, Bruce Ruxton.
