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## SEC Act threatens trees

Kew residents may be in some unpleasant surprises as a result of the SEC (Clearance of lines) Act.

Kew is now a "declared area" which means that Council has a statutory responsibility to maintain set distances between trees and overhead power lines.

Trees will have to be pruned far more severely than in the past, to comply with the stipulations laid down in the Draft Code of Practice.

Council is very concerned about both the aesthetic and economic ramifications of the Act for Kew.

The harsh pruning, to be carried out over a 3 year period, will adversly affect the appearance of some of our streets and will mean the purchase of new equipment and the employment of extra staff.

Special application will be made to the SEC to vary the requirments in the Code of Practice for significant trees and the SEC will be requested to undertake minor works in some streets to provide increased tree clearance from overhead conductors and thereby limit the need for extra

While understanding the SEC's concern about fire hazards and the continuity of supply, Council believes that the present situation is an over-reaction when the potential dangers from trees growing around and through power lines in Kew are considered.

Kew Council will make every effort to maintain the high aesthetic quality of our streetscapes.

#### Kew residents care for their environment

These incidents are reported promptly and have subsequently decreased considerably.

The mowing of naturestrips is another area where residents help the Council and help to keep the municipality attractive.

We often hear of residents who mow not only their own naturestrip but those of elderly neighbors as well.

One resident even mows a section of the median strip in Old Burke Road and another a large section alongside the Carmelite Monastery in Murphy Street.

## Profile

### Cr David Timms

David Timms has been a Prospect Ward Councillor for a year and a half.

His decision to stand for local government happened "overnight" after a suggestion was made that he nominate.

He had not perceived himself as a particularly community oriented person before that.

I wasn't a member of any local groups, but I did have certain ideas about the way Kew should be managed. I'd watched the freeway carve away part of Hay's Paddock and wanted to act to protect Kew's parklands," he said.

David Timms was educated in Kew and has spent most of his life here.

He runs a successful plumbing business and says that he finds out about many residents' concerns "on the job".

He felt that with his knowledge of the local community and his business management skills, he could make a contribution to his community.

"I see my role primarily as representing residents' views in Council," he said.

David Timms thinks that we are fortunate to have 15 councillors because this makes for optimum resident contact and lightens the load on individuals a little.

Even so, he was surprised at the considerable time commitment involved in his position.



He would like to see more young people standing for election to Council.

"Sometimes it's difficult to find time for everything, but it's really worth the effort to know that you can affect decisions that are made. So many people criticise but are not willing to do anything about it or become involved in the process," he said.

Cr Timms thinks that the contribution of younger people to Council could be of particular value for they may have fresh ideas and a different perspective on Kew's future.

He is concerned with preserving and enhancing the residential amenity of Kew.

He sees this partly in terms of limiting the degree of office development to the Derrick Street "triangle" and ensuring that there are adequate controls on unit development.

He would also like to see the Recreation Centre go ahead.

David's wife Joanne has also become involved in community issues.

She is a member of the local kindergarten committee and the Full Day Care Centre committee.

They have 2 children, Samantha, 31/2 and Kevin, 2.

To find relaxation from his busy schedule, David's favorite activity is to scuba dive in the sink holes and underwater caves at Mt Gambier.

"It's a totally different world," he said with a hint of nostalgia as it is becoming increasingly difficult to really get away from it all.

These days you are more likely to find him flying the radio controlled aeroplanes he builds " in my spare time".



## Hassle free apprenticeship training

The Inner Eastern Group Apprenticeship Training Scheme, launched last October, has really taken off.

Placements are being made, over 60 applicants for placement are being processed and negotiations are underway with over 40 host employers.

What is the scheme?

It is an innovative approach to apprenticeship training instigated by the Inner Eastern Councils and aimed to benefit employers and apprentices by providing a flexible program and support system.

The scheme is particularly suitable for business people who do not want to make a four year commitment to employ an apprentice or who can only provide for some aspects of apprenticeship training.

It would also suit those who would like a second, third or fourth year apprentice.

Kevin Wood, Co-ordinator of the scheme is very enthusiastic about its potential.

"We have been impressed by the standard of applicants in general but those who are invited to join the scheme undergo a screening procedure for aptitude so that employers can be sure of a high level of competence," he said.

Kevin advised students to look at the broad range of trades — anything from stonemasonry to flower arranging, ewellery making to butchering — and not list concentrate on areas like carpentry and plumbing where there is an over supply.

"There is a great need for apprentices in metal trades, motor mechanics and fitting and turning," he said, adding that students should be prepared to try something different.

The group is an equal opportunity employer and encourages young men and women to look at both traditional and non-traditional trades as possible careers.

"There have been rapid developments in trade, particularly in fitting and turning which has become highly technical. It is a very challenging area and would provide a stimulating career for the right person," he said

The group also has positions available in the government and industry accelerated training program.

The scheme provides support for employers by covering all apprentices with WorkCare, adapting requirements to meet employers' needs, assisting with

## Babysitting?

A babysitting club is a group of young families living in a local area. When a club first starts the families often have a common link such as playgroup, church or kindergarten.

The number of families in a babysitting club increases as new families move into the area or when a family feels this type of child will suit their needs.

The club aims to provide home based child care on a reciprocal basis at no financial cost to members.

Using a babysitting club means that a child is cared for in his/her own home by an adult who is usually familiar to the child. Alternatively the child may be cared for in the babysitters' home, with the opportunity of playing and mixing with other young children.

Membership of a babysitting club means that parents and children develop social contacts and friendships, families obtain information about the local community and its resources.
