Kew Council's New Faces

Four new councillors, two of whom are women, have been elected to represent the residents of Kew.

Prospect ward has two new faces, Councillors **Moira Jeffreys** and **Allen Martin**.

Moira Jeffreys has been involved in the peace movement over recent years and her preoccupations have been the global issues of peace and arms control. However, after just one cycle of council meetings, she is "hooked".

"I'm finding the shift of focus to local issues challenging and stimulating. I look forward to a busy year," she said.

And busy it will be. Councillors' workloads are large and Moira Jeffreys will participate in the Kew Junction Planning Committee, the Senior Citizens' Association and the Kew Community House as well as a number of other committees.

Councillor Jeffreys wants to be accessible to residents.

"I hope residents will feel free to con-


tact me with comments, queries and requests because I believe input from residents is the first step in Council's decision-making process," she said.

Joining Moira Jeffreys and sitting councillor, **Murray Wood**, is **Allen Martin**. He has lived in Prospect Ward for fifteen years and is executive director of the Asthma Foundation.

Allen Martin is concerned with those in the community who are not represented by organized pressure groups. He believes that elderly people living alone are in need of a voice on Council.

He is not in favour of local government becoming involved in areas which are the territory of State and Federal governments, but at the same time he believes that Council should be responsive to the wishes of residents.

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Meet our new mayor

Kew's new Mayor is **Councillor Phyllis Hore**.

Cr Hore was first elected to represent College Ward in 1971 and since that time she has been involved in a number of council and community committees.

One of her main objectives in becoming a councillor was to open committee meetings to the public. She is very concerned that councillors should be accountable to residents and the opening of committee meetings to the public in 1982 was a highpoint in her local government career.

Councillor Hore has always been a champion of the right of ratepayers to participate in the decision-making process and to have a say in how their rates are spent.

Councillor Hore sees the mayoralty as an office, being of more importance than the individual privileged to fill the role. Yet she acknowledges that each mayor contributes something of his or her individual style to the position.

What emphasis will Cr Hore give to her term as mayor? She answers in a word — "unity".

"I would like to adopt the theme 'unity' for the next 12 months for it suggests that regardless of the different views we share, the Council must act concertedly in doing what it perceives to be best for our city."

The Mayor sees Council as a collective with input from councillors representing the needs of their con-

stituents, residents contributing their views and staff providing their local government expertise.

"Although composed of different elements, Council and the community are able to come together with the aim of making decisions for the wellbeing of the city as a whole. Consultation and co-operation have never been as visible in our city as they are at this time.

"The growing public response to open meetings and the community's willingness to participate in and promote local activities is very encouraging," she said.

Councillor Hore anticipates a busy year ahead. It will be a period when important Council initiatives like the relocation of the library and the construction of a heated swimming pool will be realised.

"There will be many important issues and difficult decisions for us to face together and it is essential that we approach them in a spirit of co-operation," said Cr Hore.

Kewriosity wishes Cr Hore all the best for her mayoral term.



Traffic Management

Area 10 Bounded by Burke, Barkers, Glenferrie and Cotham Roads

Implementation of the scheme adopted by Council has commenced. All works are to be constructed in permanent form, followed by the permanent installation of most existing temporary works.

Area 9 Charles Street

Final design work on the scheme adopted by Council is now complete, and construction will commence in the near future. The treatments proposed for this area will be constructed in per-

manent form as will the existing treatments in Charles Street at Barkers Road and Wellington Street.

Area 6 Bounded by High Street, Harp, Burke and Cotham Roads and Charles Street

The results of the questionnaire have been compiled and the consultative committee is currently reviewing the proposed scheme and preparing a recommendation to Council.

Area 5 Bounded by High, Princess, Earl and Asquith Streets

The consultative committee has written its report and presented it to Council's

General Purposes Committee on August 20th. Council's response to this report will be included in the next issue of Kewriosity.

Recycling centre to open

Council is currently constructing facilities for residents to be able to recycle cardboard, paper, bottles and glass.

These facilities are being provided at the Council's new works depot off Princess Street (opposite Duke Street).

The recycling facilities currently provided at Holy Trinity Church in Peel Street will be closed after the Council's Centre is operational.

It is expected that the new recycling centre will open towards the end of September. The opening dates and times of operation will be advertised in the local papers when construction is more advanced.

Any queries can be directed to Council's Engineering Department.

Pollarding

As part of Council's policy to plant and maintain large street trees, Peter Davies, Superintendent of Parks and Gardens, has recommended pollarding as the most effective method of pruning certain species, particularly plane trees.

Pollarding, which involves cutting the tree back to its main limbs every four years, looks severe initially but the growth is rapidly replaced and the shape of the tree is maintained.

Motel permit granted

Council has determined to grant a permit for the construction of a 33-unit motel and associated car park at 7-9 Studley Park Road.

Council responded to the residents' objections received by making the permit subject to a number of conditions which would minimise the motel's effect on the amenity of the area. The proposal to include a 65-seat restaurant has been previously refused.

The conditions include restrictions on delivery vehicles, lighting, refuse and noise. No incinerators will be permitted on the site and landscaping must be undertaken as a buffer between the motel and neighbouring properties.

Residents in the area have made a submission to the Planning Appeals Board against the granting of the permit.

Kew's 125th

A meeting was held recently to propose means of commemorating Kew's 125th anniversary which falls in December this year. Those present were mindful of the need to limit cost,

but were concerned to mark the occasion in an enduring way.

Among the proposals before Council are: the installation of a stained glass window in the east wall of City Hall, the gift of a substantial tree to each school in Kew, the introduction of an HSC-level acquisitive annual local history prize, an historical display in the library, a souvenir edition of *Kewriosity* and a lunch for Senior Citizens and two children from each school in Kew.

Kewriosity survey

Council has commissioned a survey on residents' attitudes to *Kewriosity*, to be carried out by postgraduate students at Swinburne College of Technology. The survey will be carried out in October and more details will be given in the next issue.

School Holiday Program

Council will be running a School Holiday Program providing a wide range of activities for primary school children. Council angry over E6 delay

Council is angry over the low priority the Ministry of Transport may give to the E6 route connecting the Chandler Highway to Harp Junction, despite repeated submissions from Council requesting the E6's construction.

Council is very concerned about the continued detriment to residents of Valerie, Earl and Asquith Streets caused by motorists using this route as a feeder to the freeway.

The lack of certainty about the road also affects the plan to develop a linear park along the outer circle reservation east of the Harp and makes planning for the urgently required safety improvements at the Harp intersection impossible.

Disabled Persons' Parking Scheme

The operating guidelines for the Disabled Persons' Parking Scheme have been revised to restrict the provision of stickers to disabled persons only and to specific vehicles nominated by the applicant.

Applicants must be resident in Kew to be eligible.

Secretarial and administrative support to community groups

Comment from local groups has been received on the draft policy for secretarial and administrative support.

Formulation of a policy has been necessitated by the increasing demand for support services from local groups.

Toilet blocks get thumbs down


There has been a resounding "NO" from residents in response to the proposed toilet blocks in Eglinton Reserve and Victoria Park.

In view of the extent and nature of objections, Council has decided not to proceed with construction of the blocks.

"Council planning should be made in a long-term context and there should be restraint on large-scale developments. Private enterprise should be encouraged to take an active role," he said.

Councillor Maree Williams is the new face in North Ward, joining **Councillors Wendy Smith and Joe Ormando**. "New face" is perhaps a misnomer for a person who has been so active in community affairs and who has been representing the interests of various groups at Council meetings for some time.

Councillor Williams was chairperson of the Family and Community Services Consultative Committee, and of the Children's Services Consultative Committee. She is also active in the North Ward Action Group.

Cr Williams practises part-time as a midwife and is a consultant on the Family Planning Council, so it is not surprising that her concerns are with the needs of families in Kew. She sees her role as a councillor in terms of representing these needs.

"I've had extensive experience as a lobbyist, now it is time to be involved in the decision-making process from the other side," Cr Williams said.

cern for the needs of families and small businesses in Kew.

"I would like Council to protect the residential environment. We need improved planning to limit through traffic, and to enhance our parks and street-scapes.

"I'm also concerned that the Recreation Centre and plans for a full day child care centre should go ahead," he said.

Cr McKenzie is also interested in services for the aged in Kew and would like to promote the encouragement of resident interest and input into the decision-making process.

Cr McKenzie will join sitting councillors, **Anne Glasson** and **Chester Keon-Cohen**, in Central Ward.

Another former Mayor, **Jim McCue**,



Writing this submission involved a lot of time, and research, by a small group of parents. We have established that there is a need for a government-funded child care centre, offering quality care at a reasonable cost.

However, there is much lobbying to be done before Kew will have a centre. Kew is now the only municipality in the inner eastern region which doesn't have a government-funded child care centre.

If you have had difficulties getting quality child care, or find yourself on the waiting list with the Family Day Care Scheme, then we need you to write to the Government. Please state the specific problems you've had and highlight the need for government-funded child care in Kew.



"Friends" answer back

In **Kewriosity** for August Mr. Stan Meyer took Friends of Kew Library to task re the plan to move Kew Library into the main City Hall. He is probably unaware of the facts:

- Kew Council during 1984 investigated both Halls use and Library needs.
- It concluded that the main Hall is used largely by other than Kew people, operates at a loss, and that the smaller No. 3 Hall could continue to accommodate the majority of Kew-based needs.
- It also concluded that the best solution for a clear need to expand the Library would be to use the Large Hall at a cost of \$600,000 rather than build afresh at \$1.6 million or more.
- Friends of Kew Library was estab-

lished in March of this year, as a continuing support group of citizens, and immediately lent its support to Council's proposals.

Council last month resolved to implement this plan as soon as funds become available, hopefully this year.

I hope that Mr. Meyer will therefore appreciate that the present Library has been overtaken by public needs and that the Council, not Friends of Kew Library, properly initiated matters and resolved to act, after an investigation of the facts. We look forward to helping the Library, in a small way, to be a better facility for its 4000 users per week.
