The Armistice and our men come home — a personal memory of Kew by Bill Stent

Kew became my home in 1918, so you don't have to be a Rhodes scholar to reckon that I'm fortunate in having a few bonus years up my sleeve. My first pleasant recollection of Kew was being awakened by the dawn choir of blackbirds and thrushes which was very different from the subdued roar of the mines and crushing batteries I'd become used to in Kalgoorlie, my previous home. Over the last twenty years this choir has diminished until today it is almost mute.

When I came to Kew the street gas lighting was manually lit and extinguished by a bicycle rider with a long pole who proceeded from post to post renewing mantles as necessary. The gas was not ignited during moonlight hours. I think that Mr Allen, the father of several boys and long-time Kew resident, was the chief operator.

The main event for 1918 was the signing of the armistice on the 11th of November. Australia's troop commitment on a percentage basis was far greater than that of the U.K. or the U.S.A. and by the end of the war, 60,000 men had died on the battlefield.

There were rumours about the armistice a week before it was declared

and those of us who worked in the city would scan the notice boards outside The Age and The Argus in Collins Street for the latest bulletins. When the rumours were confirmed, the whole population exploded with relief. All the church bells were rung and every youngster who could bang a tin can, banged it.

During October the first batches of Anzacs who had been away for four years were granted their first home leave. They wore red, white and blue rosettes on their shoulder straps and they, together with the wounded who wore blue arm bands, added to the colour at the spontaneous celebrations for the war's ending.

The men who returned went back to work. Harry Holmes continued in his father's hardware business in High Street, Norm Lees and Stan Cook opened a plumbing business in Denmark Street and Ron Stapleton could once more be found in his grocer's shop on the corner of Derby and High Streets.

It was not until 1925 that the war memorial outside the Post Office was unveiled by the Mayor, Mr Carnegie. It is inscribed with the names of the over 600 Kew men who volunteered and the 200 who did not come back and is a constant reminder to all who pass by it each day, of the tragedy of war.

Consultation and the decision making

process

The Kew community is a combination of individuals, services and institutions. One aspect of Council's role is to ensure that the provision of services to the community is running smoothly, that needs are recognized and that problems are discussed.


One way of achieving this is by maintaining consultative links with the different sections of our community. If you glance at the Kew Community Directory you will see that there are a number of groups in Kew representing various interests. From time to time these groups will approach Council on a particular issue and the consultative process will again begin.

Community consultative committees

Council encourages input from the community as a basis upon which informed decisions can be made. Our extended children's services program was developed as a result of investigations undertaken by the community-based Children's Services Consultative Committee.

The decision to establish a Community House is another example of close Council/community liaison. The Family and Community Services (F.A.C.S.) committee in Kew spearheaded the move for the establishment of the House and was able to convince Council that there was a need for this facility in Kew.

There are numerous instances of successful consultation between Council and community, although not all representations to Council meet with the result desired by that particular group. It is Council's role to deliberate on information received and to make decisions for the wellbeing of the whole community.



Traffic management and master plans

The implementation of our traffic management initiatives is the tangible result of a long process of consultation. Area consultative committees made up of interested residents, professional consultants and council officers are convened to work through problems and possible options in the local precinct. As part of that process in Area 5 volunteer residents conducted a doorknock during which reaction to a proposed traffic management scheme was canvassed. The response will help to shape the final recommendation which the consultative committee will present to Council.

Another method of maximising community input into the decision making process is by requesting information. Council has asked many of the private schools in our municipality to submit master plans detailing their current and proposed operations. These plans will act as a guide for both Council and the schools and enable any possible areas of concern to be discussed before any formal procedures to initiate changes are commenced.

This type of consultative process was seen in action in the recent discussions between Council and the Methodist Ladies' College about their proposed new indoor sports complex. Any areas of concern, whether they be held by

Council, school or residents, can be considered at this early point so that the final stages of planning become more straightforward.

Balancing costs

An important aspect of Council's role is to maintain a balance within the municipality. The satisfying of one group's wishes may disadvantage another group so the ramifications of specific decisions must be carefully considered.

Another important consideration is our limited budget and adherence to the financial plan for major works. The realisation of a scheme may have to be delayed simply because we cannot afford it at the time. Priorities have to be set which may not always be popular but they are set after consideration of monies available to finance particular projects.

Interaction and consultation

Council is becoming increasingly involved in human services which can affect everyone from the infant to the aged. Council's relationship with the institutions which service the community is crucial to the smooth functioning of our City. Our policy of interaction and consultation at individual, group and institutional level will enable as many people as possible to have their comments taken into account.

Council and committee meetings are open to the public. Come along and have your say on any issue that concerns you; be part of the decision making process. That is what a healthy community is all about.

Baby Safety Bassinet Loan Scheme

This is a program designed to save young Victorian lives. Under the program, up to 10,000 safety bassinets for use in cars will be bought and loaned at a nominal charge to parents throughout the State.

While 75% of children between six months and seven years use child restraints or adult seat belts, very few babies receive the protection of a safety bassinet. One reason for this is the difficulty of many parents to meet the expense of purchasing approved restraints when they can only be used for up to six months.

The loan scheme should overcome these problems. Both Australian Standards Association approved car bassinets, the "Steelcraft Safety Swinger" and the "Safe 'n' Sound Baby Safety Capsule" will be available under the scheme.

It was hoped to be able to publicise more details of the loan scheme in Kew in this issue, however due to delays these details should be in June Kewriosity.

Read this!

Incinerators may be used between the hours of 8.00 am and 6.00 pm from TUESDAY to SATURDAY only.

You can be fined up to \$400 for burning outside these times.

Traffic Management

Area 10 — bounded by Burke, Barkers, Glenferrie and Cotham Roads

Council considered implementation of traffic management proposals for this area at its last meeting. The designs under consideration are for treatments in Dean Street and Edgevale Roads. Discussions are continuing with schools regarding buses and the picking up and leaving of students.

Area 9 — Charles Street and environs

The report from the Road Traffic Authority on the Area 9 committee's preferred option has been received and a report was presented to the Physical and Community Services Committee recommending the implementation, in permanent form, of that scheme. The resurfacing of the bends in Charles Street was implemented in early April.

Area 6 — bounded by High Street, Harp, Burke and Cotham Roads and Charles Street

A meeting was held in March to determine the final form of a questionnaire to be delivered to all residents in Area 6. Residents should now have received their questionnaires and it is essential that as many people as possible indicate their views.

Area 5 — bounded by High, Princess, Earl and Asquith Streets

A doorknock was held in this area in April to gauge response to traffic management proposals which were developed at meetings of residents and the traffic engineering consultants appointed by Council.

The response to this questionnaire will be taken into account when council determines its preferred scheme.

Kew Council has been quietly employing women in non-traditional areas for some time. This is in keeping with the tradition of women's involvement with the running of the municipality.





 It will provide an alternative activity for young people to express themselves through drama, dance, comedy etc.


The Committee feels the Youth Theatre will be successful if the community realises the importance of such a facility to young people.

THE PARSONAGE


If ever you've driven down Highbury Grove on the way to Kentucky Fried or strolled back from the pool, you would have passed by "The Parsonage" at No. 21.

library news

Both adults and children have been observing Bruce Killen drawing at Kew Municipal Library on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Bruce is a member of The Artists' Cooperative.

It is not often that we can watch an artist at work, but we can always appreciate art works through books. Kew Library has many art books. There are those which illustrate a particular type or period of art such as Impressionism, Realism, Surrealism, Abstract Art, Primitive Art, Baroque Art. Here are several titles available from the Library — Primitive Art, Pre-Columbian, North American, Indian, African, Oceanic — Ferdinand Anton and others. Impressionism — Pierre Courthian. Dada and Surrealism — Robert Short.

The art of a certain country or region is interesting to explore. Books on Italian, French, Dutch, Egyptian, American, Celtic, African, Japanese and Australian art, to name only a few, are all represented in books held at the Library. For example — Africa, tribal art of forest and savanna — Arnold Bambert. The golden age of Australian painting: impressionism and the Heidelberg School — Alan McCulloch.

For those who have been fortunate enough to visit some of the fine museums and art galleries of the world,

a book can help you recapture the visit. Three books which spring to mind are — The Hermitage Picture Gallery, Western European Paintings, The Prado — F.J. Canton, and The British Museum and its collection.

Once you have viewed many works of art you may be eager to learn more about the artists' lives, art history and criticism and aesthetics. Here are a few captivating titles which the Library holds:

Aesthetics — Ways of seeing — John Berger. The Marxist theory of art — Dave Laing.

Family Day Care in Kew

Family Day Care is a coordinated child care scheme where children are placed in the homes of individuals who care for children on a casual, part-time or full-time basis. These minders are called caregivers and are paid an hourly rate for their work.

Caregivers may be mothers already caring for their own children, single people or even grandmothers. The main prerequisite to be a caregiver is a warm nature and a love of children. To allow for greater individual attention, caregivers' groups are limited to a maximum of four children.

Adult Literacy in Kew

A number of adults in Kew have difficulty in reading and writing with confidence. They can be quite embarrassed when people unthinkingly assume that everyone can decipher print—and of course they can't read **Kewriosity**. They rely on a trusted friend or relative who understands their dilemma to pass on information about where they can have a second chance at education.

Since 1978 a large number of adults from Kew. Hawthorn and Camberwell have been involved with the Adult Literacy Program based at Swinburne College of TAFE. Learning is initially one to one with each adult student working with a trained volunteer tutor on basic reading, writing and spelling but, as participation is confidential, little is heard about this opportunity. When the student's confidence has increased. he or she may join with others an English workshop of eight. This is also free and can be a stepping off point to the many opportunities in mainstream adult education, or to enjoying the Kew

Both these programs assume the student speaks English, and about two-thirds of the adult literacy students in Kew are Australian-born, and one-third are migrants with fluent spoken English.

Similar problems exist all over Australia, but the one at Swinburne serves particularly Kew, Hawthorn and Camberwell. If you know someone who can't read this, could you please tell them they can make a second start with their education. Interchange Needs 3.

"Interchange" is a community-based organisation which is designed to support disabled children and their families. It provides this service by matching up a disabled child with a host family or person from the community who regularly cares for that child on a basis of one weekend or day per month.

Many families with a disabled child are faced with extra pressure in their day-to-day role of caring for a child with special needs. More time and energy is required to provide the necessary visits to doctors, specialists, and education facilities. Added to this is the wearing effect of behaviour problems, the isolation, frustrations, emotional pressures and in some cases the maintenance of almost constant supervision. All these factors add to the sheer physical effort involved in coping on a day-to-day, year-to-year basis.



Interchange works on the principle of providing a suitable host or host family from the community who is willing and able to provide on-going monthly respite for a family of a child with special needs. People who volunteer as hosts are not expected to have any previous experience with disability. The only prerequisite is a genuine acceptance and willingness to care for such a child. A training program consisting of three evening sessions of two hours duration is provided by Interchange and is followed by the careful matching up of a child with a suitable host family.


Fundraising by parents over the years has provided the school with a wide range of educational equipment and playground facilities. Current projects are computer equipment and a sprinkler system for the oval.

Emphasis is placed on the acquisition of literacy and numeracy, with the arts, sciences and physical education also being fostered and developed.
