

The Kew Community Festival: Growing Together

Victoria's 150th anniversary theme "Growing Together" has been adopted by this year's Festival committee. What could be more appropriate for our Festival than the ideas of "growth" and "togetherness"?

The Festival has grown from small beginnings 11 years ago to this year's varied two-week program involving all sections of our community. Everyone, from the kinder child to the elderly citizen, can play a part.


The kindergartens have always contributed imaginatively to the Grand Parade at the Festival's opening. Each kindergarten will interpret "growing together" in its own way. Some children will be dressed in national costumes representing groups in our multicultural community.

Schools will also be involved. An arts project involving seven schools has been devised and Glendonald School for the Deaf and St Paul's School for the Blind will be adding their contributions.

There will be a display of basketball prowess by members of the **Paravics Sporting Club** in the car park and an exhibition of art work by disabled community members.

Art and Craft will have an important place in the Festival, but again, with the emphasis on communal activity. You will find the "Craft Village" in front of the Civic Centre and other craft and art activities in which everyone can participate will be an integral part of the program. Come and discover your hidden talents!

The Community House will also be involved. They will be having an open house and barbecue to which all Kew residents are invited, and a fund-raising and publicity stall. If you haven't visited the Community House yet, this is your chance.



By a happy coincidence, Senior Citizens' Week falls during the first week of the Festival. While there will be special activities for elderly people throughout the state, Kew's senior citizens will be involved in their own program. One highlight will be a performance by the Senior Citizens' Choir, which has been a popular event in the past.

Many older people are very active in Kew, providing the backbone of our volunteer body, particularly with regard to the Citizens' Advice Bureau, Meals on Wheels and the Red Cross. Their contribution to the Kew community is greatly valued.

Kew's past will be represented in a photographic display mounted by **Kew Historical Society**. It will focus on the Henty family, their homes and graves. The society will also be conducting its tours around Kew, which are always fascinating. Our past is all around us and without knowledge and respect for our heritage, community growth is impossible.

The Festival is very much a family occasion. Starting with the Fun Day on the 16th of March, to its conclusion on the 31st of March, there are activities that have been designed with families in mind. The Regatta on the Yarra at Studley Park, the spit roast, the Soap Box Derby all have strong family appeal. There will be a variety of rides and refreshments available as well.

There are so many ways you can contribute to the !ife of your community. Coming to the Festival, participating in the activities, buying goods from stalls being held by Kew's self-help groups, are in themselves, contributions.

The Festival has grown from strength to strength since its inception. This is due to the considerable amount of voluntary work put in by the community-based Festival Committee. It is due to the financial support given by Council and to sponsorship by service groups and local businesses. It is also due to your participation.

In the spirit of "Growing Together", join us at the Festival and be part of the celebration of Kew's 125th and Victoria's 150th anniversaries.

Human services in Kew

The Municipal Association of Victoria has developed a proposal for the funding of human services, in response to the Victorian Government's Human Services Programs report which favours more responsibility being given to local government in this area.

Council's representative on the M.A.V., Cr Kaye Cole, chaired the sub-committee on human services programmes. She said that the Association is arguing for maximum autonomy for local government.

"The key policy paper we have prepared, focuses on "Group One" human services programmes. These include infant welfare, children's service, aged services, recreation, library, information and other programmes related to social development.

"We make a number of concrete proposals in the crucial areas of bases for and methods of distributing funding."

Councillor Cole explained that the

M.A.V. saw local government as coordinating, planning and delivering essential human services at the community level.

To realise this role, it is proposed that local government receive a fixed percentage of state revenue and that the federal contribution be increased.

"Grants would be distributed according to a needs based formula, but each municipality would be guaranteed a minimum allocation.

"It is essential that the final funding formula developed should enable municipalities to adequately meet and plan for the needs of their citizens for locally based human services." said Cr Cole.

Waiting for funding

Councillor Wendy Smith, chairperson of the Physical and Community Services committee said that Council will continue to seek funding for a federally subsidised full day child care centre for Kew.

That this move is supported in the community has been made evident in studies undertaken by the Children's Services Consultative Committee and in the formation of a voluntary association, the "Kew Full Day Care Centre Incorporated". Council was addressed by Mr Paul Maginn, representing the group.

"Council supports the establishment of a parent co-operative working toward the establishment of a full day care centre," said Cr Smith. "And we will support their independent submissions to the Office of Child Care for capital and recurrent funding for a centre."

The parent group is in agreement with Council's choice of Victoria Park as the

most suitable site for the centre.

Cr Smith said that Council was unhappy with the Minister for Health's suggestion that Kew share the full day care centre for which Hawthorn has recently received funding. This centre will be situated in West Hawthorn and is therefore not easily accessible to Kew residents.

"The need for a subsidised full day care centre in Kew is clear. The Federal Government has offered a further increase in the number of child care places this year and will review the allocation of additional funding. We hope to be successful in our application for funding this time," said Cr Smith.

Traffic Management

AREA 10 — bounded by Burke, Barkers, Glenferrie & Cotham Roads

The report from the Road Traffic Authority has been received and designs have been completed. Council was to consider these at its meeting on 19th February, 1985.

AREA 9 — Charles Street & environs

Design work and consultation with State Government authorities is proceeding.

AREA 6 — bounded by High Street, Harp, Burke & Cotham Roads and Charles Street

The consultation process was delayed until the end of the holiday season and school recommenced. A meeting was to be held in February to determine the final form of a questionnaire to be delivered to all residents in Area 6.

AREA 5 — bounded by High, Princess, Earl & Asquith Streets

At its last meeting for 1984, Council released the Consultant's report on traffic management in Area 5 to the public. Copies of this report are available in the Library, and for sale at the Engineer's Department for \$3.00. Council also invited the members of the advisory committee set up by the consultant, to form the Consultative Committee. It was planned that this committee would meet in February to decide upon the method of community consultation.

Free trees

Kew Council will continue its free distribution of trees this year, but at a different time and place.

Tree vouchers have been included in the rate notices, but owing to the proposed relocations of the nursery to the new Depot site, it will not be possible to distribute trees from Lalla Street, as planned.

Trees will now be distributed from the new Depot site in Princess Street between the 9th and 18th of August.

During this period, residents are invited to present their vouchers in Princess Street, and collect their trees.

Places available for extended hours kinder!

A few places remain to be filled for Kew's extended hours kindergarten, at Davis Street, unit 2. If your child turns 4 before July 1st or if you have decided that your 4½ year old is not ready to start school, the extended hours program will suit you.

Sessions run from 9.00 to 3.30, five days a week. Fees for this full day kindergarten program are very reasonable.

Children's Services Consultative Committee Report

Extension of Services

Since its inception in December, 1983, the C.S.C.C. has reported regularly in Kewriosity. We are pleased to report that we have been involved in the planning of Council's extension of children's services into the areas of occasional care and extended hours kindergarten. We are also pursuing the issue of government funding for a full day child care centre for Kew.

Children's Services Officers

At present, Council has appointed two Children's Services Workers with C.E.P. funding. We hope that Council will continue its commitment to these positions.

Play leader

A play leader has been employed to act as a catalyst in organising play-groups in various venues throughout Kew, particularly to accommodate three-year-olds.

After school programme

A small programme has operated from East Kew Primary School during 1984. It is hoped that there will be an increase in this service stimulated by wider publicity and with the assistance of a bus to transport children to a single centre.

Future directions

The C.S.C.C. will continue to review the needs in Kew. The committee will observe the establishment of the new pre-school services and assist the community and Council where necessary to maintain the momentum established in children's services last year.

The Annual General Meeting, open to the public, will be held on Thursday the 18th of April. Committee members for the coming year will be elected and any people interested in joining are urged to attend. Venue and guest speaker will be announced in the April Kewriosity.

Hamer Court is home

Hamer Court, Kew Council's independent living hostel for the aged, is home for 30 people. As one would expect in any family, individual members have their own interests and activities, their own sets of friends.

It is a pleasant place to live; with its pale walls and large windows the effect is one of airy brightness. You will find Hamer Court next to the elderly citizens' centre and from High Street the building appears to be single-storeyed. On entering, two storeys are visible; the Court is built into the side of a hill and the architects have maximised the potential visual interest.

The rooms are arranged around a paved central courtyard filled with flowers and shrubs and scattered with tables and chairs. It is an inviting area. In the "back yard" are more gardens and lawns and a barbecue area for entertaining friends.

This is a busy place; there is a feeling of quiet activity. Men and women come and go or relax in comfortable chairs along the sunny corridors. Hamer Court is a place for independent people, and individual endeavours are encouraged.

Mr Ted Aldridge, one of the first residents, has his own workshop where he repairs toys from kindergartens and the toy library. Many residents continue their involvement with the Senior Citizens' Centre, working with Meals on Wheels, helping in the Op Shop and participating in discussion groups.

Mr Bob Parks and Mrs Adele Hobill, also original members, are active in Senior Citizens. Bob also tends the gardens at Hamer Court and Mrs Hobill participates in the craft group. They are both very happy with life at Hamer Court.

Living at Hamer Court provides residents with the opportunity to broaden their interests and meet new friends. They can learn art and craft skills there or join groups at other centres. Some residents have their own cars and there is much visiting.

Janet Dobbyn, the supervisor at Hamer Court, sees herself as the "housekeeper" making sure that everything runs smoothly. There are no set programs that everyone must fit in with. There are regular activities, but there is no compulsion to "join in".

Residents organize their own game of bingo on Friday afternoons, which is well attended. The prizes are token but



that doesn't detract from the fun. At the craft group on Monday mornings, there is a sharing of skills among those from Hamer Court and non-residents who attend. This is an occasion to catch up on the latest news as well as to create saleable items.

Mealtimes are communal times in the attractive dining room. The fact that people enjoy their food is clear — a regular "weight watchers' weigh-in" has recently been initiated.

Residents can prepare tea or coffee in their rooms, which are small but well-designed. Each is different, with the owner's personal stamp clear in the choice of furnishings and nick nacks. There is room for entertaining one or two quests.

Just as in any family, members have responsibilities. People take turns at clearing the tables and helping in the kitchen and with general housework and gardening. There is a "family conference", where residents meet to discuss the day-to-day happenings and clear up problems. It is a supportive community, with people always ready to help or listen. Janet Dobbyn and her staff put a high priority on personal care.

Mrs Dockerty, a newcomer at Hamer Court, has found her high expectations were not unrealistic. She spoke of how helpful, friendly and kind her new neighbours were and how secure she felt in a tight-knit community. The only things

she missed were those ingrained habits of housework and shopping, but she felt sure she would adapt easily.

Living at Hamer Court is a comfortable blend of looking after yourself and being looked after, the individual and the communal. As a member of the excellent "room service" staff said, "It is a happy place, close and homely". She should know!





Kew woman captains Victoria!

Kew resident, Ruth Buckstein, captained the Victorian Women's Cricket Team which played the touring English side in Melbourne recently.

The two one-day matches held at Aberfeldie Park resulted in one win each. Victoria did not play to its full potential on the first day, a combination of nerves and a lack of experience in this tactical and highly pressured style of play. Ruth made 41 of the 127 runs Victoria scored. The team made up for this next day, beating England by four wickets.

"The English team was much more experienced than the Victorians. It was wonderful to have the opportunity to play against them and to do so well," said Ruth.

She began her cricketing career at the age of 18, which is considered to be a late start. After playing with various sides, Ruth joined the Preston Women's Cricket Club five years ago. There is no women's club in Kew.

"I like playing for a team," said Ruth.
"I like the group spirit. When we win it's because everyone has worked together. It's a great feeling!"

Ruth feels that cricket is a game that suits a variety of talents and caters for a wide age range, with most players in their twenties and thirties. This differentiates it from most other games which attract predominantly younger players and is a factor in the proliferation of women's clubs.

She is enthusiastic about current developments in women's cricket. "We have had problems with sponsorship and publicity, and have always played on poor grounds as men's teams have

A street by any other name . . .

This is the first of a series on the origins of our street names. These names are signposts to the past, many of them referring to Kew's pioneer families, their homes, and other illustrious residents.

Stawell Street and Sir William Street

These streets are both named after William Foster Stawell. He was born in Ireland in 1815, practised law there and then migrated to Australia at the age of 27.

Garryowen described him as "a careless, fair and easyish sort of fellow", but neverthelss, an excellent cross examiner. Mary, his wife, wrote of his "fine figure and delightful manner, his wonderfully expressive eyes." He was, by all accounts, a ladies' man.

He was very involved in politics and became in turn, Attorney General, Chief Justice and Acting Governor of Victoria. He was knighted in 1857.

He was also a somewhat intolerant gentleman, and has been blamed, along

with Governor Sir Charles Hotham, for the Eureka troubles.

His land ranged from Princess Street (then a bullock track) to the Yarra and north to Wills Road. **Stawell Street** marks the southern boundary.

Sir William built **D'Estaville** in 1857. It is a fine bluestone residence, a copy of his home in Ireland, and eminently suitable for entertaining the Duke of Edinburgh, Anthony Trollope and other dignitaries. The house remains today in Barry Street.

Sir William had a large family, of six sons and four daughters. Having decided to travel, he sold the house in 1888, but died in Italy the following year en route to England.

Senior Citizens' Week March 17-24


