

Your councillors are very approachable. We have an expert staff who can help with your problems or concerns. Council cares about the residents of Kew and allocates a significant part of its resources to social development.


Some people ask, "Why should Council spend money on social services? That is the responsibility of Federal and State Governments. Councils should stick to garbage collection and road maintenance."




## Depot works on schedule

Work is well underway for the new Kew Council Depot in Princess Street. Earthworks and drainage works are nearing completion and the concrete contractor has commenced constructing building slabs.

"We are very pleased that the work is right on target," said Councillor Jim McCue, Chairman of the Depot Development Project Committee. "Our project managers, McGinley and Partners Pty. Ltd., have advised us that the Council's nursery will be relocated from its present site in Parkhill Road, to the new site, by December this year."

Stage 1 of the project, which includes the nursery, main depot building, earth and road works, carpark and landscaping, is programmed for completion in late 1985. At this time, the final changeover of Council activities from Disraeli Street, will take place.

Kew's new Municipal Depot will include a recycle depot, in its Stage II. This recycling function, however, is not likely to be available for more than a year hence. Council advises residents that Holy Trinity Church has undertaken to continue their existing service, if needed for another six months at least.

Venue: Recycle Depot, Peel Street, next to church tennis courts.

Time: Open 8 am - 12 noon daily, except Sundays and public holidays.

Material accepted: clean paper, magazines, books, cardboard, glass bottles and jars.

N.B. - NO plastic or film accepted.

# Kew Library on the Move

If you have been literally "bumping into your neighbour" every time you try to get a book from the shelves at Kew Library, relief may soon be in sight.

Plans to overcome the library's severe shortage of space by relocating it in the present City Hall, are currently being considered by Kew Council.

The Library Review Committee undertook a feasibility study and consulted with a number of community groups prior to recommending the relocation scheme to Council last month.

Anybody visiting the library on a busy Sunday afternoon will know that these days it is not a relaxing place to be; Kew Library is only one-third the size specified in International Standards for local libraries.

This, coupled with the more than 50% in-

crease in loans since the library first occupied these premises, has created extreme pressures for staff and users alike.

The lack of space creates congestion at peak times and makes any further development or extension of library services impossible.

Cr. Kaye Cole, Chairman of the Library Review Committee said, "The larger area proposed will mean that the eventual provision of services like personal computers and videos will be possible, as will a permanent home for the Citizens' Advice Bureau, the Kew Historical Society and the Kew Toy Library.

"It will mean a comfortable and welcoming foyer, better separation of noisy from quiet areas, more seating, adequate workspace and room for library users to move without obstruction.

"It will also mean turning an under-utilized City Hall into a vital community asset."

The Committee believes that the relocation scheme will be welcomed by ratepayers as it is less than half the cost of a new building and the library will remain in the heart of Kew.

Councillor Cole said that the Committee members were delighted that Council had endorsed their own view that the relocation is by far the most cost-effective solution for the library.

The matter of funding and timing of the project has now to be resolved in conjunction with Council's overall capital plan.

Cr. Cole said she hopes the library will be relocated in the City Hall within the next two years, "Otherwise you'll need a can-opener to get in on Sunday afternoons".

#### **Occasional Care Centre**

Since the last edition of **Kewriosity**, Council has received the go-ahead for an Occasional Care Centre five days per week commencing in February, 1985.

The Centre will be staffed by a trained Coordinator who will be appointed in the near future. Other staff will be untrained but will need to have a commitment to working with children in a caring and safe environment.

Parents will be able to book their pre-school children into the Occasional Care Centre for up to four hours at a time whilst they attend appointments, shop, play tennis or just take a break.

The Occasional Care Centre will be in Strathalbyn Street, East Kew, behind the Infant Welfare Centre in the building presently being used as a kindergarten. It will be open for forty hours per week and as mentioned earlier will commence operation on Monday 4th February, 1984.

A full session of four hours care will cost \$6.00 but parents will be able to book for from one hour to four hours at a time. Twenty places will be available and while all preschool ages will be catered for, the number of children under two will be governed by State childminding regulations.

Should you require further information or wish to book your child into the Centre, please contact Rhonda Robertson at the Municipal Offices on 862 2466. The portico of Petrie Square is a fine stage and the lawns and gardens provide a friendly environment. If the weather is unkind, the carols will be held inside the Civic Centre.

The Ministers of East Kew and Kew churches have worked together for this special event.

Mr Gerard Petrie will be co-ordinating the evening's activities and he says he is expecting a bigger crowd than ever. "I believe that a lot of families are looking forward to having a great night out."

#### Full Day Care Centre

A day care centre caters for children between the ages 0-6 and can offer either full day care or regular part-time care.

A local committee has been meeting recently to attempt to obtain funding for a Full Day Care Centre for Kew. This committee was formed due to the need for a centre like this in the community. Most families need someone to care for their young children, at some time. The needs will vary with family circumstances and there should be a choice in the type and amount of care available. Kew doesn't currently have any subsidised Day Care Centre for children. The perception of Kew as a suburb of elderly citizens is losing ground with 4.6% of Kew's population in the 0-4 age bracket.

There is a need to obtain Commonwealth funding from the Office of Child Care, to ensure a high standard of care where qualified staff meet the individual needs of children. With funding, fees may be reduced for those with special needs.

A Full Day Care Centre for Kew is a positive step in the ever-present problem of child minding alternatives. 

Again a club for mixed company between the ages of 17 and 26 and you don't have to be a member of the Scouting Association to become a Rover.





Kew Library also caters for adult readers of popular fiction. There are many easy-tocarry paperback novels. These writers are just a few of the many who are published in paperback — Jeffrey Archer: **The Prodigal Daughter**, R. Ludlum: **The Parsifal Mosaic**, Winston Graham: The **Poldark** series, Stephen King: **The Shining**, J. May: **Saga of the Exiles** series, M. Mosco: **Almonds and Raisins**.

However, if you do not mind carrying hardbacks, one-volume collections of the novels of one particular author are good value. For example, omnibus editions of the works of Sir A.C. Doyle, Frederick Forsyth, John Galsworthy, Herman Hesse, Jack Higgins, Agatha Christie, D.H. Lawrence and W. Somerset Maugham are all held at Kew Library.

#### KCA responds to METRAS

The Kew Citizens' Association has prepared a submission in response to the Ministry of Transport's Metras Issue Paper on the reserve between Chandler Highway and Burke Road. KCA has actively voiced community concerns about the types of development along the outer circle reservation since 1979, when it was the first community group to formally articulate the problems of an expressway proposal along the Earl, Asquith, Valerie Streets route.

This submission has been prepared by the KCA committee after consideration of members' opinions, discussions with private citizens and community groups, published data from the Environmental Effects Study, a survey of residents along the reserve, discussions and meetings with Kew Council, and the views expressed at a public meeting which was publicised by an article in the local pression and 'leaflets distributed to 5,000 households.

This submission addresses the future use and development of the reserve from the Chandler Highway to Burke Road and considers all the major factors which presently need to be evaluated so that a final decision can be made and continued uncertainty eliminated.

In summary the submission makes the following major conclusions and recommendations that:

(1) the entire reservation east of High Street be rezoned and redeveloped for passive recreation, this park be part of a linear park linking several eastern and south-eastern suburbs and, that no other development be permitted along this section of the route;

(2) a new **two-lane** road be constructed within the reservation between Chandler Highway and Harp Junction to overcome operational difficulties and to improve the amenity along this section and that existing roads be remodelled and landscaped to provide access and parking for local residents;

(3) consistent with a design solution to traffic problems, the amount of parkland be maximised along the section from Chandler Highway to Harp Junction to provide a critical link in the linear park through to the Yarra. Only a two-lane road with appropriate intersectional treatments would achieve this objective along the narrow sections of the reserve.



# Where to from here?

At the Kew Community House there is no division between people. Here is a place for the handicapped, the young mix with the elderly, there are families and single parents with their children. At first, people can be awkward with each other.

At times, I have had to talk fast to fill the gaps created by long silences. At other times there has been a flash of friendship and an understanding develops between people, making the difference in age, background or experience unimportant.

I have watched people become aware of their needs, and the needs of others. Many people do not share the quality of life for which Kew is famous; their lives are spent mainly trying to survive. There is poverty in Kew, just as there is unemployment and loneliness.

Often people ask, "Do we need a Community House?" We need people who are involved, who are willing to take a responsibility for the community. The Community House provides a haven for those who need help, it provides courses for those who wish to learn and share skills. It is a place for social interaction, mirroring all groups in our community.

Those who are involved with running the House are struggling against community apathy. We have had some help from Kew residents, but they are few in number. Applications for funding can be refused on the grounds that Kew is a wealthy area. This attitude, combined with the shortage of volunteers, makes our job very difficult.

If the Community House is to have a future, it can only be through the support of the people of Kew. If you question the need for the House why not come along and see what community life is all about.

There is now a new co-ordinator. There will be new ideas and directions, so keep watching!

This has been a rich experience for me, with laughter and tears and special people whom I will miss, among them Jamie, Glenn, Susie, Lizzie Scott and Marie, from the **Glendonald School for the Deaf**.

I wish the Community House well. People of Kew, it's over to you.
