### **Mayoral Comment** SWEDISH HERO HONOURED IN KEW

By the time the June edition of 'Kewriosity' is delivered, Kew Council will have honoured a very courageous man by giving his name to a small park at Kew Junction.

Raoul Wallenberg was born in Sweden in 1912, three months after the tragic death of his father. His grandfather, Ambassador Wallenberg, allowed him to study architecture in the U.S.A. on condition that he eventually join the family's international banking firm. He extended his interests to commerce, which enabled him to travel widely in Europe - even after the Second World War had closed borders to other than nationals of neutral countries.

Wallenberg's business activities also took him to Hungary, where he met relatives and friends of his Jewish partner - many of whose lives he would

In 1944, Sweden responded to an appeal by the American War Refugee Board by sending Raoul Wallenberg, a non-Jewish single, multi-lingual business-

man, to Budapest.

He set about establishing 'protected' houses, hospitals and children's shelters for Jewish residents and refugees to serve as an 'International Ghetto'. He also distributed, often at great personal risk but with enormous determination and bravery, many thousands of protective passports which enabled the bearer to claim Swedish nationality.

As the situation worsened, he travelled tirelessly to retrieve Jews from the Auschwitz-bound cattle trucks



and death marches. It is estimated that he saved tens of thousands of lives.

When the Russians advanced on Budapest in January 1945 he was taken into their custody and disappeared

into the Soviet prison system.

Despite long but belated efforts by the Swedish Government to secure his release, Raoul Wallenberg still remains imprisoned in Russia — if he has survived.

Many people believe that he has, and for this reason

Kew Council was requested to plant a tree in honour of Raoul Wallenberg's 70th birthday in August 1982. It determined instead to give his name to a small but very visible park. As a member of that Council I am proud to be associated with a decision which looks beyond our boundaries to recognise a truly great man of this

'Raoul Wallenberg Garden' is on the corner of High and Princess Streets and the official naming ceremony was held on Sunday, May 27. His bust, by sculptor Karl Duldig, will be placed in the park later this year.

Since I first wrote about my street in the Kewriosity Sheet, estate agents have taken to calling it Edgevale Village. I can't discover, however, that it ever had a name. It was though, a village in kind if not in name, a self-sufficient community, with at the peak, twenty-two shops, a baker where there is now a small reserve, a nursery, and a dairy.

Butchers, fruit shops, haberdasher, an estate agent, you could do almost all your shopping in your own street. There was even a resident cabbie and a plumber. A horse bus ran from the Harp to Glenferrie, passing down Edgevale Road, so if you wanted boots or bicycles, you had

only to catch the bus.

The early subdivision of the land into narrow blocks defined the nature of the buildings; it was a working man's street, though now the small houses in and around Edgevale Road are selling well as first homes, and the larger Edwardian houses which later infilled the circumference of our village are sought as family homes.

Since I've been known to be collecting information about the area I've talked to some very elderly people who remember their childhood in Edgevale with warm affection, I'm learning names of shopkeepers, successive changes in shopping facilities - the road that way has been downwards since first trams, then the car and finally the supermarkets drew people to shop elsewhere. However, six shop premises are still occupied, though only three by retailers.

The street became like any suburban street, a place where you knew only your neighbours.

Two things have changed it lately, there are now ninety-three children in the street, I'm told, and children are great agents of socialisation. The other link between residents is our common concern about the vastly increased traffic brought into the street by the roundabout at the Edgevale-Wellington St intersection. Designed to prevent accidents at a 'black spot', it has proved a great convenience to commuters trying to dodge traffic lights.

This is part of a process on-going in cities everywhere today, the very vastness of them, the loss of the sense of community, the traffic and living-together irksomenesses turn citizens towards a new sharing of responsibilities. Neighbourhoods, rather than villages, they are setting up the values of neighbourhood, joining together the little islands of city dwellers into communities.

This is a historic process which we can observe in our own times - something Barbara Giles quite new.

### PARKING PERMITS FOR PEOPLE WITH PHYSICAL DISABILITIES

In 1983 after consultation with the community and in particular with people who have physical disabilities, the City of Kew decided to implement a number of policies designed to improve access to public facilities.

One of these policies involved parking and Kew agreed to supplement existing disabled persons' parking spaces as required and to ensure that such designated spaces are clearly marked to discourage unauthorised use.

Drivers with physical disabilities can apply for a parking label which allows them to park in those areas.

Several people have noted lately that cars without these labels have been parked in the designated areas. This may be due to drivers not applying for a permit, but it is more likely that the spaces are being taken by drivers who should not be using

Kew Council Traffic Officers say that generally the public recognises the value of these spaces and leaves them free.

Parking is a problem but that is not a good enough reason to park where you see the distinctive "RESERVED PARK-ING" sign.

Those people who have got a permit should display it clearly. If you think you are eligible for a permit, contact the Social Development Department at the Municipal Offices, on 862 2466.

### **COMMUNITY ARTISTS**

The Artists' Co-operative in the Kew/Deepdene area was formed in April this year after receiving funding from the Commonwealth Employment Programme to initiate an Artists in the Community Project.

The Artists' Co-operative is based at Kew High School, in the Community Education Advisory Committee's office under the supervision of Nancy Nankervis. Nancy is the Community Education Officer for the Kew/Deepdene area. Also assisting is trainee social worker Nancy Mariani.

Three artists and a co-ordinator have been employed. The artists, all of whom have different artistic backgrounds, are Raewyn Turner, Richard Evans and Jacinta Gruntsch. Pauline Bennett is the co-ordinator. The artists will be working during the year in our local schools and community recreation organisations.

There are ten schools, two of which are special schools - Glendonalds School for the Deaf and St. Paul's School for the Blind. The remaining eight consist of Government and Catholic parish primary schools. The recreation and community organisations involved are the Kew Youth Resource Centre, the Kew Community House and the Kew Youth Drop-In

Centre, all of which are situated in the central Kew area.

During the next twelve months the Artists' Co-operative will begin community projects where the public can participate or simply observe the artists at work. The artists' skills embrace a broad spectrum of abilities, ranging from designing, painting, drawing, sculpture, leatherwork, music, craft art to theatre. drama and dance.

It is hoped that the co-operative will enable active involvement with, all members of the community, including children, adults, people with disabilities and older people.

An artist in the community programme such as this provides access to the skills and processes of an individual artist with which the local community may never have had prior contact. One of the roles of the Artists' Co-operative is to bridge the gap between the community and the creative arts. It is hoped that by establishing these links the co-operative will act as a vehicle to encourage new opportunities for creative expression. ### **NEW VICTORIA** BUILDING REGULATIONS

The March issue of Kewriosity carried a small article on these new regulations which came into force on May 1 to replace the previously used Uniform

Building Regulations.

As stated then, the V.B.R.s allow more innovative housing design and accept alternative construction methods. However, the regulations still ensure the application of reasonable construction standards. Some of the changes to be aware of include those affecting the position of the dwelling, occupancy, lighting, size and fire protection.

Dwelling Position: Setback from the land frontage must be a minimum of 7.6 metres and in respect of a corner site the minimum setback for a street alignment other than the frontage will be 2 metres. The minimum distance between houses on an allotment has been reduced from 9 metres to 2.4 metres.

Occupancy: Certificates of Occupancy may be granted in stages, permitting parts of the building still under construction to be occupied.

Lighting: Roof lights may be used in lieu of windows as an acceptable means of providing the required natural light to habitable and non-habitable rooms.

Size: The requirement for a house to have an area of not less than 55m2 has been omitted.

Fire Protection: All municipalities must prepare a map and register of fire zones. Whether or not a building is to be situated in a fire zone, and if so, the class of fire zone, will determine the extent of protection required.

### VOTING

At the last Municipal elections there was some confusion about who is and who isn't entitled to vote. Failure to vote when entitled to can result in a fine, and it also means that you miss the opportunity to have a say in the election of Coun-

All Kew residents over the age of 18 are entitled, and required, to vote at Municipal elections. In addition, owners and occupiers of business premises are entitled to vote, as are nominees of companies registered in Kew and unnaturalised citizens.

If you are uncertain about whether you are on the voters' roll, you can contact the Municipal Offices on 862 2466. This year Municipal elections are to be held throughout the State on August 4th.

A balance has to be maintained between beautiful gardens, which we all appreciate, and maintaining safe pedes-


The Local Government Act seeks to do this through by-laws which clearly define a property owner's responsibility.


As you can see from the accompanying diagram, trees and shrubs must be pruned up to at least three metres above the footpath.

If you ignore a Council request to prune offending trees, this can result in Council doing the work and sending you

It is also an offence, and dangerous, to leave objects such as bicycles lying on the footpath.

### **DOMESTIC NOISE**

The Minister for Planning and Environment has prepared a draft amendment to the Environmental Protection Act. This amendment concerns noise controls.

The table below gives details of how the amendment affects particular types of noise. Please note that prescribed times are those times during which you are not allowed to create the noise.

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### Prescribed Items

#### Vehicle, equipment or appliance having an internal combustion engine (except a vehicle entering or leaving premises)

Chain or circular saw, gas or air compressor, pneumatic power tool or any grinding equipment

3 Electric equipment or appliance not falling within Group 2

4 Music Instrument

Sound reproducing equipment (including stereogram), radio or television

Hammer or impacting tool

### **VOLUNTEERS**

A new day centre for confused elderly people, called the "Gatehouse" will be opening in May 1984.

It is a joint venture between Kew and Hawthorn Councils, and other local health and welfare organizations.

The day centre will be situated in a large house with an attractive enclosed garden, just off Princess St., Kew. It will operate initially for two days per week.

## BLACK SHEEP AND FAMILY CRESTS

All municipal libraries have what is known as subject specialization areas. One of Kew Library's specialities is genealogy, the tracing of family descent.

The Library attempts to maintain a full collection of printed works on this topic, about our area. In many cases indexes to these works are compiled and referral to local historical societies can be arranged.

The Library has a collection of introductory works on genealogy, including Australian works and standard British titles. Kew has general books covering genealogy, names, heraldry and insignia, 'how to do it' books, histories of families, immigration lists, the history and meaning of personal names and epitaphs and cemetery transcriptions.

Items from other libraries can often be obtained by applying for an inter-library loan through your local public library.

# City of Kew Infantile Paralysis

(POLIOMYELITIS)

TO COMBAT THE MENACE of an EPIDEMIC of this disease the co-operation of all Citizens is invited and the Medical Officer of Health recommends:—

- Avoid personal contact with any resident of the primarily affected areas of Ormond, Caulfield and Moorabbin.
- Children from such areas should not under any circumstances be invited or allowed to visit Kew, and Kew children should not visit those areas.
- Children under 16 years of age should not at present enter any Theatre or other Hall of entertainment.
- The safest place for children at the present time is within the fences of their own home.
- All household milk should be boiled or pasteurised.
- 6. IN THE EVENT OF A CASE OCCURRING IN KEW —

The patient must be isolated for at least one month. Nasal and other discharges must be destroyed by burning or boiling. Urine and Faeces must be disinfected by soaking in strong phenyle or lysol before being disposed of. The patient and all food (particularly milk, cream, etc.) must be carefully pro-

### PARKS AND GARDENS

The Garden State Committee has published a Position Paper which presents a strategy to reverse tree decline in Victoria.

They are concerned with tree loss in

both rural and urban Victoria.

The loss of trees in our rural areas is probably a far more serious issue than many people yet realise. Unless increased action is taken to reverse this vegetation loss with its accelerating land degradation problem, the economic and social future for farmers and the rural community is under threat in many parts of Victoria.

The target is clear. About 64% of the total area of Victoria is private farm land with some 50,000 individual holdings. Here is the greatest problem and where the cure must start. If we planted five millian trees a year on Victorian farm land, we would only just be holding our

present level of tree cover.

The problems of salting, erosion and stock losses have been well documented. If for example you saw the dust-storms of early 1983 that took unmeasured quantities of rich Victorian topsoil out into the Tasman Sea you would realise the scale of the problem. The objectives of the committee are to:

1. arrest and then reverse tree decline in rural Victoria, mobilising the resources of the community to the greatest

possible extent;

2. increase tree cover to a level which will ensure

- long term protection of soil and water

- sustained productivity of agricultural land

- maintenance of genetic resources wildlife habitat and landscape diversity.

3. Promote well-planned establishment of trees and improve their maintenance in urban areas.

Peter Davies, the Superintendent of the City of Kew's Parks and Gardens, is keenly aware of the problem of tree loss. His department is planting missing street trees and other park trees during the period May to September. He has asked to be informed of any dead or missing street trees to help him plan that work.
