HAY'S Paddock — SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

Hay's Paddock, which is bordered by Lister Street and the Eastern Freeway in North Kew, is twice the size of Kew's Victoria Park. The area is known as Hay's Paddock because it was originally owned by Peter Hay who used the site for a stud farm. Council acquired the land from the Board of Works to compensate for land lost due to Freeway construction.

Council adopted the Hay's Paddock Development Master Plan in April, 1981 and is implementing it over a number of years. Already the site contains two sports ovals, pavilions, car parks, an archery range plus a large area of undeveloped passive recreation space.

The 1983/84 Budget allows for the development of pathways, playgrounds and picnic areas and Council hopes that the provision of these facilities will encourage more use of the passive recreation aspect of Hay's Paddock.

The sports ovals are being used by cricket, football, soccer and archery

clubs as well as by individuals on a more informal basis.

3MBS-FM: KEW'S OWN RADIO STATION

3MBS, Kew's community owned and operated stereo FM radio station, is actively seeking more supporters. The station broadcasts at least 12 hours of fine music a day from its studios at 146 Cotham Road, Kew, with the help of about 90 volunteers from all walks of life.

COMMUNITY ARTISTS

A project which will employ three artists and a co-ordinator to work in the Kew/Deepdene area has recently been funded under the Commonwealth Employment Programme.

The project, which will run for one year, is likely to get under way in May. The artists will work with students, teachers and parents to create their community art.

As part of a concentrated effort to increase the number of subscribers, 3MBS will be holding a Radiothon over the first weekend in May (4th-6th): more than 50 hours of uninterrupted music, including live broadcasts from the Kew Civic Centre. The goal for the weekend is at least 1,000 new subscribers, and listeners will be invited to visit the studios and to join the roving audience at the Civic Centre.

People to answer the telephone, to type, to program, to announce (especially during the daytime), to help in recording and other technical areas will always be welcome. don't subscribe, you can do so merely by calling at the station or sending a cheque for \$40 (\$30 concession). In return you will receive 12 copies of 3MBS's program guide **Libretto**.

PUBLIC MEETING

There are moves afoot to establish a co-ordinating and referral committee for children with disabilities. The project is called 'Shrublands' and the emphasis is on an early intervention programme which will focus on helping the child from the earliest possible age. A group of parents have been meeting to discuss the possibility of formalising the structure and procedures of the committee. FINANCIAL COUNSELLING

A generous offer by Care Force has given the Kew/Hawthorn Citizens' Advice Bureau the services of a Financial Counsellor, Cheryl McGarrin, for several hours each week.

The workers at Care Force and at the Bureau, and the Social Welfare staffs of both Kew and Hawthorn, have become increasingly aware that financial problems are being encountered not only by families — the special area of help provided by Care Force — but also by single people and childless couples.

The funding for Cheryl's position comes to Care Force from the Family Strengthening programme, and therefore only a small proportion of her time can be made available to other people in the community.

Cheryl's work at the C.A.B. will be very useful as a pilot project in revealing the spread of financial problems within the community, and may show that a different basis is required for financial counselling.

Cheryl will be at the Kew Bureau

on Fridays, and appointments to see her can be made at either Bureau.

KEW RECREATION CENTRE

A public meeting was held on Thursday March 16 to discuss the possibilities of establishing a Recreation Centre in Kew. Three community representatives were elected to the Council Consultative Committee which is investigating the viability of such a centre. They are:

Mr. Alan Alpass who is interested in the development of a useful and economically viable Recreation Centre which caters for a broad range of residents;

Mr. Rhys Williams who is interested in seeing the establishment of

a facility that caters for all residents and which includes an indoor swimming pool;

Mr. Ian Field who is interested in ensuring that the design of such a facility will allow maximum access to all Kew residents.

These community representatives join Councillors Kaye Cole, Wendy Smith and Anne Glasson and Kew's Recreation Officer, Peter Butler, on the Committee. The Committee can be contacted through Peter on 862 2466.

FIRES AND INCINERATORS

Council By-Law No. 115 regulates the construction and use of incinerators and barbecues.

No burning is permitted unless in a properly constructed incinerator or barbecue.

Incinerator use is not allowed at any time on a Sunday or Monday or outside the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. on any other day, unless written permission is received from Council.

It is also illegal to burn any material which would cause the emission of toxic or offensive fumes or excessive smoke.

Council's By-Laws Officers have been instructed to enforce the provisions of the By-Law.

Full copies of the By-Law are available free of charge, from the Municipal Offices.

NEW BUILDING REGULATIONS

The new Victoria Building Regulations (V.B.R.'s) come into force on May 1, 1984. These regulations replace the Uniform Building Regulations (U.B.R.) but are based on the same principles of fire protection, maintaining standards of habitation and preserving owners' rights to construct within the Regulations.

However, there are a number of practical changes. For dwelling construction the V.B.R.'s are considered to be a 'de-regulatory' document in comparison with the Regulations they replace.

In many instances, the V.B.R.'s will permit or legalise building works that would have been prohibited by the U.B.R.'s.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES

The Children's Services Consultative Committee was formed following a public meeting in December last year. The purpose of the committee is to review Children's Services in the City of Kew and to discuss and formulate future services for children aged 0 to 12 years. Recommendations will be put to Council and action taken to implement such services for the future as are deemed necessary.

KEW EAST PRIMARY SCHOOL

State School No. 3161, East Kew, began on its present site in Kitchener Street when a three-storeyed building was opened in 1923. In the early 1920's, it became a Central School; secondary classes continued until district High Schools were established. As the number of pupils steadily increased, an Infant School building was added in 1929. With the passing of time, other buildings followed — Canteen/staff-room, Rural School (now dismantled), L.T.C. classrooms, Library, Art/craft room, Administration Block.

Kew East's successful brass band was set up in 1930 following an application to the Gillies Bequest. Mr R. Hogan worked tirelessly for the band during 1928-1957. The work was continued under the tuition of Mr. D. Santin, a former band boy. The Kew Music Centre located in the school's grounds began as a local community project supported by the Victorian Education Department, the Kew City

Council, St. Anne's School, Kew Citizens' Band and Kew East Primary School to foster and promote music throughout Kew. Currently, the school band consists of sixty pupils, ranging from Year Three to Year Six. A school choir began in 1983. Clearly music continues to play a large part in the life of the school.

The school has a long and outstanding reputation for excellence in sports. With the passing of the Central School era, less emphasis was given to highly competitive sporting activities. However, 1983 saw Kew East again enter the Kooyong Sports Association but with emphasis more upon participation and diversity of activities. Swimming continues to be given a high priority.

A recent survey of all parents gave support to the need for the school to provide each child with a sound basic education. Curriculum studies include Language (Listening, Speaking, Writing, Reading), Mathematics, Social Studies, Science/Nature

Study, Art/craft, Music, Health and Physical Education. Religious Instruction is given by visitors appointed and approved by accrediting bodies. Specialist teachers conduct Art/craft, Library, Music, Physical Education and Special Assistance programs.

Parental support has always been a feature of the school. Last year, the newly formed Parents' Association joined the Band Parents to become the two auxiliary bodies. In line with the State Government's new directions in the organisation of education throughout Victoria, the school parent community is shortly to elect a reconstituted School Council consisting of parents and staff.

With the completion of the renovations to the original three-storeyed building and future renovations to other buildings of the school, and the drawing together of resources, Kew East Primary School is entering into a further exciting stage of its history.

HERITAGE WEEK — HISTORICAL PHOTOGRAPH COLLECTION

To launch Heritage Week (April 8-15), the Kew Historical Society has arranged the display of a collection of large colour photographs (the Koelmeyer-Edmonds Collection) of early suburban Melbourne street scenes. This important collection may be viewed during Heritage Week at the City of Kew Library, Charles Street, Kew.

Lawrie Koelmeyer, a collector of old and rare photographs, commissioned Jenny Edmonds, a noted local artist, to paint scenes such as Kew Junction, Auburn Village and the Hawthorn Railway Station in historical detail from old photographs. The paintings were then colour photographed for the Heritage Week display.

Kew residents will see twenty photos in all at the Kew Library. We

should feel honoured that our suburb has been chosen for this display. The Koelmeyer-Edmonds team was invited to launch the public exhibition in Kew at the instigation of the Historical Society and its President, Raie Brunette, who are to be congratulated for their efforts in arranging this special collection.

The State Bank has indicated its support for the photographic display. Later it is proposed that the completed paintings will be exhibited at the Head Office of the Bank to coincide with Victoria's 150th Anniversary celebrations.

The display at the Kew Library is a significant honour for our City and is one which you should not miss.

RENAISSANCE DANCING

The dances of the old world, some of them dating back as far as the court of Henry VIII, can now be studied in Kew.

For over the past year, St. Paul's church hall on the corner of Windella and Hale Sts, East Kew, has become the centre for classes and rehearsals by one of Australia's most unusual dance teams — the Rippon Lea Renaissance Dancers of Melbourne.

The group meets on most Wednesday evenings, and a special class for newcomers to Historic Dance runs from 6-8 p.m. Local residents who would like to join or just watch a

Authentically patterned period costumes, made by Melbourne designer Shane Dunn, are a feature of the annual performances by the Rippon Lea dance team at such events as the Early Music Proms, the Sale Renaissance Festival and the Renaissance Workshop of the Maryborough Golden Wattle Festival.

Helga Hill, the group's director, is an international teacher of Historic Dance who gives courses each year in Sweden and Austria. This year, she will also teach in London and New Zealand.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

Council is currently undertaking traffic management studies in certain areas of Kew. These studies are based on the Traffic Management Strategy adopted by Council in 1980.

Residents living in the area bordered by Cotham Road at Burke Road, Barkers Road and Glenferrie Road have recently responded to a questionnaire which asked them to comment on the installation of various traffic management devices. Results of this survey will be part of an evaluation report to be presented to Council in April.

Residents living in the area bordered by Cotham Road, Burke Road, High Street and Harp Road

(Area 6) will be aware that consultants are currently working in the area to prepare a plan for traffic management facilities in their area. When this plan is complete it will be displayed and residents will be asked to comment.

Council will soon consider the appointment of consultants to undertake a traffic study in the area bordered by High Street, Asquith Street, Earl Street and Princess Street (Area 5).

DRIVERS & JOCKEYS WANTED

Over 160 meals a day are delivered by the Kew Meals on Wheels voluntary network.

The programme's Supervisor, Mrs. Pat Grydzyń, says that there is currently a daily increase in the number of people wishing to make use of the service.

This increased demand means that Pat is looking for more volunteers to

deliver the meals. Often the Meals on Wheels visitor is the only person whom residents using the service will see all day, so volunteers provide the opportunity for conversation as well as a wholesome lunch.

DELIVERING KEWRIOSITY

It is Council's belief that local community groups should be encouraged to undertake this job because it offers the groups the opportunity to raise money for their activities. Chris Reidy, Kew's Information Officer, provides the groups with maps of Kew that are divided into clearly defined delivery areas and also offers assistance in co-ordinating delivery. There are 22 delivery areas and if a group has at least 22 active members, the 11,500 copies of Kewriosity can be delivered in a half day. Payment for delivery is approximately \$360. For those paying by instalments the 3rd instalment is due by 31/5/84 and 4th instalment is due by 31/8/84.

Late payments of instalments also incur interest penalties.

INFORMATION OFFICER

Council recently appointed Chris Reidy to the newly created position of Information Officer (part time). Amongst other things, Chris aims to improve the information flow between Council and the Community.

This improved two-way flow of information will raise public awareness of the role of Council and promote community involvement.

TRASH AND TREASURE

The Voluntary Helpers' Association of Carnsworth Garoopna are holding a "Treasure and Trash" sale on Saturday, 7th April in the ambulance bay at 18 Barry Street, Kew, commencing at 9 a.m.

Carnsworth Garoopna has been established in Kew since 1947 and has grown to its present capacity of 150 beds. As well as providing nursing care for the Aged, Carnsworth Garoopna also offers its facilities and expertise by extending "Outreach" to the community in Day Care Service. The Voluntary Helpers Association are holding this sale to provide amenities for the patients.



YOUTH RESOURCE CENTRE

The Kew area now has a Youth Resource Centre which has been operating since early February this year. The Centre is based in a shop-front at 283 High Street, Kew and the normal opening hours are Monday to Friday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Three people have been employed to run the Centre and they are Robyn Molloy, who is the co-ordinator, and two youth workers, Barry Kendall and Tony Jecks.

Kew Council's Recreation Office has been responsible for the implementation of the Centre, based on the results of a survey conducted by two youth work students in 1983. One of the findings of this survey was that youth indicated a need "for a community information and referral centre to assist young people". The survey considered that such a centre would provide services in areas such as information, unemployment, education and recreation. Council received a Government grant to assist in the initial cost of establishing this Centre and further financial assistance has been obtained from the Kew Holy Trinity Church, whose recent fund-raising efforts will enable us to purchase much needed resource equipment.

The establishment of comprehensive youth services in this area is a tremendous step forward as traditionally, services have centred around the elderly and young children, and, as the 1981 Census figures show 24% of the population between 10 and 24 years of age, a commitment to youth services in the municipality is warranted.

The Centre is providing three major services. This includes an information and referral exchange, and already we have answered enquiries in the areas of recreation, drug use, sexuality, education, accommodation, legal advice and financial counselling and support.

Our second service is that of support for unemployed young people, and this is undoubtedly our most predominant area of concern. We are offering advice in regard to the search for employment and are also now offering programmes at the Centre each afternoon from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. We are anxious to speak with young people who are capable of making things for sale in the hope of developing a retail outlet for the sale of these products.

Finally, the Centre is involved in projects in the local schools. These are designed to increase students' awareness of the community at large and assist them in their striving towards adulthood.

Response to the Centre has been

encouraging. There is strong community support, enthusiastic encouragement from local businesses and a steady stream of young people making use of the Centre. We are available to meet with all young people who live in and around Kew, and this allows us to cater for students who attend schools in Kew but do not live within the City's boundaries. We are also involved with parents of young people, and would stress that if parents are worried about their teenagers, they are more than welcome to make full use of our services.
